## TEST LOCAL OIL FIELD

Brady People in Conjunction With South Texas Capitalists Will Bore for Oil and Gas.

Arrangements have been quietly materializing for the past several weeks looking to a thorough test of the McCulloch county oil and gas possibilities, and The Standard is now informed that matters have progressed to the point where it may be authoritatively stated that work will begin in a short time.

Dr. J. B. Granville was the first to interest himself in the matter, and at the time the Trickham well in Coleman county was brought in he was at work. Since that time he has secured leases on large bodies of land in the northern portion of this county, in localities where all the indications point to valuable deposits of both oil and gas. In fact there are several wells in the territory which have shown unmistakable signs of both oil and gas, and one well on Dr. Granville's farm near Onion Gap yields some very fine samples of pure asphalt. Another well near Lohn has been yielding a good grade of oil.

A stock company of local capitalists is being formed, and this company will have the aid and assistance of several prominent South Texas capitalists, among whom is Otto Von Rosenberg, of Hallettsville. These men will put both money and experience into the proposition, and within a short time will send a man here to investigate—a man well qualified for the work—an expert.

It has been known for years that the whole northern portion of McCulloch county contained valuable deposits of coal, oil and gas, and all the old-timers here are firm in the belief that all the field needs is a thorough test to develop the industry.

Brady and McCulloch county may expect big things as a result of this investigation.

N. B. Embry, manager of the Alfalfa Lumber Co., left Sunday for a business trip to Oklahoma City.

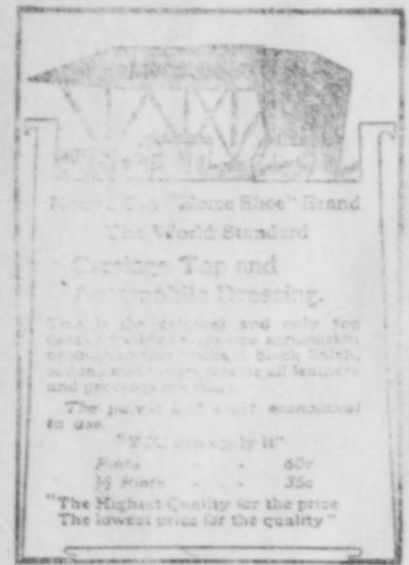

## BRADY NEEDS A PARK.

The courthouse park is a thing of beauty, and one cannot observe it without thinking how advantageous it would be for Brady to have a public park. There are so many suitable spots in and around this city which Mother Nature seems to have set apart especially for park purposes that it would seem strange that Brady has so long overlooked providing a public playground. The land is becoming more valuable every day, and the longer we wait the harder it will be to provide a park. Really, Brady ought to take up the park proposition at once. It would be a good thing for the new commercial club to work on.

## THE PARDONING POWER.

Gov. Patterson, of Tennessee, has announced for another term, and the people of the good old State of Tennessee should now do the rest. They should snow under and bury for all time this daring politician who usurps authority to license crime and to scandalize the State. Gov. Patterson, during his term, has pardoned 965 convicts, of whom 152 were convicted of murder. His record is not only shady, but, as thousands see it, considering all the killers he has turned out to kill again, it has blood on it. In his announcement for re-election, embodying an "explanation" as to why he pardoned Col. Cooper, he presents not even the shadow of a legal excuse. As a lawyer he knows that it is not necessary for a man to do the killing in order to be a murderer. A person in San Francisco can murder another in Boston. As far as evidence of conspiracy is concerned, Gov. Patterson's own evidence, as to Col. Cooper's conduct and threats, taken with the magazine pistol of Robin Cooper and the hunt taken by the two Coopers together, was enough to satisfy the jury and the courts. But, aside from any discussion of the evidence, the verdict of the jury and the judgment of the court are enough. No Governor has any right to go behind these and reverse them all in order to liberate his friend. No man who dares to do it is fit to be trusted by a people who respect themselves and their institution. Gov. Patterson, of Tennessee, by his high-handed usurpation of power in this case, has brought before the people of this country a new question. The pardoning power must be taken away from politicians of his stripe. It must be taken out of politics. It is going to be done.—Dallas News.

## SOME CURRENT COMMENT

BY J. WALKER GREEN

Time and again, I have traveled over Brady territory—McCulloch and adjoining counties—and everywhere I have been the recipient of abundant hospitality at the hands of the best people God ever made, but no where have I met more genuine kindness and lasting hospitality than at the generous and genial home of Ernest Poole and his good little wife. And old Sandy knows them and appreciates them as much as I do, for whenever I get near them and turn his head in their direction, he begins to trot high and pull on the bit, and if over a horse gave unmistakable expression to pleasant anticipation it is them. Mr. Poole has a pretty home, just a mile from the Mercury depot, beautifully situated on a high plateau surrounded by broad and fertile acres. But Ernest has riches far greater than these in the possession of "God's best gift to man, a good wife." Standing by his side, an ideal helpmate, they face life and the world with a confident smile of assured happiness. Whenever I begin to get homesick, and long for the wife and children, I think of Mercury and I could not think of Mercury now without thinking of Mr. and Mrs. Poole, for they are my staunch friends, whose welcome don't wear out. Here I leave old Sandy to rest and feast on the splendid grass until my return, when he is "plum fit" to hit the road again. So it happens, that Ernest and his wife have become closely associated with the thoughts of home to me, and that is about the warmest spot in a man's heart, is it not? Surely there never was a fellow under heavier obligations or one more sincerely grateful and appreciative, than I am to the matchless people of the Brady Country. Ernest has two fads; one is thoroughbred chickens and the other thoroughbred pointer dogs. He has a 500 egg incubator and has already covered the whole hill, with snow-white Plymouth Rocks, and Wyandotts. He has promised to let me have some of the younger ones when they get big enough to out-fight and out-run Brownwood rats. He has six or eight beautifully marked puppies of the finest strain of pointer blood. They are certainly beauties. The parents often follow me to the pasture, when I go to get old Sandy, and in pointing birds they make an exquisite picture, backing each other with fore-foot lifted, rigid as statues; they make me almost envy my good friend, Ernest, and his happy environments. Surely the farm is the place to make life worth living.

