FRUIT SALAD

(Contributed by Mrs. G. M. Doyle)

This recipe serves about twenty persons.

2 large cans sliced pineapple. 2 large cans seeded White Cherries

1 pound marshmallows. 1/2 pound pecans.

Dice the pineapple and cherries, add the chopped pecans; add the chopped marshmallows to the fruit just before serving.

DRESSING: 2 whole eggs, beaten light. 3 table spoonfuls lemon juice.

1/4 cup sugar. 1/2 teaspoonful salt. 1/2 teaspoonful vanilla. 3 tablespoonfuls melted butter.

Mix all ingredients and add butter last, a few drops at a time, like olive oil; add red pepper to taste. Cook slowly until thick, cool and add 1/2 pint whipped cream just before serving.

Sets That Catch Wolves and Foxes

Charles N. Tunnell, in Farm and Ranch: Wolves and foxes are considered hard to trap, as the sets have to be made on land instead of water. The first thing to work for when making sets for these animals is to destroy all trace of human scent. Before setting traps for either wolves or foxes the traps should be sprinkled well with fresh animal blood, or dipped in melted beeswax. This will destroy all trace of human scent, and picious. The trapper must wear leather gloves, which have been rubbed with blood; the soles of the trapper's shoes should also be sprinkled with blood.



The indications are that we are becoming a little dippy over cerain forms of athletic contests, and that we are placing more stress on athletic training in our scholls than on academic instruction. No teacher will deny the value of physical development, but many teachers are coming to doubt whether the kind about the best physical conditions on the part of the students. Is the colsevere physical discipline to which he is subjected, or is he a poorer student because of it? The experience of most instructors is that the athlete who becomes keenly interested in inter-collegiate contests does not rank his studies along with those who go in for physical training solely as a means of physical development.

Over-attention to inter-collegiate games, while it may result in inreased school pride, has a certain oad effect upon the entire student body in that it not only detracts from he interest in studies, but also has a endency to cause students to think that athletics is the main thing in school life-that nothing else is really worth while in comparison with winning a game for a school. It discourages those who know that they are not physically fit to "star" in the contests, and who find that whatever may be their intellectual achievements, they get but scant public ap-plause. The student has difficulty in properly appraising his work, except as he sees it approved or ignored by the public. He sees a fellow-student heralded as a hero because of his brute strength or his physical endurance, and while he, too, may applaud, there is a feeling created that might rather than intellectuality is the thing most to be desired in life.

The hope is freely and frequently expressed by school men that while every attention may be paid to the utmost the physical endurance of students and that excite to the highest pitch those who watch the outcome of the games. There is a feeling that these things have come about through a spirit of rivalry between schools rather than from any real desire to help either the athletes or the students by having such contests. It is frequently asserted that the school that would not put forth its utmost efforts in such contests would soon find itself without students, and that college athletics as now practiced will All these things point to some surbecome more and more the central inget together in some agreement t call a halt.

IN GOOD PRACTICES

Under the leadership of Fire Chief Eugene Butt, the Kerrville Fire Department is putting in two evenings each week in practice in handling the new fire fighting equipment. Every Tuesday and Friday nights the boys are out with the new engine, familiarizing themselves in making connections with the fire plugs and in handl-

ing the engine.

Going on the assumption that practice makes perfect, the boys have got the time for making connections down close to the half minute mark. Between thirty and forty seconds from the time that they drive the truck up to the fire plug they have made connections and have a stream of water coming out the nozzle.

In addition to the regular equipment of the engine a large bell has been placed thereon, which is used by the company in all practice runs and will also be used in returning from fires. Going to fires the siren will be sounded and it is at this time that the new traffic regulations relative to obstructing the streets is effective. In practices and at all times when the bell only is used on the engine the fire team does not expect a clear right of way, only half the road being nec-

I am in favor of giving adequate support to our schools and institutions of higher learning, and also to carry forward our road building program.

At the last session of the Legislature there were 153 taxation measures introduced in the House of Representatives, 39 of which passed the House and reached the Senate. I opposed the passage of all of these bills, but helped work out a few simple revenue measures that are meeting the needs of the State without being felt by the masses of the people. I also opposed all useless or excessive items in the appro-

At the last Session of the Legislature I favored only conservative, well considered legislation, and sought the advice and co-operation of my constituents upon all questions of importance and will do so again, if elected.
