WE AGREE COMPLETELY with commentator Andy Rooney, who said this week that the political campaigns are 'way too long.

Nothing the candidates say, or do, between now and November 6 is going to change the way people are going to vote.

"They should have the election this week, and the inauguration a week from Wednesday," Rooney said, implying that then we could get all of the political rhetoric off the front pages, and off television news, and settle back down to some sort of regularity.

Here are some comments by a fellow publisher, Harold Hudson of Perryton, as to how he sees the campaign:

Walter Mondale is campaigning in a rather odd way these days. He has lined up with the anti-religious forces while letting Ronald Reagan move in as a spokesman for traditional American values which most certainly include a strong set of religious principles. It is true that Jerry Falwell and the Moral Majority have lined up for Reagan but also some leading Catholics, some Jewish spokesmen and other religious leaders who have taken a stand in line with Reagan statements even though these spokesmen may not be Republicans. Geraldine Ferraro's Catholic archbishop scolded her on national television this week for her views on abortion and religion in general.

It would appear that any candidate would feel more comfortable espousing religious principles, advocating public prayer in school, calling for more morality in public life, than he would supporting those who want to remove the Nativity Scene from public parks and throttle religious clubs who want to meet in school on an equal basis with the other clubs. Thus far Mondale is counting heavily upon the support of blacks, women's liberation movement, labor unions, homosexuals, and the loyal Democrats who cannot vote for anything except a Democratic candidate. These "single issue" groups may carry him to victory but at this stage of the game it looks mighty doubtful.

Injecting the religious issue into the campaign was Mondale's idea but Reagan eagerly seized upon it and is making hay with it. Mondale had in mind attacking Reagan's links to religious groups, particularly fundamentalist Protestant groups, and thus frighten independents into the Democratic camp. He deplored the idea of preachers getting involved in politics. But he overlooked the fact that Jesse Jackson financed most of his campaign, except federal funds he siphoned off from Operation P.U.S.H., with contributions passed down the aisles of the black churches where he "preached."

The Christian Right seems to terrify the Liberal Left. This is because these fundamentalists want to get rid of pornography instead of having it spread throughout the land; they want less raw sex and violence on television; they want moral standards restored and they are willing to endure some censorship to get it. The Catholic priest in Amarillo can exhort the faithful to mount a protest movement at Pantex but when Jerry Falwell organizes one in San Francisco outside the Democratic convention he is attacked by those who said he was merely a tool of Ronald Reagan.

Mustangs Host Chieftains Friday

The renewal of the Bovina-Friona football series will highlight Friday night's football encounter at Mustang Field, when the Friona Chieftains visit for the second home game of 1984. Game time is 8 p.m.

The two teams have had opposite results after two weeks. Whereas the Mustangs have dropped games to Happy and Nazareth, the Chieftains scored wins over River Road of Amarillo and Boys Ranch.

Bovina and Friona had been meeting each other as scrimmage opponents prior to the official season in recent years, but with re-districting and changing of schedules, became regular-season opponents this fall for the first time since 1973. Friona leads the all-time series between the two schools in football, ten wins to three.

Bovina will be without the services of cornerback Tommy Hutto, who sustained a pinched nerve against Nazareth, and has been advised not to play by doctors.

This is a further blow to the Mustangs, who are already small in numbers this

fall. Friona will bring a large team. Although supposed to be re-building, the Chieftains have won both their outings, and handled Boys Ranch with relative ease, 26-0 last Friday.

The Chiefs are led by senior runningback Alfredo Mata and wingback John Aguirre, each of whom has scored a pair of touchdowns already. Friona also has a sophomore kicker, Sam Montoya, who booted a 41-yard field goal, one of three he kicked against River Road in the team's opening win.

Murphy's Law was personified in the Bovina Mustangs' 41-14 loss at Nazareth last Friday: If anything can go wrong, it probably will--and did.

Bovina gave the Swifts the ball four times inside their own 40 yard line, and this put them in a hole. Then, they had things of this sort happening:

*Nazareth scored with only two seconds showing on the first half clock, to take a 21-0 halftime lead.

*The Mustangs had a pass slip through a receiver's hands, it was picked off by Nazareth and run in for a touchdown.

*Then, Bovina had a good drive in the third quarter, which bogged down in the third quarter, and the Swifts took over. On the first play,

Bovina's scoring in the game, all in the fourth quarter, came on a five-yard run by Johnny Villarreal, with Blake Scaff passing to Matt Howell for two extra points, and then, late in the game, on a pass from Scaff to Robert Tapia, a 28-yard scoring strike.

