The action of the World's Fair commissioners to the effect that no form of gainbling will be permitted on the exposition grounds is commendable It would-be a serious olunder for the management of this, great enterprise to take any other position than this. It would be an unwise policy for our government to permit any of its enterprises to be used to promote gambling-an evil that is daily growing in this country.

There seems no indications of any stop in the rapid extensions of the City of Mexico, which is growing fast in all directions, but mainly toward the west and southwest. Many hundred new houses are buiding, and plans for a large number more are accepted. Business is excellent, and reports from all parts of the Republic show a high degree of prosperity. There will be a large increase in the area devoted to coffee culture this year, and great attention is also being paid to sugar cane culture, and many new plantations are being set out.

"We shouid be glad to believe that tre management of the Denver \& Rio Grande railway company is seriously womideri,g the mater of extending its line southward in New Mexico. Bat it is not probable that it is doing so. The most feasible plan by which to secure such an extension is for the people of, the interested New Mexico towns to organize a company and build a line northward to connect with the Rio Grande. It is highly probable that if such a company were orgriz d the Rio Grande stockholders would render the New Mexico emmpanr valuable aid in raising the money which would be needed."

On Saturday the four Hall boys and two of the Steeles met at 'Squire Murphy's office to transact some egal business. Each was armed with rifle and revolver. The Santa Fe expects to handle several hundred thousand head this season. ## Regarding Popmation.

The decline of the birth rate in Europe seems to be general and steady. In France the births are now very little in excess of the deaths, and in other countries the decline is marked.
Germany and Austria have the highest birth rate, but Germany shows a greater falling off since 1875 than any other nation except England. Hungary and Italy alone show an increase in the birth rate, and that not a heary one. The United States have no very accurate statistics on the subject, butit is well known that even in this country the birth rate is decreasing and gradually approaching the death rate. It would seem that in civilized countries the matter of food and population may easily regulate itself along other lines than those laid down in the malthusian theory. By the time the waste places of the world are occupied and settled, neither war, pestilence nor famine may be needed to $p$ reserve the balance between power of production and need for consumption.-Ex.
Man Podro Loolsing Up.

Despite the assault made upon the Santa Fe Copper company in a recent issue of the New York Mining Recurd, the stock seems to be holding its own pretty well and affairs at the mines and furnacos at San Pedro, as well as at the compan 's Boston office, are moving on with much activity. The German expert, Mr. Schæffer, originally sent out to report on the extent and valut of the concentrating ores for the Luhring Concentrator company of London, is again at San Pedro, and his presence is deemed asindicating that the Luhring's proposition to put upa 500 - on enncentrator iś in a furr way to go into effect. The Mining and Engineering Journal t hand from New York says:
The Santa Fe Copyer company's new concentrator is at work. The amount of natte produced from March 15th to April 30th is reported to have amounted to 437,000 pounds. The directors of the company, at a meeting held in Boston, Mass., on the 14th of May, voted to issue 842,00010 per cent. five-year scrip with which to take up the coupons on the $\$ 300,0007$ per cent. mortgage bonds matured in June and December, 1890, and to mature in the same months of 1891. Holders of over three-quarters of the bonds have consented to accept the scrip. The next coupon due for payment in cash will be that of June, 189z. This will give the company a full year in which to demonstrate its earning capacity. -New Mexican.
