DOINGS OF THE COURT RAILROADS IN CLASH

County Commissioners in Session Five Days Last Week—Bridge Bond Election Ordered.

The commissioners court adjourned Friday after a five-day session in regular quarterly term. In addition to the transactions reported in our last issue the following proceedings were had:

The date for the election for bridge bonds was set for Jan. 15, 1910. The order of election was so worded as to give the voters a chance to vote against the building of any one or all of the three bridges. The amounts specified are \$9000 each for the bridges at Waldrip and Stacy over the Colorado river, and \$12,000 for the Voca bridge over the San Saba. In the case of the first named two it being understood that Coleman county is to pay a like amount toward the construction of each bridge.

The county attorney was ordered to prepare and file suits to enforce payment of convict bonds shown to be on file in the county clerk's office.

County Treasurer H. A. Martin submitted his quarterly report for quarter ending Nov. 6, which was examined and approved. The financial statement showed the following amounts on hand to the credit of the respective funds: Jury fund, \$147.27. Road and bridge fund, \$3342.39. General fund, \$958.55. Court house and jail fund, \$2059.45. Estray fund, \$10.97. Bridge bond fund, \$729.45. Total cash on hand, \$7287.80.

School District No. 29 having on Sept. 29 voted to issue bonds in the sum of \$800 with which to build and equip a school house, the court ratified said election and ordered the bonds issued.

W. D. Cowan was appointed justice of the peace for the Rochelle precinct.

The bond of J. M. Burrow, justice of the peace in the Stacy precinct, was approved.

The McCulloch county school lands, consisting of four leagues in Hockley county, were leased to Ellwood & Arnett for two years at an annual rental of \$1062.72.

The windmill and tank on the courthouse park were sold to M. P. Merwin for \$150, the public well having failed to supply the water needed.

The contract for putting in sewerage and constructing cess pool for the new jail awarded to the Southern Structural Steel Co. for \$375.

Both Santa Fe and Frisco Roads Claim Prior Right to Property in Brady and Lawsuit May Result.

The board of appraisers appointed by the court to act in condemnation proceedings regarding the Frisco right-of-way through Brady was in session the past week. Messrs. John Rainbolt, W. N. White, and Tom Baker comprised the board, and had no difficulty in appraising the Marsden and Nash claims, awarding the former \$1850 and the latter \$1000.

When the Dutton land was reached, however, the board uncovered a nut which it may take the courts to crack. The Santa Fe seems to have purchased or contracted to purchase from the Duttons a strip of land 300 feet wide and perhaps half a mile long and the papers have gone to record. The Frisco has surveyed its route, 100 feet wide, right down the center of this Santa Fe strip, leaving 100 feet on either side. The Frisco claims prior right to the land by virtue of having first made a survey over the property. The Santa Fe of course disputes this claim. The appraisers awarded the Santa Fe damages in the sum of \$1930.00, and Mrs. Dutton in the sum of \$710.

Just what the result of this clash will be remains to be seen. We understand the Marsden claim will be appealed to higher courts.

PECAN CROP \$25,000

This Season's Crop of Nuts, While Light, Brings Nice Sum of Money to the Brady Country.

The pecan crop is turning out better in the Brady country than anyone at first thought possible. There have been four cars shipped to date, another one ready to go, and the nuts bought and those shipped by local freight will run the total for the season up to seven cars. So the local dealers say.

A car of nuts consists of 30,000 pounds. The average price paid the producer has been about ten cents per pound. The nuts are bringing more than that now, but at 10c the seven cars will figure up \$21,000 paid the producer for this season's crop. The total will very likely exceed that amount and go to \$25,000.

Before the nuts began to ripen local dealers expressed a doubt as to there being a single car shipped from Brady this year. The result has been a surprise to them, though the crop is still far short of average. But \$25,000 is some little pin money and will go far towards proving that "every little bit helps."

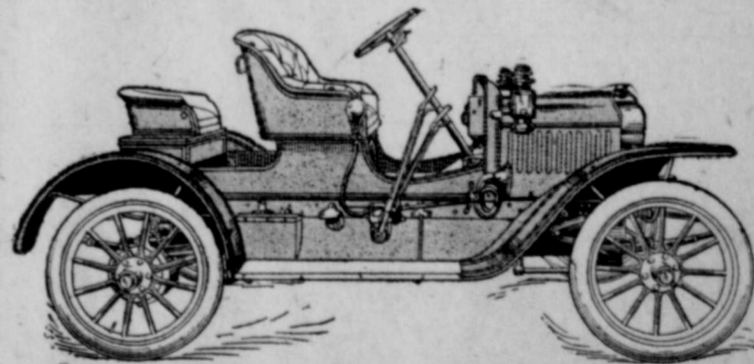

EDITOR MAYES FIGURES

Estimates That Brady Creamery Will be Able to Pay Brown County Farmer's \$35,000 Per Year.

