



# Pecan Macaroons

(Contributed by Mrs. H. Weiss)

- 1/2 pound pecans.
- Whites of 4 eggs.
- 1 pound sugar.
- 8 or 10 large soda crackers.
- Flavor to taste.

**METHOD**—Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froth, roll crackers fine and sift through a coarse sieve. Add to the egg whites, add sugar and nut meats, which have been chopped fine. Flavor with vanilla or cinnamon. Drop by teaspoonfuls on a greased tin and bake in a moderate oven until light brown.

## DRIED BUTTERMILK FOR WINTER EGGS

Farm and Ranch: Almost all poultry raisers bemoan the lack of eggs during the winter. Of course, this general condition brings on market shortage and egg prices climb. In fact, an egg laid in the winter is worth, in actual market price, two eggs laid in the spring. If this is true, the added care and feeding necessary to get eggs during the winter months returns big dividends.

There is one fact that most poultry raisers overlook, that hens cannot lay eggs in winter when given the same feed as in the spring, when new sprouts and other food elements are plentiful. To get more eggs in winter, there is one rule to remember.

Hens have more work to do in order to lay eggs in winter than any other time of year. For one thing, feed must furnish fuel for keeping them warm. To manufacture whites, yolks, and shells of eggs requires a healthy body supplied with certain food elements which hens naturally pick up in the spring and summer.

One of these important food elements, or rather a number of them, have been found to be contained in buttermilk.

Lactic acid, milk proteins, vitamins and similar food elements are easy to supply in the laying mash by the addition of 10 per cent or more of dried buttermilk.

A ration consisting of 25 pounds wheat bran, 25 pounds standard middlings, 30 pounds corn meal, 5 pounds bone meal and 15 pounds dried buttermilk has given fine results. In feeding, the laying mash should be kept before the flock all the time and should be supplemented by feeding scratch grain twice a day.

Many poultry raisers who have provided warm houses and have been disappointed by no increase in egg production will be surprised by the results given from feeding a good egg-laying mash.

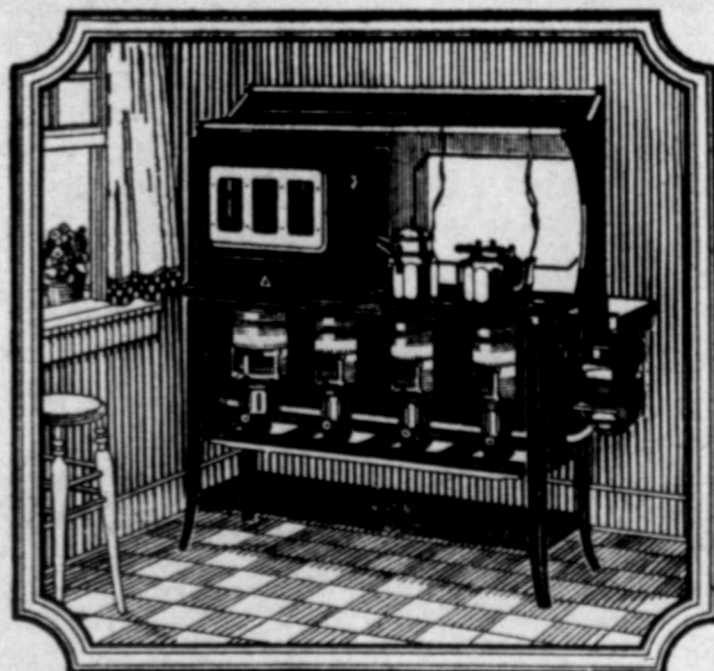

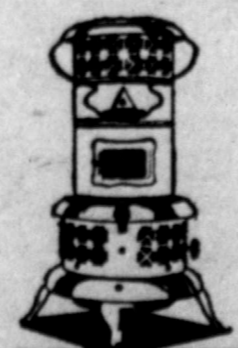

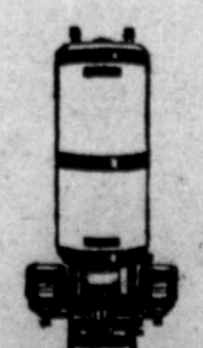

#### WOOL—AND OTHER THINGS

The neighboring little city of Uvalde goes into ecstasy over the fact the mohair sold at that place last week set a high record in the State for the fall clip. That is a record to be proud of, but Uvalde crowed too quick.

