A few days ago seven buncho men who had come from New Mexico, while en route to San Antonio, roped in a New Mexico stock man at a game and stuck him for \$250. Saw-Mills and Timber Cutting.

Timber Agent Booth and Col. Mormon arrived from Santa Fe this week to interview the mill men. They state positively that the mill men must prove that their timber is cut from mineral land, and if they cannot do so they will be put to no end of trouble. The Enterprise has frequently denounced this business as an outrage on the public, and the fact that the work is now being carried on under the republican administration does not make the matter any better. It is an outrage just the same and is a gross injustice to the people of the west who are trying to build up homes and open up a new country. It seems that it is not enough for the people to submit to murders and robberies of the government wards, the Apaches, but we are even denied the use of the scrubby timber which grows scantily on the public domain. Truly the congress of the great and powerful government of the United States cannot understand the situation or it would not permit such an unjust law to stand.

This will eventually bring about the repeal of the act so far as the arid section of the west is concerned, but in the meantime the people will be compelled to submit to an injustice which is nothing less than persecution.—Silver City Enterprise.

The Republican workers and wire pullers of White Oaks, some time last summer took it into their heads that the people of Raventon, for the good of the G. O. P., should be set off from White Oaks, and they circulated a petition signed in numbers by illegal voters, residents of Lincoln and sheep men from the Rio Grande, boys under voting age, and asked the County Commissioners to give them a precinct at Raventon, which petition, as to boundary, was so bungingly drawn that when the precinct was formed, left their supposed adherents still in the White Oaks precinct. The precinct, as legally described, includes the Jicarilla mining district and includes only a handful of votes north and east of the settlement at Raventon. At the election held Tuesday the proper election officers were appointed by the Co. Board, who, with the exception of one judge, did not reside in the precinct, and the place of election was named at the home of Aniceto Lueros, where it was held, and which place of election, was, and is still in Precinct No. 8. The election Tuesday was so conducted by a majority of the election board, who reside in the White Oaks precinct, No. 8, and in the White Oaks precinct was the polling place. Thus we have had two voting places in Precinct No. 8, conducted by two sets of election officers. The high handed way of conducting the late election, is, to put it mildly, an

unusual procedure. What will be done with the so-called Raventon returns by the Co. Commissioners at the final canvas, will be a subject of inquiry, should it effect the final result on the adoption or rejection of the Constitution. One thing is evident—the whole matter should and must be determined before the November election. There will be no such work allowed then, as transpired at Tuesday's election. We are informed that the poll-books from Raventon, will show the names of non-residents who had no right to vote, coming from and residing in Valencia Co. We have no objection to people living in Lincoln county voting at Raventon, but when you take in Valencia county sheep men, who are temporarily herding their sheep on the Jicarilla hills, we protest. The voters of Raventon are our Mexican fellow citizens, who are and have heretofore been staunch Anthony Joseph men, and have a deep and lasting regard for the men. Candidates upon the Democratic legislative county ticket, and there is not any question as to who they will vote for in November, and no amount of sophistry will make them desert Anthony Joseph and the men who have always been their tried and true friends. The claim that certain republicans are making that they can be made to vote for Otero and the Catron gang in the same manner as they were used Tuesday, is amusing to their democratic friends. We care but little about their vote on the Constitution or the way in which they were misled, as the general result in the Territory and the County will not be materially effected by the Raventon vote.

The election for or against the Constitution, held Tuesday, resulted in the defeat of the measure, by a majority of one vote in the White Oaks precinct. The total vote polled was unusually light, being 109—55 against and 54 for the Constitution. This result is gratifying to the opponents of the measure on account of the vast amount of labor and the effort put forth by the promoters of the scheme. The so-called League have held session after session, since September 1889. The whole force and machinery of the Republican party, with a few manly exceptions, was enlisted in behalf of the measure and at a final hearing at the polls, here in White Oaks, all they could muster for the Constitution was a total of 54 votes. There was no united opposition, on the part of the democrats—a large number did not vote at all, and a few voted in favor—in fact, a number of young men who were lured by the Statehood cry. The full republican vote was polled, which shows a lamentable falling off of their vote in this precinct. Some over zealous re-

