## CALL FOR 30 PER CENT

Railroad Committee Held Session Tuesday and Transacted Business—Want Cash to Buy Rightofway.

Following a meeting of the Railroad Committee held on Tuesday, notices are being mailed now to the subscribers to the Santa Fe railway bonus calling for the immediate payment of 30 per cent of all subscriptions to that fund. The notice states that the money is needed for the purpose of paying for the rightofway already contracted for and to be contracted within the next few days.

At the meeting Tuesday field notes of the survey from Brady to the east county line as adopted by the Santa Fe were exhibited, and communications were read from the railroad officials asking that the committee secure the closing of rightofway contracts and Chairman Crothers was instructed to choose a committee and proceed immediately with the work.

The call of 30 per cent is made in order to get the cash to pay for the rightofway. About \$8000 has already been paid out for rightofway, and the original estimate of \$30,000 as cost of rightofway is still thought to be right. The contract between the road and Brady is for a bonus of \$45,000, rightofway and depot grounds, no part of the cash bonus to be paid until the trains

The committee also discussed a rumor which has been circulated throughout this section during the past several weeks relative to the Santa Fe tapping the Frisco at or near Rochelle and running their trains into Brady over the Frisco track, and the Committee desires to have this rumor corrected, and authorizes the statement that the Santa Fe officials have not only never intimated to the committee any such intention, but on the contrary are even now urging the committee to close up the rightofway details so that construction work can proceed along the route surveyed and adopted. This feature is further treated in the editorial column of this issue of The Standard.

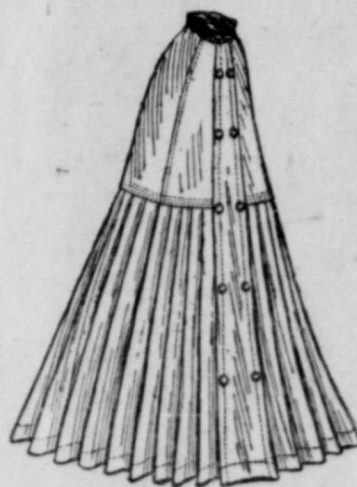

The Santa Fe has made its survey and has furnished the Brady Railroad Committee with field notes of the exact route necessary to be had, and the committee has already bought a part of said land and is now engaged in procuring the balance in compliance with said contract. Furthermore, the Santa Fe officials have never in any manner indicated to the committee that they had any intention of using the Frisco track into Brady from Rochelle or any other point, but on the contrary have lately been urging the committee to close up the right-of-way contracts as quickly as possible, which will be done within the next few days. We trust the Bulletin will give this statement the same publicity it has accorded the groundless rumors herein corrected.

### A MONSTER PLOW.

Designed For Ten Horses, It Took Fifty to Move It.

What is said to be the largest plow in the world was made some years ago at Bakersfield, Cal. This plow was the result of the ingenuity of a ranch superintendent who had authority to make improvements, but not to introduce steam plows. The superintendent had grown very tired of preparing 3,000 acres of land for wheat with ordinary nine or twelve inch plows drawn by two horses.

He argued that if two horses could pull a twelve inch plow six inches wide and that eight horses could pull a plow forty-eight inches wide, and being clever with his pencil, also made drawings and sent for blacksmiths and machinists to construct a plow on his principle.

Some simple folk told him that his great plow would not work, but they contented themselves with saying this dogmatically without giving any mathematical reason therefor. So the superintendent went on with his plans.

The blacksmiths and machinists finished the plow in due time. The share was made to cut a fifty inch furrow. The top of it reached five feet above the ground to give room to throw the earth. The beam was more than a foot thick, but the machine was constructed to run between two great wheels, so that it could be turned around easily, and on the axle between these wheels was the seat for the man who was to drive the ten horses which were hitched to it.

The plow was brought to the great field, the ten horses were attached to it, the handles were raised, the driver mounted his seat, and the team was started. But as soon as the share struck well into the ground the horses stopped short. They were stuck fast. And yet the plow had not gone too deeply into the earth. But it was evident that they could not pull the plow. More horses were brought out, but not until fifty were attached did the plow move along.

