MILL TO BE CONVERTED INTO ICE AND COLD STORAGE PLANT

New Plant to Have Capacity of Forty Tons Ice Daily—Cold Storage in Connection.

Kerrville is assured of a modern ice and cold storage plant for next season by the completion of a business deal the latter part of last week...

According to the terms of the deal the plant will be moved to the site of the mill on East Water Street...

The top floor of the building will be used for the freezing tanks for the ice and the other floors for the storage part of the business.

While it is not definite as yet, the present plan is to discontinue the manufacture of flour, but the feed mill and cotton gin will be retained and improved.

Engineers have already made a survey of the building to ascertain whether the structure would stand the strain of the added weight occasioned by the freezing tanks and storage of ice...

Work of remodeling will be begun immediately and it is planned on having the plant ready to begin operation by the first of the year.

The plant in use the past few years in Kerrville is of 18 ton daily capacity, but this has proved insufficient for the past two summers to supply ice for local consumption.

JUNCTION HIGH LOSSES TO SCHREINER 13-0 SATURDAY

Institute Shows Marked Improvement Over Previous Home Appearance; Play at Austin Saturday.

Scoring both touchdowns on forward passes, Schreiner Institute defeated Junction High School, 13-0, last Saturday afternoon on the Schreiner Field.

Schreiner opened by kicking to Junction and the Kimble County boys started off like they were going to clean up on the game.

After holding Junction for four downs and getting the ball, the local boys opened up a series of plays that carried the ball rapidly toward the opponent's goal.

Just before the end of the second quarter Laughlin passed to Schubert for the second touchdown, the play netting 30 yards.

At the beginning of the second half Coach Neely sent in a second string team, with the exception of big Gyp Henderson, principally to give the boys a workout and to enable the coach to get a better line on his players.

It looked like Schreiner was going to make another goal before the end of the last quarter, but an offside play called the ball back for a penalty when a forward pass had placed it right on the goal line.

Spectators who have witnessed the Schreiner team in action during the two home games were amazed at the development the men had made.

Next Saturday they play St. Edwards College at Austin; the following Saturday, October 18, the A. & M. Freshmen will play on Schreiner Field; October 25, the San Marcos Normal Lobos will oppose Schreiner, also on the local gridiron.

CARAVAN OF BUILD-A-BUICK TOUR TO PASS THROUGH CITY

Short Stop Will Be Made Here October 17th—En Route From El Paso to San Antonio.

The Buick Motor Company of Flint, Michigan, is sending two of its skilled workmen on a 9,000-mile tour of the United States, during which time complete Buick automobiles are to be constructed in some forty of the leading cities.

The workmen, Otto and William Hess, will pass through this city Thursday or Friday of next week, en route from El Paso to San Antonio, on a two-ton General Motors truck completely equipped with tools and so built that an improvised stage about 15x30 feet is available for the work in hand wherever the exhibitions are held.

The idea back of the plan is to impress motorists with the perfect interchangeability of Buick parts, a chassis being constructed at each of the large cities en route from parts carried in stock by the local branch or distributing house.

The caravan is to travel to all parts of the United States, from coast to coast, exhibitions being held in all the principal cities en route. The construction of the chassis is accompanied by a lecture by Patrick Keating, of the factory Service Department, and to emphasize the event a moving picture exhibition is given in each place following the demonstration.

