TEN YEARS AGO—APRIL 8, 1964

Three new councilmen were elected Tuesday from a field of seven. They were Lloyd Gober, Mario Trevino and Tom Bonds. Mayor Boyd Gilbreath, running unopposed, was re-elected to a second two-year term.

What was probably a record number of voters in this school district went to the polls Saturday to elect two trustees. A total of 300 marked ballots in the election which had four candidates seeking two vacancies on the seven-member board. Elected were Robert Read and Durward Bell.

H.M. Baggary, editor and publisher of The Tulia Herald, will be guest speaker at a Tuesday night meeting of the Parmer County Young Democrats.

Flags in Bovina and across the nation are flying at half mast in observance of the death Sunday of Gen. Douglas MacArthur. The flags will continue to be flown at that position until the funeral for the five-star general Saturday.

TEN YEARS AGO—APRIL 15, 1964

Bovina High School sports team members during the present school year will be guests of honor at the annual athletic banquet Thursday night. J.T. King, head football coach at Texas Tech in Lubbock, is slated to be the guest speaker.

The Second Annual Bovina Appaloosa Horse Show has been scheduled for Saturday, May 9. A total of 19 halter and performance classes will be offered for the spotted horses. A total of 94 horses were entered in the first annual show a year ago.

Plans are underway to change the zoning ruling on Third Street from "restricted retail" to "retail." The zoning change was discussed at a meeting of the city council last week. A protest hearing is scheduled to be called within the next 30 days in regard to the change.

Displaying a wealth of determination and breaking records as they went, the Bovina Mustangs successfully defended their District 4-B Track and Field championship at Lazbuddie Saturday.

By winning the tale-telling final event of the afternoon, the mile relay, the Mustangs edged Lazbuddie's Longhorns, 173-170. The two teams had been neck and neck in the standings throughout the meet.

Six records were broken, three of those by Bovina. Tally Kelso set a new record in the shot, Richard Carson in the mile and the team of David Anderson, Lane Gober, Scotty Rundell and Dennis Johnston set a new mark in the mile relay.

Also qualifying for the regional meet were Eddie Reeves in the shot, Rundell in the broad jump, Kelso in the discus, Rundell in the half mile, Kelso in the 120-yard high hurdles and Jackie Dane, James Lee Calaway, Dean Mayhew and Johnston in the 440-yard relay.

