PHASE IV of the Nixon Administration's attempt to halt inflation has been implemented, but it is still too early to access just how the current "phase" will pan out.

To begin with, some grocery items will be higher-priced, due to the lifting of the price freeze from all food except beef.

So apparently, the net result of the administration's attempt to halt inflation has been a boomerang effect, with most items which are not covered having experienced a price increase.

Milk, for example, was one of the first items to increase in price. Some produce also increased, although a check here Monday revealed that of six produce items, three had experienced "minimal" increases and three others had actually decreased.

BUT PRICE MAY not be the contingent factor before the unstable situation levels out.

Availability of food items may be the most critical factor in whether or not the nation's sagging economy can right itself. Partly because of the price freeze, certain items are already scarce. Wholesalers, hesitant to buy products at more than they could sell them to the grocers, have not stocked up on some things.

Chicken raisers, faced with an inflated price on feed for their chickens, have in some cases drowned baby chicks, rather than feed them for what appeared to be a sure-fire loss at market time.

The same situation is happening in our area in beef. The price of feed remains high, since raw products were not covered under the freeze. However, since the packer is still frozen on the price he can charge for finished beef, he is cautious about paying more for the live beef than he can recoup in sales.

HAVING ALREADY felt the sting of a shortage of fuel that has threatened our nation, we may yet see a food shortage such as has not been seen in this nation in many years. We sincerely hope this is not the case, as we dearly love to eat.

But consider that in almost every field you explore, there is a shortage of something. Implement dealers can't get the new implements they need. Automobile dealers can't get the autos they could sell if they could get.

Many factories have been forced to close because of Mr. Nader's anti-pollution laws. For this reason, the production of some types of equipment is behind the demand.

Many types of lumber are scarce. And since paper is a by-product of lumber, they tell us that newsprint may be the next thing to get on the "short" list. So, keep your subscription to the Blade paid up. If we have to do like the fuel dealers did in some instances, the fact that you are a longtime customer and reader of the Blade would give you an edge in being able to continue to receive your paper.

IT IS A SHAME that the wealthiest nation on the face of the earth has to suffer shortages, when if left to private enterprise the supply has always equalled demand.

Many people blame politics, or in the case of the fuel shortage, the large oil companies, for the fuel shortage. They were attempting to force the independent dealers out of business, and in the process, raise their prices so they could make more profits, it has been charged.

Regardless of the reasons, the shortages have hurt many people. And government control isn't always the answer to every problem.

Clouds Dump Welcome Rain

This is a wet country.

General rainfall Wednesday afternoon and night and Saturday and Sunday nights deposited in the neighborhood of five inches in the western portion of Parmer County.

In Bovina, approximately one inch fell Wednesday with .55 of an inch recorded Saturday and one-half inch recorded Sunday for the wettest July in several years.

The mostly slow-falling rains were welcomed by area farmers, many of whom were able to shut off irrigation wells, a rarity here in July.

The amounts recorded appeared to be more west and south of Bovina than were reported east and north.

Last week's rains, coupled with previous rains on the rapidly-growing crops of milo, corn and cotton, have agricultural observers predicting a bumper yield for Parmer County.

One farmer was overheard to say where he had one ear to the corn stalk last year, this year he had three to the stalk—maybe an indication of the type yields to be expected this year.

BANK REPORTS

Deposits In County Over \$30 Million

Deposits at three Parmer County banks amounted to more than \$30 million on June 30, according to official mid-year statements of the three banks.

The deposit totals were up by over \$6 million from the same date a year earlier, representing a 25 per cent increase for the time period.

Total assets reported by Parmer County banks stood at \$35.2 million on June 30, up by \$7.2 million from the same date a year earlier. A gain was also shown in the loan category. Loans reported on June 30 of this year totaled \$19.7 million, compared to \$16.6 million a year earlier.

Actual figures on deposits at the three banking institutions were \$30,386,549.88. A year earlier, this figure had been \$24,342,229.37, or a net increase of \$6,044,320.51.

In total assets, the June 30 figure amounted to \$35,210,952.68. A year ago, the comparative figure was \$27,722,609.69, up by \$7,488,454.08.

Loan figures were \$19,757,174.08 this June 30, and \$16,590,038.71 a year ago, an increase of \$3,167,135.37.

