COTTON FORECAST FOR U. S. 16,903,000 BALES NOV. 8 REPORT

WASHINGTON—A cotton crop of 16,903,000 bales this year was estimated Monday by the department of the basis estimated Monday by the department of agriculture on the basis of conditions on November 1. A month ago 16,284,000 bales were indicated. Last year 13,932,000 bales were produced.

A yield of 197.8 pounds of lint per acre is indicated, compared with 190.5 pounds a month ago and 147.7 pounds produced last year.

We cannot sidetrack ten years of progress in social planning just because we are con-fronted by an extraordinary re-

"We have contributed to champion those constructive and preventative activities which contribute so much to raising the American standard of living—such activities as public health and character building organizations. This policy will remain in force and, it is hoped will be adopted by all emergency committees."

One such character building or-ganization as Mr. Young mentions, is the Boy Scout movement, wherein young lads are trained in the right principles of citizenship, and general conduct. The eastern New Mexico area is striving to secure funds for its work, and should be supported because when character is developed properly, we shall have little fear of ec-onomic depressions resulting disastrously.

4-H BABY BEEF CALVES INCREASE IN NUMBERS

There will be more 4-H club calves on fed during the coming year than at any previous time since club work was started says W. L. Black of the New Mexico Agricultural College. This, in spite of the fact that many of the club members failed to make any money on the feeding operative. tions last year, seems to indicate there is no such thing as a lasting depression in the heart of a 4-H club member.

Last year there were 34 baby beef calves fed in the state. At the present time there are 41 the present time there are 41 calves on feed and indications are that there will be more than 100 additional calves go on feed between now and April 1, 1932.

These calves will be shown at local fairs and also at the sectional calves are them.

The calves in the southern part of the state will be shown at the El Paso show; those in the central part and eastern part of the state will go to the Amarillo show and those in the northern part of the state to the Denver National Livestock Show.

Indications are that this year's feeding operations will be much more profitable than those of the more profitable than those of the past, due to the fact that the calves are being purchased at prices of from 5c to 6c per pound, while previously the cheapest calves cost 10 per pound. The feed for the calves is being purchased at one-third to one-half the price of former years. Under these conditions it is very improbable that a calf that is given good feed and care will lose any good feed and care will lose any money for the owner, even if prices remain at the present low