Hill credited the play of noseguard Craig Pearson and strongside safety Doug Johnson on defense, and halfback Johnson and Johnny Villarreal on offense. Johnson was the team leader with 68 yards on offense on nine carries.

Scaff completed four of 13 passes for 86 yards, and the Mustangs added 103 yards rushing, for total yardage of 189. Nazareth led in first downs, 17-12 and in yardage gained, 396-189.

Bad news to the team was the loss of Tommy Hutto, who suffered a pinched nerve to his neck in the game while making a tackle. This has been a re-occurring injury for Hutto, and doctors have advised him not to play with the condition.

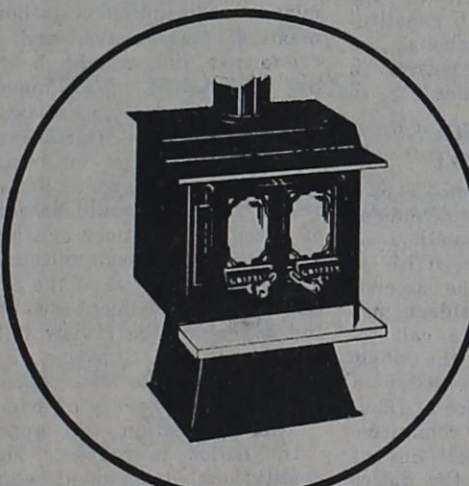
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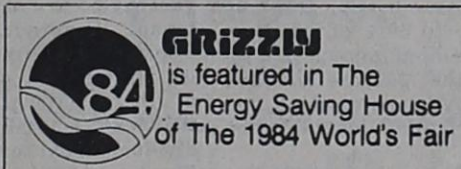
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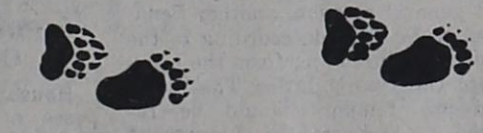


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Scooter's Scoops

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2/3 for The University of Texas System and 1/3 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin. House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. School Corner

There seems to be some confusion with regard to the new rules regarding absenteeism. I will attempt to explain these and if you still have questions please contact Kenneth Gauntt or Danny Cochran at 238-1317.

The State School Board has mandated a rule, which has become known as the 10-day rule, that states no student will miss more than ten days a year to participate in extracurricular activities (athletics, band, FFA, 4-H, etc.)

The legislature in the special session this summer passed a law which states that no student will receive credit for a course in which they have more than five unexcused absences in a semester. An excused absence is defined by law to be one caused by personal illness, sickness or death in the family, quarantine, weather or road conditions, or any other unusual cause acceptable to the principal or superintendent of the school.

The State Board rule deals only with absences due to participation in extracurricular activities, and the law deals only with unexcused absences. An excused absence does not count as one of the days in either of the above rules.

Bovina Independent School District has a rule which states that a student will not credit a course in which they miss more than ten

days per semester. This includes any absence except extracurricular absences, however, the principal may waive this rule for unusual circumstances. We will not punish a student who has missed more than ten days due to a prolonged illness.

The intent of each of these rules is to keep kids in school. Rules alone, however, will not accomplish the purpose. Parents must share the responsibility of attendance with the school.

The American systems of government and public education are not perfect. They can both stand improvement, but they are responsible for making this great land what it is. Education plays a very important role in keeping America strong. This places a big responsibility on each of us. Education must be as important in the homes as it is in the schools for us to realize our goals. A cooperative effort: this is the requirement for a successful educational process. A successful educational process is a requirement for a strong America. They go hand in hand. It becomes the responsibility of each of us to accept our respective roles in the overall process. Our willingness to accept this responsibility can insure that the generations to come can enjoy a free and strong America, just as we have.

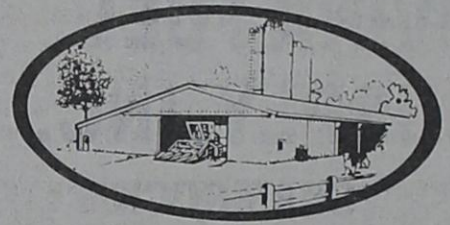

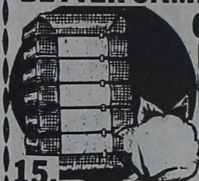