Bank officials at Friona, Farwell and Bovina credited the excellent crops of the past year, plus the much better than average farm prices with accounting for the tremendous mid-year totals. Also, cattle had played a big part in the totals on June 30, although officials were cautious as to what the future might hold, what with the current freeze on beef prices.

Dinner Fetes Rep. Clayton

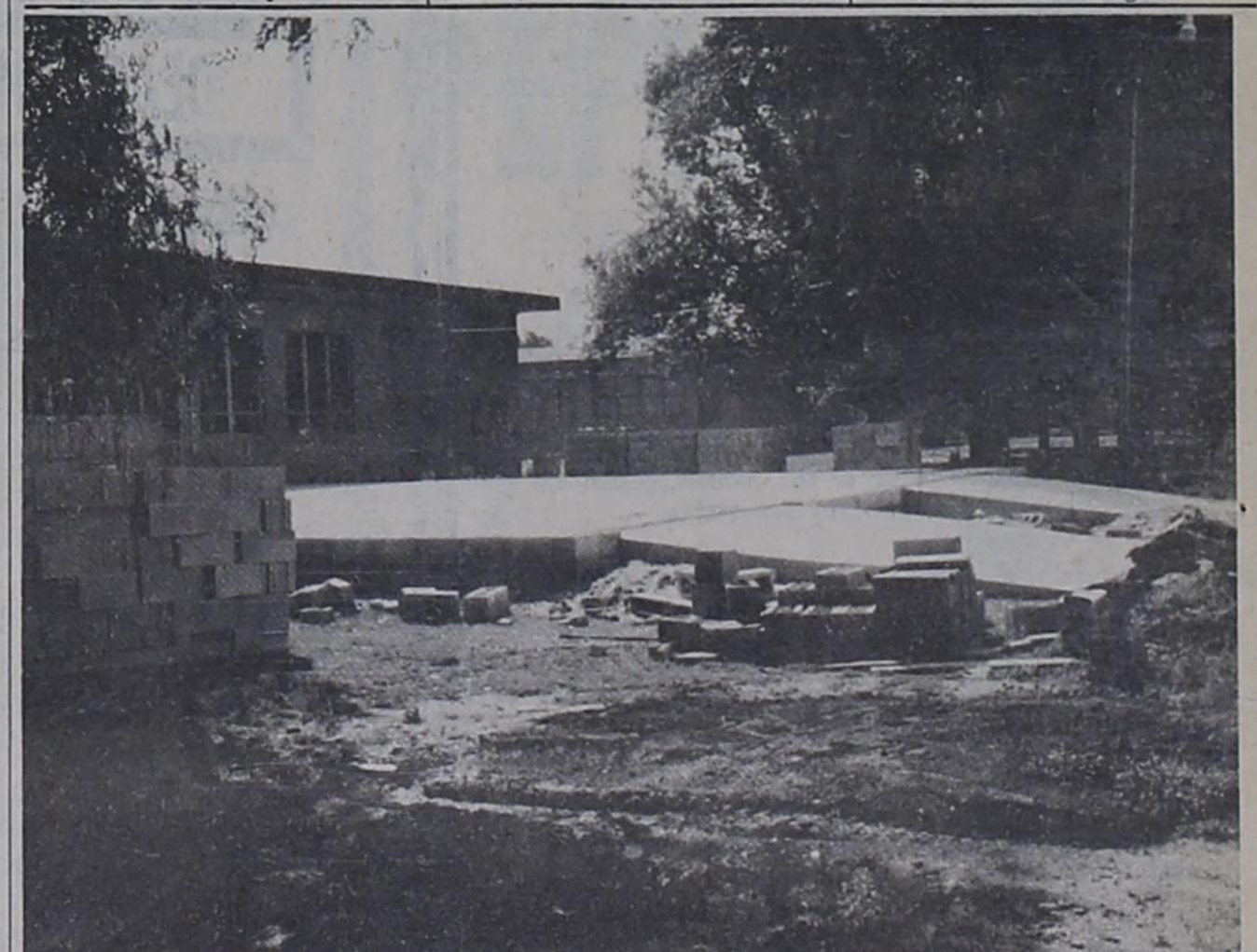
The people of Muleshoe are calling on all people of this Legislative district to "Speak-Up" for Bill Clayton, candidate for Speaker of the House of Representatives.

