The festival this year promises to be another good one. As best we can determine, everything is in readiness for the three-day event or plans are being made to get things that way.

Tom Bonds, the general chairman, was reasonably relaxed when we visited with him early this week. That situation will change, though, we'll almost guarantee, as "blast-off time" draws nearer.

We've always been proud of Bull Town Days and enjoy it each and every year.

This year, however, we have more reason to look forward to the celebration with great anticipation. . . . We'll get to shave when it's over!

For the past couple of weeks, we've avoided the use of a razor for all practical purposes. The results haven't been flattering our friends, enemies and kin-folks alike tell us with almost too much regularity.

If that comes about, the Bovina show the following day, the 21st, will fit just right.

It's possible that the horse people will be eager to get back on the show circuit after being held up for the past few weeks by the quarantine. This could mean that more horses will compete here than would have otherwise. That's looking at the situation optimistically, we'll admit, but it could work that way.

There's been some talk about an added BTD feature for next year.

With the success the feedlot cutting horse contest enjoyed here several weeks ago, before the quarantine went into effect, why couldn't an open cutting horse contest be staged on Saturday night following the regular Quarter Horse show?

This wouldn't be a part of the formal show, but at the same time, the entry list would probably be longer because additional horses would be in town for the show and would probably stay to compete in the open cutting if it was just a few hours later.

Promoters of the aforementioned cutting contest were impressed with its success. Another cutting was cancelled because of the quarantine. That one was slated to be "open to the world," we understand, and was not to be limited to local or feedlot people.

The Bull Town Days edition of The Blade is scheduled to be out next week. The issue will have some features we think readers will find of interest.

For instance, there's a report on the changing life of a cowboy by Pat Jacobs and Lou Nuttall writes about the BTD barbecue and the chief cooks, Mutt Graham and R. L. "Hop" Hoppingardner.

# Horse Talk Heads Meeting Of Council

A discussion of keeping horses inside the city limits highlighted Thursday night's monthly meeting of Bovina's city council.

No decision was reached during the session and no policies were changed.

The city's zoning laws, adopted in '59, make no provision for livestock inside the

city. The zoning laws specify that no new facilities may be built for the purpose of keeping livestock.

Cap Naegel, representing a three-man committee appointed at an earlier meeting by Mayor Chas. W. Flynn, suggested the city make provisions for allowing horses be kept inside the city with regu-

lations in regard to space, cleanliness and facilities.

At a request of Edwin Lide and Rouel Barron, representing Bovina Roping Club, the council agreed to provide a water line to the east city limits, near the new roping arena. The club will then join on the line there and extend it to the arena. Lide and Barron pointed out they would like to have enough water and pressure at the arena to sprinkle it.

A two-inch line is being installed to the east city limits for use by the roping club and other property owners in that area.

The council agreed to seek the advice of an attorney in regard to allowing a stable for horses to be built by Vernon Willard on property he owns near the new arena, but inside the city limits.

Willard indicated that about \$2000 was needed before work can get underway for the new facility.

Plans for the new track were made by members of the Booster Club last spring.

# BTD Preparations Nearing Completion

Preparations are nearing completion for this community's annual celebration, Bull Town Days, scheduled a week from now, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 19-20-21.

Tom Bonds, general chairman of the event which is now in its eighth year, indicated this week that last minute details are being taken care of so the celebration, which attracts thousands of people to this central Parmer County community, can go off as scheduled.

A question mark as of early this week was the Quarter Horse Show, which is sponsored by Bovina Roping Club. Officials of the American Quarter Horse Association, cancelled the show a few weeks ago due to the VEE quarantine. However, indications are now that the quarantine will be lifted August 20, the day before the show. This would permit the judging here to go on as originally scheduled.

Pat Read, show secretary, has been in contact with officials of the Quarter Horse Association in Amarillo. They would make no commitment in regard to having the show here, but indicated "there's a lot of hope."

In the meantime, roping club officials are assuming the show will be held.

This will be the 11th year

for the horse show, which got a three-year headstart on Bull Town Days itself.

