ON HIS RECENT visit with us, "Uncle Austin" Ellis was telling about the recent death of the man who had been his personal barber for more than 30 years, W.D. Arnold.

Arnold ran his barber shop in downtown Jackson, Tennessee, which is a bustling Western Tennessee city of approximately 50,000 persons, depending on how good a job the census bureau did on its recent nose-count.

W.D. Arnold was a pretty fair singer, according to Uncle Austin Ellis. In fact, our relative said that he and Arnold had formerly teamed up with a couple of other men from Jackson for quartet singing. Even though he's in his 80s, our uncle still sings in the choir every Sunday at the little country church he attends.

W.D. Arnold had a brother that you may have heard of—country singer Eddy Arnold. Eddy was a big singing star for a number of years with the Grand Ole Opry, having his own radio show, and later a TV show.

If you're about "our age," you'll no doubt recall some of Eddy's hits: "Cattle Call," "Mollie Darling," "It's A Sin," "I'd Trade All of My Tomorrows," "Welcome to My World," and "The Tip of My Fingers," just to name a few.

For a number of years, this old country boy (ye editor) used to listen to Eddy Arnold's daily radio program while on his noon break from hoeing or irrigating cotton in the summertime.

Jackson, Tennessee, where Uncle Austin lives, was the hometown of the Arnold boys. Our relative said he had met his barber's famous brother a number of times, as he would come in and visit the guys at W.D. Arnold's shop.

We thought that was a typical All-American story, about a pair of brothers. One became a country music star with millions of fans, and the other was just a "pretty good barber who cut your hair just like you wanted it cut."

We imagine that Mama Arnold was equally as proud of her son W.D. as she was the one that got paid to yodel.

OUR FRIEND Nolan Ryan set his 50th major league record this past Tuesday night while beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, for his 308th career win. The record was the fact that it was Ryan's 545th consecutive appearance as a starting pitcher with no relief pitching duties.

Ironically, Ryan began his career as a relief pitcher (with the New York Mets). With the Mets in 1968, Ryan won his first major league game. The price of gas was 34 cents per gallon at the time.

Ryan has just completed a deal to come back and pitch at least one more year with the Texas Rangers. With his current salary agreement, "Big Tex" can probably afford to buy a lot more gas than when it was 34 cents a gallon.

## Farwell Resident Indicted

A Grand Jury indictment has been handed down in Terry County in connection with the tractor thefts which occurred within ten counties in recent months.

Mark Ancira, a Farwell resident, in his late twenties, was indicted late last week and is being held in Terry County in lieu of a \$63,000 bond. Federal conspiracy charges are expected to be handed down on Ancira in the near future.

Another man is being held in connection with these thefts and formal charges are expected to be charged against him as well.

Each of the nine remaining counties, including Roosevelt, Curry, Lamb, Hale, Castro, Gaines, Yoakum, Bailey, and Cochran counties, are expected to file Grand Jury indictments against Ancira as soon as Terry County completes its charges.

Eight of the eighteen stolen tractors have been recovered and the remaining ten are suspected to be in Mexico, expected to have been sold to individuals there.

An investigator with the Texas Department of Public Safety Auto Theft division and an investigator with the Texas Rangers are there now still trying to recover the remainder of the tractors.

## Shortcourse On Wheat Scheduled

All area wheat producers are invited to attend a Wheat Shortcourse to be held Thursday, August 1 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Friona Community Center. Area specialists will be presenting a variety of information on all aspects of winter wheat production.

Marketing opportunities for wheat and stocker cattle will be discussed by Dr. Jackie Smith. Wheat disease management will be covered by Dr. Harold Kauffman.

Continuing education units will be offered in the shortcourse for certified private applicators. All certified private applicators are required by state law to accumulate continuing education units to maintain their license.

## Open House Is Hosted By Post Office

The Bovina Post Office celebrated its 20th anniversary as an independent establishment of the federal government July 17, 1991, with an open house for the postal customers, from 9 a.m. until 12 noon.

President Richard Nixon was in his first term of office when on August 2, 1970, he signed the Postal Reorganization Act into law creating the United States Postal Service from the former Post Office Department. The change took effect July 1, 1971.

Postmaster Laura Bartlett conducted tours through the Bovina Post Office and Mayor Keith Knight declared by proclamation, July 17, 1991, "Postal Service Recognition Day" for the Bovina Post Office.

Mrs. Bartlett presented a plate block of Desert Storm stamps to Teresa Serna on her husband, Antonio Serna's behalf, who is stationed in Germany.

Bartlett also presented plate blocks of stamps to Karen Stanley on behalf of her husband, Rock Stanley, who is in California at this time, and to Zeferino and Rita Villarreal, on behalf of their sons, Richard, who is stationed at Ft. Hood, Texas and to David, who is stationed in Kentucky.

Bartlett said, "We are proud of our servicemen who serve our

country and I am honored to be able to present them a block of Desert Storm stamps.

Over 100 people were served birthday cake, punch and coffee, and children were presented with coloring books as part of the celebration.