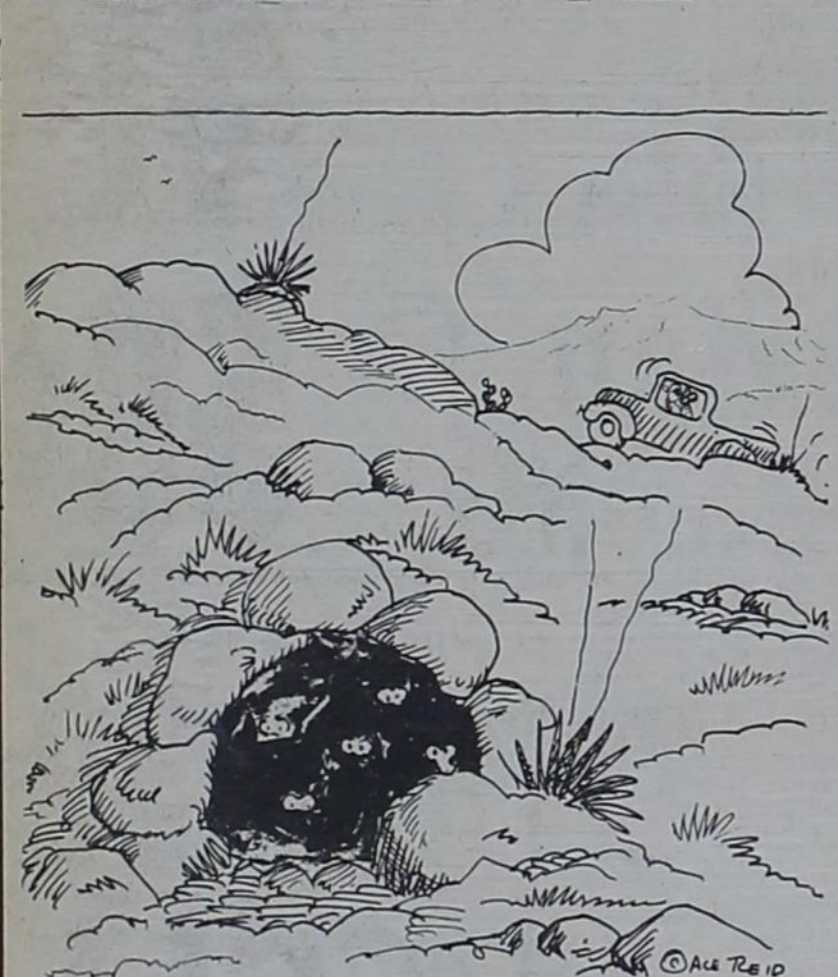

National Farm Safety Week

Proclaim July 25-31 "Farm Safety Week"

The week of July 25-31, 1973 has been proclaimed as Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Parmer County by County Judge Archie Tarter, at the request of Harry Hamilton, County Farm Bureau President. The local farm organization is joining efforts with other farm and ranch agencies to coordinate the special farm safety campaign within the county.

In his proclamation, Judge Tarter said "I urge all citizens to recognize this special period, and especially urge farm families of Parmer County to become more safety conscious, not only during FARM SAFETY WEEK, but to utilize the monthly emphasis topics and program guides to help make farm safety a round-the-calendar activity."

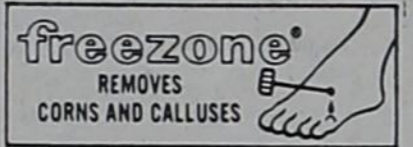
Reviewing the National Safety Council's materials, which include hand signals for

agriculture, Farm Bureau President Harry Hamilton said "hand signals can save time and prevent accidents—even fatal accidents. They are especially useful when noise or distance makes voice communication difficult or impossible. It is important for these signals to be widely publicized and learned so both sender and receiver will understand."

The Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department has tabulated the 1972 Farm Fatalities, which total 183 deaths occurring in 105 Texas counties. The breakdown is as follows—fires—31 each; fires and burns—30; tractors—25; falls—18; machinery—12; electric current—nine; suffocation—eight; struck by object—six; run over by auto—three; animals—three; poisoning and tetanus—two; snakebite—two; unknown—two; and lightning—one.

