MURDER CASE ON TRIAL

Bob Corbell on Trial in District Court This Week on Charge of Killing Willie Dean.

The second week of the February term of the District Court convened at 1:30 Monday afternoon, Judge John W. Goodwin presiding. The criminal docket for the term taken up and the case of the State vs. Bob Corbell, charged with the killing of Willie Dean near Voca in the southern part of the county last March was called for trial. Both the state and the defense announced ready for trial and the selection of a jury from the special venire of 72 men which had been ordered, was begun. The entire afternoon was taken up with this matter, the twelfth jurymen being selected at 5 o'clock. The jury selected is as follows: D. C. Pence, W. H. Cowser, J. R. Stone, B. B. Gabbert, W. A. Newton, J. B. Holmes, N. B. Embry, C. O. Thornbloom, H. J. Baker, J. G. H. Lang, A. F. McCoy and J. A. Smith.

Court did not convene until 1:30 Tuesday afternoon on account of the illness of Judge Goodwin and a meeting of the local bar was called for the purpose of electing a special judge to serve in his stead, with the result that Judge J. I. Rice, of Brownwood, was selected.

Both sides in the case present a strong array of legal talent and every inch of ground is hotly contested. The prosecution is in the hands of District Attorney Walter U. Early, who has associated with Judges J. O. Woodward, of Coleman, and Joe A. Adkins, of this city, while the defense is represented by Judge C. H. Jenkins, of Brownwood, assisted by F. M. Newman and J. E. Shropshire, of Brady.

More than 100 witnesses have been summoned in the case, but not more than half that number were put on the stand. The introduction of the testimony required little more than a day, and was completed at a late hour yesterday afternoon.

Judge Adkins opened the argument for the state yesterday afternoon, and each side was allowed four hours for the argument. The case will go to the jury late this afternoon.

LATER—At 4:40 o'clock this afternoon the jury, after a few minutes deliberation, returned a verdict of "not guilty."

