In the Coates No. 2, workmen have drilled past the big gas and are pumping fresh water into the hole, while 100 feet away, the original well is making

From Pig to Man There are at least six diseases

which man may catch from hogs. One that is usually quite serious undulant fever, also called brucellosis. This is a disease that also affects goats and cows, but the pig variety of brucellosis is the most dangerous to man. Then there is the pork tape worm that is got through eating measly pork Although common in Mexico this worm is not found often in the United States. Moreover we are protected from it by meat inspection if we buy meat with the government stamp on it. The disease we catch most commonly from pigs, however, is trichinosis and against this disease meat inspection is no protection. This point deserves emphasis. It is not commonly known that microscopic examination for trichinella spiralis was abandoned in 1907; partly no doubt because even with such an examination it is impossible to be sure that the meat is not infested.