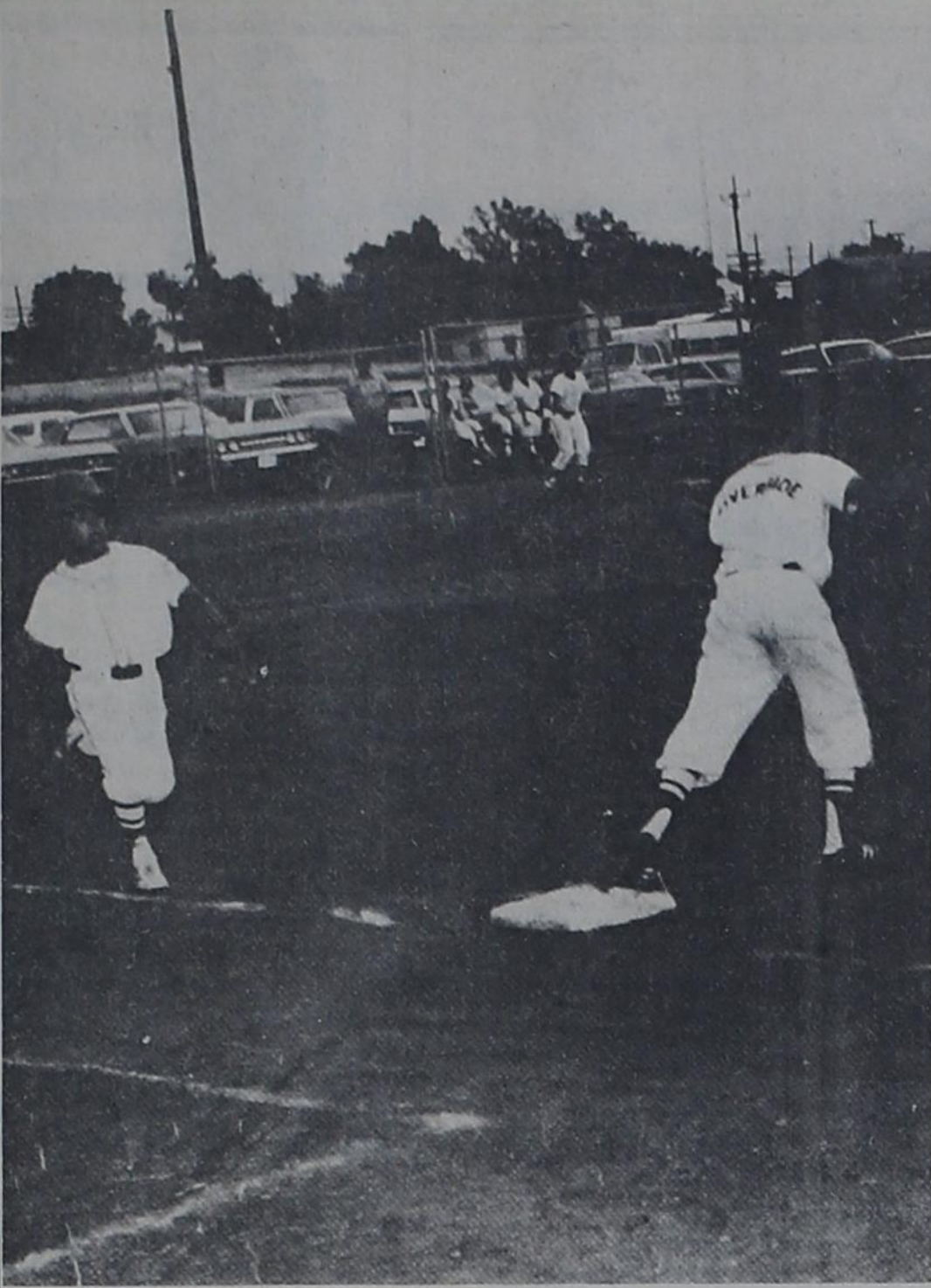

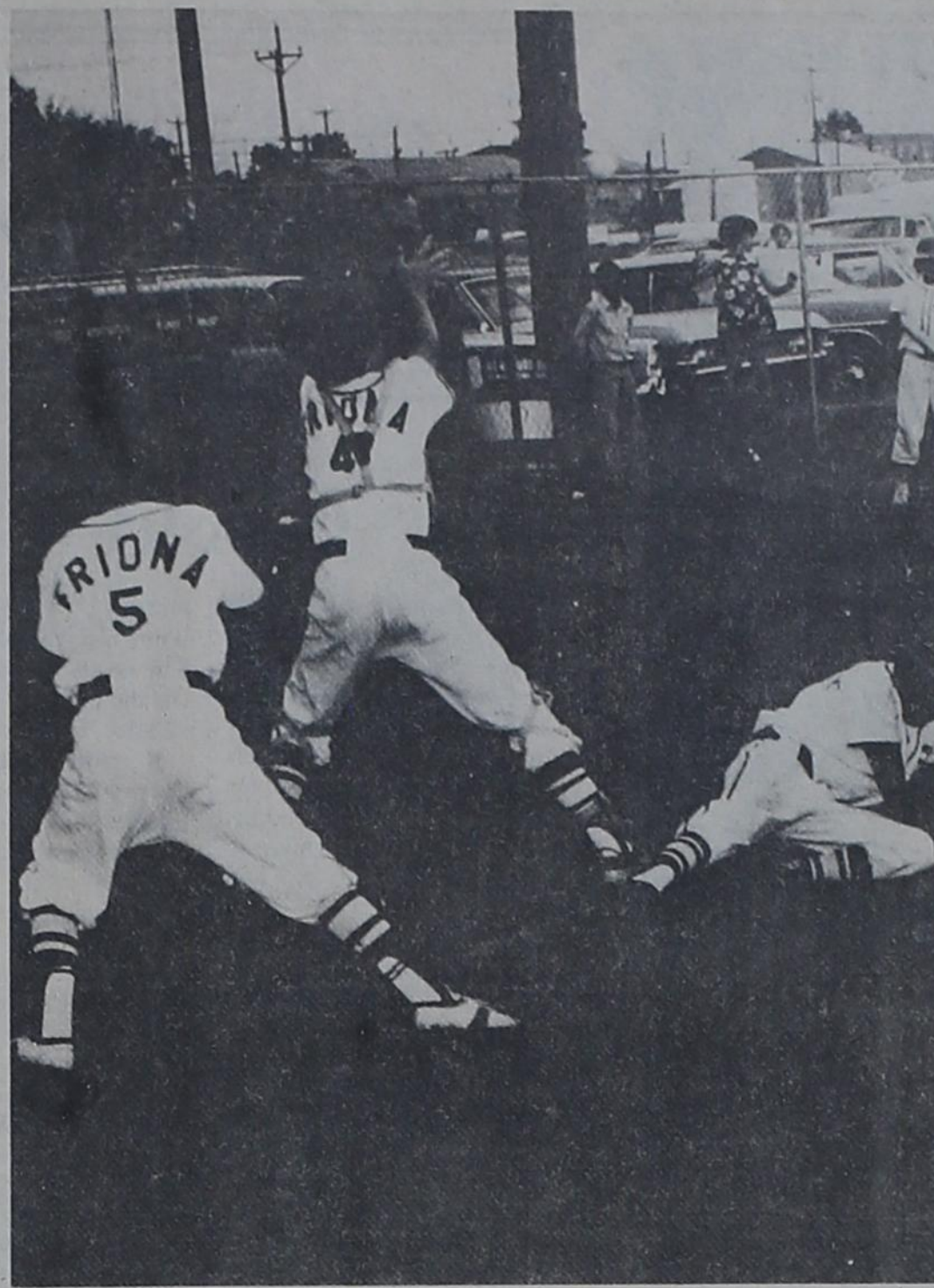

Farmers Receive Crop Payments

Parmer County farmers will earn approximately eight million dollars in payments under the 1973 wheat, feed grain and cotton programs, according to Prentice Mills, executive director of Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

A farmer participating in one or more of the programs becomes eligible to receive payments as soon as a final acreage report has been filed, says Mills.

About one-half of these payments were mailed recently. The payments went to producers on farms for which crop acreage reports were completed prior to July 1.

According to Mills, payments are being processed by the local office as rapidly as possible after an acreage report is received. Farmers may expect to receive payment within 10 days after he has made the final report for his farm.

Mills reminds farm operators they have until Wednesday, August 1, to report farm acreages. If a report is not filed by that time, the farm is not eligible for program payments or other benefits.