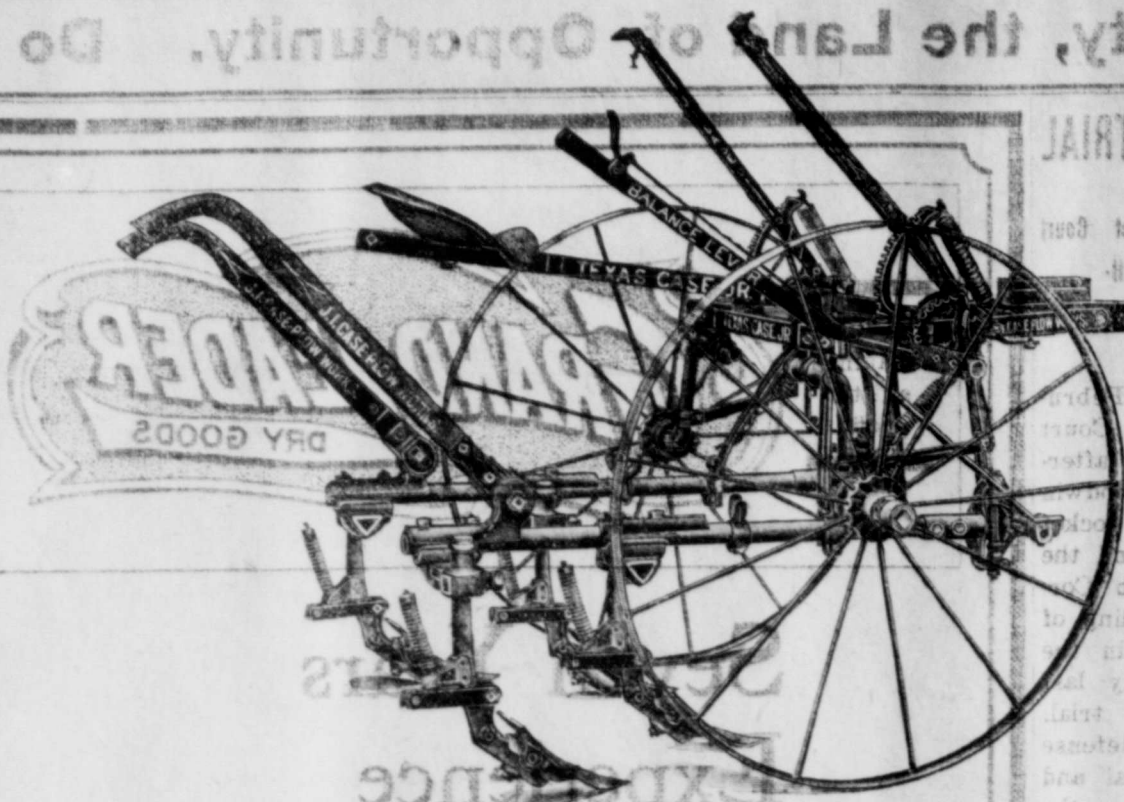

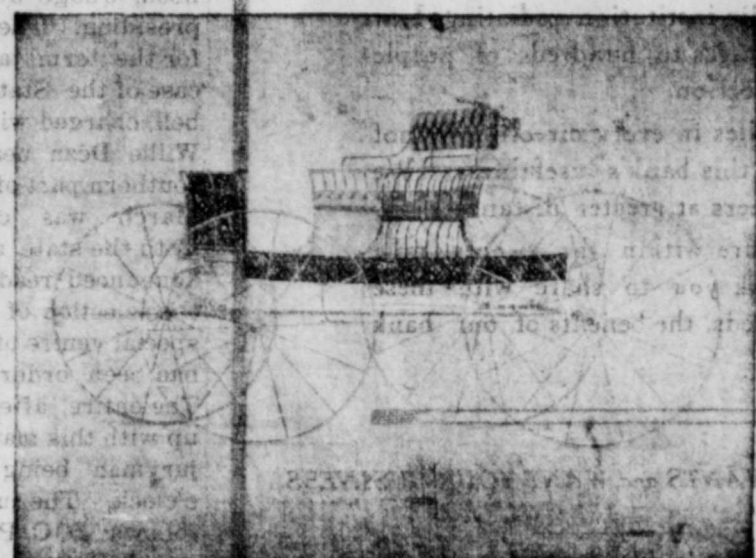

Gentlemen: It is with great regret that I find on examining the papers from McCulloch county, that only three passed, though I need nine for the county. I have no one for the city of Brady and I need two—the balance being for the country districts.

The three assignments I have made are as follows:—One at Rochelle for the district between the Brady-San Saba and Brady-Brownwood road—one at Melvin, for the district between the Brady-Eden and Brady-Menardville road and one at Fife, which will take in the north-west corner of the county to the Colorado river. As before stated, I need two enumerators for the city of Brady, one for the district between the Brady-Santa Anna road and the Brady-Brownwood, in which the town of Mercury is located and one for the district north-west of Brady between the Brady-Eden road and Brady-Santa Anna and one east of Brady between the Brady-Fredonia and Brady-San Saba and two districts on the south of Brady.

TO GET DIVISION POINT
 Conductor Fitzgerald Thinks 'Brady Will Ultimately be Made Division Point for Frisco.'

For some time there have been rumors afloat to the effect that the division point would be moved from Brownwood to Brady, but the rumors could not be confirmed. It is announced now that the matter has been postponed indefinitely, which practically means that such a move is impractical. This information comes through B. J. Fitzgerald, who was in Fort Worth Sunday and who was in conference with General Manager W. B. Drake. Mr. Drake admitted that the matter of moving the division point had been discussed, but said it has now been postponed indefinitely. Brownwood Bulletin.

Relative to the above The Standard editor interviewed Mr. Fitzgerald Tuesday. He stated that the statements as made were substantially correct. Mr. Drake having informed him that the matter had been postponed, for the present at least, though he did not know what action might ultimately be taken.

Mr. Fitzgerald added, however, that it was only a matter of time until the division point would be moved to Brady. Just how long it would be he could not say, of course, but that such action would finally be taken was a foregone conclusion. Mr. Fitzgerald is an old and valued employe of the Frisco, and while not in an official position, still his long acquaintanceship with the road and its officials puts him in a position to know some things. The fact that he is investing his money in Brady business property, even now completing one of the best business blocks in the city, is ample evidence that he has faith in his own convictions regarding the future of the town from a railroad standpoint. There can be little doubt but that Brady will ultimately be the division point.

