F. Avent and Geo. A. Titsworth; and we further find that it was justifiable homicide, and that deceased met his death while resisting lawful arrest.

Such was the verdict rendered this morning on the homicide that occurred last night.
Many of our readers are acquainted with the fact that Robt Rusher had been committed to jail sometime ago, from this precinct on the charge of arson, but fewer knew that Rusher had made his escape last Tuesday night, and that the officers were on his trail.

It was known that he was in this neighborhood, and it was apprehended that he would attempt to burglarize the store of Welch $\&$ Titsworth. Fearing such a condition, Mr. Titsworth asked L. F. Avent, Territorial policeman, to stand guard with him in the store.

About 11:30 last night the deceased entered the store by side window. Rusher was ordered to throw up his hands. This he failed to do, and the shooting began. Buckshot, as well as pistol balls were soon flying thick and fast. Ten buckshot took effect on Rusher's body, and he fell tans near the front of the store, and his body was found, lying face downward, a 32-calibre pistol grasped in his right hand, all six of the chambers empty. When examined by the jury, five finger rings and four pocket knives, all bearing Welch \& Titsworth's mark, were taken from his pockets.

## WHERE GAME IS PLENTY.

Newfoundland Declared a Paradise for L. F. Brown Sportsman. camper, writes in The Country Calen "Brôok trout and brown trout are not appreciated in Newfoundland, being far more common than are the perch and sunfish of the states. Catching them will soon surfeit the angler who casts his flies from the shore of almost any lake. Such catches are counted by the dozen-one lot of sev-enty-two dozen being brought aboard the train at Harbor Grace. One dozen ten-inch trout usually sell for 10 cents. "There are 687 named lakes on the sland, and 30,000 known ones, with ut names. The island has about 4, 00 miles of seacoast, including that of bays like Bonavista, Notre Dame, Fortune, St. Mary's Bonne, St. George,
Placentia and Bay of Islands. From Placentia and Bay of Islands. From one to six streams of clear green wa ter empty into each of these bays. very stream that reaches salt water hat salmon stream. Back from al streams are other and easny reached streams that have not even a tradition of a fishnet, rod or hook and lakes never mapped where one may camp and add to the fare wild geese and ducks, willow grouse, whose plumage turns white in winter; ptarmigan, ploer and curlew. THE RECIPROCITY CONFERENCE.
The reciprocity conference at Chicago the 17 th inst. resulted in the formation of the Amer ican Reciprocal Tariff League.

A committee of fifteen was also constituted to push tbe campaign of organization and education.
The object of course is, to force congress to act in the matter of the reformation of the schedules of the Dingley Tariff, promised before every election, with the actual results we all know.

The special significance of the meeting is, that it was a republican affair, and that its members were all protectionists.
Its menace to the "Stand Patters" appears in the prominence in its deliberations of men like Goveruor Cummins and Senator Cullom.

These men have never been famous for dangerous excursions into unexplored political territory.

They stand where they do today, because they know that the demand for tariff reform by the republicans of the middle west and northwest has become so strong and insistent, that it cannot be denied.
The Dingly schedules were mostly designedly made prohibitive. Revenue was not desired. The object sought was purely and solely the advancement of private interests at public expense.

The great American trusts are the conspicuous result. While the schedules stand the trusts will continue to defy the law with impunity.