Name Marcom C-F Chairman

Reverend Howard Marcom, pastor of Bovina United Methodist Church, has been named chairman of the Breath of Life Campaign to fight children's lung diseases, according to Frank Scott, president of the North Texas Chapter, National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

Rev. Marcom will lead Bovina volunteers in raising funds to support research and care programs for children affected by lung-damaging diseases like cystic fibrosis, severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, and a condition called "childhood emphysema."

Cystic fibrosis, an incurable genetic disease, is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene for C/F. It is believed that one in twenty persons or 10 million Americans may carry the C/F gene, usually without knowing it.

Current research funded by the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation is seeking a practical test to identify these carriers.

Because of improved therapy and constant research, many C/F patients are living beyond infancy to their teens and into young adulthood. That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from other respiratory afflictions whose symptoms resemble those of C/F.

"Most people don't realize that there are six million children in the U.S. affected by pulmonary illness," said Rev. Marcom. "For some of these children, breathing is not the natural function we, who are lucky, take for granted."

The Breath of Life Campaign supports not only research but over 100 C/F Centers for diagnosis and treatment across the country.

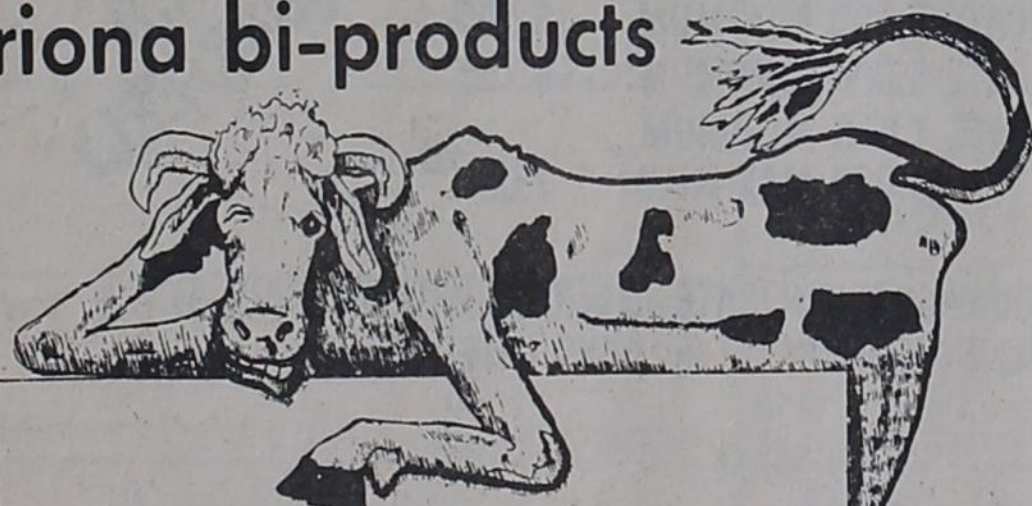

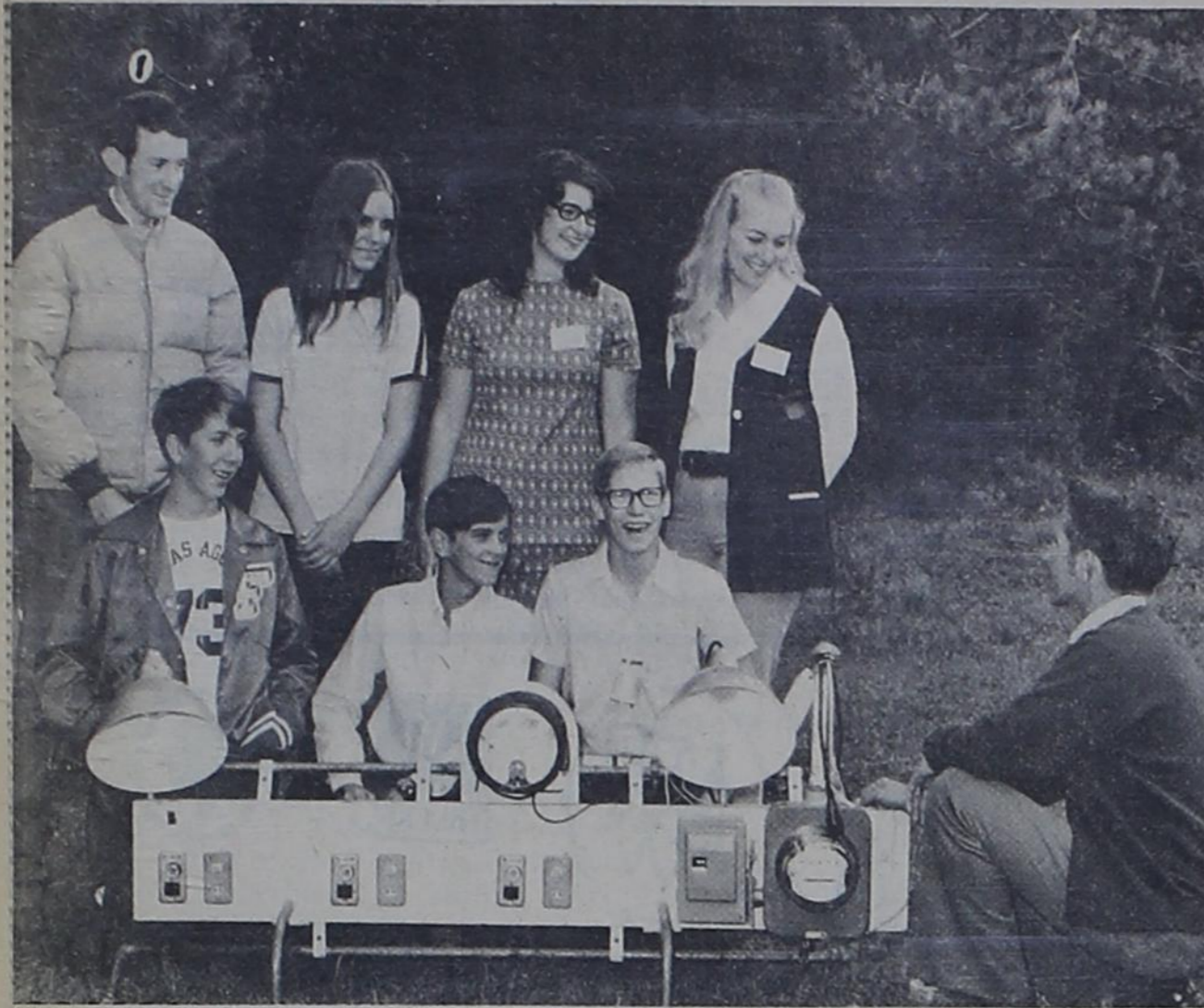

3 c. flour (enriched)
2 1/2 t. salt
2 T. butter