Even then it required four men to hold the handles in order to keep the plow in the furrow. It was an economic failure.

Then the superintendent, through the intervention of some one who was a better mathematician than he, learned that he should have cubed the capacity of his twelve inch plow every time he doubled the width of it.—Harper's Weekly.

### MOUNTAIN HEIGHTS.

May Be Measured by Means of an Ordinary Thermometer.

Heights of mountains or of airships can be measured by means of an ordinary thermometer. The greater the pressure of the atmosphere on the surface of water the greater temperature it takes to boil it. As we rise in the air less and less pressure of the air occurs, and water will boil at a lower temperature than 100 degrees C. (212 degrees F.). It has been figured out that for a few miles up for every thousand feet of ascent water will boil a degree lower. Thus if at the bottom of a mountain water boils at 99 degrees C. (210.2 degrees F.) and at the top at 98 degrees C. (208.4 degrees F.) the mountain is a thousand feet high.

In government and other scientific work extremely delicate thermometers are used. They are long, so that the scales may be divided into fractions of a degree. The entire instrument for the work is termed a thermobarometer, or hypsometer. It consists of a small metallic vessel for boiling water, on the inside of which are placed these delicate thermometers. Ganot says that the accuracy of the height of a mountain can be obtained within ten feet by means of these instruments. It is probably not quite that accurate, as the pressure of air does not decrease uniformly as we ascend. Nevertheless it is a good adjunct to the surveyor taking largely variable profiles.

Of course the ordinary instrument for taking heights without actually measuring them is the barometer. This is open to the same objection as the thermometer, for its height depends on the pressure of air, which does not decrease uniformly. However, it can be graduated to an empirical scale to tell the heights and in that case shows accuracy.—Chicago Record-Herald.