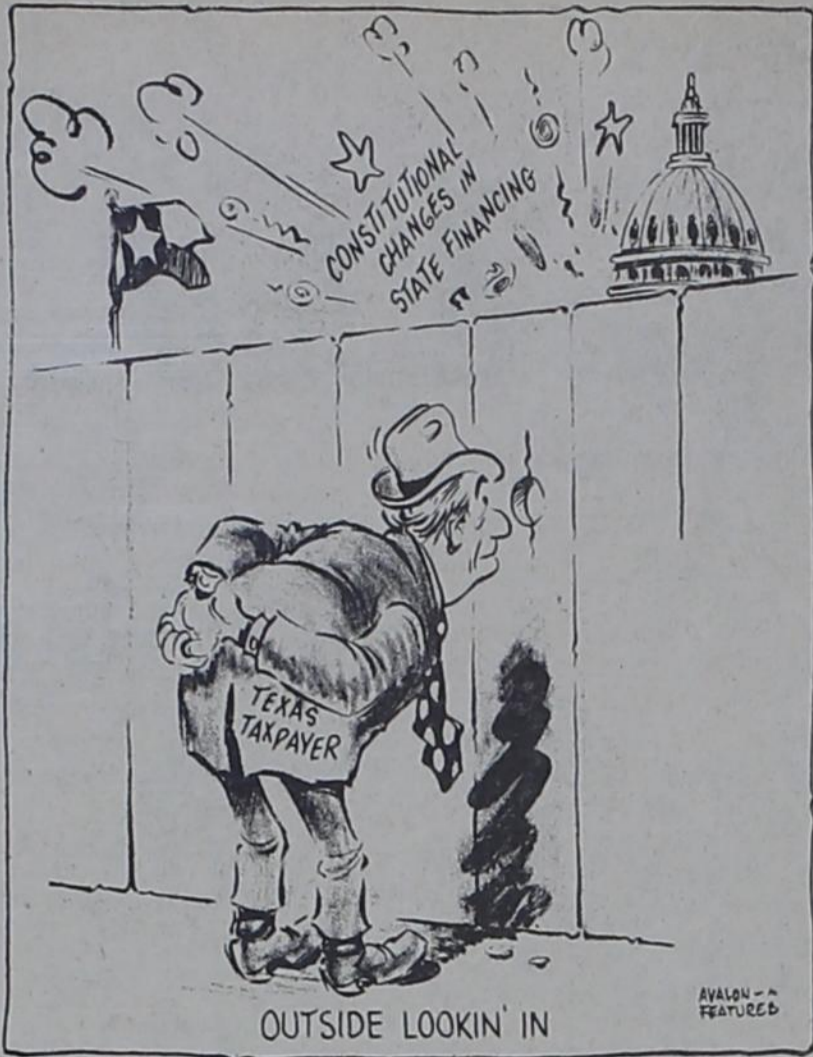
SIX YEARS AGO—APRIL 10, 1968

In unusual developments on the city government level, Bovina now has five new or re-elected members on the six-man board.

The unusualities started following Saturday's election in which two candidates, Vernon Estes and Lloyd Gober, tied for the third councilman position with 70 votes each.

Before a decision could be reached on which of the two would be named to the post, C.R. Elliott, who had another year remaining on a two-year term, resigned from the council making room for both Estes and Gober to be seated.

Re-elected to the council were Billie Sudderth and Charles Corn. Mayor Bedford Caldwell was unopposed in his bid for a



second two-year term. Leslie McCain was re-elected and Lawrence Jamerson and Leon Ware named new trustees of Bovina Independent School District when voters went to the polls Saturday.

A total of 234 votes were cast in the election. Grady Sorley and Don Murphy were re-elected president and vice president, respectively, of Bovina Independent School District board of trustees at an organizational meeting Monday night. Elected secretary was Les McCain. He succeeds Leon Grissom.

Five teachers were hired for the 1968-69 school year at the session. Named to teach in elementary school next year were Mrs. Gladys Murphy of Clovis, Mrs. Juanita Leer and Mrs. Audra Cummings, both of Oklahoma, and Mrs. Bill Nicholas of Bovina. Named to a position as high school math instructor was Mrs. Thelma Coffey of Friona, a recent graduate of West Texas State University.

Sophomore student Stuart McMeans won two first places in the District 3-A track meet at Kress Saturday while Rex Cumption brought home a second place. Both qualified for regional.

Three Bovina High School students were listed on the first team and two received honorable mention on the District 3-A all-district basketball teams.

Mike Grissom, senior, was named to the mythical first squad while Daryl Kirkpatrick, also a senior, received honorable mention. The Fillies' Linda Rejino and Judy Minyen were on the girls' first team. Margaret Jo Venable received honorable mention. All three are seniors. Linda was the only guard on the all-district lineup to be a unanimous choice.

Representing Bovina in regional literary events will be Linda Rejino, first in prose; Mike Gee and Johnnie Horn, first in debate; Zaida Donaldson, first in shorthand; Ronny Dyer, second in informal speaking; Rex Cumption, second in poetry; Gina Clawson, second in persuasive speaking; and Alan Carson, second in persuasive speaking.

Bovina won first in the one-act play contest. Members of the cast were Mike Gee, Johnnie Horn, Bob Sparks, Ronny Dyer, Rex Cumption, Nancy Mitchell, Vickie Hawkins, Deborah Hawkins, Candy Wilson and Toni Pinner.

MBP Stops Slaughter Operations In Idaho

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced recently that it would suspend slaughtering operations at its Boise, Idaho facility on April 12, 1974. Breaking and fabricating will continue. The suspension will affect approximately one hundred and twenty-five of the two hundred workers at the plant.

The shut down is caused by economics. The current prices of live cattle in the Northwest do not permit the Company to

operate. The length of the shut down will be determined by the time required for margins to return to normal.

The Boise plant was opened in October, 1973. It has been slaughtering about 2,800 cattle per week. Missouri Beef Packers also has plants in Rock Port, Missouri; Plainview, Texas; and Friona, Texas, which have been slaughtering over 19,000 head per week.

'Earth Week' Set For April 21-28

"Education for Environmental Quality" is the theme for Earth Week 1974, April 21-28, 1974. Special projects and programs emphasizing learning and action for environmental improvement are to be launched and carried out during the week.

Earth Week 1974 is sponsored by the Alliance for Environmental Education, a coalition of 27 private organizations whose local units are working throughout the nation to enlist schools, youth groups, civic groups, and others in continuing efforts to understand and properly care for the environment.

A Joint Resolution in behalf of Earth Week 1974 has been introduced in Congress by 50

Senators. The Resolution states the purpose of Earth Week 1974 as "a time to continue the nationwide effort of education on environment problems, to review and assess environmental progress, and to determine what further steps must be taken, and to renew the commitment and dedication of each American to restore and protect the quality of the environment."