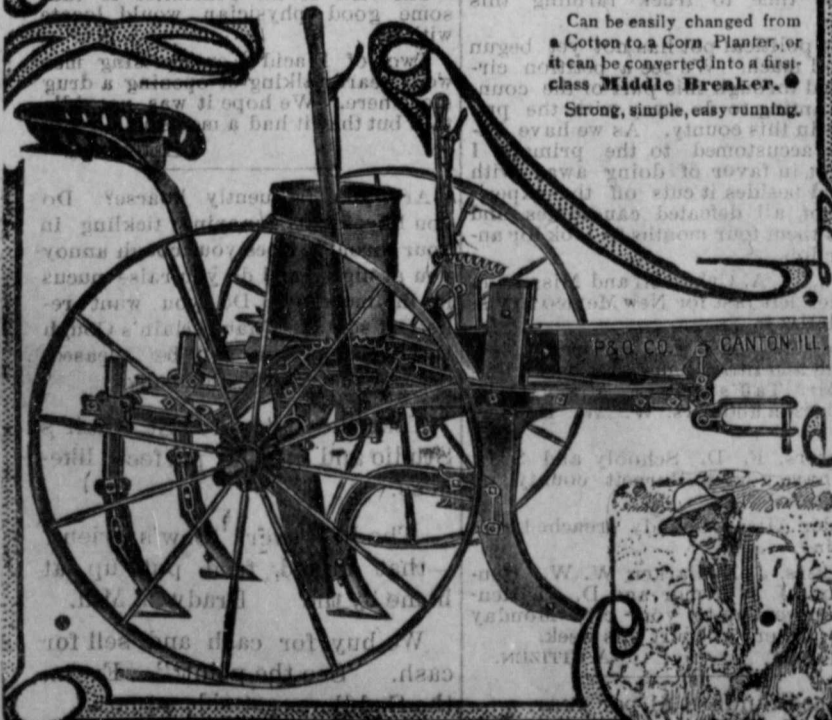

IS HERE FROM BRAZIL

T. B. Taylor, a Native of Brazil Here to Visit—Talks of Conditions in That Country.

T. B. Taylor, Bahia, Brazil, has been here this week visiting his uncle, A. R. Crawford, Mr. Taylor had agreed to deal of interest to tell of the great nation in the continent south of us. Many of our people have little conception of the immensity of Brazil. Mr. Taylor was in the employ of an English banking corporation there, his duties calling for service in the city of Sao, Paulo, in the southern portion of the country. Later he was sent to Manaus, a city on the Amazon river in the northern portion. The distance between these two cities is over six thousand miles. He was stationed for a time in Rio Janeiro, the capital of Brazil, a modern city of over a million inhabitants. This city, he declares, is the most beautiful in the world.

It was interesting to hear him tell of the great Amazon river, two hundred and fifty miles wide at its mouth. The city of Manaus, nearly a thousand miles up the river, is the center of the world's rubber market. The river at this point is one hundred and five miles wide. Think of a river as wide as from here to Dublin!

Mr. Taylor was born in Brazil, but has spent over half his life in the states. He was educated in Richmond, Va. His father, Dr. Z. C. Taylor was a Texas educated man, and sent from here to Brazil, as the second missionary of the Southern Baptist Convention to that country. His mother, Mrs. Kate S. Taylor, was a sister of our fellow townsman, A. R. Crawford, and was educated at Salado, in Bell county. They went to Brazil as missionaries in 1881. Mrs. Taylor died there about eighteen years ago.

The young man served as United States Consul in his home city, Bahia, resigning that position recently to come to this country with his father's family. Thirty years' constant work in that tropical climate has completely undermined their health, and it has become necessary for them to come to this country for rest. It is possible that they may make Brady their home in the near future.

Brazil is the greatest rubber producing country in the world, and the crude rubber, as it comes from the trees, is worth three dollars a pound. Brazil is the greatest coffee country in the world. In the southern portion sugar is raised and a great deal of cotton and cattle. Sao Paulo is the coffee center of the world, Bahia, a city of 350,000, is the sugar market, and the chocolate center of the world. Manaus on the Amazon is the rubber center of the world. Mr. Taylor recently made a trip of nearly a thousand miles into the interior to look at some lands which the firm with which at the time he was connected had recently bought. The purchase consisted of a tract 120 miles wide by 640 miles long and cost the purchaser about six cents an acre.

In the interior of Brazil are millions of acres of virgin country with vast forests of magnificent timber, hard wood, such as the world will soon be demanding for furniture making. The southern portion of Brazil is similar in climate to the southern portions of Texas while the northern interior is very hot and frequently unhealthy.

Bulletin in Error.

The Brownwood Bulletin prints a somewhat sensational article to the effect that the Lometa extension of the Santa Fe will connect with the Frisco at Rochelle, the Santa Fe running its trains from the latter point to Brady over the Frisco track. OUR HIGHWAYS THE WORST

Englishman Declares That He Found No Such Poor Ones Elsewhere.