The Brownwood Bulletin has the following pertinent remarks to make regarding Brady's new creamery plant:

The Bulletin a few days ago contained an item to the effect that a citizen of Winchell was in Brownwood inquiring into the prospects for a creamery, and stated that he was satisfied that Winchell would furnish such an enterprise the cream from 75 to 100 cows. Our business men appear to think a creamery is a matter of too little concern to interest them and despite the Bulletin's admonitions of several months are allowing neighboring towns to get ahead of them in this matter and draw the trade that could as well have been turned to Brownwood. Take the Winchell item as an illustration; even with no more than Mr. Smith suggested, and time would increase that many fold it would mean not less than \$6,000 a year in business for Brownwood that the town does not now get. Add to this an equal amount from some half dozen other towns that could be named that would certainly do as well and there would be the nice sum of \$95,000 a year paid out here for cream to people of the surrounding towns, to say nothing of the business that would be originated around Brownwood, whereas without the creamery it all goes abroad and depletes the circulating medium that much. Other towns are apparently quicker to see this than is Brownwood and quicker to act. Brady has contracted for a creamery, so has Ballinger, and Coleman is now figuring on one, while Brownwood is doing nothing. There is no danger of overdoing the business and making creameries unprofitable through too much competition. In Kansas and many other states there is a creamery at nearly every station and all that are properly conducted are prosperous. Here is what the Brady Standard says of the Winchell situation:

"Mr Smith's attention is directed to the fact that Brady has organized a creamery company and will be in a position to serve the Winchell trade in a few months. Brady is very few miles further from Winchell than is Brownwood, and Mr. Smith and his neighbors can ship their cream here just as cheaply as to Brownwood, and more conveniently, for trains run more nearly right coming this way. The Brady creamery will have a capacity which will enable it to handle the cream from all the cows that can be scared up, so the good people of Winchell, Mercury, Milburn, Rochelle and other points may rest assured of a ready market and highest market prices if they will milk cows and ship the product to Brady."

Unless Brownwood gets interested in this matter, small as it may appear, the farmers around Brownwood will, in less than a year, be shipping large quantities of cream to Brady and Coleman and other points and the loss to the town will be large. Already some are shipping to Belton from here and are making money with their cows. Railroads are good things, but it is just as important to look after the smaller enterprises that cost comparatively little and produce such large returns to the town.

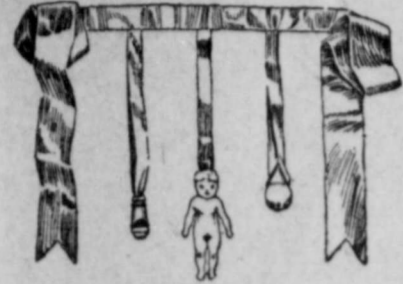

big brothers and sisters' example and write out a list of the desires of his heart for Santa to gratify. On a venture just try how his highness will like a toy belt. It is made of a piece of two inch satin ribbon long enough to fit about the waist comfortably and to tie in an attractive bow in the back with long ends. The portion that is supposed to go around the waist of the infant is doubled over to form a belt, from which hang pendent from satin streamers a whistle—silver if money is not a consideration—a rubber doll and, on the third end, a small play ball. The belt is then completed.

String Doll.

Easier to make than the rag doll and much more hygienic, for babies have the bad habit of putting things in their mouths and the paint on rag dolls is often poisonous, is the string doll. It is evolved from quantities of heavy

This is one of the prettiest new ideas in connection with the infant's layette and makes a charming Christmas gift. Inside the box is fit-



ted with a round, scented lining of silk, and the top of the lid is finished in the same way. Gathering the silk in rosette fashion and catching up the ends in the center of the lid with a rosette of baby ribbon is a dainty touch to the box.

Baby Bibs.

A baby cannot have too many bibs, and there is nothing a mother appreciates more than gift bibs for her baby. A pretty bib is made of sheer lawn, embroidered with the transparent embroidery which consists of catstitch done on the wrong side of the material for the flowers and simple outline stitch for the stems and scrolls. MONEY IN BROOMCORN

A Never Failing Demand for Broomcorn Keeps the Prices High for the Product at All Times.

