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
Fleece at 69 and 80 Cents; Shipment Requires 30 Cars.

The Schreiner Wool & Mohair Commission Company has just completed the shipment of about 1,000,000 pounds of mohair, part of the fall clip. The shipment required 30 cars to handle.

Fall wool has not been sold as yet. The entire second story of the large warehouse on Water Street is full to the top with wool, as was the lower floor with mohair before shipment of the recent sale began.

Students of the industry estimated that the fall clip of mohair would reach 1,250,000 pounds at the Kerr-ville market, but it is liable to go be-yond that mark, as considerable fleece is still coming in.

Lally turned in a score of 144 for four rounds of the course, which is par for this number of rounds. Next in the scoring was Bredemus, who turned in a card of 146, or two above par. Mangum had 149, while McGuire turned in a score of 150.

The four pros finished the 36th hole of their match even, and darkness prevented playing another hole to decide the winners.

Although turning in the highest score for the entire 36 holes, McGuire set a new course record for nine holes. On his first round he shot a 34, lowering the previous record set by Edwin Juelg of Houston recently, by one stroke.

McGuire's putting was a feature of the match, as was Mangum's driving. McGuire would sink puts that seemed almost impossible, once or twice sinking 50-foot putts. Mangum's drives outdistanced those of the other three on an average of 10 to 15 yards each time. Lally played to the pin on nearly every hole but was off in his putting, missing several easy ones.







poultry raisers bemoan the lack of eggs during the winter. Of course, this general condition brings on mar-ket shortage and egg prices climb. In fact, an egg laid in the winter is worth, in actual market price, two eggs laid in the spring. If this is true, the added care and feeding nec-essary to get eggs during the winter months returns big dividends. There is one fact that most poultry raisers overlook, that hens cannot lay eggs in winter when given the same

there is one rule to remember.

time of year. For one thing, feed must this responsibility as soon as they furnish fuel for keeping them warm. To manufacture whites, yolks, and shells of eggs requires a healthy body supplied with certain food elements which hens naturally pick up in the spring and summer.

One of these important food ele-ments, or rather a number of them, displayed in this work is the kind that outtermilk.

Lactic acid, milk proteins, vitamines and similar food elements are easy to supply in the laying mash by the addition of 10 per cent or more of dried

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
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


THE WEEK IN SOCIETY

WOOL-AND OTHER THINGS

The neighboring little city of Uvalde goes into ecstacy over the fact the mohair sold at that place last week set a high record in the State for the fall clip. That is a record to be proud of, but Uvalde crowed too quick.

This week the mohair sold on the Kerrville market and the price for grown hair topped that paid at Uvalde by one cent a pound, while the kid sold for the same.

Estimated accumulations of mohair at Uvalde for the season will amount to approximately 350,000 pounds, according to last week's Leader-News. Of this amount they estimate there will not be over 50,000 pounds of kid. Taking this estimate as a working basis the Uvalde crop will bring in \$204,000 for the grown clip and \$40,-00 for the kid.

In comparison with the Uvalde estimate, Kerrville has already sold 1,-000,000 pounds of mohair, and a conservative estimate of the fleece yet to be sold here is another quarter million pounds.

Of that already sold and shipped there is approximately 900,000 pounds of the grown mohair and 100,000 pounds of the kid, since the kid avrages around one-tenth of the clip. This sale brings into Kerrville \$621,-000 from the grown fleece and \$80,000 for the kid.

The young child just beginning to eat solid food is given a partly dried crust of Bread. Why? Because he can nibble and suck at it and learn to use his teeth. But he will not eat too much. 
If a traveling salesman were asked what was the first principle for success in his business, he might say that it was to call on the trade regularly and often. A prospective customer might feel that its lines were all right and that they did not care to upset their previous business arrangements to deal with this fellow. But if the new man was right on deck twice as often as the other fellows, there would be times when his personal solicitation would land an order that was lying around loose waiting for some one to pick it up. And once concerns got to dealing with him, they would keep on and his frequent calls would strengthen the habit of buying of him. The business world appreciates and responds to the enterprise of the man who solicits business persistently.

This is one of many reasons why newspaper advertising brings such splendid returns. Its solicitation is more regular and frequent than other forms of salesmanship.

The average person will be likely to see an advertisement in a newspaper much more frequently than he or she sees the display in a store window. The newspaper advertisement is seen at hours when people are at leisure and can read and think about it, while the show window display is apt to be seen when people are in a hurry and can't stop to consider it.

The effect of advertising then, is to keep up a constant solicitation. The persistence with which it calls attention again is likely eventually to make many permanent customers, so the public almost invariably follows the suggestions given by the persistent advertiser.
