A Little 'Dope' on the adapt ability of certain things to local conditions

COUNTY'S POSSIBILE FUTURE
Up to a few years ago it was the general belief that, aside from the lands subject to irrigation and the limited area on the high mesas where the rainfall is great, Lincoln county's vast area was only fit for grazing. But irrigated lands were scarce and a few hardy farmers, see-
ing the success of the so called "dry ing the success of the so called "dry farming" method in other sections of the Southwest, tried it on the considered the exclusive domain of the stock-gro wer. The results were surprising. Not only did the more hardy feed crops, which flourish in this region, produce abundantly oats, barley and rye. The older r sidents were atonished, shook their heads and continued to predict fail ure. But there was no such hesitation on the part of the newcomers who about this time began to invade the whole plains section of eastern New Mexico in such numbers that it became necessary to add Tucumcari in Quay county. These people were willing to take a chance Some of them failed, but most them succeeded and the influx con Lincoln county has had its shen of this immigratian and as the possibilities of the county become better known more and more people are turning ther
It is difficult to say with any degree of certainty just how great the extent of the county's "dryfarming" area. Lands heretofo re considered worthless are constantly being proven crop-producers under the scientific method. In Quay coun ty, to the northeast, the dry farming area was at first thought limited to a very small district around Tufinding this land taken up spread out over the surrounding country and and as they spread out other came in on a still wider circle an so this district has finally expand ed over a considerable part of a county which five years ago was considered only fair for grazing. The farmers continue to succeed,
the degree of success depending in the degree of success depending in
large measure upon the industry of the individual and the faitbfulness with which he applies the two or three vital rules of the scientific mathod of cultivation.
In Lincoln county at present the proven area of dry farming lands lies around Carrizo zo, where the greatest ache is, around Oscuro Corona, Capitan, Nogal and White Oaks. How much these districts
will be extended cannot be predictwill be extended cannot be predict-
ed with any degree of safety. Only experiment will prove it
In this, as in all other dry farm ing sections of New Mexico the most certain and successful crops thus far grown are the non-saccharine sorBeing valuable, both for grain and forage, they have p
crop everywhere. The Milo-maize
is probably the most drought-resistant of the two and matures in a ittle shorter time. Both, however will grow with less water than any
other dry farming crop unless it be other dry farming crop unless it be
the millets which have not yet been grown to any extent. Oats, rye and harley do well and corn has been grown with fair success, producing under proper cultivation from forty o fifty bushels to the arre, in seasons of average rainfall

The homeseeker or farmer who s gaing onto "dry" or non-irrigated and should always keep in mind he fact that he is entering upon ind of farming entirely differen rom that of the humid regions
where the rainfall is abundant and where the rainfall is abundant and or any success at all, he must learn how to dry farm. The cardinal principle of the dry farming metods is conservation of the water supply in the soil. To accomplish this special method of tillage is absolutely essential. These methods are as different from farming methods in the humid regions as are the methods of farming by irrigation. They are no more difficult than the methods used in the humid region when once understood, but they must be understood and they must be applied before the farmer can expect to get results
It is not desired to hold out to the homeseeker, either for Lincoln couny or any part of New Mexico, a picture of a land of promise and plenty where a rich livelihood may be had without effort. In this country as in any other country, sucessfull farming means hard work and plenty of it. In dry farming districts not only hard work but ntelligent aplication of the scientific method is required This method is not difficult to apply and when aithfully followed it is possible for the industrious, thrifty farmer to gain not only a livelihood but a sur-

## REFERENDUM GETS IN

Initiative Left Out but Ref erendum is Included in States' Constitution

## TO ELECT ALL STATE OFFICER

The judges of all eouts establi ed under the constitution of New Mexico will be elested by the people. A corporation commission will be reated, the members of which wil also be elected by the people.
Provision will be made in the constitution for a referendum by mean of which 10 per cent of the voters by petition may cause any act of the legislature to be referred to the people for approval or rejection. Twen ty five per cent of the voters may cause a law to become inoperativ pending its approval at the polls. come under the provisions of this ar ticle.
An employers liability act will be embodied in the constitution Th initiative will not appear in the con stitution in any form, neither will it
be submitted to the people as a separate provision. The initiative dead.
All these things were settled at caucus of the Republican member which was in session Tuesday. The settlement came only after a prolon ed struggle, during nearly all of which the old guard was on the de fensive. It is the resul of a compro mise by the terms of which the pro gressives agree to abandon thei ation of having their own way in al ation of having their own way in al
other matters for which they are con tending. While the progressives might have forced the caucus to a dopt the initiative as a republica measure, they were so divided a mong themselves as to the kind o initiative they wanted that they de spaired of ever reaching an agree ment. Bernalillo county's delegate made a good fight for direct legislation, but they were outvoted on the final test.
