# Vegetable Pickle

(Contributed by Mrs. J. S. Wheless)

- 1 peck green tomatoes.
- 11/4 dozen cucumbers. 9 green peppers.
- 1/2 large cabbage.
- 1/4 peck onions.
- Two-thirds small sack salt.
- 3 quarts cider vinegar. 1 box celery seed. I box white mustard seed.
  - 4 cups sugar.
  - 1/2 tablespoon black pepper. 1 teaspoon red pepper.
- METHOD-Slice the vegetables as thinly as possible and place in a large boiler, putting a layer of salt and a layer of vegetables. Let stand four or five hours, then add 1 gallon of water and squeeze out the vegetables with the hands. Put the ingredients in a cooking utensil with the vinegar and condiments. Cook 1/2 hour after the mixture begins to boil.


### Ingram School Opened Monday