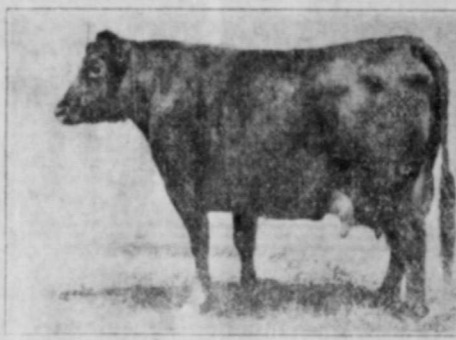

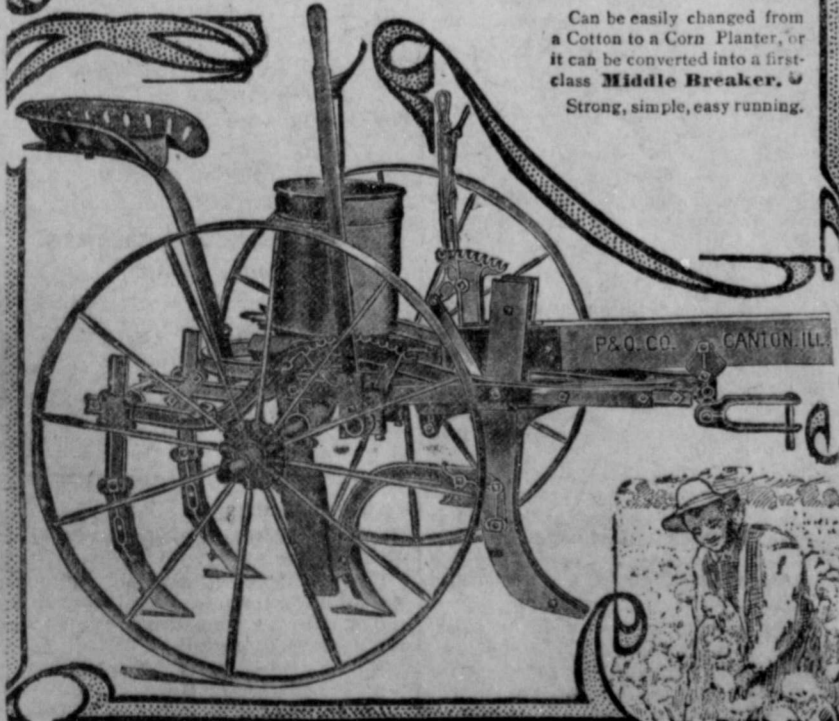

### Employs Surveyor.

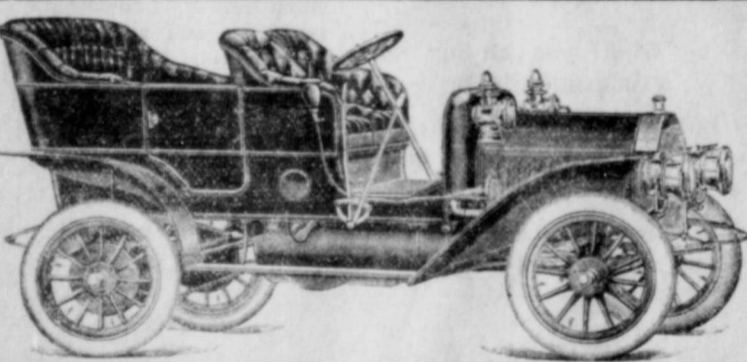

# RECENT CATTLE SALES SAN ANTONIO WINNER

Many Cattle Changing Hands in West Texas and Prices are Uniformly Good This Spring.

Oscar Appelt, who recently bought a big ranch near Sonora, writes Alfred Reissner of this city, that he has sold his steer yearlings at \$17 around, everything from ten months old up being counted. He is also selling some old cows at \$18, and expects to reduce his holdings somewhat. He reports everything in fine shape, and is well pleased with his investment. Mr. Appelt expects to buy property in Brady and make this city his home, stating that he thinks Brady is the coming city of this section of West Texas.

The San Angelo Standard reports the following sales: Wm. Watson of Lometa bought 125 head of 3 and 4-year-old steers from Jessie Cargile at \$29. Mr. Watson has bought more the \$90,000 worth of cattle in the past few weeks. Seaton Keith, of San Angelo, bought 1100 stock cattle from Thos. McCall of Eden at \$29 around, and 300 cows from G. E. Baugh at \$20. Willis Huey sold 600 cows from the Keith pasture to H. C. Campbell at \$21. J. I. Chambers bought 200 steer yearlings from Jackson Bros. of Eldorado at \$17. C. E. Springton sold to Dunlap & McGowan of Baird, 40 mule colts at \$66 around, or \$2840.

W. J. Lewis, of Clarendon, has bought 18,000 head of the famous Spur cattle from the Swensons, and has leased the Spur ranch, 438,000 acres. The consideration was nearly \$500,000, and Mr. Lewis will make the ranch headquarters at the new town of Spur, maintaining the original brand. This is one of the most important cattle transactions of recent years.

The champion car lot fat steers at Fort Worth last week sold at \$11.25, and champion single steers at \$12.25, a new record price. The champion Johnson steers, 450 head, sold for \$45,000, the greatest sale of fat cattle ever made in the United States.

At the stock convention Fred Flemming of Dallas sold 3770 stock cattle in Cottle county to James McAdams, the consideration being nearly \$100,000.

Mr. Watson of Lometa bought 380 steers from Ellis & Phelps of Pecos county, at \$30, and 1000 head of stock cattle from Dave Parker of Crockett county at \$16.