A packet of informational materials containing suggested learning activities may be obtained by writing Earth Week 1974, 1201 16th St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036. Local units of member organizations of the Alliance will provide various kinds of

help to groups requesting assistance for Earth Week projects and programs.

Dedicated to all phases of advancing the science and art of environmental education, the Alliance's primary objective is to improve the extent and effectiveness of environmental education programs.

Tailwater Can Be An Asset In Dry Weather

"It is so dry and the wind is blowing so hard the water will not get to the end of the rows," this is the common complaint right now, but in a few months the problem will be directly opposite-tailwater.

Depending on how it is treated, tailwater can be an asset or a liability. Leo Berend has one tailwater pit and believes it is making him money.

Ben Rejino has an excellent return system utilizing grassed waterways, sediment pits and underground pipe.

J.J. McDonald could not stand to see all of that tailwater on his farm wasted, so he is installing a tailwater return system.

To these men tailwater can never become a liability. They have equipped themselves to handle it and can reuse it far cheaper than their wells can be operated.

"Our water will not be here forever, but it will be here a few years longer because men like these care," says Herb Evans, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

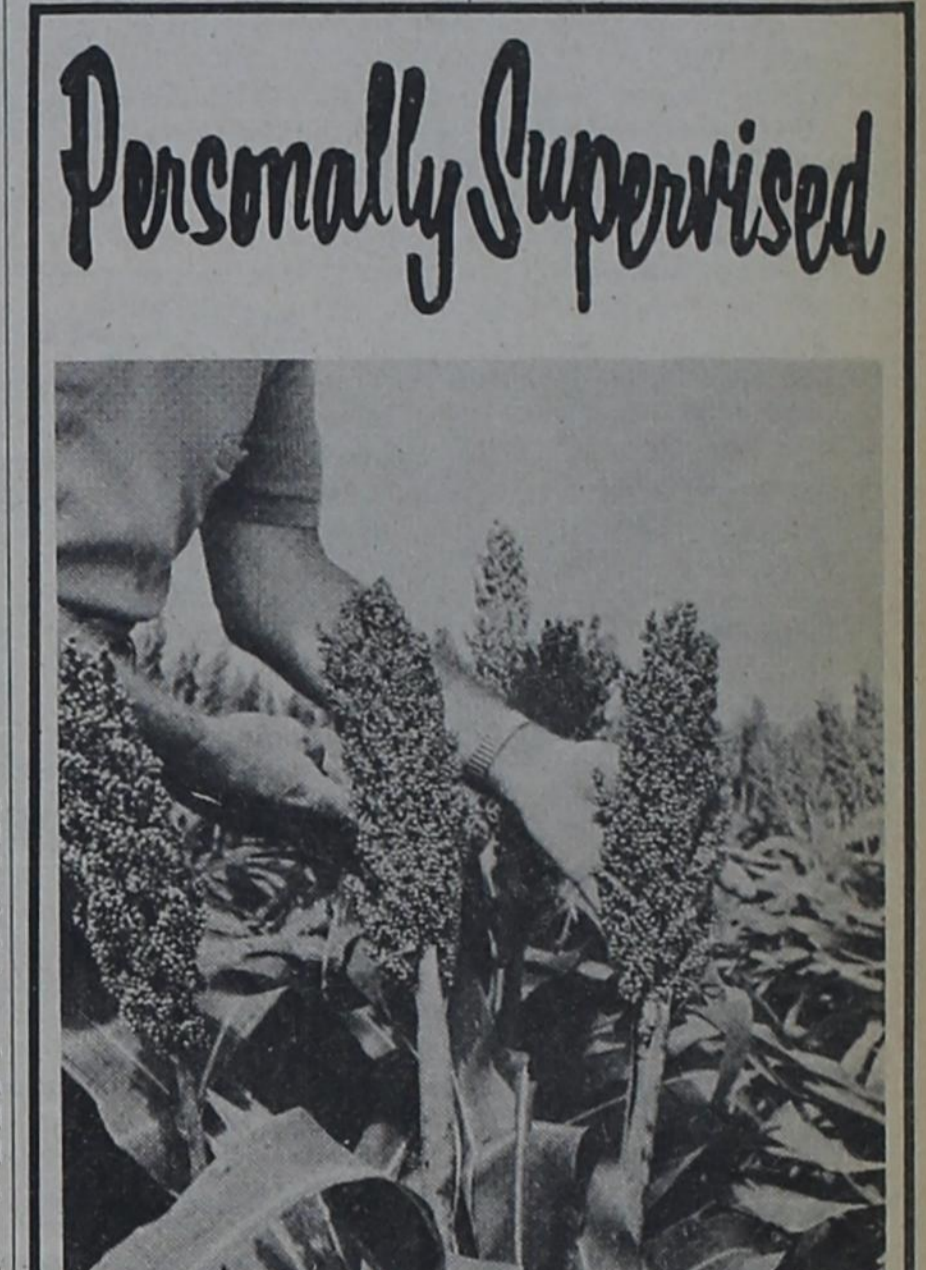

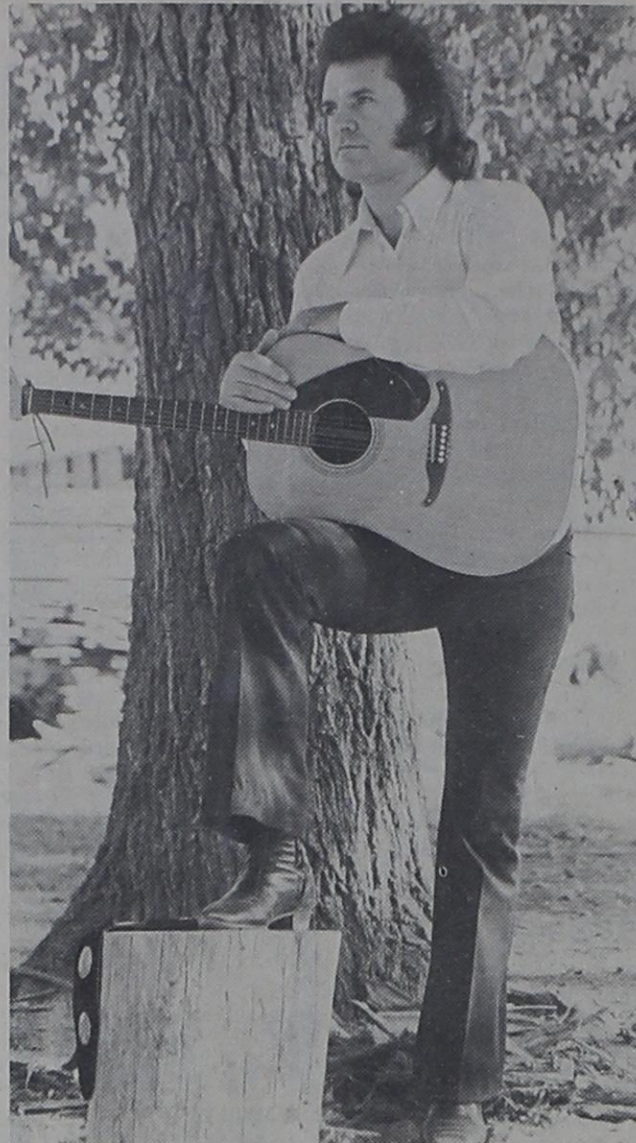

Texas Tech Day Slated Saturday

Ex-students of Texas Tech University, scattered throughout the United States and some in faraway lands, will observe the Annual Texas Tech Day, Saturday, April 20.

