


CANFIELD'S BROTHER DEAD AT FLORESVILLE

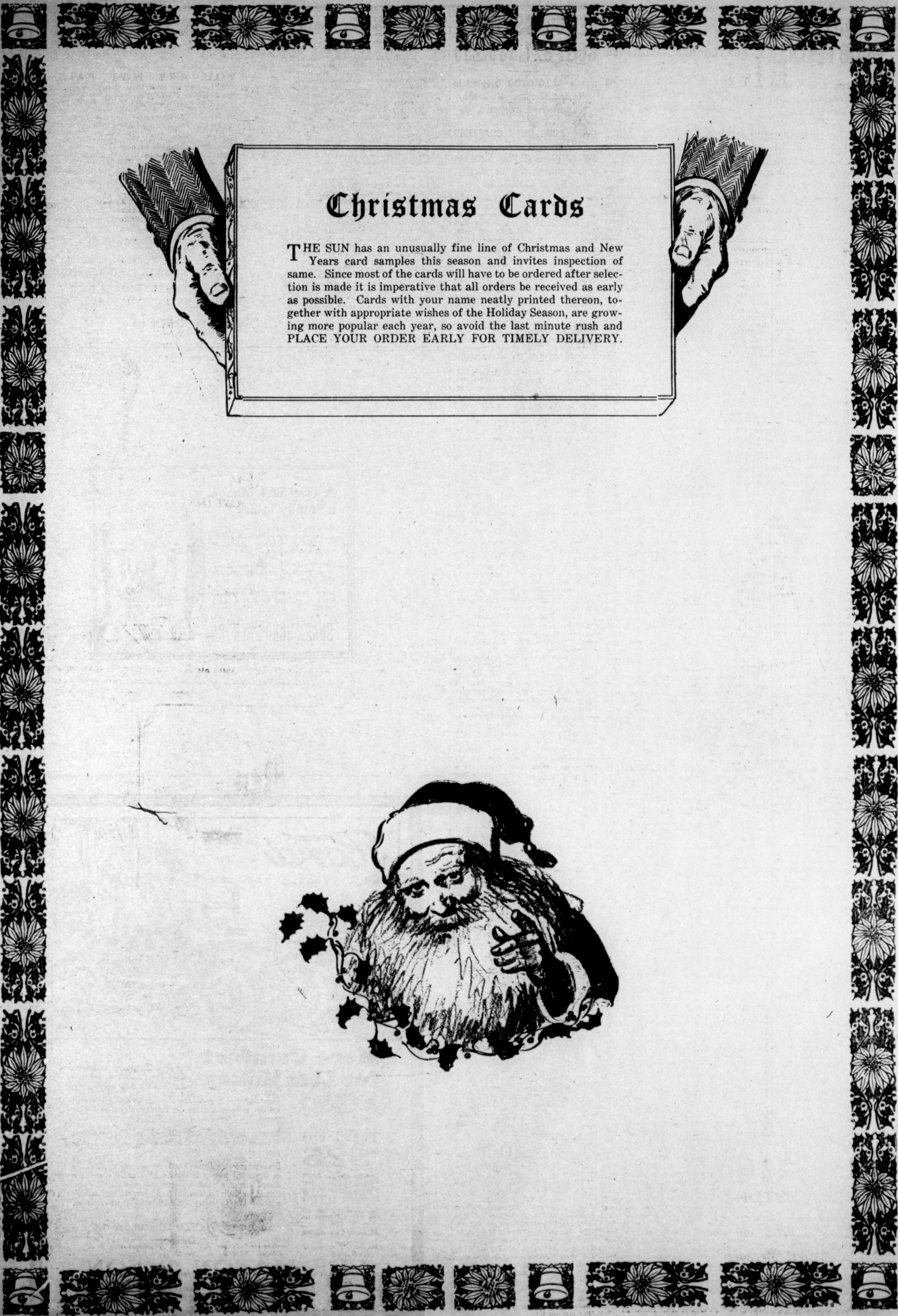

TWO SIDES OF THE QUESTION

Every proposition has two sides, and the hunting of wild game is no exception. Complaints are numerous about the inability of sportsmen finding a place to hunt, even when they are willing to pay for the privilege.

Viewed from the hunter's side of the controversy it looks like he should be allowed the opportunity of shooting deer and turkeys, since the game is not private-owned but belongs to the people of the State. His contention is that he should have the privilege of shooting the game wherever found, the fact that it is on private property at the time being no bar to his shooting.