## THINKS MINE IS FOUND

J. T. Morgan Uncovers Old Shaft—on  
Ranch Near Menardville—Signs  
of Miners' Work.

Brady, Texas, May 18.—J. T. Morgan reports having uncovered what he believes to be the famous Bowie mine on his ranch near Menardville. On a hillside in a very rough place he found a peculiar depression in the ground. His interest was aroused, and he began to dig into it. It proved to be a cave or shaft in the ground, which had been carefully covered up at some ancient period. He has now cleaned it out for a distance of some thirty feet down, and about fifty feet laterally. On the inside it shows to have been originally a natural split in the rocks, which has been worked out by human hands. Ancient bones were found in the shaft, and a glass lantern globe was also found in the debris at the bottom of the shaft. W. H. Withers has opened up a similar shaft a few hundred yards from this, and in it were found eight human skeletons. It is about three miles from these shafts to the old dam and furnace on the San Saba river, ruins of which have been one of the sights of Menardville since the town was first established.

The history records that during the time of the Spanish occupancy of Texas during the eighteenth century there were rich silver mines in this neighborhood. The hostility of the Indians became such that after Mexican independence the mines had to be abandoned. In 1835 James Bowie fitted out a party in San Antonio to reopen the mines. His famous fight with the Indians in what is now in the

southern part of McCulloch County, and his agreement with the Indian chief to abandon the search of the mine and to return home unmolested, is an incident in Texas history. With the advent of civilization, and the departure of the Indians from this country, the lost Bowie mine has been sought by many, but never found. The old furnace where the ore was roasted, the old Spanish dam across the river, are there, and one of the ancient cannon used for the defense of the camp, together with a number of old mining tools, have been found in the river and near the old furnace. No doubt has ever been entertained as to the Spaniards having found paying mines in this neighborhood, but the Indian secret has to this time been well kept. If the shafts being opened by Messrs. Morgan and Withers are the old Spanish mines, it will be a rich discovery for this country.

Prof. O. H. ## ADVICE ON TAR MACADAM ROADS

### Suggestions For Constructing Highways of This Material.

#### MUCH DEPENDS ON LOCALITY.

Highway Engineer Should Be Consulted and Given the Data Bearing on the Problem—Topography of Country and Traffic Should Be Studied.

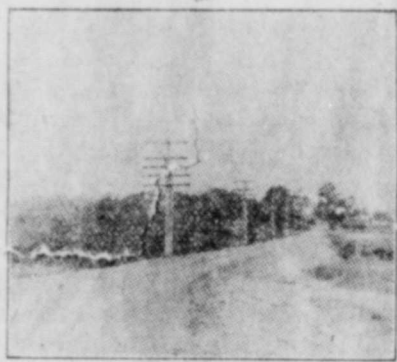
As many industrious members of various rural communities are anxious to receive information as to what kind of tar macadam roads to build, an expert authority on road construction and maintenance gives the following valuable advice:

The proper determination of what kind of tar macadam road to build in a given locality could only be made by a competent highway engineer in possession of all the data bearing on the problem and preferably by an examination on the ground.

Leaving for the moment the matter of cost out of the question, the selection of a suitable method of construction and of materials best adapted thereto depends upon so many factors that no choice is possible without thorough study of the surrounding conditions. This would include a knowledge of the location of the road, its grades, the topography of the country through which it runs, the climatic conditions and especially of the traffic to which it is subjected.

A construction that would give satisfactory results in one section of the country, might be entirely unsuited to another section, and in the same manner materials used successfully in a warm climate might fail in one where extreme cold prevailed during a part of the year.

When, as is almost always the case, low cost is the controlling consideration, still other factors are introduced into the problem, and still more data are required for its proper solution. The question then becomes one not of building the best possible road, but of building the best possible road that can be built for the money available. While it is not a simple matter to answer the first question, yet it is com-

paratively simple as contrasted with the second, and it is just here that the services of a specialist are indispensable.

It is seldom that the available funds are sufficient to pay for the best possible road, and it is necessary to sacrifice in the construction to keep within the limits of the available funds. Such weighing of cost and quality and the final decision as to what is the best and most economical procedure require not only careful thought, but also a thorough familiarity with the whole subject of road building and maintenance.