This week the mohair sold on the Kerrville market and the price for grown hair topped that paid at Uvalde by one cent a pound, while the kid sold for the same.  
Estimated accumulations of mohair at Uvalde for the season will amount to approximately 350,000 pounds, according to last week's Leader-News. Of this amount they estimate there will not be over 50,000 pounds of kid. Taking this estimate as a working basis the Uvalde crop will bring in \$204,000 for the grown clip and \$40,000 for the kid.

In comparison with the Uvalde estimate, Kerrville has already sold 1,000,000 pounds of mohair, and a conservative estimate of the fleece yet to be sold here is another quarter million pounds.

Of that already sold and shipped, there is approximately 900,000 pounds of the grown mohair and 100,000 pounds of the kid, since the kid averages around one-tenth of the clip. This sale brings into Kerrville \$621,000 from the grown fleece and \$80,000 for the kid.

When one considers the unsold portion of the mohair crop at Kerrville the amount of money coming into the country from this one crop alone is stupendous. Besides there is the fall clip of wool yet to be sold. And this amount represents only the fall clip. This is just one of the many resources of the Hill Country, and while The Sun does not want to brag, yet this section of the State is just completing one of the most prosperous seasons the country has ever known.

But when you go to talking about wool, either in quantity or price better consult the Kerrville market before you brag.

#### ANOTHER RECORD SMASHED

Holland's Magazine: We have circled the globe on wings; we stand invincible in athletics; we have more miles of railways than any nation; we have the tallest buildings; our inventors stand without a peer; we have almost half the world's gold stuffed away in the vaults of our banks, and more than half the world's boasting at the tips of our tongues. Now comes Judge Alfred J. Talley, of the Court of Special Sessions, New York City, a jurist whose observations have been made with caution and accuracy, to remind us of another way in which we stand supreme; Judge Talley declares that the United States is the most lawless nation on earth.

Let us not blink and consider the scenery, or talk football or Thanksgiving, or ignore the charge.

Let us look into this thing squarely and see for ourselves whether a jurist who presides over the greatest criminal court on earth—ominous, in itself—is wrong; whether there is not some way to extenuate or explain.

Statistics compiled for the ten-year period from 1911 to 1921—the latest available—show that the average homicide mortality rate for each 100,000 of our population was 7.2. In England (Ireland included) it was 0.5 for the same period; in Australia and South Africa, where blood is supposed to run hot and fast, 1.9. To get at the facts from another angle, Judge Talley points out that in England and Wales, during 1923, there were but 200 murders as opposed to approximately 10,000 in the United States.

The indictment that Judge Talley brings is supported by the facts. We are not only the most lawless nation on earth, but our lawlessness is increasing. The reasons are not difficult to trace. As a nation, we are not obedient to those disciplinary measures which we have framed for our own guidance. We are not only lawless; we are rather proud of it. At best, we are indifferent, and prove the extent of our indifference by evading jury service, drinking illicit liquor, upholding the "unwritten law," condemning politics instead of getting into politics. We are lawless because, no matter what our protestations and excuses, we do not care enough for the good name of our country to serve it in those humble ways which come to all of us as citizens.

#### BUBBLES AND BOMBS

San Antonio Light: Malignant mischief is a poor substitute for good, honest merrymaking.

Twice a year in San Antonio, New Year's Eve and Hallowe'en, the inhibitions that govern conduct are forgotten. The populace, especially when

ushering in the new year comes out for a hilarious carnival.

