## the protective system.

That Tariff Speaker Henderson is a sturdy Scotchman, and like his fellow countryman, Carnegie, swears by a protective tariff. The party of that policy has kept Henderson in congress for twenty years and given the other Scot a chance to take so much money from the people the does not know what to do with it, and does not feel easy without giving it back to the people who have had to give into his keeping.-El Paso Daily News

The above pretinent article is in itself a text from which might be preached many long sermons. In the first place, why should any man be empowered by law to collect an injust tax from the people, under the guise of "protection," or any other pretext, even if he, like Carnegie, should later become liberal enough to pay a portion of his wealth thus gained back to the public, in the form of libraries and the like? It might occur, in some instances, that the people who are forced to make these contributions would not choose to invest in public libraries, they might be inclined to place these enforced loanes in the necessaries of life for a needy or starving family, because the tax-

## es of the government and the in-

 creased prices paid for commodities are largely drawn from the poorer clases, or people might be able to invest their money in something which would bring them more satisfactory returns than Mr., Carnegie's library scheme. Again, Mr. Carnegie is but one in thousands who is willing to pay back, even a small potion of the illgotten gains derived from a system which compels one individual to contribute to the building up of anothers business, which denies the consumer the right to purchase what needs in any market which offers him the best prices for the article he must buy.The results of this system of discrimination are illustrated by a comparison between the tinies before the so-called protective tariff was imposed and now, after more than forty years of its continuous application. Fifty years ago, when tariff taxes were collected for revenue only, the millionaire was as rare as the proverbial "hen's teeth;" now a man who cannot enter that class is considered far from being wealthy. Then the "tramp" was as little known as the millionaire, now the roads are lined with them. During the existence of the tariff for protection the classes have been created, the extremely wealthy and the extremely poor, and the breach has been continually widening between the rich and the destitute, the one built up and the other impoverished by this unjust system of taxation. All this in the name of a boastful "American institution,"" ostensibly in the interest of the home laborer, but which has resulted to his detriment until he is forced to organize strikes and is induced to resort to violence to secure the commonest necessities with which to keep the wolf from his door. The present state of things is the result of the protectiive tariff and was unknown before this system was inaugurated. How long will the American people submit to a system which has brought them only injury, which has been a reflection upon their intelligence, and which, after forty years of application, they aught to be a shamed to perpetuate?