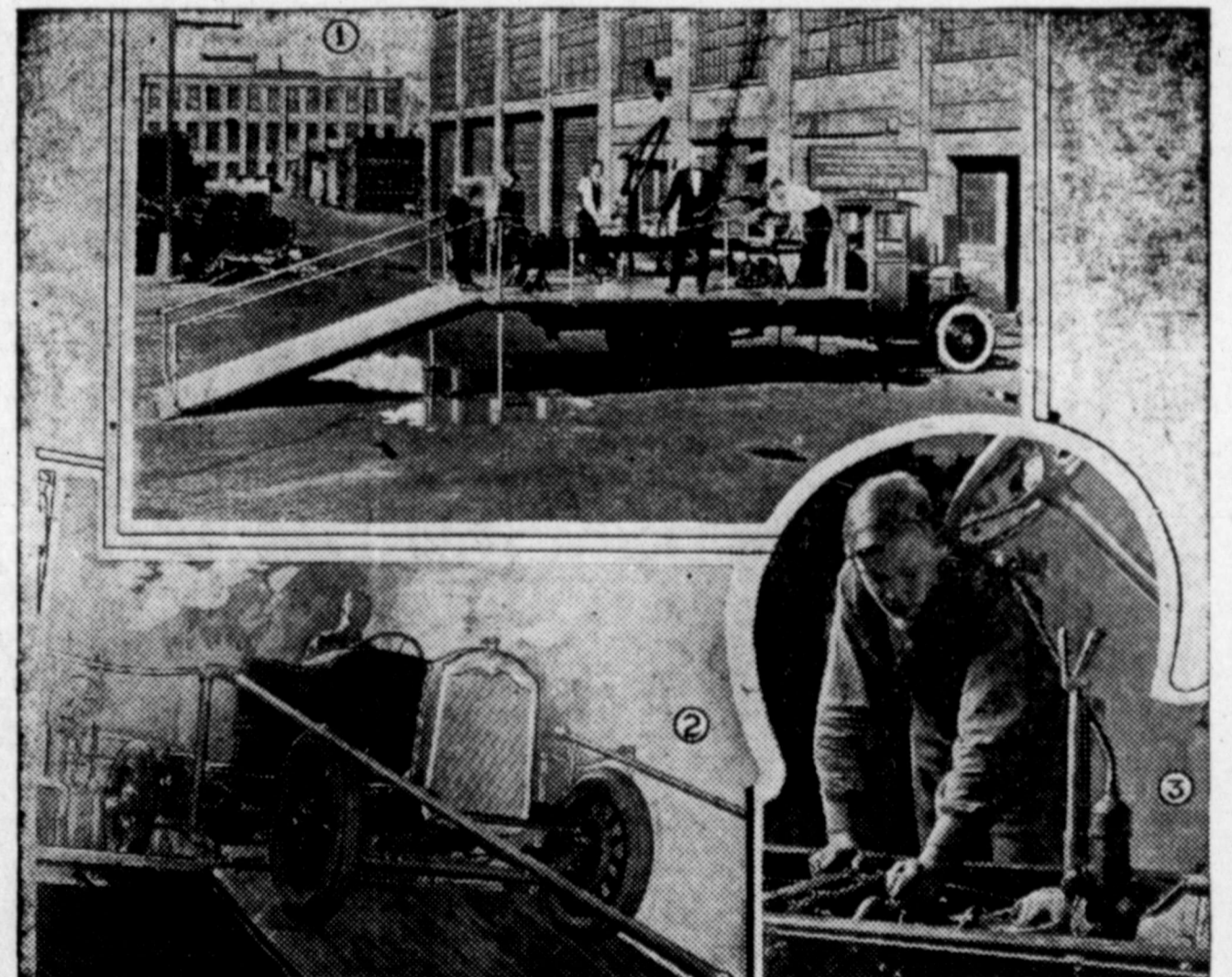

"Me for Ma"

No matter how you feel about the outcome of the summer's political campaign, there is one thing we must all accept, and that is no campaign ever produced a better slogan. Every since Eve was created in the Garden of Eden, "Ma" has needed a boost. It took a red hot political campaign to coin a slogan that might be used by every son and daughter in the world to express their genuine heartfelt sentiment of Ma. In all the ages of the past Ma has had a lot of hot air and sob stuff poured into her ears but it never got her anywhere.

When I was a child, the most popular motto in all the land was "What is Home Without a Mother." It was printed in all kinds of fancy letters. It was pictured in all kinds of sentimental designs. In our home it was stitched into perforated card board with all colors of "zephyr," framed in a beautiful, cheap frame and covered with glass to keep the flies from roosting on "Mother." And there it hung through all the years after mother died and left her life work half done for others to finish.