# Good Rain Falls Here

Rain, the good, soil-soaking, farmer-pleasing, slow-falling kind, totaled two and a half inches here Saturday night.

The moisture began falling late in the evening --- about 10 or 11 p.m. --- and continued almost all night.

Rain was received over a large area with the amount ranging from one and a half inches north of town, in the Riea Community to three and a half in other areas.

Many farmers described the rainfall as being as good as they'd ever received.

The welcome and unexpected rainfall allowed irrigation wells to be turned off. It will give crops, especially grain sorghum, a substantial boost toward making better yield. Also, the moisture will make ideal seasoning for wheat-land which had been prepared for planting this month or next in many cases.

The rain was considered a handicap for vegetables which were being harvested or nearing the harvesting stage.

In addition to the good rain Saturday night, a shower, measuring .08 of an inch was recorded Monday night.

More rainfall is predicted for the area. The moisture situation is such now that one optimistic farmer was heard to remark, "If these showers keep up, we might not have to irrigate anymore this year to make a crop."

# School Announces Free Lunch Policy

L. F. Jacobs, Bovina Schools superintendent, announced this week a free and reduced price lunch policy for Bovina school children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have adopted a family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children, according to Jacobs. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents at the beginning of the school term. Additional copies are available at the

principal's office in each school.

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple, Jacobs says, easy to complete and request information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships

which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, says Jacobs.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Jacobs has been designated as hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any

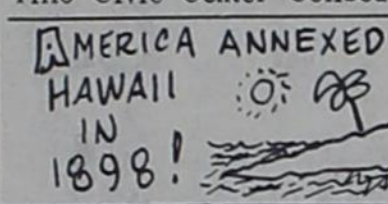
## Two Receive BS Degrees

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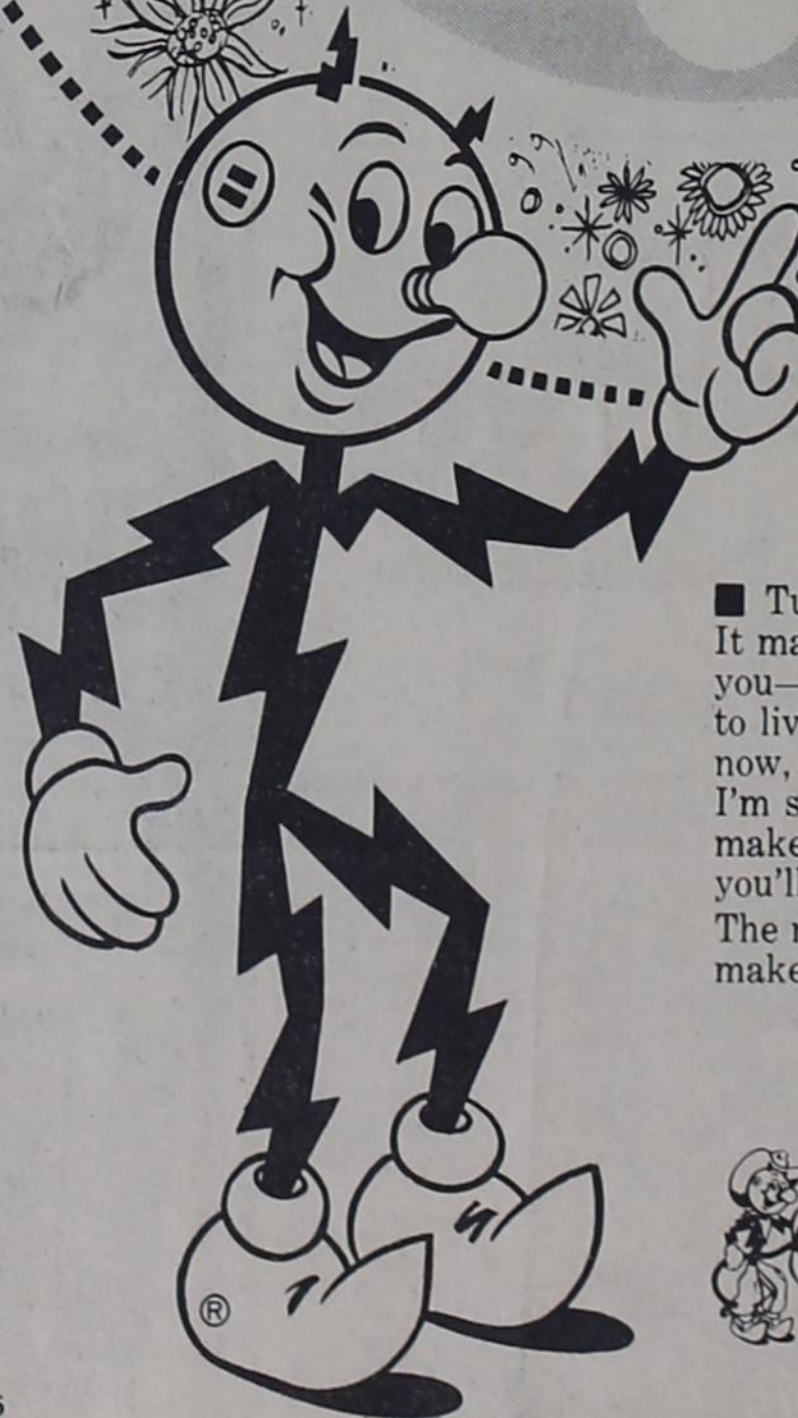

