

EDUCATION.

Hon. Amado Chaves, appointed superintendent of education under the new public school law, was born in the city of Santa Fein april 1851. He was at San Miguel college for three years, and when 15 years of age went to Washington city, where he attended the pudlic schools for three years and a half; took a full course at Bryant & Stratton's business college, and then tended the National University of Washington as a law student, graduating and receiving his diploma as attorney and counselor at law and was admitted to practice in the supreme court of the District of Columbis: his diploma as such is signed by Gen. Grant as ex officio president of the University, and was handed to him in person by the general, then president of the Uni ted States He was also employed readers of all classes. Sample copies a number of years in the interior department as clerk and translator. He returned to New Mexico 1877 and practiced his profession for a while, afterwards engaging in runching and stock business. He was elected clerk and assessor of Valineia county, but resigned both offices; and was elected to the 26th legislative assembly and was by an overwhelming majority chosen speaker of that body. During that session, owing largely to his efforts and his work, much beneficent legislation was had, and, amongst other things the first school law was put through and became law.

He is the son of Col. Manuel Chaves, who was well and favorably known as one of the most successful Indian fighters in the southwest, a man of splendid courage and as one of the first men who raised volunteers for the union cause in New Mexico He comes from an old and honored Spanish family, Col. Antonio Duran de Chaves, of

Cadiz, of the Royal Spanish armyand knight of the order of St. James being his ancestor; the latter came to New Mexico in 1710 and established the colony of Atrisco on the Rio Grande, opposite Albuquerque--New Mexican.

### HOUSE BILL NO. 89.

Introduced by Mr. McDonald, Jan. 24, 1891, read first time by title and, under suspension of rules. read socond time and ordered translated and printed.

AN ACT To Amend Section 2788 of the Compiled Laws of New Mexico.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexibo.

Sec. I. Section 2788 of the Com piled Laws of New Mexico of 1884 be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 2788. The proceeds received from said sale shall be disposed of as follows:: First, they shall be applied to pay the expenses of said sale; second, to discharge any outstanding claims incurred in entering the town site of said town: third, the surplus, if any, shall be paid over by said town trustees to the board of directors of the school distrct wherein said town is situated, to be used and expended by said school board in the erection of school buildings for the use of public schools of said district, and for the use furnishing of the same and for no other purpose.

Sec. 2. Immediately upon the passage of this act the treasurer of any board of town trustees provided for in the act to which this is amendatory, shall turn over to the treasurer of the school district all moneys and property, notes, bonds and securities Which may have come into his hands by virtue of said act, taking proper receipts therefor, which money, property, notes and securities shall thereafter be vested in said school board and be expended and used as provided for in section 1 of this act.

Sec. 3 This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

The Mormon Elders' Book

Under the new school law the territorial board of education is to select the books for all the schools in the territory, and such books when selected, cannot be changed for five years.

By authority of the legislature the territorial superintendent of public instruction will issue in pamphlet form all the public school laws of the territory, just as soon as the same can be compiled and

It is estimated that the text book prevision of the new law, which makes the books uniform all over the territory, and enables the territorial board to contract for them at wholesale, will save to the people of New Mexico at least thentyfive thousand dollars a year.

The Deming Headlight has the following regarding the Late Legislature:

Fall of Dona Ana, Burns of Sierra, McDonald and Richardson of Lincoln, George, of Socorro, Paulin of San Juan, Walker of Colfax, Young of Taos, Easley and Gable of Santa Fe, and Mills and Montova of San Miguel, represented an honesty and determination of purpose in a good cause—an intellectual and legislative ability-an aggressive, feerless and forceful power of young manhood. rarely witnessed and never excelled in a legislative body of corresponding numbers.

On the Republican side, also, there were marked changes for the better, conspiouously so in the cases of Stover, of Bernalillo, and Anchetta of Grant.

It is creditable to the body that no great number of bills was passed as not many were needed- that while a few may be objectionable, none are viciously bad, and several are of the first importance to the well-being of the Territory-which cannot be said of any session of the Territorial Legislature for many years past.

If one were to ask what has this Legislature done for the good of the Territory, a sufficient answer would be, and one that would debar just criticism even if nothing else had been done, that it made a complete law for the establishment of the the American free public school system in New Mexico. Even if that had been all, the name and fame of the body just adjourned would have passed with high honor into the histoy of this Territory, entitled to and receiving the grateful plaudits of coming generations Nothing else was so much needed-without it, no matter what else might have been dene, the session would have been a failure That done, it was a grand success.

Ir will be conceded, all things considered, that the legislature which has just adjourned, was probably the best New Mexico has ever had. It would have been better could the personnel have been changed in a few particulars. Then so ne more needed legislation would have been had. The most hopeful aud encouraging fact in connection with the whole matter is that public sentiment in favor of

the school bill for instance, was so strong that the vicious elements in legislature dared not exert their power and prevent the enactment. The people are the masters, and even the most selfish and unscrupulous dare not resist the will of the people too far. Public sentiment, however, must be educated to such an extent, by the meeting of the next legislature, but not only that good legislation will be demanded but only such men will be elected to that body as are sure to advocate and pass good measures. The vicious elements of the last legislature must be excluded from the next .-Optic.

The residents of White Oaks by the passage of the law printed on our first page entitled An Act to amend section 2788 Compiled Laws of 1884 are placed in a position to construct a school house this year if deemed advisable. The amount available under the law passed is about \$1200 principle and interest for two years \$288 a total of \$1488. The school district Treasurer will receive this amount, the license money about \$800. Poli Tax and Gambling Tax, a 8 mill general tax will create a fund this year ample to build a school house and conduct school the full term. The exemption of \$300 has been repealed increasing thereby the tax payers largely in White Oaks. And should it be necessary a special tax of 5 mills can be raised in addition. Every one in White Oaks is interested in the subject of the earliest construction of a school building to meet the requirements of the district the subject should receive the attention of the citizens at large who should express themselves frankly to the school board their opinion. The district has a school house site of several lots between the residence of Col. Heman and the Parsonage. What kind of a building will we have and when should the board commence to build it? The board will most likely desire to hear from the tax payers and the time has come to express yourselves. Do not lay back to find fault when action is taken by the board but can. vass the subject at once and inform the board of your desires. 



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
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
