United States v. William Watson.
Hearing ordered by commissioner's letter "N," March 9,1891 , to determine characeer of land embraced in Coal Entry, No. 15, Mining Survey 256 , bein : part of N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ section 36, T. 6 S. R. 12 E.
opinion of register and receiver.
This case comes before this office, on the supplemental eviderce taken before a special commissioner, appointed by the Register and Receiver, which hearing was held pur$s$ nt ' $\theta$ an order contained in Com. mis sioner's letter "N," March 9, 1391, to determine whetker the land contained large deposits of coal, and is cuiefly valuable therefor. The hearing then, is ordered
question contains coal, or is adja cent to lands valuable for coal, but to determine if the land itself, contains large deposita of coal, and is chiefly valuable therefor.
Numerous witnesses appear in behalf of the claimant Watson, chief among whom is the witness Comery, whose testirany as far as it goes is direct and conclusive, and dearly demonstrates the fact, that coal actually exists upon the tract in question, in at least toree separate and distinct bodies, varying from 80 to 140 feet in depth. The fact that coal upon said entry ?ctually exists. in regular deposits, is not controverted nor denied, and the question therefore resolves itself in to the simple one of quantity, and as to whe her or not such cquantity is sufficient to make the land chiefly valuable ior coal. The witness Comery, testifies to three veins of coal, the first 4 in. thick. at a depth of 84 feet, the second 10 in . thick, at a depth of 124 feet, both composed of "rotten coal," and the third, from 16 to 22 inches of coal, with a streak of slate 1 to 2 inches thick in its center was found at a depth of 134 feet. This seems to have been the only coal discovery upon the tract in question, or at least the only one upon which the claimant relies for the establishment of his claim. Comery also testifies, that the fire tests made of
the coal discovered, were made of "the hard lumps about the size of a hazel nut" brought up by the drill from the 8 or 10 inch vein, lying below the stratum of slate in the 16 to 22 deposit last encountered. The natural supposition then is, that the upper half of the lower vein, and the two strata lying above it, are composed of "rotten coal" unfit for cousumption. If such be the case, claimant relies upon the discovery of a 10 inch vein of coal lying $13 \pm$ feet below the surface of the ground, to render the land "chiefly valuable for coal.'

Attorney for claimant, in his brief, plaees great stress upon the fact that the land in question, is contiguous to and geologically resembler, land chefly valuable for coal, notably the "Gallagher" mire, and reasons by induction, that if adjacent land geologically similar in character, contains large and valuable deposits of coal this laud in question is encitied to the same classification.
Such reasoning, however, is not admissable, in Hooper vs. Ferguson, 2-L. D. 712, and in Dughi vs. Harkins ibnd. F21. it 19 clearly held "the burden of proof lies upon the mineral claimant, and he must show nut that neighboring lands are mineral in character, or that, that in question may be, by possibility valuable for mineral, but that as preseut fact it is muneral in character. and that must appear from the actual production of mineral, and not from any theory that it may pro-
duce it." in other wurds, it is fact and hut theory that must govern ia this offee, in deciding upon the case at issue. The question then narrows itself to the determination as to whether or not 10 inches of coal at a depth of 134 feet below the surface of the ground is such a deposit as to render the land containing it chiefly valuable therefor.
In this connection, the general intention of the law seems to be to segregate as coal lands, only those containing large deposits of coal, or those containing coal in such quamtities as to make their workings reasonably remunerative, and not the segregate from the public, lands contaiuing such small deposits as to be practically worthless to their possessors. That among the latter class of deposits, should be classed the entry in question, seems to be evidenced by the fact, that from the date of entry till ine date of the or. der for the hearing in the above case, claimant has wholly failed to vail himeelf in any way of the val. uable deposits he claims as existing on the land in question.
In view of the foregoing facts, it is the opinion of this office that Coal Entry No. 15, Mining Survey 256, abuve quoted, has not been proven to contain such valuable deposits of coa: as is contemplated by the letter " N " of the honorable commissioner under which this hearing was had.
Thirty days is hereby allowed in which which to appeal from this decision to the Honorable Commissioner of tho General Land Office.
