

Local Council Passes Juvenile Curfew Law

On July 11, 1994 the Bovina City Council passed a juvenile curfew ordinance. The ordinance basically states that people under the age of seventeen are not allowed to be out in public without their parents or legal guardians after midnight Sunday through Thursday or after 1 a.m. Friday or Saturday.



Funeral services were held at the Baptist Church in Crossroads, Oklahoma and graveside services were held at Matador on Friday.


Brandon was a former resident of Bovina and moved away about thirty years ago.

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




