THE FIRST SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION．

Hon．Amado Chaves，appointed uperintesdent of education under the new public school law，was born in the city of Santa Fein april 1851. He was at San Miguel college for three years，and when 15 years of age went to Washington city， where he attended the pudlic school for threo years and a half； took a fril course at Bryant \＆Strat ton＇business college，and then at tended the National University of Washington as a law student，grad－ uating and receiving his diploma as attorney and，counselor at law and was admitted to practice in the stipreme court of the District of Co－ lumbia：his diploma as such is signed by Gen．Grantas ex officio president o：the University，and was handed to him in person by the general，then president of the Uni ted States He was also employed a number of year in the interior department as clerk and translator． He returned to New Mexicn 1877 and practieed his profession for a while，afterwards engaging in runching and stock buanoss．He was elected clerk and assessor of Va－ lincia county，but resigned both offices；and wan elected to the 26th legislative assemblv and was by an overwholming majurity chosen speaker of that body．During that session，owing largely to his efforts and his work，much benoficent leg islation was had，aud，amongst oth or things the first school law．was put threukh and became law．
He is the son of Col．Manuel Chaves，who was well and favor－ ably known as one of the most sue cessful Indian fighters in the south west，a man of splendid courage， and as one of the first men wh raised volunteers for the union cause in Neir Mexico He comes from an old and honored Spanish family， Col．Antonio Duran de Chares，of

Cadiz，of the Royal Spanirh army－ and knight of the order of St．James being his ancestor；the latter came to New Mexico in 1710 and estab－ lished the colony of Atrisco on the Rio Grande，opposite Albuquerque－ －Now Mexican．

## HOUSE BILL NO． 89.

Introduced by Mr．McDonald，Jan． 24，1891，read first time by title and，under suspension of rulos， read socond time and ordered translated and printed．
An Act To Amond Section 2788 of the Compiled Laws of New Mexino．
Be it enacted by the Legislative As－ sembly of the Territory of New Mexibo．
Sec．1．Soction 2788 of the Com piled Laws of New Mexico of 1884 be and the ame is hereby amend－ ed ao as to read as follows：
Sec．2788．The proceeds re－ seived from said sale shall be dis－ posed of as follows：：First，they shall be applied to pay the expen－ ses of said rale ；second，to dis－ charge any outstanding clams in－ curred in entering the town site of said town：third，the surplus，if any，shall be paid over by sind town trustees to the board of direc－ tors of the school distrct wherein said town is situsted，to be used and expended by said school board in the erection of sehool buildinga for the use of public schools of said distrtct，and for the use fur－ nishing of the same and for no oth－ er purnose．
Sec．2．Immediately upon the passage of this act the treasurer of any board of town trustees pro－ vided for in the act to which this is amendatory，shall turn over to the treasurer of the school district all moneys and proparty，notes，bonds and securities Whieh may have come into his hands by virtue of said act，taking proper resoopt． therefor，which monoy，property， notes and securities shall thereafter vested in said school board and be expended and used as provided or in section 1 of this act．
Sec． 3 This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passugo．

## WASHINGTON LETTER，

（From our special c rresponde a t．）
Tosay that Washington is uver－ run by women is to put the case mildly．We are bounded by them north，south，east，and west．They throng the streets，fill the stores，con－ gregate in hotel parlors and corra dors，and long procossions wend their way through the Capitol． The rain which has nattled invo a
steady pour does not discourage them, nor detract from the sunniness of their smiles.
The accoumodations of many ho tels given out, but the delegates pack themselves three or four deep into one small room and accept their fate as cheerfully as a feature of the great Nuticnal Counil of Women.
The leaders have been here for several dars. Miss Willard, Miss Anthony, Miss Seymour, Mrs. Sewell, Mrs. Thomes, and Miss Eastman were on the ground at the be ginning of the work, and varied their offcial labors by a little quiet visiting and sight seeing.
The Western delegate can readily be distinguished from her eastern colleague. Take, for exarple, the Rev. Olympia Brown, of Wiscen$\sin$, who is on the programme for a Scripture reading Sundiay morning. Wisconsin is written on every line of her face, and its bracing Western atmosphere shows itself in her voice, her walk and her wholesouled cordialit with the people she !ikes. She is said to have an exceedingly wellstured mind and a gift oi oratory which has always won recognition.