On the other hand, the man on whose land the game may be found has possibly protected same for a number of years, in order that the species may not be exterminated in its wild state. Many ranchmen in the Hill Country have done on their ranches that have been there for several years and numbers of them have been feeding wild turkeys when dry seasons have made it impossible for the fowls to secure sufficient food from their natural sources.

Certainly a ranchman who has protected and fostered the game on his premises is entitled to backing from the State in his efforts to keep the game from becoming exterminated.

Another matter that enters into the hunting proposition is the fact that many hunters destroy other than wild game while hunting. Frequently ranchmen suffer the loss of a cow or yearling when some over-zealous or inexperienced hunter mistakes it for a deer, and also numerous instances can be cited each season where stock are killed on the ranches by stray bullets from the hunters' guns.

Surely a man who has protected the game on his land has the right to say what kind of hunters he wants to come on his premises and kill the game he has raised, and it is not unreasonable for him to charge them for the privilege, since he knows from past experience that the money he derives therefrom will no more than pay for the damage they will probably do to his property and live stock while hunting.

But the biggest objection that can be raised to hunters from the viewpoint of the conservationists and ranchmen are the game hogs. Deer and turkey are protected by law, the limit being three buck deer per season to each hunter and three colubiers. Does and hen turkeys are protected at all times.

Just over the line in Kimble County last week Deputy Game Warden J. J. Dent arrested four men who had between them 22 turkeys, and included in the number were seven hens. The game hogs were taken to Junction and paid fines of something over \$200 for violating the game laws. But they were wealthy men and afterward bragged that they had received value for their money in the pleasure of slaughtering the game.

Down in Brewster County about a week ago First Assistant Deputy Game Warden A. E. Peaty and Deputies Crawford and Miller arrested five men in whose camp they found hanging the carcasses of eight black-tailed does and two fawns. The hunters paid fines aggregating \$890 at Marathon for violating the law. And they, too, said the money paid in fines was well spent.

Such acts as these are a stain upon the reputation of every sportsman in the State and do more than any other one thing to make lovers of wild game more reticent about allowing hunting on their premises.

The Sun believes that the statutes should be amended to read that a man who violates the game laws cannot secure a license to hunt inside the State for a period of years. A few paltry dollars' fine imposed on a man worth millions is no hardship but the privilege of hunting inside the limits of the State might be some inducement for this class of people to respect the rights and property of others—which is something they neglect to do when they kill more than their lawful share of game.

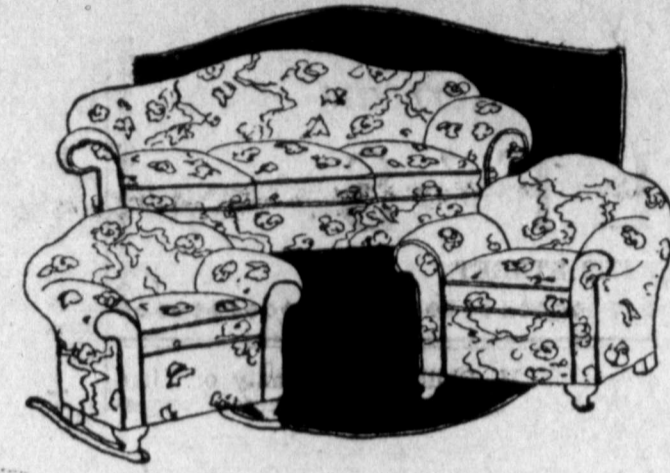

part of the State as in another. Turkey growing is a profitable side line for farmers and requires comparatively little investment, time or labor. Every farmer in this county should grow and market enough turkeys every year to pay for his groceries.

One of the reasons why more turkeys are not grown is that farmers do not have the stock with which to make the start and either do not know where it can be bought or are too indifferent to make the original investment of a few dollars. At Temple a few years ago, P. L. Downs, a local banker, bought a large number of the best turkeys obtainable, and let farmers in the community have a tom and two hens on condition that they would take good care of them and return him half the increase at the end of the year. These he let out to other farmers on the same conditions. By the exercise of care in letting out the turkeys to dependable farmers and on written contracts as to the care to be taken of them and as to accounting for the increase, he soon succeeded in interesting many farmers in raising the best turkeys, and with profit to himself. There should be some man of means in every county who would be ready to help the farmers along in that way.

Activities of this kind need not be limited to turkey growing. Farmers should be encouraged in every way to diversify their products, and if Chambers of Commerce and like organizations are anxious to do a real service to their communities they cannot do better to formulate plans to induce farmers to raise a few thoroughbred hogs, sheep and cattle on every farm. A short cotton crop does not throw a county into a financial panic when the farmers produce a good

supply of poultry and live stock and raise enough vegetables and other foodstuffs with which to feed themselves.