publicans have taken it upon themselves to personally villify members of their party for voting against the Constitution; accusations have been made of treachery, and abuse has been dealt out against one of their own party for no earthly reason, other than that he, in common with other citizens, exercised his divine right as an American citizen, and voted openly and for his own good reasons, against the Constitution. The man abused they have no right to single out for abuse, and it is boyish, and despicable to keep up the abuse of one of the foremost, and we must say, popular republicans in the county. The hot heads are only making themselves ridiculous, and if it were not so uncalled for, we would say keep it up, you are only increasing the democratic vote; but the treatment is so unjust, so unmanly, it is time a halt was called. Whatever satisfaction the republican party enjoy, they are at liberty to make the most of their disaster here in White Oaks. Any conclusion they can deduct is agreeable to the democrats, the majority of whom were opponents of the measure, while they are on record as being favorable to Statehood. We will be liberal with the G. O. P. people and say that after deducting 8 democrats from the total vote, and give them an offset of 4 who voted against the scheme, the G. O. P. have in the list 50 votes—add, all told 10 republicans who are known to be absent, and at a liberal estimate 60 G. O. P. followers in this precinct. Anthony Joseph will certainly receive some of these votes in November; but granting them the full 60, where will Otero get a majority in White Oaks? Otero can have the benefit of this vote. Certainly the G. O. P. can see that three months of daily efforts have resulted in disaster. Democrats are to be congratulated on the outlook for November. There is now no fear as to how the vote will go in November. The precinct of Nogal was represented at White Oaks in the above vote—two residents of that precinct were innocently allowed to vote here and they voted for the Constitution. Now, as a final conclusion, deduct from 54 the 8 democrats who voted and the two residents of Nogal, we have a grand total of 44. Where! Oh where! is the G. O. P.?

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN DONA ANA COUNTY.

The democrats of Dona Ana Co. held their convention on last Saturday. Court was in session at the same time. The Republican clique had procured an indictment against the editor of the El Depensor Del Pueblo, a democratic Spanish paper, charging him with libel; also an indictment against Chas. Bull, a prominent democrat,

on charge of carrying a pistol. There was ample opportunity to arrest these men outside of the convention, yet the republican bulldozers waited until the convention was in session and then sent a posse into the hall to take these defendants out of the convention. There was considerable uproar, but the men went out quietly and gave bond and returned. Great indignation was expressed on all sides. Several prominent republicans declared they would not vote the republican ticket as long as the party was managed by the present Las Cruces bosses. The democrats nominated a strong ticket and mean to win.

Mr. Joseph addressed a large and enthusiastic meeting at night with telling effect.—Albuquerque Democrat.

THE INIQUITY BURIED.

Yesterday's election demonstrated that the native and acquired citizens of this territory have intelligence, manhood, courage and independence beyond the expectation of the bosses and rulers in the republican party. If a constitution as bad as the one that has been voted down, and handicapped as this one by an illegal submission to the people of the territory, could pass, then would all the slanders that republicans in congress have uttered and published against this people have received indisputable confirmation. When a people however, earnestly deserving the boon and justice of admission, and ranking with a sense of the wrong done by congress to New Mexico in keeping her still in a territorial condition can yet stop to reflect and dispassionately discuss, and then condemn the iniquitous measure, that the class interest has been promulgated, the best and highest proof of the fitness and worthiness of our people for statehood has been given the cliques, the rings, the partisans are now given definitely and decisively to understand that the question of a fundamental law for our future state is to be based on, and rooted in justice, equity, and liberality.

No huckstering in special privileges and favors is to be allowed. No manipulation and party tricking is to be submitted to in so great an issue as this. Let the land grabbers and the bosses now know and understand that this people yet take them at the estimate they placed on each other in the split of 1884, and go to the rear. Then will the road to prosperity, equality and justice be easily trod and pursued. The vote on the constitution, says of the land grabber: "Cut him down, why encumbereth he the ground?" to-morrow, the Democrat's exultation will be better expressed in the procession of triumphant roosters that will adorn its columns, and the definite figures given as ocular demonstration of our peoples intelligence and manhood.—Alb. As we go to press the latest returns indicate beyond any doubt that the Constitution is defeated in the Territory by at least 2,000, and may reach 3,000.