There are many road binders composed principally of tar, besides the several tars themselves, that are employed in road building. Their use has been attended by both success and failure, neither being necessarily an index of the value of the material, for the selection with due regard to conditions to be met and the manipulation in the actual work affects results fully as much as any inherent qualities of the materials.

As in most work of a similar nature, the best results are to be expected when a material and method of construction are chosen which have given satisfaction in a case similar to the particular one under discussion; hence in the last analysis the most reliable information is to be gained from service tests of roads subjected to the same outside influences as that which is to be built.

**Remove the Mud Tax Burden.**  
No plan for spring work is complete which does not include dragging the roads. If this is attended to at the proper time it insures good roads for the season and removes the larger share of that awful burden, the mud tax. In this matter the towns and cities are equally interested with the farmers, and their co-operation is not generally hard to secure if the matter is handled rightly. Road dragging is one of those things that must be secured through co-operation if widespread benefits are to be enjoyed.

**Prosperity Follows Good Roads.**  
You show me any community in this or any other state where there are good roads, said a speaker at a good roads convention, and I will show you a community where there are no paint-finished buildings or tottering lean-tos, a community where there is the air of prosperity, thrift and progress.

## Waterways

We have 400 miles of gulf coast and 2,000 miles of inland waterways susceptible to navigation. The cost of transporting freight over the waterways is 2 mills per ton per mile.

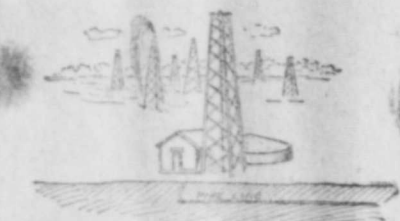


2 Mills Per Ton Per Mile.

This method of transportation is cheaper than either railroad or public highways. The principal cost of public highways is in constructing and maintaining the roadbed, and the same applies to railroads, but nature furnishes a level roadbed for the vessels and the government maintains the waterways. The improvement of our rivers and harbors will greatly lower the cost of transportation.

Pipe Lines.

We have 1,500 miles of pipe line in transportation service leading from the oil fields to our refineries, and

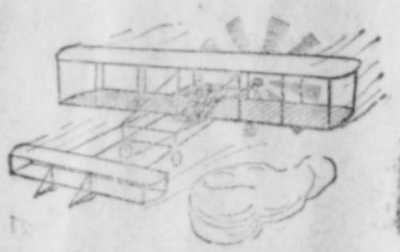


several hundred miles of pipe lines in the refinery yards.

Pipe lines are primarily city builders. The pipe lines bring the oil field to the refinery and the gas well to the city and the factory, and reduce the cost of transportation as well as provide a feasible method of distributing the product of the oil and gas wells throughout the State.

Aerial Navigation.

We have no airships in transportation service in Texas. This character of transportation, while experimental, is nevertheless important, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association.



The perfection of airship will greatly reduce the cost of transportation. The same plane furnishes the roadbed for aerial navigation and affords a fast and universal distribution of trading facilities. All people are vitally interested in inventions. Robert Fulton, by giving us the steam engine, reduced the cost of transportation in Texas from 43 cents per ton mile (public highways) to 1 cent per ton mile on the waterways. Improved machinery reduces the cost of transportation in all lines of traffic, and consequently increases the value of production.

Rochelle Records.

While drilling for water on his farm near town, C. C. Curry struck a strong vein of gas at a depth of about 100 feet. It is not known now just what may develop, but Mr. Curry says he intends going further and either getting plenty of good water or plenty of gas.

