The constitution is to be submitted to the voters at an el ection to be called on January 21s of next year and that it will be ra tified by an overwhelming majority is a matter upon which there can be little argument. The convention wound up it' was marked by the greatest good nature and from which excitement and hilarity were not lacking. The happy ending of the convention was due in no small measure to the in troduction and passage of a substi-
tute for the article on constitutiontute for the article on constitution-
al amendments which was reported from the revision committee late that afternoon. The article as finally adopted permits the second session of the legislature, held under the state government, by a majority vote, to submit three amendments to the constitution, but these amendments may not affect the ar ticle on elective franchise nor upon the rights of children regardless of language to attend the public shools. For the first twenty-five years after the will require of this fourths vor the fourths vote of the members of eac house of the legislature to initiate movement for the calling of anoth er constitutional convention. Afte the twenty-five year period, two thirds of the members elected in each house may submit to the people a proposition for the calling of a convention to amend or revise the constitution.
That the adoption of this article will go a long way toward allaying democratic opposition to the const tution, was indicated by the vote by which it was adopted. Roll call on the article showed that every one of the seventy-one republicans voted in the affirmative, while of the twenty nine democrats in the convention only few of them voted in the negative.

Another provision is that the earnings of convicts in the penitentiary shall be used for the support of their dependant families. The leasing of convict labor is forever prohibited. Section 15 of the articie provides that employes of common carriers may not be debarred from recovering damages for injuries which were the result of negligence on the part of any fellow employes or any other person connected with he corporation owning or operat hig the road upon which they were

One ox tall, one tablespoonful of
flour, one teaspoonful of mushroom
catsup, one heaping catsup, one heaping tablespoonful of dripping, one onion, one carrot, one
turnip, salt and pepper. Wash the tail turnip, salt and pepper. Wash the tail
well in warm water and cut it up at