That motto hangs in my memory still and haunts me every day. What did it mean to me as a child? It meant a home without a mother. It seemed to me it meant the final expression of despair after the mother in any home had been taken out of that home. There was no hope for a home without a mother. As the years came and went another version of the same motto revealed itself.

The second revelation told me it did not mean what it said at all. The real meaning of the motto was not what is home without a mother, but what is home without a baby, or a half dozen crying children. And in my own mother's life it had meant ELEVEN children. Eight boys and three girls to feed and dress and send to school, and rear, except two of the boys soon meant little narrow graves to care for. She had pioneered in two States and developed three different homes. She had toiled and drudged through 30 years of life, passing directly from childhood to motherhood without a year of real youth. And then just when she was needed most to rear her big family that she had paid her life for she was worn out and gone, with never one day of rest or recreation.

And then a third revelation of the old motto came to me. What is home without a mother means who will do the work. Who will do the saving and sacrificing now. Who will sow that others may reap. Who will wait on the family when they are sick. Who will kiss away the tears when things go wrong with the children. Why, it was not mother we were thinking of at all when that old motto was coined. It was coined by some selfish, self-pitying creature who really had no interest at all in mother's welfare, pleasure or accomplishments. The whole thought in that old motto any way you read it is for "ME" instead of "Me For Ma."

If the old motto were interpreted as it should be it would read "MA FOR ME." We love the new slogan best. It means "I am for mother." I believe in her rights and her ambitions. I believe she should have the same privilege to serve the world that any other person has. I believe in her principles. I believe in her judgment. I believe in giving every mother in the world an equal chance with everybody else to live her biggest, best life. I believe in sharing a little of the honor with mother instead of giving her all the blame. I believe in recognizing her powers the same as those of any other human being. It is time for the world to recognize

mother for what SHE is and not for what you are only. "All that I am I owe my mother." Did you ever hear that? Study it. Big I. Dear little mother. How proud you should be that you bore ME. It has taken the world a long time to give mother any credit for doing any thing by "raisin' ME." The greatest thought that has been given to the world this year or in many years is "ME FOR MA."

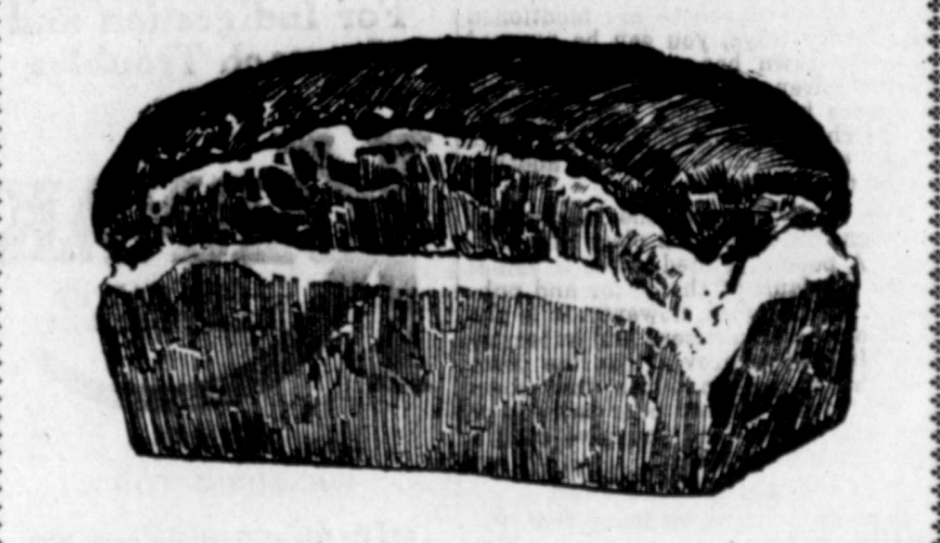

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING SUREST WAY TO BUILD SMALL TOWN INTO CITY

(Note—A correspondent to the Small Town Chamber of Commerce department of The Commercial World, published at Fort Worth, asks: "What is the surest way to make my town grow?" The answer is easy—but it is worth an entire column of this publication; and here it is):

There is hardly a town in Texas whose citizens do not want to build it into a city.