1/2 c. honey
2 c. boiling water
2 pkgs. yeast
1/2 c. lukewarm water
1 c. old-fashioned oats

In a large bowl, pour boiling water over rolled oats. Cover and let stand until just warm. While waiting, mix honey, salt and butter.

The above mixture will make a sticky dough. Cover and let rise until double in bulk. Cut down with knives; it's too sticky to knead. Divide into two loaves and let rise. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 to 45 minutes. Butter crust liberally when loaves are removed from oven.

APRICOT BREAD

1 c. dried apricots
1 c. sugar
1/2 c. brown sugar
2 T. butter
1 egg
1/2 c. water
1/2 c. orange juice
2 c. flour
2 t. baking powder
1/2 t. soda
1/4 t. salt
1/2-1 c. nuts

Soak apricots 30 minutes. Drain, cut up. Mix sugars, butter, egg, water and juice. Sift dry ingredients and blend into creamed mixture. Stir in nuts and apricots. Bake one hour at 350 degrees or until done.

KOSHER PICKLES

20-25 4-inch cucumbers
1/8 t. powdered alum
1 clove garlic
2 heads dill
1 hot red pepper
1 quart cider vinegar
1 c. coarse-medium salt
3 qts. water
grape leaves

Wash cucumbers; let stand in cold water overnight. Pack into hot, sterilized jars. To each quart, add above amounts of alum, garlic, dill and red peppers. Combine vinegar, salt, water; heat to a boil and fill jars. Place grape leaf in each jar; seal. Makes 6 to 8 quarts.

KITCHEN KNIVES often perform deeds they weren't designed to do.

For example, sometimes they remove staples, open cans or pry up lids. Such misuses frequently result in injuries. Likewise, using the wrong knife for a task can lead to injuries.

Each piece of kitchen cutlery was designed for some specific job—and should be used only for that task.

