JOINT STATEHOOD BILL
The house committee on territories has agreed to report favorably a joint statehood bill. The following are some of the important features of the bill:

That the inhabitants of all that part of the area of the United States now constituting the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, as at present described, may become the state of Arizona, as hereinafter provided.
All qualified electors of said territories are hereby authoized to vote for and choose delegates to form a convention for said territories. The aforesaid convention shall consist of one hundred and seventy-nine delegates, based on a population of one thousand nine hundred and fifty, or fraction of of four hundred or over, for each delegate according to the last census in New Mexico and Arizona. On this apportionment New Mexico counties will have the following number of delegates: Bernalillo, 9; Chaves. 3; Colfax, 6; Dona Ana, 6; Eddy. 2; Grant, 6; Leonard Wood, 2; Luna, 2; Lincoln, 4; McKinley, 2; Mora, 6; Otero, 3; Quay, 2; Rio Arriba, 7; Roosevelt, 1; Sandoval, 4; San Juan, 3; San Miguel, 12; Santa Fe, 8; Sierra, 2; Socorro, 7; Taos, 6; Union, 3; Valencia, 7; and for the counties of Arizona, as fullows. Apache, 5 ; Cochise, 5 ; Coconino, 3; Gila, 3; Graham, 8; Maricopa, 11; Mohave, 2; Navajo, 5; Pıma, 8; Pinal, 4; Santa Cruz, 3; Yavapai, 7; Yuma, 2. The governors, respectively of said territories shall, within twenty days after the approval of this act by the president of the United States, by proclamation order an election of the delegates aforesaid in their respective territories, to be held en the seventh Tuesday after the approval of this act as aforesaid, and the proper officials, as now provided by law in each of said territories, respectively, shall immediately upon the issuance of such proclamations, make, or cause to be made, in time for the election, a supplemental or general registration of the male citiof the United States over the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in said territories for six months, precinct, ward or election district where they are to vote thirty days next preceding
the date fixed for said election,
whose names shall be placed upon or added to the great registers or registration lists.
That the delegates to the convention thus elected shall meet in the hall of the house of representatives of the territory of New Mexico, in the city of Santa Fe therein, on the third Monday after their election, and after organization shall declare on behalf of the people of said proposed state that they adopt the constitution of the United States, whereupon the said convention shall be, and is hereby, authorized to form a constitution and state government for said proposed state.
The debts and liabilities of the two territories shall be assumed and paid by said state.
Provision shall be made for the establishment and maintenance of a system of public schools, which shall be open to all the children of said state and free from sectarian control: and that said schools shall always be conducted in English: Provided, that nothing in this act shall preclude the teaching of other language, in said public schools.

The capital of said state shall temporarily be at the city of Santa Fe , in the present territory of New Mexico, and shall not be changed therefrom previous to Anno Domini nineteen hundred and ten.
In case a constitution and state government shall be formed in compliance with the provisions of this act, the convention forming the same shall provide by ordinance for submitting said proposed state for its ratification or rejection, at an election to be held at a time fixed in said ordinance, which must be within sixty days from the adjournment of the convention, at which election the qualified voters of said proposed state shall vote directly for or against the proposed constitution, and for or against any provisions separately submitted.
Until the next general census or until otherwise provided by law said state shall be entitled to three representatives in the house of representatives of the United States, which representatives, together with the governor and all other officers provided for in said constitution, shall be elected on
the same day of the election for the adoption of the constitution; elected and qualified under the the provisions of the constitution, and the state is admitted into the Union, the territorial officers of the said territories respectively shall continue to discharge the duties of their respective offices in said territories.
Upon the admission of said state into the Union there is hereby granted unto it, including the sections thereof heretofore granted, four sections of public land in each township in the proposed state for the support of free public non-sectarian common schools, to wit: Sections numbered $13,16,33$ and 36 , and where such sections or any parts thereof have been sold or otherwise disposed of, other portions in lieu thereof may be taken.