Sandy Ware, Cathy Shields, Vi Hutto and Laura Bartlett assisted with the party, all employees of the Bovina Post Office.

Along with the blocks of stamps, Mrs. Bartlett presented a letter to the servicemen. It read as follows:

Dear Veteran:  
Welcome home, and congratulations on your service to our country.

## Cleanup Work Continues By Santa Fe R.R.

Santa Fe Railway trains were back on schedule early Wednesday morning, July 17, approximately two and one-half days after 15 cars, loaded with 30-35 semi-tractor trailers, derailed just east of Bovina around 2 p.m. Sunday, July 14. Until the tracks could be cleared of debris, all trains were being re-routed through Lubbock.

Clean-up of the area was halted last week when a train at Higgins derailed and the crews were pulled from the Bovina site and taken to Oklahoma to restore train service there. Clean-up resumed sometime Monday when part of the crew returned and the rest of the crew returned on Tuesday.

Clean-up of the area is being conducted by Messer Enterprises of Hereford, who have hired a number of people to help go through the wreckage and salvage anything possible. Messer has also purchased all damaged equipment and contents of the trailers, to be sold to individuals at a later date.

It has been estimated that there were 126,000 United Parcel Service packages aboard the train and of those 126,000 packages, 56,000 have been salvaged.

According to Mel Clark, who is working with the local Sheriff's Department and Messer Enterprises, the area is being guarded 24 hours a day to keep people away from the wreckage. He stated that there have been approximately 100 rattlesnakes found in the area during the clean-up, but luckily no one has been bitten. He is asking that onlookers stay away from the area for their own safety.

Estimated clean-up of the area and damages will be close to four million dollars.

## Redistricting For County Discussed

The Parmer County Commissioners and County Judge Bonnie Clayton met with Bobbie Hill of the firm Northern and Daugherty on July 16 to discuss changes in Parmer County voting districts caused by the 1990 census.

Last month, members of the Parmer County Citizens Advisory Committee on Redistricting had met with Virginia Daugherty of the same firm. She explained new guidelines about voting districts.

Now Ms. Hill has met with County Commissioners to get their input.

Ms. Hill explained that the new voting districts are based upon the census boundaries that were set up by the federal government using geographical boundaries as seen on satellite generated maps rather than arbitrary township lines. A computer was used to designate census blocs within each geographical area.

She brought maps of proposed voting districts for Parmer County, and the commissioners made a few suggestions to her. She will take their input back to her computer programmer to see if the changes they suggested can be made.

In general, the proposed voting districts for voting precincts, election precincts, and commissioner's precincts help to make voting easier for those people who live on farms. Some of them have great distances to drive

in order to vote. The county commissioners' districts were the subject of the most discussion. Farmers normally want to vote for the person who takes care of the roads in front of their farms, but sometimes another commissioner has to care for the roads for an adjoining area. An attempt was made to create voting districts that match the working districts.

The commissioners suggested very few changes. For instance, one rural census bloc proposed by the government had one house in it. The census taker marked the entire census bloc 100% minority. The information was sent to the federal government which used it in preparing the voting precinct maps. Now the family has moved, and the census bloc will remain on government maps with the designation of 100% minority for the next ten years unless a change is made.

The government process to change a designation calls a petition signed by 25 voters within a census bloc be presented. Some rural census blocs like the one the commissioners pointed out do not have 25 residents. The commissioners noted that Lakeview voting district, for instance, has only 16 voters. Residents there could not petition for change because there are too few people involved.

Taxes of Bovina Independent School District were raised by the unanimous vote of the board of education in a special session Monday night. Tax rate was increased from 92 cents per \$100 valuation to \$1.05.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1966

# Steam-Flaked Sorghum Equal To Steam-Flaked Corn For Beef Cattle

For feedlot operations looking for ways to cut production costs and increase profits, results of recent research done at Texas Tech University could be the answer.

The research showed that steam-flaked grain sorghum performs as well as steam-flaked corn in high concentrate diets for growing/finishing steers and can be substituted for corn with no adverse effects on gain or feed efficiency.

"Steam-flaking improves the feeding value of sorghum so that it has a higher value than rolled corn or approximately the same value as for steam-flaked corn," said Dr. C. Reed Richardson, ruminant nutritionist at the university.

What that can mean for feedlots is a savings in production costs when they feed the cheaper grain and that's usually grain sorghum.

"Any price differential between grain sorghum and corn would be reflected in lower cost of grain for the lower priced grain," said Richardson.

The project, funded by the Texas Grain Sorghum Board, compared steam-flaked sorghum and steam-flaked corn in diets with and without added fat.

One hundred and twelve crossbred steers were divided randomly into four treatment groups. Each group was fed a diet consisting of 88 per cent concentrate and 13 per cent crude protein. Diets consisted of grain sorghum without fat, sorghum with fat, corn without fat and corn with fat. Compositions of the rations are given in Table 1.

"The fat was added at the expense of the grain in the diets so

# Jerry Don Rogers Is Buried At Lubbock

Services for Jerry Don Rogers, 56, of Lubbock, were conducted Monday in First Baptist Church of Lubbock, with the Rev. John Ballard, associate pastor, officiating.