Stern visaged Puritans frowned ominously on young men and women who in their frivolous moments dared to cavort gleefully around a bedecked maypole. Even the most rock-ribbed Puritan nowadays, however, does not frown on harmless pastimes, or by invective, endeavor to prick the bubble of hilarity.

But even the cavalier in spirit, the antithesis of the Puritan, deplores the malicious pranks played by unthinking young men and boys during certain festive periods. This mischief, as a rule, is directed against property. Amusement is of the moonshine variety that is distilled from trouble-making elements.

Next week will bring Hallowe'en. As a rule San Antonio has been unusually free from malicious mischief on the All-Saints Eves of the past. But there has always been more or less of the handwork of a few thoughtless young men and boys remaining for the morning after.

There is nothing harmful in the effervescence of the carnival spirit on stated occasions.

But the playthings of revelers should be bubbles—not bombs.

**Honor Convicts to Clean Parks**

Texas Commercial News: A plan has been devised by Governor Pat M. Neff to clean up and put in shape the various State Parks that have been donated to the State, which is expected to make these parks and camping sites a pleasant place in which to spend some time. This is to be accomplished by the use of eight convicts who are to be put on the honor plan to carry on the work under a supervisor.

"I have worked out a plan to improve the State Parks given, during the past few months, to the State as camping sites and recreation places for the people of Texas," said Governor Neff, in discussing his plan.

"The Federal Government has loaned me a large truck, the Highway Department has fitted me up a camping outfit with tents and cooking utensils, and the Prison Commission, under the law permitting the work of convicts on public property, has agreed to let me have eight prisoners.

Under the general superintendency of an employe of the State Parks Board, these eight prisoners, who will work as honor men without guards, will go from park to park, fencing, cleaning up, and in various ways making these parks pleasant and convenient camping sites.

"Benches and tables will be built around trees," continued the Governor, "cooking ovens will be constructed, and other similar work done, looking to the making of the State-owned parks comfortable as camping places. All necessary expenses will be borne by a few philanthropic citizens who have made contributions in money to this work. The first parks to be visited by this clean-up squad will be on that part of the Glacier to Gulf Highway extending from San Antonio to Amarillo. We hope to have a large number of these State Parks, scattered throughout the State, made convenient as community recreation places, and as comfortable sites for auto tourists to spend the night."

**The Highway to Del Rio**

Edwards County Leader, Oct. 18th: County Engineer W. E. Simpson of San Antonio, was here this week for the Commissioners' Court meeting. R. G. Halter, a brother-in-law of Mr. Simpson was here with him. Mr. Halter is a mining engineer, and has his headquarters in Chihuahua, Mexico.

Mr. Simpson reiterated the information that the engineering work on the fourteen miles of the Del Rio road from town west was completed, and said he expected bids to be advertised for on this part of the road right away.

And Mr. Simpson gave us this—that the State Highway Department is going to finish up the gap between the fourteen miles above mentioned, and the ten miles of the Del Rio road now building from the county line this way. This is very pleasing news, indeed. It means a first class macadamized highway from Rocksprings all the way to Del Rio—in fact it means a highway all the way from Kerrville by way of Rocksprings to Del Rio. Val Verde County is now finishing up their part of the highway from Del Rio to the county line.

And work is now well under way on the highway across the north part of Real County. Mr. Simpson says they have one crew of men clearing the right-of-way, and another grading. They had some trouble with the Real County land owners but that is now settled—the road will now pass south of the Fairview ranch house instead of north of it, as first contemplated; this also changes the road to some extent across the Dietert ranch.

And the Kerrville highway in this county will be completed one of these days before long. Mr. Simpson went down the Del Rio road Thursday morning and on to Carta Valley on business.

The Progressive Farmer: "Somebody tells me that in walking on public roads I should walk on the left side. Is that correct?"

