

### EASY TO ENUMERATE

Applicants for Positions of Census Enumerators Not Required to Pass Rigid Examinations.

Nat M. Washer, of San Antonio, has been appointed Census Supervisor for this district, the 14th Congressional, and the following will be of interest to those expecting to make application to him for places as enumerators:

Washington, December 27 .-Any person of good judgment, who has received an ordinary common school education, can readily and easily pass the test to be given applicants for census enumerators' places on Saturday, February 5th, the date finally set by U. S. Census Director Durand, according to an announcement from the Census Bureau today. This will be a comforting assurance to the several hundred thousand who are believed to be contemplating application for the places.

It was emphatically stated at the bureau that the test will be an eminently reasonable and practical one, similar to that applied to applicants at the Twelfth Census. It will consist of filling out a sample schedule of population from a description, in narrative form, of typical families; and, in the case of enumerators whose work will be in the rural districts, they will be called upon to fill out an additional sample schedule of agriculture. from information furnished by the Census Bureau.





### EASY TO ENUMERATE

Applicants for Positions of Census Enumerators Not Required to Pass Rigid Examinations.

Nat M. Washer, of San Antonio, has been appointed Census Supervisor for this district, the 14th Congressional, and the following will be of interest to those expecting to make application to him for places as enumerators:

Washington, December 27 .-Any person of good judgment, who has received an ordinary common school education, can readily and easily pass the test to be given applicants for census enumerators' places on Saturday, February 5th, the date finally set by U. S. Census Director Durand, according to an announcement from the Census Bureau today. This will be a comforting assurance to the several hundred thousand who are believed to be contemplating application for the places.

It was emphatically stated at the bureau that the test will be an eminently reasonable and practical one, similar to that applied to applicants at the Twelfth Census. It will consist of filling out a sample schedule of population from a description, in narrative form, of typical families: and, in the case of enumerators whose work will be in the rural districts, they will be called upon to fill out an additional sample schedule of agriculture, from information furnished by the Census Bureau.