There is hereby given and granted unto said state the sum of ten millions of dollars, which is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the same to be kept permanently invested, and the interest only of which shall also be expended in the support and maintenance of a system of public non-sectarian common schools, equitably and ratably in proportion to the school population in every school district of said state, under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed by the legislature: Provided, that so long as said principal sum or any portion thereof shalt remain in the treasury of the United States, interest thereon at the rate of four per centum per annum shall be paid quarterly by the treasurer of the United States to the proper officer of said state.
Proviision is also made for the yranting of $2,100,000$ acres of land to the new state for the support of asylums, penitentiaries, hospitals, normal schools, reformatories, agricultural and mechanical colleges and military institutes.
The said state shall constitute two judicial districts and two internal revenue districts, to be named the eastern and western districts of Arizona, the boundaries of said districts to be the same as the present boundaries of the the territories, and the
circuit and district courts shall be held at Santa Fe and Phoenix for the time being, and the said districts shall, for judicial purposes, until otherwise provided, he attached to the eighth judicial circuit. There shall be appointed for each of said districts one district judge, one United States attorney, and one United States marshai.
That the constitutional convention shall by ordinance provide for the election of officers for a full state government, including members of the legislature and three representatives in congress, at the time for the election for the ratification or rejection of the constitution; but the said state government shall remain in abeyance until the state shall be admitted into the Union as proposed by this act. In case the constitution of said state shall be ratified by a majority of the legal voters of said territories voting at the elections held therefor as hereinbefore provided, but not otherwise, the legislature thereof may assemble at Santa Fe, organize, and elect two senators of the United States in the manner now prescribed by the laws of the United States: and governor and secretary of state of the proposed state shall certify the election of the senators and representatives in the manner required by law, and when such state is admitted into the Union, as provided in this act, the Senators and representative shall be entitled to be admitted to seats in congress and to all rights and privileges of senators aud representatives of other states in the congress of the United States; and the officers of the state government formed in pursuance of said constitution, as provided by the constitutional convention, shall proceed to exercise all the functions of state officers; and all laws in force made by scid territories at the time of their admission into the Union shall be in force in the respective portions of said state until changed by the legislature of said state, except as modified by this act or by the constitution of the state; and the laws of the United States shall have the same force and effect within the said states as elsewhere within the United States. COMMODIOUS BUILDING FOR REA SONABLE PRICE.

Room for Eight Head of Cattle, One Single Horse Stall, One Box Stall and One Sheep Pen-Cost Would Be About $\$ 415$.
E. F. D.-Please publish the plan o a barn 30 by 34 feet, with stall room for nine cattle; also a single stall and a box stall for two horses; and a pen 12 by 15 feet, for sheep. I would like between them. Can you give me an estimate of the material needed and the probable cost?

The accompanying plan of basement of barn, 30 by 34 feet, contains rooms for eight head of cattle, one single horse stall, one box stall, and one sheep pen. The floor above has feet of 10 est over catle, and on pen tot over the horses and sheep the side of the barn goes down rom is side of the barn floor and the feed in put down through a swinging doo n the side of the mow beside th stairway. By using the swinging doo will always be kept shut and pre ent draughts in the stables.
The cost of a cement concrete wall and concrete stable floor, together with the frame work above, would be

Overhauling an Old Frame House.
C. D.-I have an old frame house which I wish to overhaul and raise about one foot. Some of the posts are rotted off both top and bottom and some of the beams are rotted where morticed into the sills. I also wish to raise the roof without taking it off. Can I use the old plates or should I procure new ones?
In raising old barns and putting basement walls under them, I have often had the posts spliced at the bottom where they had been rotted off, and they answered as good as new ones. But 1 think if you have to splice your posts, both at the top and bottom, it would be cheaper and make a better job, if you were to take the house down, for in raising the roof, you would have to splice all of the studing and you would practically have to plaster the most of the house. The same plates and rafters can be used again if desired.

Quantity of Hay in Mow
D. McL-About what quantity of timothy hay should there be in a solid block 12 feet by 14 feet and 10 feet deep?

Ans.-About 500 cubic feet of wellsettled timothy hay is calculated to weigh one ton. On this basis the mow in question should contain about three tons and 720 nounds of hay.

thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary. is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not other wise appropriated, for defraying all and every kind and character of expense incident to the elections and conventions provided for in this act; that is, the payment of the expenses of registration and holding the election for members of the constitutional convention and the election for the ratification of the constitution at the same rates that are paid for similar services under the territorial laws, respectively. The said money shall be expended under the direction of the secretary of the interior, and shall be forwarded, to be locally expended in the present Territory of Arizona and in the present Territory of New Mexico, throumh the respective secretaries of said territories, as may be necessary and proper, in the discretion of the secretary of the interior, in order to carry out the full intent and meaning of this act.

## Republican County Convention

The republicans of Lincoln county held their counts convention at Lincoln last Saturday, February 27, for the purpose of electing five delegates to represent Lincoln county at the Territorial delegate convention, which convenes at at Las Vegas on the 19th of March.
George B. Barber, of Lincoln, called the convention to order; Col. D. J. M. A. Jewett, of Capitan, was chosen chairman, and C. F. Goddard, of Ancho, was elected secretary.
The following delegates were selected to go to Las Vegas:
G. W. Prichard and Charles Spence, White Oaks; Ira Wetmore, Capitan; Henry Lutz and Joseph Serrano, Lincoln.

A resolution was adopted instructing this county's delegation
of Col. G. W. Prichard, of White Oaks, as delegate to the National republican convention at Chicago. A resolution was also adopted declaring that the republicans of Lincoln county favored single statehood, but no reference was made to the joint statehood proposition, the only measure of this nature now pending in congress.