In announcing the date, Manuel DeBusk of Dallas, President of the Tech Ex-Students Association, pointed out that Texas Tech Day is one of the most important days on the University calendar each year. Local observances are planned by most of the Association's 40 organized clubs and a number of groups that are not organized.

This will be the 20th Annual observance of Texas Tech Day. Its purpose is to bring Exes and other Friends of Tech together for the "common enjoyment of traditions and heritage" of the University, DeBusk said. Thousands of Exes and friends of the University will get together, many meeting for the first time with one another, but with a common tie, Texas Tech. Several campus officials and faculty members are expected to attend chapter meetings

throughout the State and the Nation.

Not all the chapters will meet Saturday. Some will choose a more convenient day soon, according to Wayne James, Executive Director of the Ex-Students Association.

In addition to the chapter meetings, there will be numerous gatherings of Tech Exes in homes throughout the nation.

Founded in 1923 and opened in 1925, Texas Tech is in the midst of observing its Fiftieth Anniversary. Last fall it had an enrollment of 21,510 students in its eight undergraduate colleges, and two Schools-Graduate and Law.

Academically, Texas Tech has been designated as one of the four major, multi-purpose Universities in the State of Texas System. The board academic program is designed to meet the increasing demands for continuing education of all citizens by providing opportunities at the undergraduate, graduate and professional levels.