A delegate who is attracating considerable attention here is Mrs. Virginia (c. Meredith, the noted woman farmer of Indiana. She has one of the finest stock farms in the State, and is sole manager and overseer. Her husband died after a long illuess, leaving his affairs in ratt.er an involved condition. His wife knowing nothing of the work bravely began to learn: she perserved and matyers smoothed themselves out under her direction unti all debts were pard off and the old Neredith farm took first rank in the Hoosier State. Mrs. Meredith isn't a bit spoiled about it all and finds time in cine midst of her labors to take a helpfulinterest in other women and their work. She is one of the Board of Managers of the C 0 . lumbian Exposition aud will doubtless be prom:nent in next weeks discussion,

Let me take you in the parlors of the Riggs House, where the interest and women have centered. Seated near the window and surrounded by an admiring throng you will see a woman, gray-haired, spectacled, and plainly attrred, whose slightest word is listened to with interest. No matter how noisy the room may be or how much talk is in progress, when this woman speaks there comes a great calm. Of course it is Susan B. Anthony, and equally of course the dark young woman sitting beside her is Rachael Forester-Avery. The two are inseperable. Together they planned thas National Cnuncil of Women, together they worked for its organization, and together more or less they have been ever since.

Miss Willard will not be in the parior. She is at another hotel, and besides she never sits during a woman's souncil. It is simply impos-
sible to butonhole her for one moment. A harpin here or stray glove there are the only traces the little woman leaves behind hor as she flies from place to pace. I saw her takea car yesterday. That public conveyance was hatf a block ahead and was bowling along merrily, but Miss Willard started after It with the serene determiration whieh has carried her and her cause riumphantly through the years Her glasses leaped wildly off her nose, her atchel flew open, she lost a handkerchief, a glove, and several trifles, but she get what was left into that car.

The nomination of Charles Foster to be Secretary of the treasury caused no surprise in any quartor. It had been confidently expected for several days. Never at any time probably did the President have but two names under consideration in connection with the vacant Cabinet place. Under the new school law the territorial board of education is to select the bouks for all the schoois in the territory, and such books when seiected, cannot be changed for five years.
By authority of the legislature. the territorial superintendent of pubiic instruction will issue in pampllet form all the public school laws of the territory, just as soon as tbe same can be compiled and arranged.
It is estimated that the text book provision of the new law, which makes the books uniform all over the territory, and enables the territorial board to contract for them at wholesale, will save to the people of New Mexico at least thentyfive thousand dollars a year.

If one were to ask what has this - Legislature doue for the good of the Territory, a sufficient answer would be, and one that would debar just criticism even if nothing else had been done, thatit made a complete law for tne establishment of the the American free public school system in New Mexico. Even if that had been all, the name and fame of the body just adjourned would have passed with high honor into the histoy of this Territorv, entitled to and receiving the grateful plaudits of coming generafions Nothing else was so mach needed-without it, no matter what else might have boen dene, the session would have been a failure That done, it was a grand succees.

If w:h be conceded, all things
consi ered, that the legirlature which has ju-t adjourned, was probably th: best New Mexico has ever had. It would have been better could the personuel have been changedin a few particulars. Then so ne more needed legislation would hive been had. Tha most hyefu aud encouraging fact in connection with the whole matter is that public sentiment in favor of
ccrtain needed legislation, such as Eddy conspicuous among the lead the schoul bill for instance, was so ers in the legislature and the influstrong that the vicious elements in logislature dared not exert their power and prevent the enactment. The poople are the masters, and even the most seltsh and unscrupalouz dare not resibt the will of the people too far. Public sentiment, however, ust be educated to such an extent, by the meeting of the next legislature, but not onl that good legisfation will ba demanded but only such men will be elected to that body as are sure to adveate and pass god measures. The vicious elements of the lant legislature must be excluded from the next.Optic.
