

THE SPECIAL SESSION of the Texas Legislature convened this week in Austin. The main reason for the special session is for lawmakers to pass some public school legislation.

No one knows at this point just what the legislature may pass, but just about everyone agrees that before the special session has adjourned, Texas taxpayers will feel the results in their hip pockets.

Virtually everyone has heard by now about the "Select Committee on Education," headed by H. Ross Perot, which has made a number of fairly liberal recommendations. These include a longer school year, a longer school day, and less emphasis on the extra-curricular activities and more emphasis on the basics.

Area Students, Teachers **Attend Science Symposium**

Safe nuclear energy that does not produce nuclear waste is the goal of a research project studied for four days by area high school science students and teachers at a symposium at the University of Texas at Austin.

If the students are like some of their predecessors at the symposium, they may end up helping conduct the research and experiments after they enroll in college, said Jim Greene, administrator of the university's Fusion Research Center.

Included among high school students and teachers from throughout the state attending the symposium June 5-8 was Blake Scaff, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Scaff of Bovina.

He was among 38 participants from the Panhandle and South Plains sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS). SPS is one of ten electric utilities in Texas that compose the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

Fusion is the energy source of the sun. Greene said.

In order to create a fusion reaction on earth, temperatures of about 100 million degrees are needed. The hot gases created also must be confined for a long enough period of time for the fusion reaction to take place.

Several projects are under way around the world to create fusion and confine the reaction. The heart of the research at the University of Texas is a machine called a tokamak. A tokamak uses magnetic fields to attempt to confine the reaction, Greene said.

High enough temperatures have been reached to create fusion, Greene said, but the reactions last only a fraction of a second. Because of the brief time of the reaction, it takes more energy to create fusion now than the fusion process generates.

An immediate goal of scientists is to reach "breakeven" -- the point when fusion reactions last long

go a lot further than that, but this is a simplified analysis.

Just what direction the legislature will go in overhauling our school system is anyone's guess, but regardless of what new legislation is passed--and you can depend on something--it will cost state residents more tax money.

For most of the last decade, our state lawmakers, from the governor on down, have been harping about the fact that they have "passed no new tax laws."

This may be true, but what they have done, on the school situation, is withdraw a big portion of state funds from the educational system, with the local school districts having to make up the difference. As a result, the schools have had to raise real estate and property taxes to the hilt, in order to keep their school systems operating.

Now that the local tax base has been taxed more heavily, the state lawmakers are more or less admitting that they will have to raise taxes on a state level in order to fund whatever new program they decide upon.

And the route that the new taxes may take are making taxpayers jump like they've just been hit by a needle in a doctor's office.

Some of the proposals include raising the state sales tax by another penny or two. Also, there is the proposal to eliminate the sales tax exemption on such things as groceries and services, such as doctor bills, and fees from other professional people.

And, if you don't think your local school taxes are high enough, maybe you need to be aware that one proposal has been advanced which has a "Robin Hood" type of basis. This proposal would take money away from the school districts which are deemed "wealthy," or at least able to pay, and give it to the poorer districts.

It should come as no surprise that those who may do such overhauling of the tax structure will consider districts in the rural areas as "wealthy," due to the large amount of farm land. (Most legislators have never farmed, so they probably don't know about the sad plight of agriculture).

Since our area's legislators, James (Pete) Laney and Bill Sarpalius, are

County 4-H Horse Show

Bovina will serve as host for the Parmer County 4-H horse show Saturday, June 16, beginning at 10 a.m.

PUC Approves Rate Increase

The Public Utility Commission of Texas has approved a slight increase in charges for intrastate long-distance calls within the regional calling areas called local access and transports areas (LATA) established by the federal judge overseeing the divestiture of AT&T and the Bell operating companies.

The new charges, effective June 1, do not apply to intrastate calls made between the regional calling areas which are carried by the long-distance carriers rather than the local telephone companies.

SPS does not own or operate any nuclear power plants, but since 1957 SPS and the other utilities have sponsored fusion research at the University of Texas. Berl Springer, chairman of the board of SPS, has been president of the research foundation the past two years.

Nuclear power plants in operation today use a process called fission--the splitting of atoms--to produce electricity. Fusion is the opposite of fission; it is the fusing together of atoms, said Greene.

If the fusion process can be controlled, Greene said, it may enable the development of power plants that get their fuel from water and that don't create large quantities of radioactive waste.

Deuterium is one of the fuels that can produce fusion, Greene said. Deuterium comes from hydrogen. Because water consists of two parts hydrogen and one part oxygen (H20), almost limitless supplies of fuel are available in the earth's oceans, rivers and lakes, he said.



An oral report must be made immediately to the nearest office of the Texas Department of Human Resources, which is Hereford for Parmer County. Their number is 806-364-6841 or call the 24-hour Child Abuse Hotline, 1-800-252-5400.

A person who, without malice, makes a report of suspected child abuse or neglect is immune from civil or criminal liability. Reports of child abuse or neglect are confidential.

Failure to report suspected physical or mental abuse or neglect of a child in Texas is a crime punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.



Burch said that Kory made a good showing and his high score of the meet was 9.0 on the rings. His all around score was a 49.00 which was only eleven points from a perfect score.


"This was Kevin's first
