## ssip Says Hatch May POTASH CO. OF Judge in New Mexico, AMERICA PLANS **EXPANSION**

To Build Second Shaft Expected to Start in the over the country. Next Sixty Days on the Two Projects.

Construction of a refinery and the sinking of a second shaft will be started by the Potash Company of America within 60 days, G. R. Harris, a company official, announced at Carlsbad recently.

Thirty men have been put to work by the company during the past week and an additional 30 will be given employment during the next, Harris said.

About 150 men will be at work for the firm within a week.

The second shaft will be used chiefly for an air shaft. It will be a three compartment shaft just as the main shaft is, but the main shaft will be used primarily for sending equipment into the mine, for sending men in and bringing them out of the mine and for lifting the mined potash to the sur-

Mr. Harris said that it is indefinite as to what type of refinery will be built at this time. Whether a small pilot plant will be built or for Gov. Tingley except whether a larger plant will be decided on will be determined within few weeks, Harris said. on Cutting in the senate.

get Less by \$134,000.00 Than Any Period Since 1927; Saving Effected in Every Department.

SANTA FE-Gov. Clyde Tingley passed by the last session of the said Tuesday the "total budget for the state for the 1935-1937 biennium is less than for any twoyear period in the past eight years and the budget for this year is \$134,000 less than the average for the past eight years."

The figures were released in a prepared statement from the governor's office.

The governor said, "savings in many departments, except schools, made this possible. The lower budget was possible despite the fact that \$150,000 more is budgeted for schools alone.

"As result of the act of the legislature authorizing refunding of bonds, we will save \$90,000 alone on interests during the year.

"By cutting down waste in state departments and cutting out nonessentials it has been possible to keep the budget for this year to \$2,141,537 and for the next year to \$2,166,284.

According to figures compiled at my request, the average for the last eight years was \$2,275,115. Last year was the only year in which the budget was lower during the eight year period. The total was \$2,046,000 about \$94,000 less than for this year when \$150,000 was added in appropriation for

State Income Tax Due On April 15

SANTA FE-The attention of New Mexico taxpayers may now be devoted to the state income tax, due April 15.

An auditor, cashier and stenographer have been added to the staff of L. D. Sparks, in charge of its collection, Sparks said Mon-

Sparks said greater returns from the tax are expected this year since the offset allowed by virtue of a property tax will prevail only for the first one-third of this year. The rate on incomes up to \$10,-000 is one per cent, two per cent on incomes up to \$20,000; from that figure to \$100,000 three per cent, and over \$100,000 four per cent.

Exemptions are in odd sums this year, because of a change in the law by the legislature, Sparks said. Where the old law was \$1000 for single persons and \$1500 for married persons, the new law is \$1500 for single persons and \$2500 for married. Due to the four months lapse, however, the old law applies to a third of last year's income, thus a single person has an exemption of \$1,333.33, and a married person \$2,166.67.

## State Income Tax Due On April 15

SANTA FE-The attention of New Mexico taxpayers may now be devoted to the state income tax, due April 15.

An auditor, cashier and stenographer have been added to the staff of L. D. Sparks, in charge of its collection, Sparks said Mon-

Sparks said greater returns from the tax are expected this year since the offset allowed by virtue of a property tax will prevail only for the first one-third of this year. This year the tax paid may be considered an offset only for onethird of the taxable period reported and taxes paid on income property may be used as an offset for only a third of the year-under the same conditions as previously, which is that only 20 per cent of the taxes paid on income property might have been deducted.

The rate on incomes up to \$10,-000 is one per cent, two per cent on incomes up to \$20,000; from that figure to \$100,000 three per cent, and over \$100,000 four per cent.

Exemptions are in odd sums this year, because of a change in the law by the legislature, Sparks said. Where the old law was \$1000 for single persons and \$1500 for married persons, the new law is \$1500 for single persons and \$2500 for married. 