Ruidoso, Weed, Upper Penasco and Red Cloud, are the four precincts still to hear from, which will make the total vote cast in the county about 600, and a sure majority against the Constitution, from 100 to 150. Chaves and Eddy will vote a small majority against. In the 3 counties the majority will be about 300. This vote is the criterion that our republican friends were reckoning upon to indicate a good vote for Otero. Anthony Joseph will, without the least doubt be re-elected to congress by 3,000 majority.

New Mexico Election.

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 7.—

The election to-day was on the adoption or rejection of the constitution drafted by a convention in which only the republican party was represented. The democrats refused to participate in the convention upon the ground that they were practically disfranchised by apportionment. They opposed the adoption upon the ground that it protected land grants and corporations of wealth from taxation and imposed the burden on small property owners and occupations, and and that its school provisions amounted to nothing. Returns from all points accessible by wire indicate the overwhelming defeat of of the constitution. Partial returns from Bernalillo Co. indicate a majority of eight hundred against it, Santa Fe 600, San Miguel 1,000, Socorro 500, Colfax 300, Grant possibly a small majority for it. Valencia a small majority, either way. It is safe to say that the constitution is everwhelmingly defeated. It is impossible for the advocates of the constitution to overcome the majorities reported against it.

This, Friday morning, after waiting our forms for further returns, the mail failed to arrive; this morning of all others in the year. We candidly believe that Harrison and Otero were in the league to disappoint our readers. The delay, to say the least, is inexcusable. The Postoffice folks should make complaint and stop such unwarranted disappointments.

Politicians sometimes utter great truths in the midst of the most partisan speeches. For instance, Speaker Reed in an address to the Republican League of Pennsylvania the other day at Philadelphia said: "But friends, the greatest thing in this world is the people. They make and unmake parties; they create history; they govern and move, and the people of the United States are alone responsible for this government, and it is their business to know and act upon the responsibility." It would be well if this little paragraph were printed in plain letters and pasted in the hat of every voter in the United States. There are entirely too many men who seemingly forget that this is a government "of the people by the people, and for the people," and they should be occasionally reminded of it.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

We, the Democratic party of the Territory of New Mexico, in convention assembled, reaffirm our allegiance to the time-honored principles of the National Democratic party as enunciated in the platform adopted at St. Louis in 1888.

We demand the free coinage of silver.

We arraign the National Republican party for squandering the surplus revenues in the treasury in order to furnish a pretext for increasing tariff taxation on the necessities of life—for depriving Democratic constituencies of their representatives in Congress and arbitrarily seating republican candidates who were not elected by the people—for adopting an arbitrary and unconstitutional system of rules in the House of Representatives and thereby suppressing the rights of the minority—and for attempting to pass the Lodge election bill to suppress free elections and subvert the rights of the states, in utter disregard of the Constitution of the United States—and practically for having awarded seats in the Senate of the United States to two Senators from the state of Montana, who were not lawfully elected thereto.

As heretofore, we reiterate, that the General Government has been and still is, heedless of the rights of New Mexico and its obligations under the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo in failing and refusing to pass such a law as will secure the prompt and speedy settlement of land titles in New Mexico.

We declare that the native population of New Mexico are entitled to the lands held by them or their predecessors under the laws of the Republic of Mexico, and that their rights thereto should be respected.

We endorse the course of Hon. Antonio Joseph, our delegate in Congress as a zealous and faithful public servant, at all times tireless in his efforts in behalf of the people of New Mexico, and heartily commend him for re-election.

We denounce the action of L. Bradford Prince Governor of New Mexico in requesting the quartering of United States troops in the county of San Miguel to overawe the people under the pretext of resistance to the civil authority, when no process was in the hands of the officers of the law unreserved, as in keeping with the spirit of contempt for the civil authorities usually reserved by the Republican party.