We append extracts from the fiery speech of Governor Cummins, which make interesting reading.
Governor Cummins spoke in part as follows:
"Reciprocity has been damned with faint praise and false friends long enough. The time has come to unmask, so that the people may know who stand for and against this doctrine. The friends of reciprocity have passed through years of depression and discouragement, simply because it has been coddled in conven-
tions and crucified in congress.
"It has been eulogized in the abstract and condemned in the concrete. And the hour has arrived in which it is fair to ask those who are hostile to the policy to avow it; and I am gratified beyond measure that in the course of this struggle there appears to be some sign now that those who fight it will come out in the open.
"The gravity of the situation is manifest, and it is acknowledged, I believe, upon all hands that we must meet it in one of two ways-retaliation or reciprocity. The 'stand-patters' have raised the banner of the former, and we march to the music of the latter. Many people thinn that this question is confined to treaties with particular powers, but it is not so, for it can be accomplished through general tariffs as well as through special arrangements.
"Indeed it can be truthfully said that with us, if attained in the near future, it must be attained through the general law by a revision of our schedules, for it has been made clear to the dullest mind that no trade or treaty, however advantageous to the people of this country, can command two-thirds of the United States senate.
"Our present schedules are, in the main, intended to be prohibitive, if American products are sold at a fair and reasonable profit. It is only when through combination or unusual demand, the home manufacturer lifts the price into the region of robbery that his foreign competitor can enter at all. There is no conflict, and can be none between protection and reciprocity. If we abandon the selfish interest of a particular product or class of producers and ascend to the higher standpoint from which we may view the common welfare.
"The demand we make is not new. The men who today are exponents of the 'stand pat' theory of governmet are not prorectionists; they are exclusionists. They have no title to the leader ship of the party of protection, and they are using the policy for a purpose that would be indignantly repudiated by its most distinguished champions, were they now in the land of the living."

## BIG FOREST RESERVES

COVERING MILLIONS OF ACRES

Include Nearly Half the Timber Area of Colorado-Will Be Guarded by One Hundred and Fifty Men.
The old adage that "it never rain but it pours" seems to be particularly pertinent in regard to the creatio of new forest reserves in Colorado Some years ago six were proclaimed embracing more than three million acres. These were established in rapid succession, to the dismay of many who regarded the forests as free pen pasture for illimitable herds
Much opposition arose particularly
Much opposition arose, particularly better adapted to farming and pas ture than forest purposes. A halt wa called and many eliminations made. At the beginning of the present year these six reserves contained $2,903,460$ acres. During the long interim the department had experts carefully ex state, getting ready for the reclama tion of more reserves when conditions became favorable
Since the forest machinery of the government was turned over to the Department of Agriculture last December the President, up to the 3d o June, had proclaimed the consolidation of the Plum Creek and South Platte reserves with the Pike's Peak reserve and added to it 134,627 acres, and also
created the Medicine Bow, Gunnison, Leadville and San Juan reserves, em Leadnine and San Juan reserves, em $270,1,219,947$ and $1,437,406$ acres making a grand total on the 3 d day
of this month of $8,252,619$ acres in forest reserves in the state. On June 18th the Associated Press dispatches announced the establishment of the Parke Range reserve of fourth reserve created during the week previous, which doubtless referred to the Montezuma, Wet Mountain and Cochetopah proposed reserves, which embrace in all more than $2,000,000$ acres, making more than 16,300 square miles and nearly one-half of the timber area of the state. will will have entire supervision and care and a dozen forest rangers apiece and a dozen forest rangers apiece

Profits of the Packers.
There has been a great deal of disappointment because the Garfield report shows that the profits of the packing industry only amount to about two per cent of the volume of business transacted. There is no rect.
The census reports compiled by the government in 1900, before the agitation regarding the "beef trust" began, throw considerable light on this question. It appears from the census that the packing industry is conducted on a smaller margin of gross profit than any other industry in America. The gross margin of profit of 871 flour and grist mills in Illinois, in the census year, was nearly seven per cent on the volume of business. The gross margin of fifty-one wholesale slaughtering and meat packing establishments in Illinois was only about onethird as large, or a little more than two per cent on the volume of business.

The millers have not been accused of bein ${ }^{\text {in }}$ in "trust," and combinations would seem impossible in a busi ness where there are several thousand mills in the United States competing actively for the flour trade, but it appears that the gross profits of the mill ers are larger than the gross profits of the packers. It may turn out that the agitation regarding the packing industry will show the same result as the devil found in shearing the pig: Homestead.
