### Going After More Water.

Mr. Bencini has a force of well drillers at work again on the deep well at the Brady Oil Mill, and during the season of the mill's idleness will go after an inexhaustible supply of water. ## REVIVE GOLEMAN ROAD

Coleman Capitalists Secure Charter for Road from Seymour to San Antonio.

News was received from Austin last Friday that a charter incorporating the Texas North & South Ry. Company. Capital stock of the corporation is \$360,000.00. The incorporators are as follows: W. L. Copson, D. A. Paddleford, L. E. Collins, W. V. Chappin, J. A. B. Miller, W. H. Stephens, J. E. Boog-Scott, W. N. Cameron, R. L. Boog-Scott, J. C. Dibrell.

The charter calls for the construction of a line of railway from Seymour in Baylor county, through the counties of Throckmorton, Shackelford, Callahan, Coleman, McCulloch, Mason, Kendall and Comal to San Antonio.

We are informed by some of those who are interested in the project that the road would be pushed with all haste and no time lost in getting same in operation.

It is stated that the company may after completing this line extend the same on to either Galveston or Aransas Pass on the Gulf and the other end extended north through Oklahoma.

The members of the company are not giving out much information, only saying that now they are in a position to build that long talked of road north and south through Coleman.

The gentlemen interested in the new railroad are out today going over the proposed route. One crowd going north and the other south. We are informed that these gentlemen have the financial backing and are going to push things just as fast as possible, and hope to have a surveying party in the field soon. The proposed road will traverse some of the richest territory in the state and will connect up with Coleman some of the best parts of Texas. It will be a direct and short route to the Gulf and also to the corn and grain counties north. If it is built it will be the making of Coleman and assures for her the brightest future of any town in the state.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

## BANK CONTRACT IS LET

Local Firm of Contractors Will Build the New \$15,000 Home for the Brady National Bank.

Messrs. Wright & Horn, a firm of Brady contractors, have been awarded the contract for the erection of the new home for the Brady National Bank which will occupy a site 50x90 feet on the southeast corner of the square. Work on the excavations will begin in about ten days, and the bank officials hope to be domiciled in their new quarters by the first of October.

This building will be the handsomest business structure in the city. It will cost about \$15,000, and considered with the site the bank's new home will represent an investment of more than \$25,000, exclusive of furniture and fixtures.

The bank building proper will be 30x90 feet, and two stories in height with a basement in which will be located a steam heating plant which will supply heat for the entire building. The additional twenty feet will be one story in height and will be used for a business house. It will be 90 feet deep and will join the bank proper on the east. The cut of the new building shown in this issue shows the entire 50-foot front to be two stories high, but this is an error of the engraver.

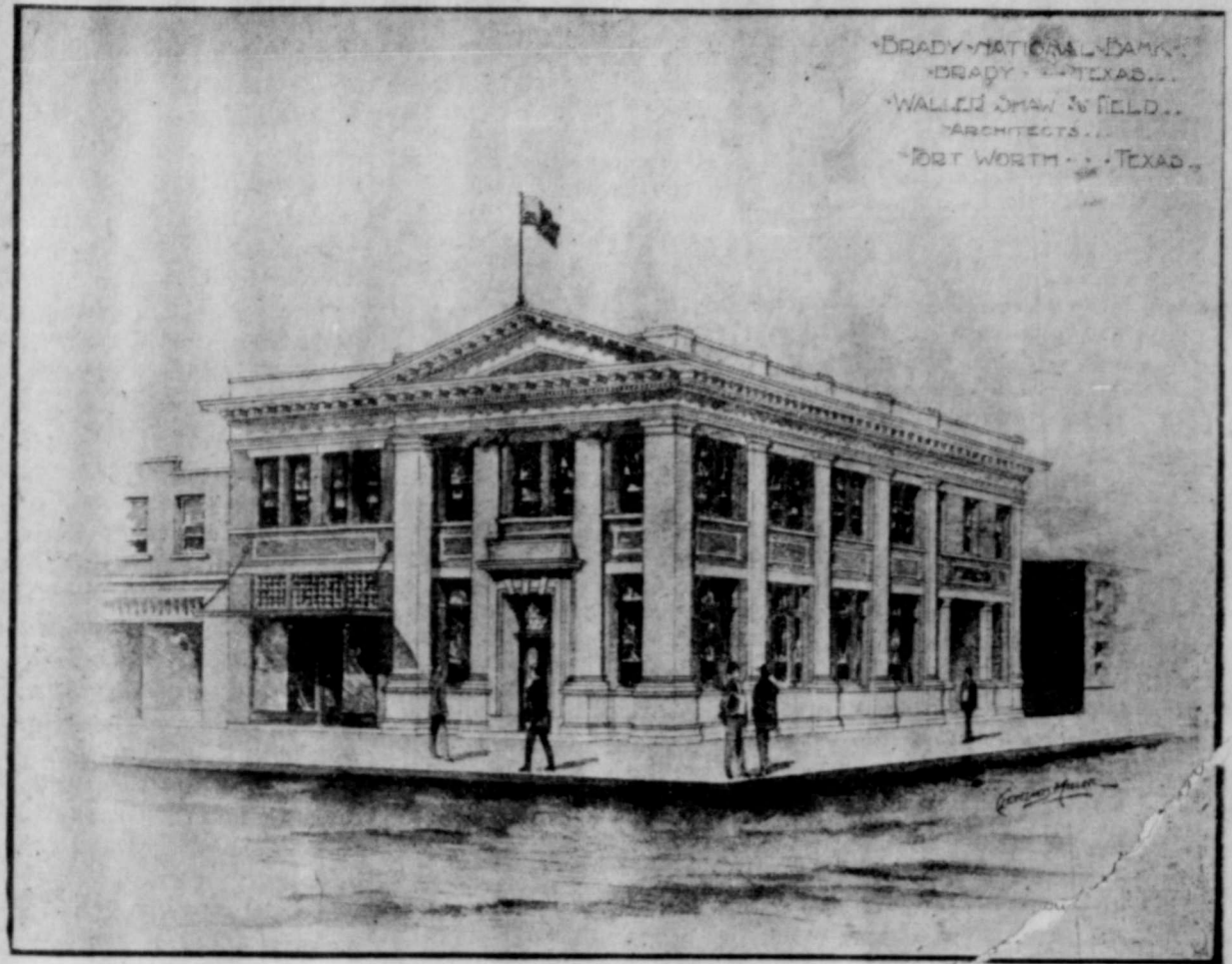
The building will be constructed of cream buff ginger brick, trimmed in gray ginger brick, and the old Colonial style of architecture will be followed. There will be eight suites of office rooms on the second story, all steam heated, and equipped with modern plumbing devices. The building will be the handsomest and most modern in the city, and will occupy the best and most valuable site within the confines of Brady's business district.