There is not a town in Texas whose residents have not the means at hand to increase its size to double or treble what it is today.

How can this be done? is the question that is asked every day—and that is just what the publisher of The Commercial World has asked me to tell in this article.

If you want to see your town grow, there is just one way to accomplish it and that is by advertising its advantages in your local newspaper.

Advertising Does Pay

Whether you believe it or not, advertising does pay—and it pays the city in a greater measure even than it does the individual business man.

Of course there is advertising and advertising. It is not meant to suggest that you have the city government or the Chamber of Commerce run display advertisements in your local paper. That probably would be a paying investment, but there are other ways of advertising in the local newspaper that beat display advertising a city block—that is, for a city.

In the first place, let me emphasize that people judge every town by the newspaper published there. Your newspaper is just like your letter that you write a stranger. He will judge you by that letter, the paper: it is written on, the handwriting or the typing, the spelling, and the way you sign your name. When I get a letter from a stranger and read it through, I have a pretty good index to that man. And I can certainly tell a lot about a town by the time I finish reading the weekly or daily newspaper published there.

Must Carry Advertising

In judging your town by its newspaper, the first thing to look at is the amount of advertising carried. If the ads are few, ill arranged, and the copy not up-to-date, you know the town is behind the times and that must not be a very attractive place in which to live. That is the fault of the merchants—and proves that they need waking up.

The second thing in judging a town by its paper is the reading matter and the spirit of optimism—or maybe depression manifest by its editor. If the paper is full of interesting local news, written in breezy manner, and printed readably, you can always bet that the town is a good place in which to live. If there is plenty of school news and the teachers are mentioned in friendly ways, you can be assured that the town has good schools and that children reared there will have a chance to grow into good citizens. If the churches and pastors get their share of publicity, that is another credit to the town.

The third thing is the mechanical excellence thereof as a piece of printing. A poorly printed paper is sometimes the fault of the editor and publisher. More often, however, it is the fault of the advertisers and subscribers. It always proves that the town and the section in which that town is located are mighty poor patrons of the local paper—and you give such a town a big black mark.

Paper Better Than Town

You can always estimate that the paper is better than the town in which it is published; and you will never be wrong. Editors are built that way

—they always sell a better product than the get paid for. This is truer in Texas than any other State, mainly because Texas editors have been in the business so long for glory instead of money that they think nothing of the latter but spend 24 hours a day figuring how to get out a better paper.

Right here let me say that small Texas towns have better newspapers as a rule than the small towns of any other State in the Union—and they deserve far better financial support than they have ever received.

But this is no brief for the country editor. He needs none.

So back to the matter of building a city out of a town by the advertising method!

Editor Your Partner

In the first place go to your local newspaper man—or both of them, if you have two—and get all the information you can about the newspaper problems of the town. Find out how many subscribers are reached out of town and where they live. Find out how many papers go out of the county and out of the State. Above all things find out whether the newspapers are making money or losing money.

Having this information, the important thing is to see that the newspaper is a profitable concern. No editor can build a city on an empty stomach. Put some dollars in his pocket—even if you have to chloroform him to do it.

Then get some advertising in his paper, and get it there at paying rates. Don't see how cheaply you can trade with him. The man who would jew a country editor down on advertising rates is a traitor to his own town. Having put some money in the editor's pocket and some advertising in his paper, you can afford to take up the matter of a better paper—if that is needed, though it probably will not be.

Circulation Next Need

Having gotten your town in a fair way to have a paper that will be a good advertisement you can afford to look after its circulation. Remember that the paper which reaches no one is not an asset to any town, no matter how good it is. So the thing to do is to build circulation—and it is up to you to do it.