Assisting was Chuck Williams, youth minister at First Baptist Church, and the Rev. Jimmy McGuire, senior adult minister at Bacon Heights Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Cory Don of Lubbock; three daughters, Jana Hallett and Joni Rogers, both of Lubbock, and Jige Houston of Albuquerque, N.M.; his mother, Opal Rogers of Lubbock; a brother, Gibb L. of Rowlett; and a grandchild.

that the roughage level remained unchanged," said Richardson.

After 160 days on feed, the steers showed no difference in average daily gain or feed efficiency for the grain sorghum without fat, corn without fat, and grain sorghum with fat treatments. (Table 2).

Richardson said that one interesting aspect of this experiment was the higher intake of feed dry matter for the corn plus fat diet as compared to all other treatments. Perhaps this explains the increase average daily gain and improved feed efficiency that the corn plus fat demonstrated over the other diets, he said.

What that can mean for feedlots is a savings in production costs when they feed the cheaper grain and that's usually grain sorghum.

## Rodeo Is Scheduled

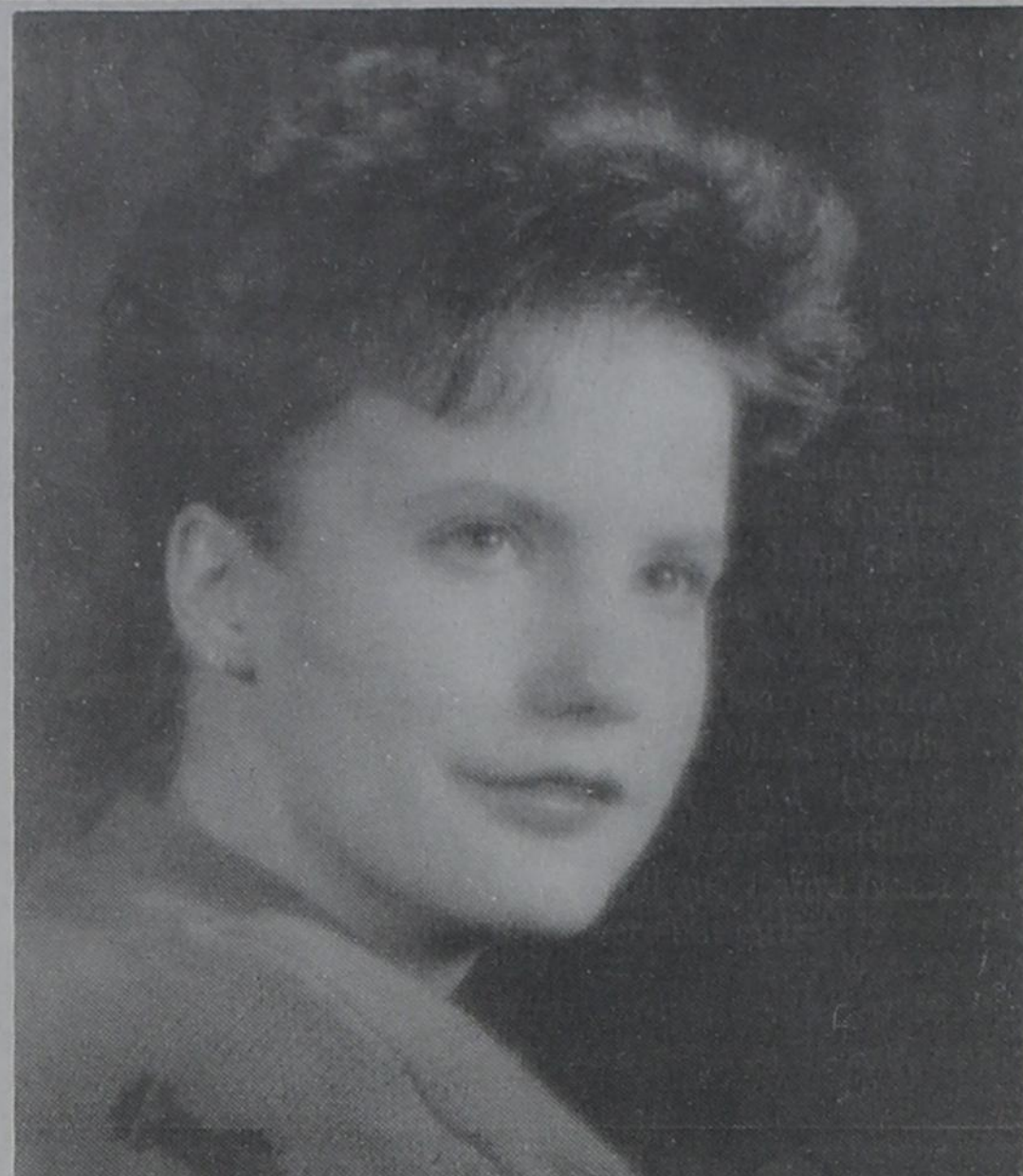
The 24th annual Farwell rodeo will be a special one this year--it will be a full-fledged amateur rodeo.
