## NEW IDEAS THAT ARE OF PRAC

 TICAL VALUE.Combined Wheeled Vehicle and Sleigh --Improved Shoe Lacing DevicePlaced Over Gas Jet.

Runner for Wheeled Vehicles. How well the old resident remem bers the time when we had summer in the summer time and winter when it was due, which lasted until spring; and with what pleasure he tells of the cold weather and good sleighing for weeks in succession! But whether it is the destruction of the forests to build our houses and serve other purposes, or from some other cause, we do not seem to have good winter weather for very long at a time, and sleighing and skating are soon de


For Changeable Weather.
stroyed by a thaw. In Canada and some portions of this country this is not the case, and when a farmer or teamster puts up his wagons and gets out his sleighs for the first snow he has fairly good assurance that he will not have to change again until the spring thaw. But in a vast area of the country the man who drives may find himself riding through mud in a sleigh or slipping over a snowy road in a carriage, and it is to meet just such occasions as this that the invention shown in the picture has been designed. A set of sheet iron shoes is provided, with steel runners, and perforated at intervals for the insertion of bolts. When there is a fall of snow the driver has only to put the shoes on the wheels and bolt them in position, and he is ready for a sleigh ride, with no worry over what the future state of the weather may be. The shoes are light enough to be carried in the wagon when not in use, and should prove a great convenience to the man who has to drive every day The patentees are Samikil J. and

Cleaning Agent from Filth.
Soap for sewage sludge is an extreme example of by-product economy reported in the Zeitschrift of the Austrian Society of Engineers and Architects. The process, briefly stated, is as follows: Dosing the sewage with sulphuric acid, heating to 100 degrees Centigrade, compressing into cakes, drying and treating with benzine, which latter dissolves out the fatty matters. The fats recovered by distilling off the benzine are of a slightly yellow color. Thus has science not only provided a way to dispose of sewage, but has actually transformed it into a cleaning agent for household use!

CAVES IN COLORADC

## Located on Beaver Creek, Near Flon plored by Professors in Florence Found. <br> About seven miles northeast of Flor

ence, close to the mountain range and in the vicinity of what is known as two caves of the paleolithic period. They are situated upon a ranch owned only visited by competent judges only visited by competent judges respondent of the Denver News. These two, Prof. E. A. Kenyon of the science department of the Florence high school, and Superintendent Durfee o the Florence schools, were induce to make the trip from the many vague and wild rumors as the caves and of what thearance of the caves and of what they con Dakota sandstone to an unknown dis tance and are very extensive, the roofs being but ten feet high, but the area so far unknown.
The entrances co these caves have been filled for years with sand tha has washed in from the small creek that passes the opening, but recently intertly to allow of an excavated suffitrance into them.
The excavations
see a portion of the walls, which are covered with curious engravings which for the most part run horizontal ly. These scratches are of considera ble depth and are highly polished, their surfaces being much harder than the surrounding rocks, so that in places where the wall has crumbled
away these marks stand out an inch away the
or more.
The earliest settlers have no recol lection of these caves, and the ravine which passes the opening has been
traversed for years. Mr. McLean has resided on this ranch for twenty year and there has not been a flood that reached near the level of the flood de That the debris in the caves is a true flood deposit is shown by its fine lami nations and other marks of stratifi cation. Judging from the number of laminations (they run up into the
thousands and give evidence of re peated floodings) and the rarity o floods that reach as high as the lami nations extend, the time that has
elapsed since the caves were inhabited is of great length, running back hun reds of thousands of years.