But, you will say, that is the editor's business! Sure it is—but it's your business, too, and if you are going to build your small town into a city, that is the way to go about it.

Remember that every time you get a dollar and a half or two-dollar subscription to your local paper, you are

doing your town and every merchant in it ten dollars' worth of good.

John Spurlin's View

When the writer was a boy with his first newspaper, John L. Spurlin was the biggest merchant in Hamilton and perhaps the biggest merchant in any adjoining county. He always had a big ad—usually a page—in the Hamilton Herald. Hearing one day of a paper—probably the old Dublin Progress in the palmy days of populism and Jim Daley—which had 2,200 subscribers, Spurlin said:

"If my town had a paper with 2,200 subscribers I'd do twice the business I can do now, and I'd take a double page ad every week at a dollar an inch."

Spurlin had the right idea about the value of newspaper circulation to a town.

Yet many good papers go along year after year boosting their towns, printing all the news, chronicling all the deaths and births—and never have a thousand paid subscribers—the only kind that are worth a tinker's damn!

How to Get Subscribers

And it is much easier for the business man of a town to get a subscriber for the local paper than for the editor. "Say, have you subscribed for the paper? Well, you know we're proud of our paper and we want every man who comes to this town to read it!" Some little remark like that will do the work—and you have made a

friend for your town and a friend for all the business men who advertise in that paper, all at one time.

I know a man who does a credit merchandise business in a town of less than 3,000 people; and he has turned in an average of 50 subscribers a month to that town's paper ever since he started business. When he gets a customer that paper gets a subscriber; and the merchant declares he makes money by it.

These are by no means all my ideas about advertising a town to make it grow; but this was to be a column—and the space is used up. May these put some ideas to working in every Texas town that wants to grow.

The rug is six feet by four and carries out the color scheme of United States currency. It is illegal to reproduce currency in any manner.

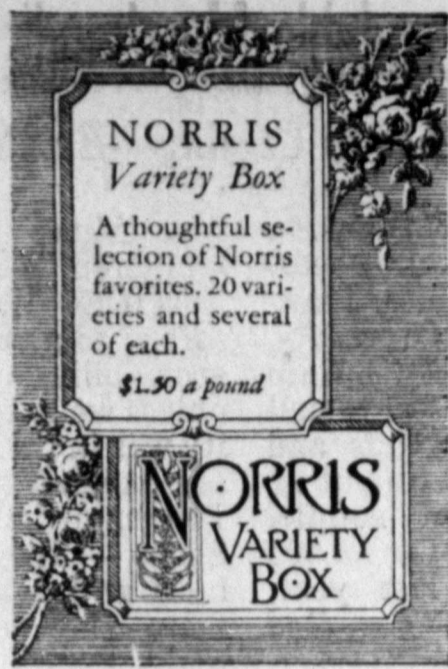

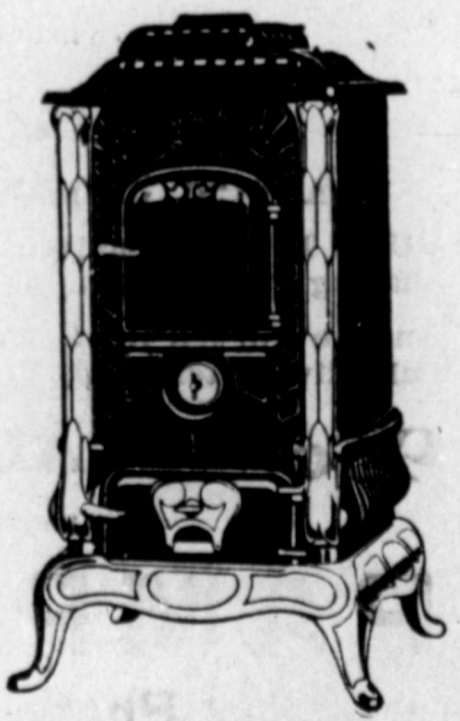
