## A BROWNWOOD KILLING

Conductor Chas. Whidden Shot to Death in His Caboose by Cecil Keeble of Austin.

Brownwood was the scene of a deliberate murder last Wednesday night when Cecil Keeble, of Temple, got off the train and hunted up Chas. Whidden, a freight conductor, whom he found sleeping in his caboose. Keeble called out to know if Whidden was inside, and being answered in the affirmative stated that he had a note for Whidden, whereupon he was admitted to the caboose. Whidden was in his night clothes and Keeble asked him to strike a match that he might read the message. When the match flared up Keeble began shooting, five shots being fired and all taking effect. Whidden died a few hours later, after making a sworn statement to the effect that he barely knew the man who shot him and had done him no wrong. Keeble surrendered to the officers with the statement that he came to Brownwood purposely to kill Whidden, and that his defense would be the "unwritten law."

Whidden leaves a wife and one child whose home is in San Angelo. Keeble is a single man. Both parties stood high in their respective towns.

## ROAD FROM THE NORTH

R. A. Love, Who Built the "Sunflower" Road, Wants to Build from Abilene Through Brady.

Brady is squarely up against another railroad proposition this week. R. A. Love has submitted a proposition to the railroad committee through its chairman, W. D. Crothers, to build a road from Abilene, through Coleman, Brady and Llano, San Antonio being the objective point. Mr. Love's proposition is that the first four towns named shall subscribe for \$750,000 worth of the bonds of the proposed road, give rightofway and depot grounds. The bonds are the 6 per cent article, 50 years, with option of redeeming same in five years. The \$750,000 thus subscribed is to be paid in installments of 15 per cent as the road is completed. San Antonio has been asked for \$400,000 on same basis.

Mr. Love is the man who built the "Sunflower" road from Miles to Paint Rock. Just who is behind him in this later venture is not yet known here, but it may be a Santa Fe proposition, although that is simply a guess. That he built one road is a fact, and that the proposed road covers a fine territory and is one that will eventually be built by someone, is another fact.

A mass meeting was held Tuesday afternoon and Chairman Crothers was authorized to appoint a committee of five to go to Coleman today to meet with a like committee from Coleman, another from Llano and another from Abilene. This was the request made by Mr. Love, and it is expected that at this meeting the details of the proposition will be threshed out.

It is stated on good authority that Coleman has already agreed to take \$200,000 of the bonds. Coleman wants the road. Llano wants the road. Brady has got to have it.

The committee from Brady will be as follows:

W. D. Crothers, F. M. Richards, G. V. Gansel, G. R. White and D. F. Savel.

Pork on Foot Continues to Go Up and \$8.55 per Cwt. was Paid on Ft. Worth Market Last Week.

And still the price of pork on foot climbs skyward. On the Fort Worth market last Thursday a load of Oklahoma hogs sold at \$8.55. This was the second time since the new year dawned that the hog record on that market was broken, and \$9.00 hogs are now confidently predicted.

The hogs sold were not strictly choice, only weighing 219-lbs, and it was stated that heavier hogs of the same class would have brought a dime more.

Kansas City's top for the same day was \$8.65, St. Louis' \$8.75, and Chicago's \$8.85. Packers confidently assert that the day of the cheap hog is over, and that high priced pork has come to stay.

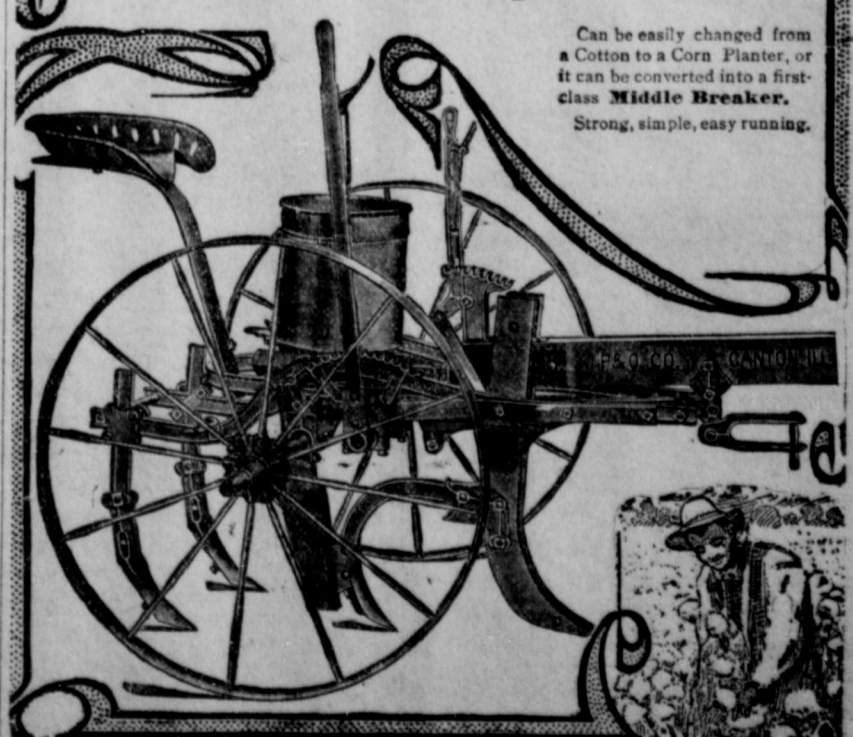

### THAT TRADES DAY.

The big trades day advertised for last Saturday seems to have been a failure, and there can be but one reason, namely: The affair had no organized head. No preparations had been made, other than the securing of the premiums, and Brady, without any commercial club, or other organization to take charge of the matter, simply "fell down." It might also be said that the farmers, too, showed a lack of interest in the matter; however, there were some here with entries to make in various of the contests, and with a proper management the trades day could be made a big success in this city.