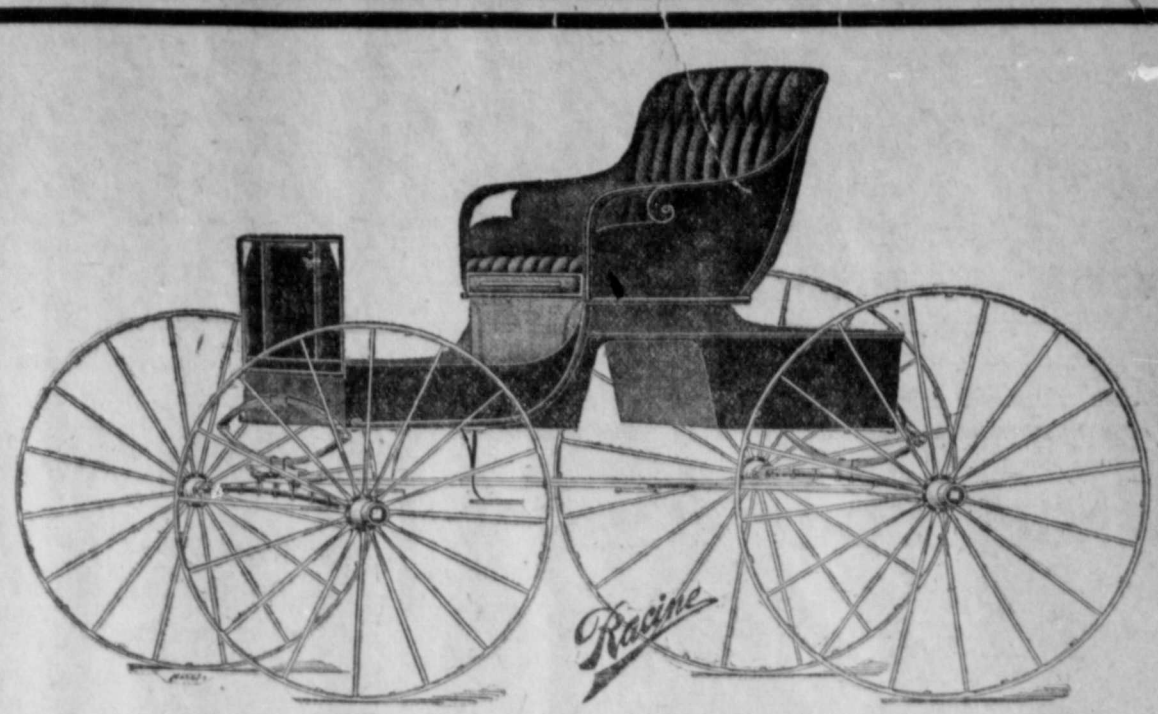
The Bank of Rochelle has ordered new fixtures for their bank, and they will be installed as soon as the bank gets into its new quarters.

Of course, it takes a two-third vote to bring about such conditions, but the public is interested and no better time than the present could be found for the election. Let's get busy.—Llano News.

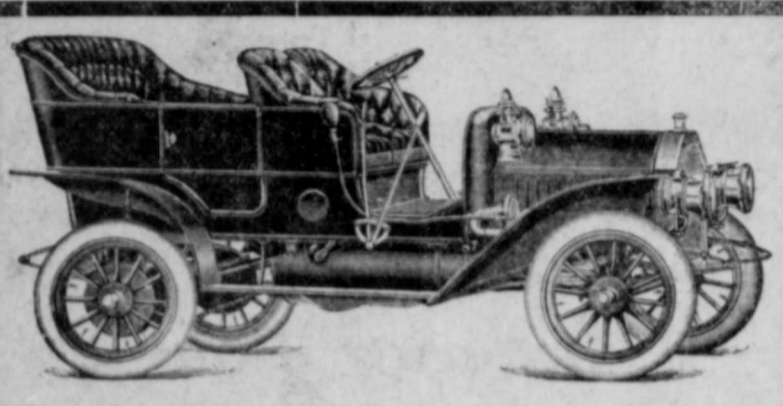

### COMMERCIAL CLUB NOTES

By The Secretary

The Commercial Club has succeeded in landing the wholesale and retail electrical supply house for Brady. Messrs. Ungrin and Forster, the former from New York, the latter from Oil City, Pennsylvania, are the gentlemen who will have charge of this business. These gentlemen are also expert wiremen and will take contracts to wire. As soon as they receive their supplies, they will give a public exhibition of not only their stock, but will demonstrate the workings of the electric iron, the electric cook stove and heater, and in fact several other displays of this character.

