



An Important Enterprise. Pueblo Chiettian.

In the course of his remarks before the committee of the board 5 trade last night in advocacy of the proposed line of railroad to El Paso via Las Vegas and White Oaks, Mr. Jefferson Reynolds of Las Vegas, a former resident of Pueblo, who is well and favorably known to most of older citizens, mentioned some points which contain food for thought for our enterprising peeple. He called attention to the fact that the time had arrived when Pueblo must look to the south and west for her trade. On the east she is checkmated by Kansas City and on the north by Denver. A direct independent line of railroad via Las Vegas and White Oaks will connect her at Kl Paso 1,700 miles of completed railroad in Mexico. The mining resources of that coun try are being rapid'y developed. the demand for mining smelting, tuachinery is large and increasing and Pueblo is at present the most convo lient point at which it can be manufactured. The shipments of ore from old Mexico are now more then sixty car loads per day. Of course as long as the only north and south lines of railroad are cor trolled by the trunk lines running east and west these people will go to Kansas City or Chicago to cell their ores and purchase their machinery and supplies. The eastern trunk lines want the long haul and while they control the only lines running north and south it will be impossible to divert any part of that important trade to Pueblo. An independent line could accomplish this and it is hoped by the projectors to bring by this means a large portion of this business to Colorado cities. Another important advantage to hegained by the construction of the line via Las Vegas and White Oaks is a connection at El Paso with the Southern Pacific thus giving Pueb to people another route to New Orleans on the east and San Francisco on the west.