The Standard sees no good reason why there should not be a lot of broomcorn raised in the Brady Country each year. Broomcorn is a plant similar in nature to kafir corn, maize and sorghum. It is a drouth resister, and will make good yields under the most unfavorable circumstances. It is easily cultivated, easily harvested and commands a price which will make the farmer more money than cotton, corn, or any other one crop. Recent press dispatches have reported the sale of broomcorn at prices from \$100 to \$210 per ton.

Below we print an extract from an Amarillo paper relative to the success of a Panhandle man in growing this crop. If broomcorn or any other crop will do well on the plains it is a sure thing that it will do as well or better in these sections of the state. The article says:

"Casting about for a crop in which there is money—plenty of it and surer than wheat or oats and as sure as the 'rough feeds' for which this country is so widely noted," said A. J. Lundegreen, of Amarillo, "caused me to take up the growing of broomcorn. The experiment proved a success. Not a mediocre success, but one of the permanent and satisfactory class.

"If I were to tell all the details of success of the broomcorn industry perhaps there would be many who would doubt, but after experimenting with it I have this to say as to its worth. It will easily average \$20 per acre in broom stock alone. To illustrate this I will say that I am now offered 9 1-2 cents per pound for all that I have on hand. I have refused this offer for the very reason that I am operating in this city a broom factory and use all the stock I have.

"This year I am planting between four and five hundred acres and to show those interested that I am not weak-kneed about the proposition after a try-out of four years, I will say that I intend to plant fifteen hundred acres next year. The dwarf

variety is the kind to plant, and it is as easy of cultivation as kafir corn, maize or sorghum. It is not difficult to harvest and the seed, of which there will be a yield of twenty to twenty-five pounds, make fine feed and may be used in connection with the broomcorn fodder which I always save. The livestock not only eat the seed, but the fodder and keep in fine shape on it without the addition of other feed. I keep seventy-five cows and operate my dairy industry without the introduction of any other grain or roughness. The seed is crushed in order that the best results may be obtained from the feeding.

I have planted as late as July 20, and was rewarded with an excellent yield. From the time of planting to that of harvest is about eighty or ninety days.

"As an additional reason for the immediate planting of this valuable crop, I would offer the fact that practically all of the warehouses of the country are empty and five years will be required for the filling. The fact that I have been offered the sum of 9 1-2 cents per pound for my present supply indicates the greatest demand for stock upon which to operate factories. Forty tons will be required for operating my factory at capacity from

now until September 1. The sum of \$7,200 is the price of my stock at the figures offered.

"It seems to me," concluded Mr. Lundegreen, "that any man who has intelligence to hold title to land could see from the foregoing that there is money in growing broomcorn and that he could have his feed extra for his trouble. The growing or the failure to grow my crop by my neighbors of the Panhandle cannot in any way effect me. I expect as a matter of fact to grow stock for my own factory, with perhaps a little to spare, and I am urging the general planting of it for the good of the planters as a whole. My factory is a success. I sell my output as fast or faster than I can turn it out. The demand is increasing steadily. Many factories over the country have suspended operations for the very reason that they have no stock upon which to operate."

Mr. Lundegreen's farm and dairy are three miles northeast of Amarillo. Those who are skeptical regarding the manner in which this venture was carried on and proved profitable, are invited to take a run out and see for themselves. The sleek fat cows and other livestock offer evidence conclusive of the worth of the seed and fodder of broomcorn as fed by Mr. Lundegreen.

The amount necessary would be about \$1000.00 or \$1250.00

RECEIPTS OF COTTON

Brady Had Received at the Two Yards Up to Monday 9,500 Bales of This Season's Crop.

Up to Monday morning the cotton receipts at the public yard and the Farmers' Union Warehouse showed a total of 9,500 bales weighed of this season's crop. The Brady Compress reported having pressed 4,700 bales. The freight office records showed that 6,881 bales had been shipped, as against 11,759 up to the same date last year. Agent Hundly reports that over one-third of the shipments so far have been flat; that is, cotton not pressed and unsold, being shipped on consignment by farmers who are holding for higher prices.

At the public yard Monday the total receipts were 6769 bales, of which about 1800 were still in the yard. At the Farmers' Union Warehouse the receipts were 2,740 bales, of which about 1,000 were still on hand.

A study of these figures will show that the receipts to date have been in the neighborhood of 10,000 bales. The Standard interviewed a number of prominent cotton men, and the consensus of opinion seems to be that Brady will receive this season somewhere between 15,000 and 20,000 bales, the majority of the buyers placing the estimate closer to the 15,000 figure.

The staple is about all gathered from the fields, but there is still lots of cotton in the country unsold. In a recent ride of several miles west and northwest of town the editor saw scores of bales of cotton piled in the yards of farmers. At one farm we counted nearly forty bales, and nearly every farm shows a few bales still on hand.