Armistice Day was fittingly celebrated in Austin and a number of other places in Texas this year, and the people turned out in thousands to show their appreciation of the services the boys rendered the country in the greatest war that has ever been fought for democracy. The war is too recent and its memories are too vivid for the celebration to take on the hilarity of a Fourth of July. As yet it is an annual memorial and it should always be commemorated as such rather than as a day of jollification. America has reason to be proud of the part it played in the effort to win for the world that freedom this country enjoys. As the years pass and the countries of the world come more and more into the enjoyment of the principles for which the war was fought, Armistice Day will become the greatest of our annual celebrations.

Alvin Owsley, former National Commander of the American Legion, was the guest of honor and the principal orator at the Austin Armistice Day celebration. When the parade was formed to march up Congress Avenue to be seen by some fifteen thousand citizens, Owsley did not put on a silk hat and ride in an open carriage as he might have done, but took his place on foot at the head of the long parade and marched proudly with the rest of the boys who had seen service. To this writer, Owsley's democratic simplicity as merely one of the great number of marchers, when he might have used the occasion for self-aggrandizement was the outstanding feature of the parade. RAILROAD MERGER WILL BE BENEFIT TO TEXAS

San Antonio Light, November 19: "No event in the history of Southwest Texas has portended as much benefit to this territory as the plan for the Southern Pacific to operate the San Antonio & Aransas Pass Railway," Milton Everett, special representative of the Sap, declared.

"It means a ballasted track, more equipment, more trains and faster time, through cars and through connections. In other words, better service to the people, and service is the only thing a railway company has to offer these days," said Everett.

"But in this case, it means also that the world-wide organization of the Southern Pacific will be behind the development of our territory of wonderful and varied resources. In this connection it is significant that a few months ago the Southern Pacific brought to Texas the heads of its European agencies so they could get personal ideas of the resources of the State, added Everett.

"Not since it was announced in 1885 that the Sap Railway Company had been organized to give Southwest Texas its first railway outlet, has any event in transportation circles occurred which will do more for the progress and prosperity of this section.

"The Sap built and now operates 726 miles of railway line in Southwest Texas, and since their lines were built, the increase in assessed values has been over 700 per cent. The Sap has been a factor of vast benefit to others but being constructed through a country of sparse population, it did not and could not earn enough money to pay operating expenses. While the company has steadfastly worked to develop the country and thereby increase the commerce and the traffic, the fact that their hauls were short and their revenues slim, precluded the expenditure of large sums in development, as the Southern Pacific did in California, where they made a veritable desert of greasewood blossom like a rose.

"Southwest Texas is a country of vast possibilities. Every crop from northern wheat to tropic bananas is grown in this section. It contains a wonderful and superabundant amount of fuel and power in petroleum, natural gas and lignite. It is mostly a rolling and upland country and contains more black cotton and corn land than any or all other sections of the State.

"The great Southwest Texas has lacked only one thing—the big railroad systems having long hauls. The Sap, the Gulf Coast Lines, and the S. A. U. & G. Railway, which serve practically all of this territory, are short lines, and go nowhere, and have no chance to draw or direct traffic outside of a very limited district. They therefore cannot bring wealth and developing projects to the Southwest, as can be done by the big systems.

"The fact that the Southern Pacific system has its own rail and steamship lines to New York on the east, and Portland, Ore., on the west, will permeate Southwest Texas throughout the country. It means greater prosperity for every man, woman and child in the territory; a greater demand for our farming lands; and it means that we will get the long wished for capital to engage in hotel building to develop our natural resort opportunities.

"For many months, the press of San Antonio and Waco has been urging the extension of the Falfurrias branch of the Sap to the Rio Grande border, and this consolidation may mean the realization of these plans, Everett concluded.

As a consequence, when he feels the call of nature Frank just naturally turns the job of editing the publications over to the bunch and hikes out.

He is a frequent visitor to the Hill Country and as a result of his visits this section of the country has received considerable valuable publicity. Mr. Holland is always a welcome visitor at The Sun office, for a talk with him is an inspiration to better things.

