Constituting this total were 133, 461 tons of nuriate, 9,843 tons of manure salts, 18,281 tons of sulphate, 7,268 tons of Kainit, and 1,603 tons of sulphate of potash magnesia. These figures include salts of domestic and foreign origin, exclusive of importations of potassium nitrate.





#### DEATH WALKS THE HIGHWAY

The gods of recklessness are devouring thousands of lives each month on American highways, and there is no limit to their appetite.

During the week of the Fourth last July, nearly 500 people met accidental deaths - the largest number in five years. Fireworks were responsible for a smaller number of those fatalities than usual-but that greatest destroyer of all, the carelessy operated motor car, chalked up a grisly record.

Every week witnesses similar occurrences. If, in a single disaster, such as an earthquake or a fire, as many people were to be killed as have been killed in accidents in the last few months, the world would be aghast.

But the world seems to regard accidents as inevitable, and even looks upon them with equanimity. Alas! the great tragedy is that

accidents are not inevitable, and nine out of ten are preventable, and easily preventable.

Carelessness, recklessness, ignorance, stupidity and the nonchantly don't care attitude are the principal causes of accidental injury and death, and surely they can be cured, through law, through force of public opinion, and through education of the individual.

In our own community recently there have been very near tragedies. A woman going down Main street colliding with a truck (which had been parked without a driver in the middle of the street) and of this same incident, we heard the driver of the truck make a sneering remark about the woman's driving. More than one out of every six farm operators in the United States on January 1, 1935, had operated the farm they occupied less than one year, according to a United States summary of the 1935 federal farm census released recently by Director William L Austin of the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce There were 1,197,204 farmers who census date, as compared with 1,-005,211 farmers who had been working the farm reported upon less than one year on April 1, 1930. > The number of farm operators in the United States who gave a Mr. and Mrs. Richard Key and report for the date of beginning operations on the particular land occupied on January 1, 1935, was 6,677,242, or 98 per cent of all operators. Of the total reporting, 18 per cent had been operating their farm less than one year, 26 per cent less than two years, 44 per cent less than five years, 60 per cent less than ten years, and 72 per cent less than fifteen years. The number of all operators who had operated their farm fifteen years or more shows an increase of from 1,596,159, or 26 per cent of the total reporting in 1930, to 1, 905,648, or 28 per cent of the total

in 1935. For the United States, exclusive of the south, 11 per cent of all farm operators had been working their farms less than one year and visiting friends and attending to 35 per cent fifteen years or more The corresponding percentages for the western states were 13 per cent and 23 per cent, and for the southern states 25 per cent and 23 per cent. Among the individual states next Sunday at their range east of the range in the percentage of operators with less than one year occupancy was a high of 34 per cent in Georgia and a low of 5 per cent in Massachusetts and Rhode Island. For those who had been on their farm fifteen years or more the highest percentage, 46, was reported in Maine and the lowest, 16 in Mississippi.



## Spanish Government

Flees From Madrid

WHILE the Fascist insurgents were smashing their way into Madrid and hurling shells among its chief buildings, the Socialist government of Spain, headed by Premier Fancisco Largo Caballero, fled from the capital and set itself up in Valencia on the Mediterranean coast. The capture of Madrid by the rebels seemed certain and this, it was believed, would be followed by recognition of the Fascist government by several powers, including Portugal and Italy and perhaps Germany. The first nation to accord this recognition was the Central American republic of Salvador. It is not to be assumed that this would end the civil war, immediately or soon. Caballero, it was reported, believed the loyalists could best continue the struggle from the south, and it was claimed they had strong concentrations at Valencia, Cartegena, Alicante and Albacete. Moreover, there were indications that they would soon receive open aid from Russia and perhaps France. Leon Blum, French premier, told a Socialist meeting that he was ready to scrap the non-intervention pact and help Caballero if Great Britain would join in such action. This caused consternation a mong the British statesmen.

Fighting in the suburbs of Madrid was continuous and bloody. The casualties on both sides were heavy, and the Fascist bombardment by artillery and planes killed and wounded hundreds in the center of the city. The Socialist defenders had been ordered to hold their posts regardless of losses, and they fought bravely and stubbornly.

## Navy and Army Growth

Noted in Reports

SECRETARY of the Navy Claude Swanson, who it is believed may retire from the cabinet, made his annual report to the President showing that the navy had made considerable progress in its program to build up to full treaty strength. At the end of the 1936 fiscal year last June 30, the secretary said, the navy had under construction 79 vessels. Further, the 1937 appropriations act provided for the building of 18 vessels as replacements for over-age ships and for the beginning of construction in 1937 of two battleships. The capital ships are to be built only in the event battleships replacement construction is commenced by Great Britain or Japan, the other signatories to the