Credit is due to the promoters of the town lot auction sale for their effort to establish the trades day feature. They secured the premiums and advertised the feature widely and well. That was all that could reasonably be expected of them. The fault lies simply in Brady's lack of organized effort. We need a commercial club to take charge of such things. No one man has either the time or the interest to accept the management of such a proposition, and the failure simply emphasizes the deplorable fact that Brady has no commercial organization.

What are we going to do about it? Shall we continue in this state of stagnation? Is Brady so well satisfied to accept the good things handed her on a silver platter by a munificent fate that she shall ever continue in the rut, while other towns more alive to their interests put on their running clothes and outstrip us in the race for supremacy?

AND once again—"pay your poll tax."

FOR Heaven's sake, let's organize a commercial club!

DON'T forget the election Saturday, but go to the polls and vote for the bridge bonds.

FIFTEEN more days after today in which to pay your county and city poll tax. Get busy!

DO YOU want better bridges and roads? Then vote for the bridge bonds Saturday, the 15th.

UNLESS you pay your poll tax by Jan. 31st you had just as well be a Mexican or a Hottentot. You simply can't vote without a receipt.

The San Angelo Standard suggests the organization of a Central West Texas Press Club. The suggestion is a good one, and such an organization would redound to the interests of this section of the state.

WE ARE in receipt of the "Texas Almanac" for 1910, published by the Dallas News. The book is a valuable one in many respects, but its chief value lies in the large bulk of information concerning Texas which it disseminates to the world at large. The Standard believes a better name for this annual work of The News could have been secured, but a "rose by any other name," etc.

## THE BRADY CREAMERY

Creamery Plant Was Completed Last Week and is Now Ready for Business.

The plant of the Brady Creamery was completed last Friday and was accepted by the Executive Committee, representing the stockholders, after a thorough testing out of the machinery.

A reporter of The Standard paid a visit to the plant Monday and was shown through the different departments by Mr. L. L. McKean, superintendent of construction for the Hastings Industrial Co., who installed the local plant. The creamery is located in the western portion of the town on the Marsden property and is owned entirely by local capital.

The building in which it is housed is a very substantial frame, the main portion of which is 24x32 feet, with a boiler and engine room 12x24 feet, with 12 foot ceiling throughout. Everything in the way of machinery necessary for conducting a thoroughly up-to-date sanitary creamery has been installed and is now ready for operation. The milk and cream from the customer's wagons are received at a window located on the north side of the building and a sample of it is placed in a bottle on which is the customer's number. A slotted iron disc with a corresponding number is given to the customer which he places in the automatic skim milk weigher in order to receive his share of skim milk. The milk, as it is received at this window, is first turned into the cream separator where the cream and milk are separated, the milk being conveyed by a large chute into a 300 gallon vat and the cream carried by a pump across the house into a big churn having a capacity of 1600 pounds of cream at a churning. The skim milk is then conveyed by means of another pump into a 400 gallon vat, from which it flows through pipes into the automatic skim milk weigher, where it is delivered to the customer.

When fourteen samples of milk from a customer have been collected it is taken to a steam turbine milk tester, by means of which the per cent of butter fat it contains is ascertained. This machine will not only show the amount of butter fat, but also the quantity of water contained in the milk. The presence of water is found by placing in a glass graduate 17.6 centimeters of milk and 17.5 centimeters of sulphuric acid and putting this into the turbine, which has a speed of 800 revolutions per minute, and allowed to remain for about two minutes. The action of the acid on the milk separates it from all the water and when taken from the turbine the acid will be found in the bottom of the graduate, the milk above it and the water, if any, on top and the exact quantity of each is shown.

The power for the plant is furnished by a six horse power Atlas engine, made especially for the creamery business, and a 10 horse power boiler. The plant is also equipped for

the manufacture of ice cream and this will be made one of the important departments of the business.

The thing about the plant which impresses one most is the thorough cleanliness throughout. None of the milk or the product is touched by human hands, but is handled, from beginning to end, by machinery, which is cleaned by steam and hot water jets.

The local committee has nothing but the highest praise for Mr. McKean and his work here and state that they are more than pleased with the plant. One member of the committee stated Monday that Mr. McKean had done his work very thoroughly and that it was up to contract and more, putting in several items not called for in the contract.

P. J. Martin, a member of the executive committee, stated Monday that the stockholders of the company would be called together within the next few days for the election of officers, and as soon as this was done the company would be incorporated and begin business. He asked that the farmers be urged to support this institution and that by doing so he was sure that they would find it profitable to them.

The Standard claims the distinction of having begun the agitation for a creamery plant here and is glad to see visible evidence of the result of its labors in this direction.

He intimated, however, that the extension might be built immediately.
