Sheriff Lovelace Reports A Number Of Thefts

A rash of thefts has been reported by Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace.

A chain saw was taken from the Eugene Van Story place east of Lariat, reports the sheriff. Story lives in Morton and the house was vacant at the time of the theft.

Six hundred gallons of diesel fuel was taken from the Gene Vasek place, two miles north of the Hub community. The fuel was kept in an underground tank, according to Sheriff Lovelace. Vasek lives in Hereford.

A citizen's band radio was removed from a grain truck which was parked at Worley Mills, Inc. in Farwell. The truck belongs to Don Lovett.

Another CB radio was taken from a pickup owned by Bill Hill of Lazbuddie. The theft occurred while the vehicle was parked at the Lazbuddie Schools Bus Barn where Hill is employed as a driver.

Sheriff Lovelace also reported that a .22 caliber

Another case under investigation by the sheriff's department involves furniture which was taken from the Jerry Fancher place southeast of Hub. taken.

Other cases being investigated involve check forgeries and vandalism. Six forged checks, each written for the amount of \$20, have been passed in Friona. Charges were to be filed Wednesday, Sheriff Lovelace said.

Two-Point Run Gives S-E Win

The Bovina Mustangs dropped their second district game to the Kress Kangaroos in a very close one, 8-7, Friday. Untimely penalties and two missed field goals had as much to do with the Mustang's loss as Springlake-Earth did in the hard fought struggle.

In spite of the loss, which dropped the Mustangs to 0-2 in the district loop, Bovina is an improving football team.

We are improving every week," said Bovina head coach Joe Christian. "This was a tough one to lose. 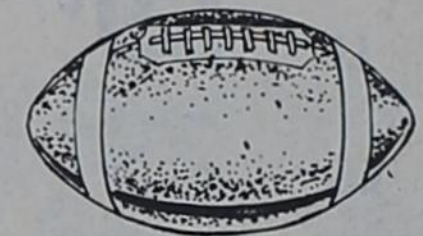

Bovina Travels To Kress On Friday

Next week the Bovina Mustangs will take on the Kress Kangaroos at Kress coming off an impressive win over the Farwell Steers, the Kangaroos will be trying for their second district win.

The Mustangs, who lost a heartbreaker to Springlake-Earth last weekend, 8-7, will be trying for their first District 3-A win against two losses. Bovina's other district loss was to Farwell.

The Kress Kangaroos now stand 4-3 for the season and 1-1 in district, having lost their district opener to Hart.

Kress senior Dane Sisemore scored on a four yard burst and then slipped through the Farwell defense for the two point conversion to lead the visiting Kangaroos to an 8-6 win over the undefeated Farwell team.

Sisemore led both teams rushing for the night with 103 yards on 23 carries. Kress also held the total offensive edge over the Steers 180-160.

Kress has amassed 108 points against opponents' 76 points so far this season while the Mustangs sport a slight offensive edge and a small defensive deficit. They stand 113 points for and 111 points against for the season.

"Kress is probably the most improved team in our district," said Mustang head coach Joe Christian. "They have excellent running backs and are a very good overall team."

Already this year, the Kangaroos have outdone their previous season record of 2-8.

Returning 11 lettermen to the squad this season, the Kangaroos' main problem was the lack of vital experience in the offensive backfield. There was no problem with the experience in the front lines. It was up to head coach Al Mitts to find an offensive combination that could average more than the 6.8 points they averaged last year.

So far this season, the Kangaroos have managed to average over 15 points a game, so it looks as though they are coming along.

Three seniors, each a two way regular last season, are back to lead the Kangaroos this fall. They are: end Lyndon Byrd, tackle Daniel Rascon and halfback-defensive end Dane Sisemore. Sisemore is the only offensive backfield regular held over from last year.

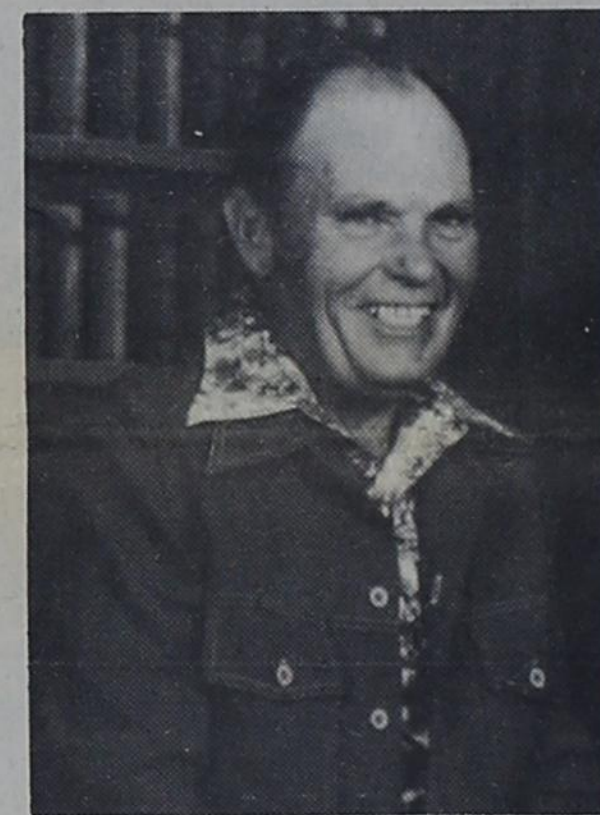
Strengthening the line offensively are Carlos Amador, guard, Richard Mora, center, and Zane Weiss and Kent McClendon, ends.

Kress' early season was a time of testing for coach Mitts as he tried to find the combination for the lack of size and experience in his backfield. His success in the early season reflects how the Kangaroos will do in District 3-A.

"They're young (Kress), but they do very well. We have to play them at their house, and that makes it tougher," coach Christian concluded.