While on a visit to this country recently Robert H. Jackson of Whitburn Lodge, London, had during an interview occasion to criticize the condition of our highways. Mr. Jackson said: "No country I have visited has such poor roads as the United States. This is surprising to me for if there is any improvement a nation can make that pays for itself it is the building of first-class highways. I spent several weeks in India—at Poona, Bante—and as I am interested largely in farming I made frequent trips through the surrounding country. Some of the roads were six inches deep in dust, and in the winter I doubt not, this dust became mud. How the farmers can get to market with their crops is beyond me. Your roads wherever I have been are generally very bad. In England we have excellent roads, as in other countries of Europe.

"Road building and road improvement are done through the township unit system. Nearly every township has one or more steam rollers and the cost of improving the roads or building new ones is borne by the property owners in proportion to the valuation of their holdings. Most of the modern roads of England have a foundation of brick—not of ordinary brick, but brick of three size. Upon this foundation are placed several inches of soil and on top of this soil a concrete, which is ground into the soil by means of the steam rollers. This makes a first class, durable road that will keep in good condition during all seasons of the year. Over here most of the roads are made by simply turning the turf and grading. At least that is how they improved me."

NEW MODEL HIGHWAY.

Hummelstown Pike, in Pennsylvania, an Example For Road Builders.

A modern road is the Hummelstown pike, near Harrisburg, Pa. It is made of a mixture of water, sand, cement, liquid asphaltum, road oil, carbolic disinfecting powder, sulphate of copper and oil of wintergreen. The sulphate of copper is used to prevent the oils from becoming ignited and the wintergreen counteracts the odor of the others. There is nothing disagreeable about the smell. A curious effect of the mixture is its disinfecting power. During the past year there was not a single contagious disease in that section. The cost of applying the mixture is 5c cents a square yard. The cement holds the dirt together like stone, and the oils make it waterproof, so that it readily sheds water. The road is never muddy and, unlike a tar road, does not become slippery in winter. Frost has no effect on it at all, as the mixture will not freeze. The cost of applying is very small, as it is sprinkled on like water. That this method and the mixture are perfect successes has been shown the past summer. Despite the heavy automobile and wagon traffic, the road is perfectly smooth and very hard, and it has met the test in every way.

UNIQUE GOOD ROADS MOVE.

Rural Carrier in Brenham, Tex., Forms an Association.

William Burnes, carrier for rural route No. 9, from Brenham, Tex., to Independence, is a strong good roads advocate and has some original ideas about the best way to improve the roads.

Some time ago he started an independent movement to get the people along his route to help him keep the road in good condition and asked them to form an organization, to be known as the Good Roads association of R. F. D., No. 9, and to contribute monthly dues to such an organization to maintain a team to work on this road, dragging it with a split log drag or doing such other work on it as could be done by this team, he agreeing, without compensation, to superintend the work.

He sent out circulars to all the people along his route, setting forth his plans, and asked them to join the association.

On one occasion he met a large number that live along this route at Prairie Hill. The association was organized, and Mr. Burnes was elected manager, secretary and treasurer and E. W. Quebe and Carl Marcus directors.

English Highway Policy.

Two points in the recently proposed British bill to provide for the economic development of the United Kingdom, and the improvement of the roads therein are worthy of notice in the United States. The program of the bill provides for special motor roads to be exclusively or chiefly for the use of motorcars, the road board having authority to improve existing roads or to construct new roads for that purpose. The board may acquire land for this purpose by right of eminent domain and may also acquire land adjacent thereto for a width 220 yards distant from the middle of the road, which land they may sell, lease or control, the increment therefrom being used for the maintenance or construction of this class of highways.

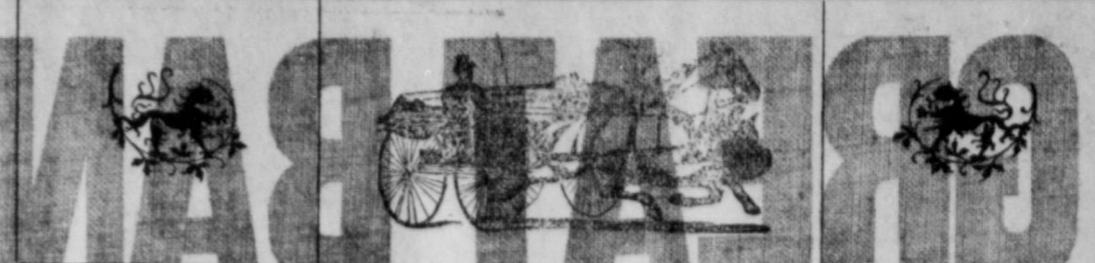
