In the course of his remarks before the commitue of the board of trace last night in advocacy of the proposed line of railroad to LII Pas. ria Las Vegas and White Oaks, Mr. Jefferson Reynolds of Las Vegas, a formor resident of Pueblo,
who is well and favorably known to who is well and favorably known to
most of older c!tizens, mentioner some points which contain fooci for thonght for our enterprising peeple. He called attention to the fact that the time had arrived when Pueblo must look to the suith and west for her trade. On the east she is checkmated by Kansas City and on the north by Dunver. A direct independent line of railroad via Las Vegas and White Oaks will oonect her at III Paso 1,700 mile: of completed rai road in Mexico. The mining resources of that cotn
try are being rapid'y developed the demand for mining smelting suachinery is large and increasing and Pueblo is at present the most cone ient point at which it can be manufuctured. The shipmets. then sixty car loads per diy. $O$ course as long ns the only norih and south haes of railroad are cortroiled by the truok lines running east and west these people will go to Kansas City or Chicago to eell their ores and purchase their machinery and supplies. The eastern trunk lines want the long houl and while they control the only lines running north and south it will be impossible to divert any part of that impostant trade to Pueblo. An in tependont line could accomplish this and It is hoped by the projectors to bring by this mosans a large portion of this business io Colorato cities.

A nother important alvantage to hegained by the construction of the line via Las Vegas and White Oakis a connection at El Pas, with the Southern Pacific thus giving Pueb to people another route to New Or leans on the east and Sin Francisco on the west.
Our citizens should car finly consider the importance of this pros posid new line and give the enterprise all of the aid in th-ir power.

Mr. Wootton pre iet.s its line. This enterprise has great things fur Trinidad from this reached such a stage that the busi new road. He says that it will give ne-s men of Denver can no longer thecity a vertable boom, and that fford to neglect it. The $\$ 10,000$ uecessary to defray the expense of the preliminary survey has been
raised, and that work will doubt less be completed by the close of the year. Although the distanze from Deaver to El Paso 18 over 600 miles the connections and conditions are
such that only 420 malles of the road will have to buit.
The route is almost a bee line. There are n. steep grades, sharp curv-s or dangerous water-conrses to be en countered, and the work of construction will, therefoe, be comparatively easy. The resources of the country to be opened have already heen frequently laid lefore the puble, to gether with the fact that the whole tributary section is exceedingly anxious to do busiaess with this city; but these alone aro nat the only advantages to be derived.
New railroad connections of great value will be atained, The line to Topolobampo will soon be built, opening up the trade of old Mexico, passing through a splendid mineral seetion of that republic and giving access to the best Mexic $m$ ha:bor on the Pacific coast East of El Paso line already built connect with New Oreans, Galveston and Vicks. burg. The Eddy oad, now Luildmg up the Pecos valley, will strike the line at LasVegas or White Oaks operng a new farming and fruit growng country that is now being rapidly sevelopai This road will also hasten connection wita deep water harbors on the gulf. With all these facts it is evident that the Denver, Las Vegas \& Ei Paso line should coumand the substantiai support and consideration of this city. The people of New Mexico and Texas are terribly in earnest regarding the enterpise. They have mean business from the start.

Maxa sheeciang to bo held.
Hon. R L. Wootton, who reprecented Trinidad at the Las Vegas railroud convention, arrived in the city, this ufterboon. He states that the meeting was a grand success, and the greatest enthusiasm pre vailed among all of tha delegates with reference to the constraction of the Ei Paso road. Mr. Wooton advocated the project of an independent line from Trinidad to Las Vegas, while the Maxwell grant People were in faver of the Catskill route. Finally, Mr. Weotton carried his point, and the survey was ordered for an independent line through the Stonewall valier. This survey will be begua as som as the ynuta of money for this purp ose is paid into the treasury from the several cities along the line. Trinidad's proportion is $\$ 2,000$, and this must be raised at once. To this nd a mass meating of the citizens
it will never do to let such a tri
fling sum stand in the way of its progress. The Putblo dolegates wanted a new line all the way to that city, but that was put aside as a matter of after consideration. The Denver and Paeblo delegates re mained over and are being entertained at the Las Vegas hot springs hatel. The convention concluded with a grasd banquet, last night which did not break up until four o'clock, thas woraing. Mr. Wortton spenks in high praise of the generous hosptality of the Las Vegas people, who spared no pans or expence to make the visit a most agreenble one. - Trinidad Chronicia Las Vegas, Oetober 24th,-Friends of our propose? railroad, wh, have been recounting the resuarces of the lane, seem to have only a passing remark for that portion between Las Vegts and White Oks, count ing it as ana oluetive, excopt what valua it mar have as a grazeny country. They all see a to have overlooked a prospective industry. which, to my mind, is scarcely second ary to any resurce along th whole line. I refer to the galt beds of Valencia county. Theso beds are undeveloped anl unworked; but nature manipulate, them as fol lows: During the heavy rains, the salt is washed out of the sarth, dissulved, and carried in solution to the natural basins which dot the surface of the country. As the water evaporates the salt crystatlizes and merely requires to be gathered up and hauled away. For generations, the natives have visited these lagunas to gather salt In recent years, they have sold Valencia county salt all over New Mexico and parts of Colorade, at twentyfive cents to $\$ 1.00$ per cwt .
In my estimation. it is only a question of time whell thousunds of thrity people will one their subsistence to the industry to be devel oped on the salt plaius of Valencia county. F. Menedith Jonss.
It will be of interest to old Kansans to know that Hon. Lawrence D. Bailey, of Kansas, died at Lawrence last week, aged about soventy vears. The Chiof Justice was Thomas Ewing, Jr., son of Hon. Thomas Eving, of Ohio, whow as the first secreca:y of the Interior Deprrtment. The other Justice was Hon. S. A. Kingman, now dead. Chief Justice Ewing resigned in 1892 to take the Culoneicy of the 11th Kansaa Regiment in the war of the rebellion, afterwards promoted to be a Brigadier Gencral and later a Representative in Congerss from Ohio, Gen. Eving is the only member of the first Supreme Court of Kansas now living -Deming Headight.