Mr. Bordenough reports that, with other parties, he will open up a canning factory for Brady sometime in June. The prospects for an immense fruit crop in this county were never better, so it is reasonable to suppose that a small factory of this kind will be a good thing for Brady.

We are glad to report that our committees are actively engaged in investigating conditions and preparing the work coming under their jurisdiction. The R. R. committee, with Chairman Hundley, has secured rates for our spring races to be held May 26 and 27, and has received word from Supt. Drake of the Frisco, that electric lights for the depot will be put in.

Our good roads committee, with Chairman Joe Matthews, is preparing the bond issue petition for the grading and graveling of the roads leading into Brady.

The sanitation and health committee, with Chairman Dr. Granville, is busy looking into the health and sewer conditions of Brady.

The matter of an up town telegraph office is being investigated by the Western Union officials in St. Louis.

The names of about five hundred prospective home seekers have been placed on the files of the secretary's office, and descriptive folders of Brady and McCulloch county will be mailed to them this week. Any one wishing this literature to mail out to friends and acquaintances will be supplied by calling at the secretary's office in rear of First State Bank.

A number of our citizens are showing great interest in the work of the Commercial Club, and are actively working for its good.

The Club now has 270 members, 70 more than Amarillo, a city of 15,000 people. If each member will work to secure one or more new members within the next week, it will not be impossible for us to have a larger club than Abilene, Stamford and San Angelo. Suppose we get extra busy and pass them inside of the next week.

The directors of the Club, on last Saturday, instructed the Secretary to contract for an exhibition space 12 1/2 by 16 feet at the Dallas State Fair which will be held October 15 to 30. Forty-seven counties of Texas have already spoken for space in the exhibition hall. One million people will view the different exhibits; so all the citizens of McCulloch county can see the importance of making this a fine showing for our county. Something like several thousand pieces of descriptive literature of McCulloch county will be on hand to be given to those who wish it.

The Santa Fe R. R. reports that it will be ready in a short while to go to work in the settling up of this section. The officials of this road have written for literature descriptive of this section. The Frisco is already at work advertising McCulloch county, and is working up several northern states to secure im-

### MATHEMATICS.

Used to Locate an Aerolite That No One Had Ever Seen.

Arithmetic, algebra and trigonometry are not romantic, but they may accomplish things which greatly impress the imagination. By means of them a professor at Yale university found a few years ago an aerolite that no one had ever seen.

It appears that a photographer in Ansonia, Conn., was occupied in taking pictures by the aid of a telescope of a comet which was invisible to the naked eye. When his negatives were developed one of them revealed the fall of a meteor. It was too small an object to attract the attention of the unaided eyes, but its line on the photograph indicated that it must have come to the earth.

The picture was shown to an astronomical professor at Yale. Ascertain the point of observation and reckoning with the aid of the data which the photograph itself supplied, he made a calculation which proved that the meteor must have fallen in the neighborhood of a reservoir some two miles north of Danbury, Conn. There the aerolite was found in the very place indicated by the calculation. It was oval in form, measured fifteen and a half inches in length, seven and a half inches in diameter and weighed twenty-six pounds. It was sent to the museum of Yale university, where it serves not only as an illustration of the nature of the vagrant bodies of the skies, but testifies also to the wonders of calculation which it is possible for mathematical science to accomplish.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

### DROPPING ASLEEP.

The Way Mother Nature Charms Away Our Consciousness.

How do we go to sleep? How does Mother Nature charm away our consciousness? First of all she throws her spell on those centers of our bodies that preside over the muscular system, causing one group of muscles after another gradually to collapse. Thereafter various powers of mind succumb in regular order. First we lose attention and judgment, then memory goes, and imagination wanders away in reveries of its own. Ideas of time and space cease to control thought as gentle sleep, the nurse of our life, draws nearer. Then comes the turn of the special senses, beginning with sight.
