

TELLING THE TIME WITH A QUARTER, A STRING



The a string around a quarter and hold the quarter suspended over and slightly inside a glass. Grasp the string between the index finger and the thumb, and place it directly over the pulse of the thumb. Hold your hand perfectly rigid, and the quarter will begin to swing to and fro like a pendulum. The arc made by the swinging quarter will slowly increase in width until the quarter strikes the side of the glass, and it will strike the number of times closest to the hour of the day. If the time should be twenty minutes past one, the quarter will strike the glass once, and should the time be quarter of two, the quarter will strike twice. It is necessary to hold the string over the pulse of the thumb, as this is the motivating force controlling the movements of the quarter.

Many people raise the question about the digestibility of cheese. Food scientists say, however, that the discomfort sometimes following the eating of chese is probably largely the result of "the unsuitable way in which cheese is often eaten-as at hours other than meal times, or at the end of a meal already sufficient. When eaten at a rational place in the meal and thoroughly chewed, usually cheese is well digested.' To this the bureau of home economics adds the suggestion that the methed of cooking cheese has much to do with its digestibility. Grate, flake or shave the cheese and distribute thru the other ingredients of the cheese dish, and cook at a very moderate temperature. Then the cheese has no chance to form the leathery mass which is

so slow to digest. Onion soup with cheese is a whole meal in itself. Cheese fondue, made with a pound of cheese, a pint of milk, and two cups of bread crumbs, can be served as a very cheap main dish for the family dinner. Tomato rabbit, Welsh rabbit, cheese with tomatoes and rice, cheese souffle, cheese with macaroni and tomatoes or scalloped with cabbage and spaghetti, or cheese with potatoes, corn, hominy or hominy grits cheese with rice croquettes, or cheese with anything, almost, will add both to the flavor and food value of the meal.




