The Mexican government has latey ordered 1,000,000 grape cuttings rom California and will distribute them free to all who wish to plant hem in Mexico.

They do not sell enough public land in Canada to pay the expenses of surveying and managing the ales. There was a deficiency in the land department last year of nearly \$100,000.

A late New York dispatch says: The epidemic of influenza, or grippe his caused a demand for quinine never before equalled in the history of American market. The demand comes from all parts of the country. From an estimate of a prominent manufacturer of this city, it is believed that over twenty-five tons of drugs have been consumed in this country during the past two weeks.

The Sioux chiefs in their recent appearance before the house commitee on Indian affairs, made an earnest onslaught on the practice of sending Indians to eastern schools. Too few of the Indians could be sent to schools in the east to have any beneficial effect upon the great masses of Indians, when returning to the reservation, after finishing their education. More Indians ould be sent to reservation schools and their schools should be improved.

Under the laws of Old Mexico here is a strip of country along the Rio Grande, abutting upon the United States, into which goods may be imported without the paynent of duties. It is notorious that this strip has for years served as the smuggler's paradise, to the disadvantage of merchants residing on this side of the boundary. A merchant can purchase his goods in Europe, have them shipped in boud from New York to Paso del Norte, Piedras Negras, Laredo and other cities on the Mexico side of the line, and there have them delivered without the payment of any duty. Then he can wait favorable opportunity and smuggle these goods back into the United States and undersell the American deal r who has had to pay regular custom house charges. To put a stop to this and cheek other systems of smuggling Senator Reagan of Texas is about to offer i bill in congress authorizing the secretary of the treasury to suspend the law which allows the transportation of goods bound from Europe to Mexico in bond through the United States until the government of Mexico shall abolish this free zone or zona libre along the border. It is thought the Mexican government would gladly consent to this, but the smuggler influence is very powerful in the northern states and Diaz is loath to move in the matter or fear of an oprising against him.

Land Office Decision. UNITED STATES LAND O.BCE. Las Cinces, N. M., Jin. 6, '90.

U.S. Involving Das ert Lund E John H. Riley tries N . 210 and Vm. L. Rynerson. No. 211.

These entries were held for can ellation May 15, 1839, upon the eport of Special Agent R. P. Valker.

O: June 8, 1830, this office transnitted the applications of the above named entrymen for a hearing as to he involved entries to the commisioner of the G. L. O. Said appliations were regarded as sufficient asis for hearings which were ordered on lune 24, '89, to enable said parties to show cause why said entries should be sustained.

Or June 26, '89, this office ecommended to the commissione hat a complete survey be made of these entries under the supervision of a Special Agent.

O. S. ptember 25, 1889, this office was advised that Special Agent Jno. S S.idger had that day peen authorized to make said survey and to submit a topographical map showing the streams, ditches, marsh lands, etc., embraced in sail entries. O. Dec. 2, 1839, Wm. C. McDon-

ald, a U. S Deputy Mineral Surveyor, by the request and by the direction of Jno. S. Stidger, Special Agent, submitted a topographical map of these entries. After conference with Special Agent Stidger these cases were se

Desert lands "are all lands ex clusive of lands and miggral lands which will not, without irrigation.

produce some agricultural crop." After carefully examining all the evidence submitted in the case of Desert Land Entry No. 210 of John H. Riley, it seems clearly established that with the exception of the bottom lands this entry i desert in character, i. e. "one year with another for a series of years i will not, without irrigation, make fair return to the careful, ordinarily killful and industrious husbandman for the seed and toil expended in endeavoring to produce a crop; and may justly be regarded as desert within the intent of the statute."

(Balcock & Watson II L. D. 20.) Of the bottom land, the greater portion north and east of the tuli or cane, is covered with a growth of sacaton or wire grass which is value less as pasture or as hay, if not positively harmful in any form.

A considerable portion of the low land, according to the survey, i covered with weeds and grass. This growth is without doubt the result of the brigation and cultivation to which this portion of the land was at one time subjected.

A very small part of the bottom land is tuli or cane-the result of overflow from the river. This growth may have some slight value is forage for stock, but is not sufficiently valuable to allow it to remain where the land by irrigation, can be cultivated. Then the boggy nature of the soil, covered with such growth, makes it dangerous as pas ture land.

Tae only plan seems to be to drain such land. But when once drained t becomes valueless because all growth is at once stopped, and it soon becomes devoid of vegetation and truly desert in character, and can only be reclaimed from such a state by irrigation.

greater force to Desert Land Entry No. 211 by William L. Rynerson. There is a much smaller amount of bottom land an l a less proportion of natural growth. It is certainly desert in its character within the meaning of the law.

The good faith of these claimants is shown by the large expenditures, aggregating some \$3,500, they have nade in constructing ditches and a reservoir for irrigating these lands and in fencing them and preparing them for successful cultivation.

I am satisfied from the evidence that these entries are desert in character within the meaning of the act under a fair interpretation, and that they cannot be successfully cultivated without irrigation.

The cases have been long pending and the controversy in relation to hem should be ended. I therefore recommend that the proofs long since submitted be accepted, and upon payment being made that final receipts be issued.

Delegate Joseph introduced his bill for the admission of New Mexico into the sisterhood of states on the 18th of December last, which was duly read and ordered printed. One delegate is allowed for every 400 votes cast in each county and one for each fraction of 250, which pportionment is made by the governor, chief justice and United States attorney. Provision is made or an election on Tuesday, after the irst Monday in June, 1890, and roclamation shall issue therefor within thirty days after the passage of the act. The canvass of votes to be made as the Territorial law now direct, and those elected shall meet at the seat of government on July 4th, 1893 Then follows the usual tereotyped method for the admision of the Territory as a state. Among the wholesome provisions is a state selection of 20,000 acres land for the permanent support of an agricultural college, and endowment of 5 per cent of the lands sold by the general government subequent to admission for common schools, and a liberal provision for he state university. Also for the establishment of permanent reservoirs for irrigation, an appropriation of 250,000 acres of land; for the naintainance of an insane asylum, 0.000 acres; for state normal schools 0.000 acres; for school of mines, 00,000 acres; for deaf and dumb asylum, 50,000 acres, and for a reform school, 50,000 acres.
