

HOT AND COLD BATHS

The city council Monday took up the matter of having all streets and sidewalks kept open. Their attention was called to the fact that bushes and weeds and other obstructions are allowed to fill up sidewalks. They are of the opinion that all property owners ought to have civic pride enough to keep the sidewalks around their own premises in a good condition, and feel that where persons will not clean up their own sidewalks on request, the power of the law will be invoked. As a preliminary, this request is published. Cut the weeds and bushes around your property, clear away the obstructions from the sidewalks. No matter what part of town you live in you will be expected to clean up the sidewalks around your property. Do not throw the weeds and bushes into the street, but burn them. Clean up. If the property owners will do this the council will take no further action. But where property owners show no disposition to clean up, the council will take the needed action to have the premises cleaned. Clean up.

#### A New Method.

George Darley, the Voca fine stock farmer, was in town last week and in discussing crop conditions stated that he was farming this year along a new line. He is planting largely of Kaffir corn, and is experimenting with field peas. He has a large crop of each of these crops. The Kaffir corn is in fine shape, the recent rains having come in just the right time to make a big yield. He will cut his Kaffir, and will run it through a cutting machine to chop the stalk into shreds, while the heads he will have ground. The meal and the chopped up stalks will be thoroughly mixed, and this summer be fed to fine stock. Mr. Darley thinks he will have a magnificent feed as a result. He also figures that his peas will pay him better as a feed crop than the same amount of land planted in cotton, and with a great deal less labor. Mr. Darley's experiment will be watched with interest by the farmers of the county and if he proves that peas and Kaffir corn are a better crop commercially, and are as sure as cotton we may well expect to see many of our farmers adopting a similar method. 


