Delegate Wm. H. Andrews Reviews The New States' Resources, in Magazine

DESCRIBES MANY ADVANTAGES

"Our Newest State and her Marvelous Resources" is the subject of a very interesting article which appears in a recent issue of Leslie's Weekly and which was written by Hon. William H. Andrews, delegate to Congress from New Mexico. Mr Andrews says many thing that are known to the people of this territory but he also emphasize certain points that many people have never learn ed or have forgotten He shows conclusively that New Mexico came into the Union pretty well equipped for statehood and possessing "the wealth of the world" to use the expression of no less an authority than Baron von Humboldt, the great scientist and traveler. Mr Andrews' said in part as follows:

For sixty-two years New Mexico has been pleading for compliance with treaty rights. This is the twenty-fourth congress having bills to admit New Mexico to statehood for consideration. The record shows fifty-five bills presented; the bill has passed one House or the other twenty times and both houses several times. REPORT ON IMMIGRATION

Close to 13,000 homestead entries were filed in the five federal land offices in New Mexico during the year ending June 30,1910. According to a table compiled by the secretary of the bureau of immigration, there is evident a substantial gain over INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM last year, showing that in spite of a record breaking drouth and a comparatively poor crop year in New regarded as the land of opportunity these figures will cheer him up.

GOOD HORSES ARE IN FAVOR

There is Growing Demand for the Better Class of Driving and Carriage Animals.

"The horse was never in higher favor than at present, and it was never harder to find a good one," said Arnold Lawson, an ardent admirer of the horse, recently. "Ten years ago fine horses were common and prices were moderate. Today a matched pair is almost impossible to find, and the price named by the dealer is appaling. Horseback riding is going to be one of the fads of the summer, and the woman who has grown stout and listless will take to the bridle paths again to reduce her weight and bring her back into form. It is said that at Dreamwold Thomas W. Lawson's stock of fine horses is as large as ever. He uses his automobiles for long trips, but his horses for pleasure. "There is nothing, to my mind, that can take the place of a well-bred horse," said Arnold Lawson. 


More Money in Raising Animals Than by Planting Legume Crops-Humus Is Retained.

(By W. SCOTT HICKOX.) The man who plants legumes solely to turn under will, in the majority of cases, get tired of it after a few years because of the cost in seed, labor and rent of land. He who grows legumes and sells the tops for hay is pumping the mineral elements out of his land in a most reckless manner and there will come a time of reckoning after a while. The writer is proud of the fact that he belongs to the class of men who plant legumes, make hay of the top, extract the food values by passing the hay through first-class farm animals, returning more than three-fourths of the material value and practically all the humus back to the soil, and during the progress of the game trapping enough nitrogen from the air to far more than balance the small amount of phosphorous and potash the young animals sold remove from the farm. This, my friends, is sane farming, proven such in many lands and under various conditions.

IN BRIEF

TREND OF METAL PRICES.

Colorado. All the coal mines at Castleton are working full time.

A recent car of ore from the Treasure Vault mine, Idaho Springs district, returned 5.55 oz. gold per ton.

The Oneida mine, Idaho Springs district, has four feet of ore that is sent to the smelter without sorting.

An effort is being made to have a smelter established at Gunnison to be operated by the Kuenzel process.

Ore shipments from Idaho Springs station for August were 115 cars, as against 94 cars for the corresponding period in 1909.

The Ouida mine, Idaho Springs district, is shipping three cars per week to the Golden smelter, and it runs from \$55 to \$100 per ton.

Ten cars of ore per week are being shipped through the Rockford tunnel from the Magalona and Donaldson mines, Idaho Springs district.

Six hundred and seventeen pounds of ore from the Henry Adney, Cripple Creek district, were settled for at the rate of \$12 a pound, or \$7,404 for the

William Lloyd, general manager of the Hamlet mine and mill in Maggie gulch, died of heart disease while at the dinner table. He had been in the San Juan country six years.

After seven years of "staying with it" Wilson Davis has a two-foot vein of ore running \$40 in gold in the Lost Lake mine above Eldora. Mr. Wilson employs fifteen men and the property has shipped all summer.

A second large and rich strike has been made in the Bright Diamond property, Ouray district. This discovery is on the Ironclad claim and is said to be even richer than that of a few days ago on the Finance claim.

The new Monarch Mining company owning the Cleveland property in the Leadville district is extracting ore from a fissure vein fifty feet between walls, the low grade from which averages \$20 a ton and the high grade 14

Oom Paul group at Ironton, have sent a shipment to the smelter that will average better than \$80 a ton for the carload, but some assays have shown some values of 2 to 8 oz. gold and 200 oz. silver.

The first carload of ore from the new strike on the Kansas City group in Georgia gulch, in the San Juan, netted the shippers \$800, about \$60 per ton. As this ore was just as it came from the mine, later shipments with better handling will undoubtedly show better values.

The owners of the Gold Link mine near Pitkin having constructed a dam and settling basins to impound the tailings from their mill, so that the pollution of the Gunnison river will be stopped, State Game and Fish Commissioner Holland will drop the suit recently instituted by him against the mining company to compel this action.

John Owen of Idaho Springs, as trustee, has secured a bond and lease upon the Oneida, Rustler and Maximum claims in the Freeland district, and the consideration is stated as \$50, 000, to be paid as follows: Six months from date, \$6,000; twelve months, \$8,-000; eighteen months, \$10,000; twenty-four months, \$10,000; thirty months, \$10,000.

The Socorro mines, Mogollon district, will sink the main shaft to intersect the Little Fannie vein, and then go still beyond.

Wyoming.

The shaft house, cre bins and entire plant of the Wyoming Copper Company, which were destroyed by fire at South Pass, will be immediately replaced, according to a telegram from the company's general offices at Detroit, Mich.

Several wells are to be sunk yet this fall in the La Barge oil field in the Green River valley. It is said that an excavation ten feet from the surface will accumulate about five gallons of oil in a day, and that the oil sand crops to the surface. The product of this field is of a fine quality.





RAISED A NOVELTY IN CORN

Western Farmer Grew Ear with an Odd Number of Rows Showing on It.

Jake Brunton, a farmer living five miles northwest of Blair, astonished the managers of the corn show there to a finish by bringing in for exhibition a full well-developed ear of corn with an odd number of rows of corn on it. It is a noted fact that all ears of corn have even number of rowsrunning from 14 to 22-but no odd numbers. This ear has 15 rows with 48 grains to the row. Mr. Brunton planted fifteen hills from a peculiar ear of corn of his own selection, and the planting received the same attention as his other corn. He read last year of an offer by an Illinois corn raiser of a 320-acre farm for an ear of corn with an odd number of rows. He began to experiment, and planted an odd number of grains in an odd wife of the richest peer in England, the month, and husked and counted each ear separately. A dozen corn experts examined it, and would not believe it until counted by themselves. 