We arraign the Republican party of New Mexico for reckless disregard of the will of the people and turning out of the last Legislature duly elected Representatives in order to secure a majority sufficient to pass iniquitous measures over the executive veto.

We arraign them for passing a libel law contrary to the spirit of the age in order to suppress free speech and a free press; for the passage of a change of venue law in the interests of a single corporation and thereby so increasing the cost and delay of litigation as to amount to a denial of justice; for passing a law changing the practice in taking appeals to the Supreme Court, applicable only to a limited number of cases in which Republican members of the Legislature were either parties or attorneys; for assuming the powers of the Territorial Executive in order to place in office incompetent and corrupt party favorites; for passing a law authorizing the competition of convict with honest labor; and for passing many other outrageous laws subversive of the rights of the people.

We condemn them for failing and refusing to enact such legislation as would secure to the Territory an efficient public school system, and for a manifestation of general hostility to public education, as shown by their defeat of the effort to establish such a system by the last Legislative Assembly, as well as their denunciation of the Perkins Bill for the reason that such a system for the education of children or the masses would require the taxation of large land grants.

We condemn the Republican party of New Mexico for placing the management of the Penitentiary in the hands of a board composed of perpetual incumbents of public office, which Board, in defiance of public opinion, has given employment almost wholly to relatives of the members thereof, and turned what was intended to be a reformatory institution into a house of debauchery.

We denounce the prostitution of the Courts by packing juries to secure wholesale indictments for crime against innocent persons as a means of intimidation for political purposes, and as a further means of rewarding a horde of party strikers who are kept in attendance on Courts as witnesses, term after term, while refusing the accused the speedy trial guaranteed by the law of the land.

We declare ourselves in favor of the unqualified repeal of the Act of Congress of 1850 restricting entries on the public lands, and thereby retarding the progress of the Territory; and of the repeal of the law prohibiting the investment of foreign capital in our mining industries.

We condemn the Republican party for passing such an act, authorizing the holding of a Constitutional Convention, as deprived the Democratic counties of the territory of any opportunity to secure a fair or equal representation in said Convention, and of attempting to foist upon the people a Constitution framed in the interest of that party alone, and discriminating in favor of the few as against the masses.

We declare that the Constitution so framed would, if adopted, deprive the people of the State of the right to elect the judges of the Supreme Court, while providing for the election of the judges of the District Courts by districts so constituted as to render such right valueless. We further declare that said constitution denies to the Executive the power usually conferred by such instruments, and makes him the mere puppet of the Legislature by subjecting him to suspension from office upon impeachment without trial. We further declare that said Constitution limits the power of taxation upon persons and property as to enable all large property interests of individuals and corporations to escape the just burdens of the government, and inequitably and unjustly authorizes the same to be imposed upon particular articles and occupations.

We further declare that this proposed system of taxation will not produce, by property tax, sufficient revenue to support a State government and meet the public obligations, thereby rendering it absolutely necessary to impose a tax upon particular articles and occupations, thus making the masses pay for the benefits of the government received by the property of the few.

We further declare that said Constitution makes such an arbitrary and partisan apportionment for the election of members of the Legislature as to virtually disfranchise opponents of the Republican party. We further declare that the action of pretended apportioned Convention, on the 18th day of August, 1890, was taken without color of legal authority and without the presence of a quorum of said original Convention, and that the manifest object of a change in the date of the submission of said instrument to the purpose of defeating a full and fair expression of the popular will thereon.

We therefore call upon all patriotic citizens of New Mexico to go to the polls on October 7th next, and vote against the proposed partisan Constitution, to the end that all advocates of Statehood for New Mexico may without regard to present or future party affiliation unite in an honest effort to secure from Congress an Enabling Act, for the submission of a fair and just Constitution.