This is the second decisive forward step in the affairs of the Brady National within the last few months. On March 1st the capital stock of this bank was increased from \$75,000 to \$100,000, almost the entire additional \$25,000 being placed with the farmers of McCulloch county. So great was the demand for this stock that two or three times the amount could have been placed. The wise and conservative management of the institution has been carefully noted, and the Brady National is not only a popular banking house with its home people but is recognized everywhere as one of the soundest and safest banks in Texas. The affairs of the bank for the past year have been under the direct supervision and management of its cashier, Mr. J. F. Montgomery, and it is a fact patent to the most casual observer that that gentleman has "made good," and in the making the bank has been strengthened and its business increased.

## CITY COUNCIL MEETS FINE RAIN LAST NIGHT---STILL FALLING TODAY

Regular Bi-Monthly Meeting of City Fathers Held Monday—Large Volume of Business Transacted.

The regular meeting of the City Council was held Monday morning at which a good deal of important legislation was enacted, with all the aldermen present, Mayor Conley presiding.

One of the most important matters receiving attention was the appointment of a special policeman for the city. This step was taken by the council primarily, because of the increased duties of the office of city marshal, and to secure a reduction in the key rate of fire insurance for the city. With the addition of this officer the rate of insurance will be decreased about 5 per cent, and considering the amount of insurance in force, it will readily be seen that this was a wise step on the part of the Council. Ed Holmig was appointed to this office at a salary of \$50 per month, and his bond was fixed at \$500.

An order was passed allowing City Marshal Sheridan \$30 per month as a salary for a deputy.

A resolution was presented by Alderman Reagan and passed by the council granting to barber shops and soda fountains the right to pipe waste water into the storm sewers. This water, according to the resolution, must be filtered before going into the sewer and permission to make connection is to be granted by the street committee.

An order for fire hose and reel placed by Mayor Conley was ratified by the council. The following accounts were allowed: Weeks Restaurant, \$6.20; Penny Store, 65c; J. H. Derrough, \$1.50; Brady Standard, \$21.00.

Adjournment was then taken until 2 o'clock, at which time two ordinances were to be considered, one regulating fast driving and the other prohibiting the keeping of hogs within the corporate limits of the city. After considerable discussion, and on insistence on the part of Mayor Conley that immediate action be taken with reference to the ordinance prohibiting the keeping of hogs, both these ordinances were passed under suspension of the rules.

The present mayor is very active in his crusade against existing unsanitary conditions and

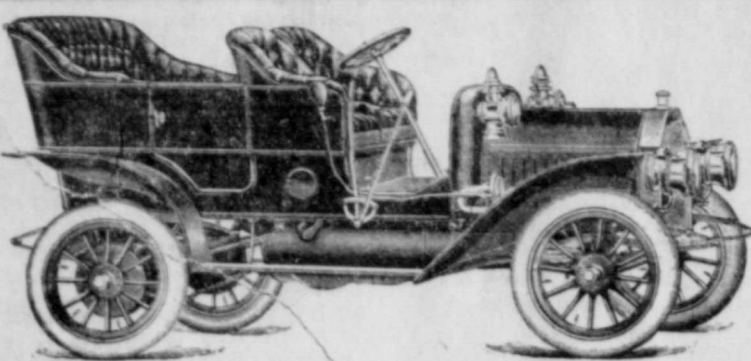

He said the Commercial Club at Brady would make a special effort this year to grade some of their principal streets and hoped to put down many miles of walk. He was content to pattern after Brownwood because he was impressed with the belief that Brownwood had made a success both in street paving and sidewalk building.