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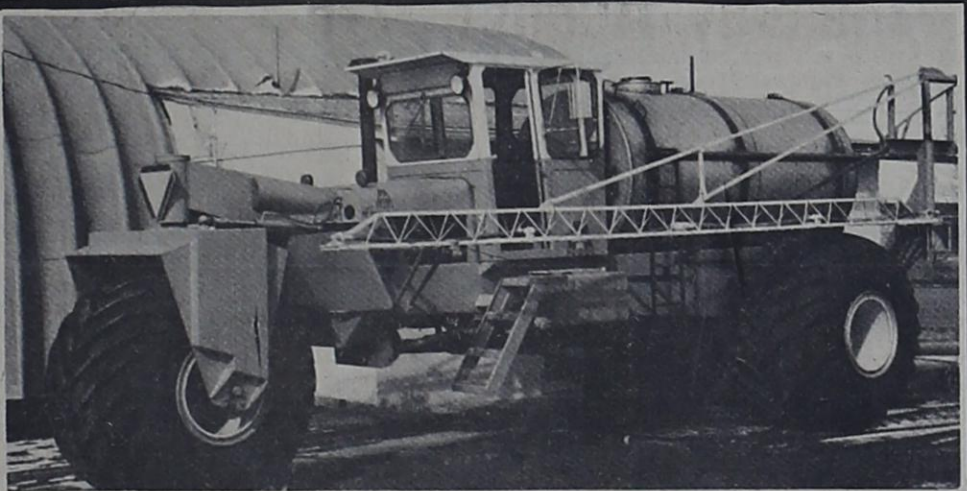
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# Kay Spicer, Joe Stanton Exchange Wedding Vows

# NOTICE

## Bovina Independent School District Required Immunizations 1971

DEAR PARENTS OR STUDENTS:

Texas now has a new law that requires immunizations for all students enrolled in schools and institutions of higher learning, as shown below:

If the number of doses required have been received, but last dose was before time stated, then an additional dose of POLIO, DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS or SMALLPOX is required.

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered. However if this is not possible, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the Summer and Fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-1972 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the Summer 1972 Semester, after which validation of new records is required.

Exclusions from compliance are allowable on an individualized basis for medical contra-indications and religious conflicts.

A new, standard Certificate of Immunization form is being developed; however, compatible documents will also be acceptable. Fill out and return Immunization Records to teacher.

If you have any question, contact your family physician or school nurse. We suggest that you take this letter with you if you contact them in person.

A combined Measles-Rubella vaccine is now available which requires only one injection. The age criteria for this vaccine is the same as indicated in the above table for Measles (Rubeola) and Rubella.

We will appreciate your cooperation in this matter.