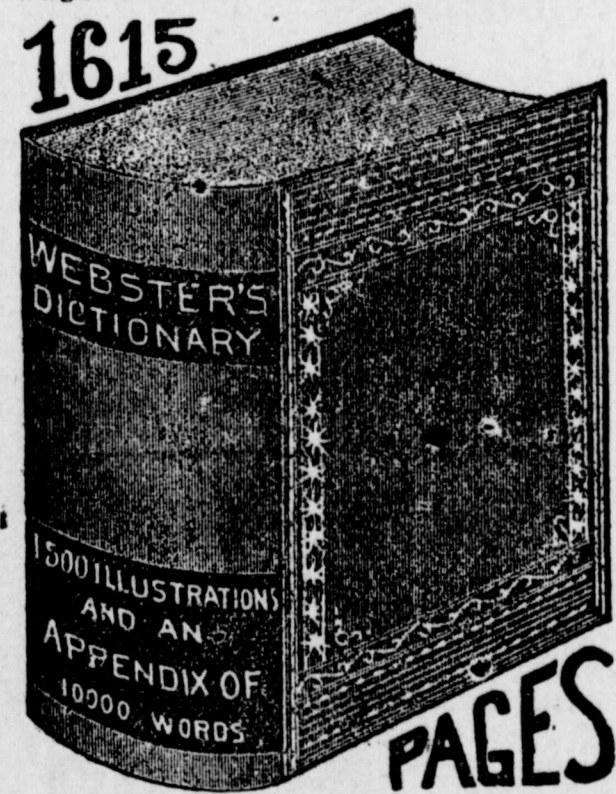

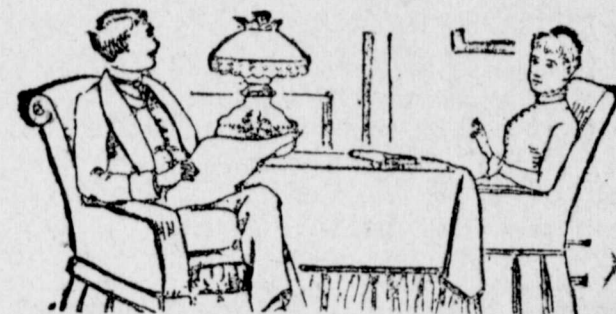

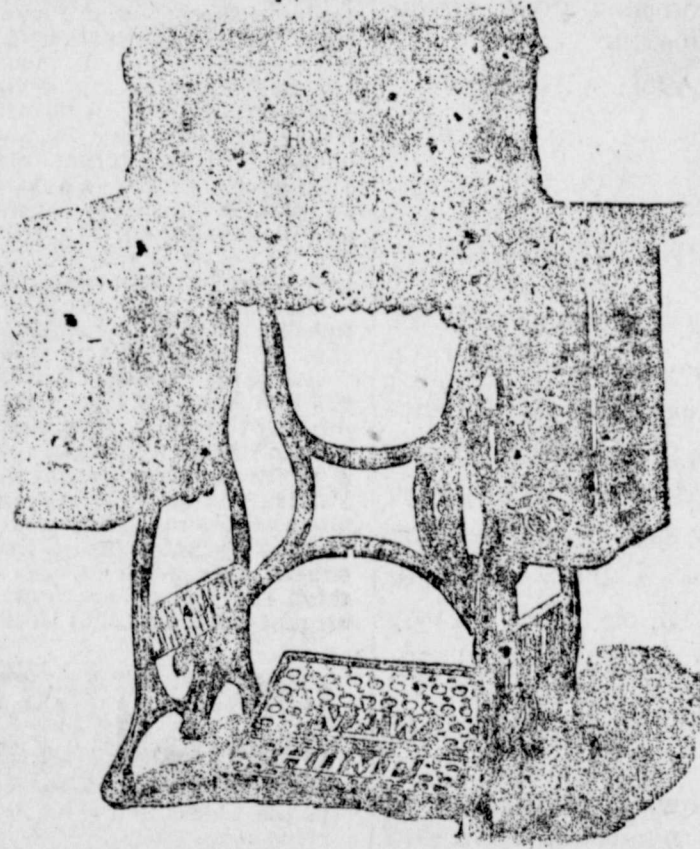