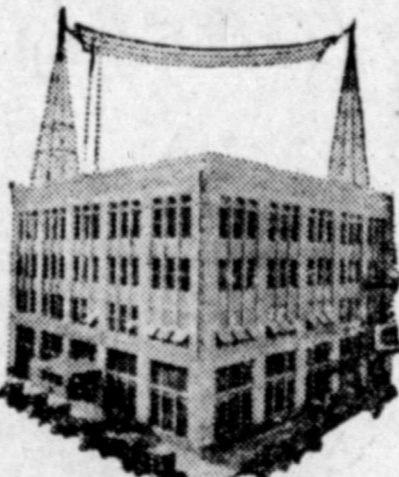

TEXAS WINE MAKERS FACE DISAPPOINTMENT

San Antonio Light, November 14th: Texans who hailed with joy the ruling on home-made wines and ciders in the test case forced by Representative John Philip Hill of Baltimore, and who had decided to emulate that worthy's example, are doomed to bitter disappointment.

Even though the decision handed down in the case of the Congressman-cider manufacturer should be upheld by the higher Federal tribunals and become the accepted law, Texas has a Dean law all its own that makes the brewing or distilling of any sort of liquid dangerous in the extreme.

The Dean law, according to Leonard Brown, lawyer, with offices at 396 Kampmann Building, and recognized as an authority on prohibition cases, prevents Texans from staging cider parties similar to the ones that drew the attention of the Nation to Congressman Hill.

"The Dean Law is very broad and very severe," Mr. Brown said. "It absolutely prohibits the manufacture of liquor of any sort for any purpose

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HOME DEMONSTRATION ACTIVITIES OF WEEK

Twenty men and women of the Reservation community met at the home of E. H. Kensing last Thursday morning for a meat canning demonstration. According to Mr. Kensing, a \$10 calf was converted into 90 cans of steak, roast, chili, meat loaf and soup stock, well worth \$30 of packing house canned beef.

Another interesting feature of the day was the organization of the Reservation Community Club with the following officers: Mrs. Kott, president; Mrs. J. A. Peril, vice president; Mrs. G. C. Duderstadt, secretary. Membership and program committee to be appointed later.

Last Friday afternoon the girls of the Center Point Community Agricultural Club conducted a very successful canning and jelly making demonstration at the school house auditorium. While giving the demonstration the girls explained the paramount importance of considering the following points when making jelly and canning: Selection of fruits; sterilization; cause of spoilage and how to prevent; the extraction of fruit juices for jelly making; how to make the different pectin tests; when to add the sugar; how to test and determine when the jelly is finished; storage, and the causes of poor jellies.

Last Friday morning six girls of the Sunset Home Demonstration Club met in regular session at the school house. After the regular order of business a poultry tour was discussed. Club members entering the judging contests at the Hill Country Poultry Show at Fredericksburg, will participate in this poultry tour for the purpose of studying the different breeds of poultry.

Last Saturday afternoon six girls of the Cypress Creek Home Demonstration Club met at the school house. After receiving further instructions on the sewing which they had already begun, the meeting was called to order by the president and the following program rendered: Song, "America," by club; reading, "The Little Stitchee," Clara Spenrath, Ada Allerkamp, Lydia Holekamp, and Myrtle Allerkamp; recitation, "Little Dimp Crumb," Anita Allerkamp; song "Eyes of Texas," by club.

A Mighty Difficult Feat

This isn't hard when you know how. Topperwein has never missed breaking both objects. Get up early some morning and try it in the back yard. Anyone can do it with a little practice, says Topperwein.

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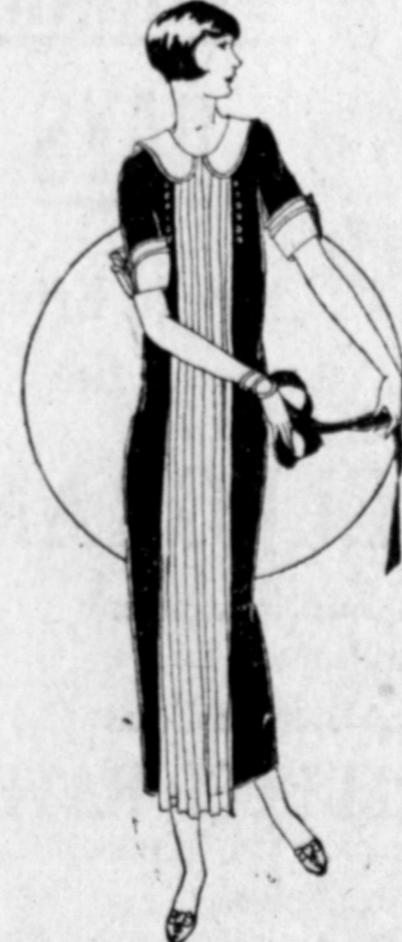