It is. On this point H. K. Wither- spoon, of the north Carolina Highway Commission, says: "It is wrong for pedestrians to walk on the right side of State highways. The reasons for this regulation are obvious. No traffic will be moving in their direction from the rear on the left side of the road, since motor vehicles keep to the right. On the left side of the road they will be facing any vehicle that is on that side of the road, whereas on the other side of the road they would have their backs to traffic. On the left side of the road there is no danger of being run over."

### THE PASSING DAY

Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, Texas University

A friend whom I have known many years, and who I never heard speak a word against any one, said to me the other day that the most noticeable change in his character as he grows older is that he becomes less critical of others and more inclined to concede that they have as much right as he to think and do as they please. Youth inclined to be impetuous and to attempt to force the whole world to accept its ideas. Failing in the effort to implant its ideals in others, it is likely to become critical and say things that should be left unsaid. As one grows older he comes to see, if he keeps his contact with the life about him, that others, as well as he, are largely the products of their environment and their training, and often are more to be pitied than censured if their views and their conduct are at variance with the commonly accepted standards of right.

One of the hardest lessons to learn, though, especially if one holds the position of teacher or preacher, is to avoid passing unfavorable judgment on those who do not accept your views. Most persons forget that they change their own views and their standards of conduct from time to time, and that they are only in very small part what they were in their early years. It is unfortunate if, despite this change which all thinking people recognize as inevitable, an individual grows harsh in his judgment of those who have not developed or changed along with him. The most miserable person is the old man or woman who has grown cynical and harsh and merciless along with age, and who has gotten out of attune with the world. The happy old age is that which keeps close to the thoughts and to the lives of youth.

On his own account, even if the happiness of those about him is not considered, one cannot afford to drift into a pessimistic attitude toward life. It may be true that life today is not pitched along exactly the same lines as it was fifty years ago, but why complain of the change? We are living in a faster age, just as our parents lived in an age faster than that in which their ancestors lived. I cannot bring myself to think, though, that the people are any worse than they were in "the good old days." In fact it seems to me that youth is better than it was then, that, with some exceptions of course, young people have higher ideals and motives and are making preparation for doing greater things in life. The age has laid a certain prudishness and assumed modesty noticeable in former years, but who can say that it is really any worse for that?

Recently a young girl was talking to me about taking a ride with a party which her mother was to accompany. Inadvertently I asked why

she did not take her father along, too. Her reply was that he was too grouchy and would spoil the drive for the whole party. Somehow I did not feel so sorry for the girl because she had such a father as I did for the father because he had such a disposition. To come to be recognized as a "grouch" by one's children is a plight to invite pity. That father has merely lost contact with the viewpoint of youth, and the mother has retained it. Perhaps it is because she has lived closer to the children that she is better prepared to understand them, and to enter into their pleasures as one of them.

Teachers have wonderful opportunities for living with young people in such intimacy that they themselves may remain young in mind if only they will. Unfortunately too many of them become dogmatic in their instruction, dictatorial in their methods, and disgruntled in their attitude toward life. When they do, they not only lose most of their influence on those they would teach, but a reaction is felt in their own lives that makes them "crusty" and "grouchy". The best teachers are learning this and as they do learn it the school room is losing most of its horrors for youth and is getting its right place in the hearts of the young. It is great to remain young just to know the viewpoint of youth.

### PUBLISHER NAMED AS TEXAS REGENT

Austin, Tex., Oct. 20.—Governor Neff has appointed E. Marsh of Austin, newspaper publisher, as a member of the board of regents of the University of Texas, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of San P. Cochran of Dallas, several months ago. When the board meets in Austin next Tuesday it will have for the first time a full membership since the memorable session when Mr. Cochran and Frank C. Jones of Houston resigned following the election of Governor Neff as president of the University. The resignations were promptly accepted, although the Governor declined the University presidency.

The vacancy caused by Mr. Jones' resignation was filled some time ago.

