Americans have more than \$5,000,-000,000 invested in the empire and they buy from Canada more than 15 times as much as all the nations of the commonwealth together.

WOOL MOVES FASTER THAN IN 12 YEARS

BOSTON .-- L. U. Edgehill, vice president of Draper and Company, Friday said the National Co-opera tive Wool Marketing Corporation had sold several million pounds of wool today at a price of 35 to 37 cents a pound, clean basis. Sales of equal size were made Thursday, of Lucas Cranach the elder (1472- Edgehill said. The buyers of the co-operative

vool were not disclosed by Edgehill. who said they included some of the largest manufacturers in the coun try. Draper and Company are selling agents for the co-operative.

Edgehill described the present ool market as "moving rapidly," ithe like of which the trade has not experienced since 1920. He estimated that more than 15,000,000 ounds had been sold "in the street" in the past 48 hours. Others prominent in the trade, he said, estimated the sales as high as 25,000,000 pounds.