Utilize paring knives for peeling, scraping and various small tasks.

When slicing, dicing and coring vegetables—or trimming and scoring some meats—use a utility or trimmer knife.

A hefty butcher knife should be capable of dealing with

stubborn joints or other hard-to-cut objects.

Carving knives are ideal for cutting hot meats and poultry.

Many common knife injuries stem from slips. Avoid slips by gripping the handle firmly and cut away from your hand or thumb. Above all, concentrate—attention invites trouble.

Since sharp knives are less likely to slip, keep all cutlery sharp. A dull knife requires extra pressure—and when force overcomes resistance, the blade moves suddenly and unexpectedly.

As another precaution, stand or sit in one location when using a knife—don't move around the kitchen with knife in hand.

Common sense in using these kitchen utensils is another defense against accidents.

WTSU Adopting New Regulation

West Texas State University has eliminated its physical examination requirement for incoming students, Dr. T. Paige Carruth, vice president for student affairs, says.

Under new regulations adopted by the Board of Regents, only a record of a student's immunizations are required for admission.

Mrs. Louise Mitchell of the University Health Center says, “In the past, a student would go to a doctor for a physical examination and the doctor would give him several tests that were not required by the university, such as chest x-ray, blood tests. This practice was very expensive for the student.”

Carruth says the university's only medical requirement now is that students must have had the oral polio and the combination tetanus-diphtheria immunization within the last 10 years.

“Last semester we gave more than 375 shots in one day because students had not gotten their shots or did not realize they had to have them,” Mrs. Mitchell says.

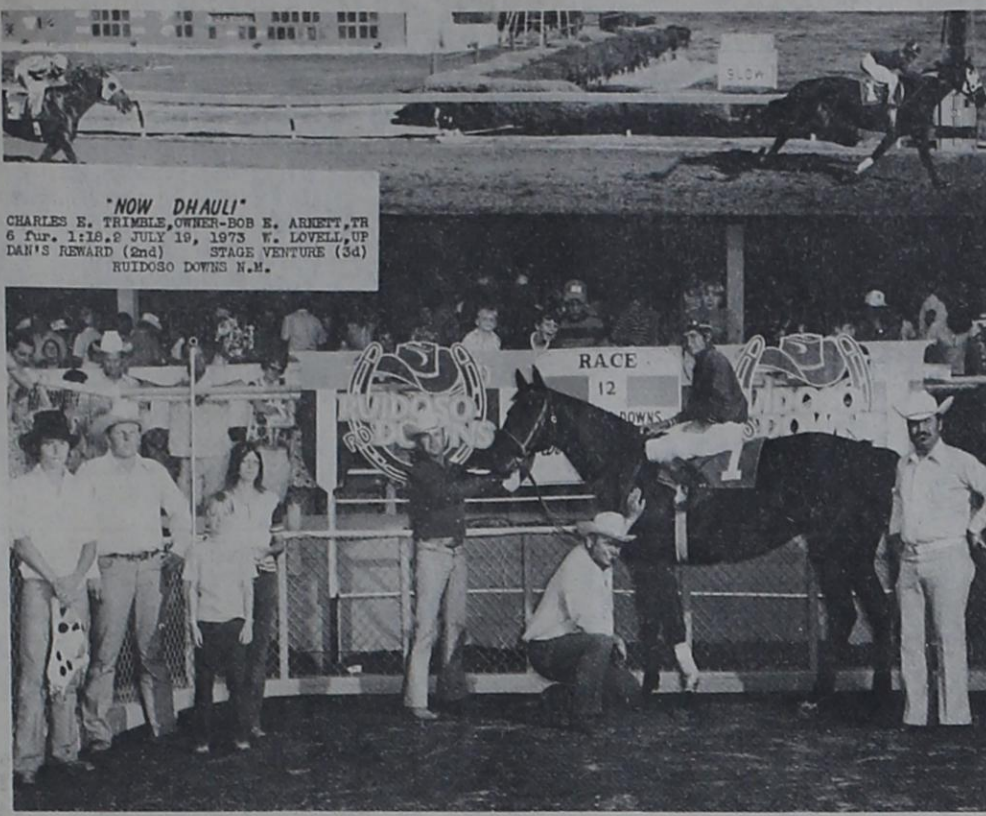
