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

"NEW" METMOD FOR TREAT-ING GOLD ORES.

This time it is Mr. L. Chard, of St. Louis, who comes to the front with a process for getting out gold where other inventors cannot. It is hardly fair to criticise Mr. Chard's process without more definite information than is afforded by an English exchange which attempts a description of some experiments lately conducted in Loned in the metallurgy of gold. We have been so often disappointed by similar announcements that we have little faith in them, and that credence is steadily dwindling as each new proposition appears. Mr. Chard's method appears to be a specie of dry washing or air concentration, somewhat in the line of Krom's system. Now there is no mystery about working refractory gold ores. If the metal is there, and there is enough of it, it is simply a question of profit and loss, with an outside limit of reduction cost of about \$12 per ton for leaching, in most districts. Now, on the other hand, is there any insuperable obstacle offered by scarcity of water, provided, again, that the gold is present in sufficient quantity? The report of the English Deputy Master of the mint, recently issuel, estimates the world's coinage at about \$168,000,000, according to his figures an increase of \$43,000,000 over 1888, and about \$53,000,000 over 1887. According to both estimates while the coinage of gold has increased since 1887 the coinage of siver has declined, so that the metals may be said to have reversed positions as regards the amounts coined during the three years.



The bill creating a new judicial district has become a law. It now becomes a question as to how it is to be formed. It has been proposed to constitute the present county of Lincoln into a district. The only plea for this is its size and that after November there will be three counties in that territory. As to the matter of business, Judge Mc-Fie is able to clean up the docket and clear the jails in a ten day's session. In some of the other counties the courts are one and two years behind with their business. Judge Lee suggested to the Reporter a much better arrangement. The new district should comprise the counties of Socorro, Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy, with Socorro as the seat of the U. S. Court. The established line of mail and passenger transportation naturally connects these counties. This arrangement would not only furnish the new district with business sufficient to justify the establishment of a court, but it will greatly relieve the Second district, in which there is always a large surplus of business.—San Marcial Reporter.

The case, therefore, stands thus: No State law can prevent any man from selling liquor or compel him to pay a license to engage in that business provided he imports his liquors from another State and sells them in the original packages.