### MAN FALLS FIVE STORIES AND LANDS ON HIS FEET

Chicago, Oct. 21.—Harry Wright, 26, a building cleaner, Tuesday fell five stories from the side of a Chicago skyscraper when he lost his balance but landed on his feet and suffered no worse injuries than two broken ankles and a dislocated right arm.

The largest crowd of the season witnessed the game and spurred the Institute men to increased efforts by their routing.

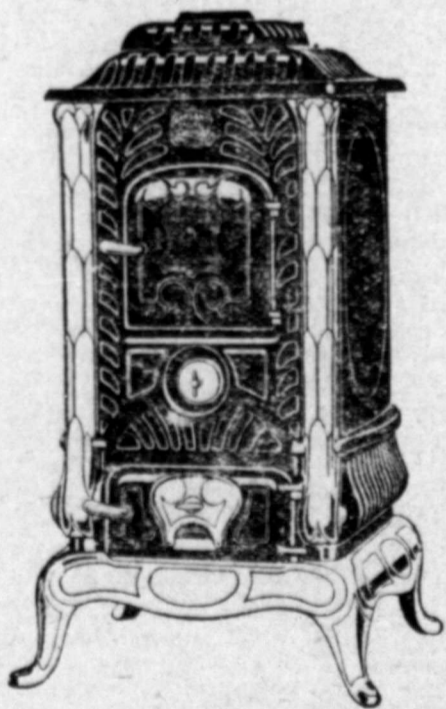

**NIGHT WATCHMAN STAGES BATTLE WITH ROBBERS**

Two Men Caught in Act of Burglary—izing Collins Wholesale Grocery Warehouse Tuesday Night.

A pitched battle was staged in the wholesale district Tuesday night between Charles Lloyd, night watchman, and two unidentified men, who were caught in the act of burglarizing the warehouse of the Collins Wholesale Grocery Company. Between 10 and 12 shots were fired, but as far as known, no one was hurt.

A few minutes after midnight Mr. Lloyd, in company with Bill Reynolds and another man, came down the street and noticed a car just stopping at the wholesale house. Lights on the car were turned off, and as the night watchman approached to investigate, two men with the car opened fire on him. Mr. Lloyd returned the fire and told Mr. Reynolds to go phone the Sheriff. Since both men of the other side were armed with automatics and were using them freely and neither of Mr. Lloyd's companions were armed, he attempted to seek cover and return their fire so as to keep them from getting away until reinforcements arrived.

One of the men broke away and ran down the street and a few seconds later the other jumped suddenly in the auto and pulled out.

Within a few minutes from the time Mr. Reynolds went to the phone Sheriff Moore arrived on the scene, but too late to assist in apprehending the robbers. Deputy John Massey also appeared within a few minutes. Since the door of the warehouse had been pried open and several cases of cigarettes were lying outside after the robbers left, it is presumed that they had broken into the building and brought their loot outside before bringing up the car to haul it away.

A check up on the stock the next morning showed that five cases of cigarettes were missing.

The Sheriff's office immediately started search for the car containing the robbers but without results. About an hour after the robbery and fight, a car answering the description of the one sought was seen near Comfort traveling toward San Antonio.

Since there has been several such robberies reported from different sections of Southwest Texas recently and in each instance only cigarettes were taken it is presumed that the robbery is the work of an organized band working out of San Antonio.

This is the third time that the Collins Company has suffered from robbery within the past year. Their stock is covered by robbery insurance.

"It is suggested that Agents find out, at once, the interest of turkey raisers in their county, in marketing turkeys co-operatively. Where there is such interest the members of the pool should select a sales committee or sales agent to handle the business details. This sales agent should have a record of the number of turkeys, their condition, the best shipping points, etc.

"As soon as appointed the name and address with the above information should be sent to W. B. Lanham, College Station, Texas, and T. W. McBride, State Marketing Agent, Austin, Texas.
