## CONSITIUTION CARRIES

Overwhelming Majority Give
Constitution Throughout The Territory
LINCOLN COUNTY IS AGAINST
The Constitution as compiled by the one hundred delegates who adjourned November 23 rd has been accepted by the people with an iate statehood is assured us by those in a position to know. Eighteen thousand votes is the majority given the Constitution by figures compiled from the returns from the va ious counties of the territory but this figure may be lowered or raised after the vote has been more carefully canvassed Lincoln county was one of the few counties which went against the Constitution and the vote here was very evenly divided, a majority of seven votes against was the result as near as can be stated from the returns received over the telephone from the various precincts. Carrizozo rolled up a majority of 39 votes for the constition; 115 votes being cast "For" the Constitution in this precinct
and 76 "Against." and 76 "Against."
A general get together movement is under way throughout the new
state and party lines and pros and cons are being eliminated and all are combining to assist in the rushing of Statehood through at this session of Congress. 5. Thou shalt add organic matter to the soil. Holds moisture and plant food; improves mechanical con dition of the soil: helps make plan food available; lessens drifting and blowing of the soil; lessens washing of soil; stable manure is the best form; plow weeds under when green. 6 Thou shalt keep down the weeds. Weeds use up moisture; use up plant food; crowd the plants shade the crop; make it difficult for
the plant to grow; makes it hard to work the land properly
7. Thou shalt grow early matur ing crop Growing conditions best in early summer: winte
ter than spring grains.
8. Thou shalt grow corn, every three to five years. The cultivation given corn saves moisture; kill weed; kills plant diseases; corn best preparation for a grain crop; corn produces fine stock food, both grain and fodder; corn produces more per
acre than other crops; do not hill up the corn as this wastes the moisure. 9. Thou shalt grow clover or alfalfa every few years. Clover and alfalfa add fertility to the soil; add organic matter to the soil; kill weeds and plant diseases; produce a most ble seed crops.
10. Thou shalt keep stock. The most profitable way of marketing grain and fodder is ihrough stock; they produce manure which is very necessary to the soil; they bring a bout prosperity
Whoso obeys these commandents shall reap abundant crops. He who violates them shall be punished by the transgression.