I am often asked what I think of the race for governor, and to pick the winner. This latter I cannot do; it would take a prophet of the first water to do that and as I have never attempted the role of Jeremiah I beg to be excused. Of course I have my own conception of the situation, and to those who may be interested as to what it may be will say that—at this distance from election day—the race lies between Poindexter and Colquitt and barring the injection of some factor not now apparent, will continue so to the end. My reasons for this belief seem good to me, and if it be possible that they can be of service in assisting anyone to reach a decision or choice of candidates, I see no good reason why they should be kept under cover. So here goes. The issue is a very old one; hundreds of years; much older than Texas; much older than the United States, dating back to the adolescent days of civilization itself. But I am not going to discuss prohibition; God forbid! Every argument pro and con has been worn to attenuated frazzles long ago. The moral excellence of a temperate life is recognized the world over, and the nastiness, meanness and cruel beastliness of drunkenness, is just as universally and unreservedly condemned. There is absolutely no leeway for discussion as to that. Even the saloonist—the bar-tender himself, despises the drunkard, if not the man at least the weakness and folly of drunkenness. But the issue in Texas today is not prohibition, per se; all of the candidates agree that the traffic in intoxicants should be controlled. The point of divergence begins in the application of methods. Cone Johnson is the fox, cunning and snarling, because he begins to see that the grapes have been hung too high; Davidson is the bear, still hibernating—sucking his paws, living on his fat until it is summertime and safe to come out in the open; Poindexter and Colquitt are the lion and the tiger respectively, have no concealments to make, and are unafraid as they fearlessly roam the political jungle. Cone Johnson's candidacy was predicated upon his opposition to, and abuse of Senator Bailey two years ago, and this in itself is indubitable proof of his aberrant methods of mental procedure, which entirely unfits him for the chief magistracy of the great State of Texas. Not that such opposition

was fatal to his reputation as an able and honest man, because when the fight was ended, there is no doubt he was still held in highest esteem by those who shared his convictions. But when it is remembered that he was defeated with 23,000 votes to spare, it is difficult if not impossible to "catch on" to a process of ratio centem that would give vitality to a hope of victory against the same overwhelming forces, the more especially since his own line-up has been depleted and thinned by desertions to Davidson. Another fatal weakness to the Johnson cause is the untenable position he occupies as a prohibitionist. In voicing his purposes he makes himself ridiculous by proposing a legislative enactment that a very large majority of the most distinguished lawyers of Texas declare would be clearly unconstitutional and therefore inoperative. Then again he advocates a new-fangled local option law, the same law in effect that is now in force, except that Johnson's proposed law like its would-be sponsor, is crawfishy and travels backward. As the writer understands his position he advocates statutory prohibition but would give counties the right to vote whiskey "in" while the option already exists to vote whiskey "out." It seems a distinction without a difference to me. It simply permits voters to choose as to whether they will permit intoxicants to be sold within certain geographical lines just as the existing local option law does. There is another phase of the Johnson program, however, that is much more serious than the local option feature. If the leading lawyers of the state are correct in their construction of the constitution of Texas, statutory prohibition would most certainly be annulled by the supreme court; but the adverse decision would be directed toward the clause of the enactment that prohibited the sale of whiskey, while other clauses, not violative of the organic law, and clearly within the province of the legislature would remain intact; this would include the repealing clause, which would knock out the present local option law entirely and place prohibitionists just where they were in the beginning of the crusade against whiskey.

Johnson, in his Brownwood speech, said that a little bird convinced him of the error of his ways. What a wonderful little bird it must have been; after a quarter of a century of study and debate on the stump, where he was confronted—as the champion advocate of anti-prohibition—by some of the most learned and adroit debaters in the state—among them Senator Bailey himself—whose ability to marshal facts and present arguments in the most attractive and convincing way, left him still obdurate and intractable, but a little bird did the job instantly; on the swing of a pendulum; a bitter uncompromising, militant anti one moment, a mournful, sobbing, repentant pro the next. But such miracles are not unusual with Johnson, they seem to be habitual, if the political history of Texas during the last ten years may be cited as proof. While consistency may be a virtue of fools, it is not an unusual attribute of wise men also; but be this as it may, when a man requires twenty-five years of strenuous quest to discover that he is wrong, he cannot justly be called bright and Johnson has never been called a fool, though his candidacy at this time, under the circumstances, comes perilously near justifying it.

Davidson came out of his hibernating quarters and appeared at Waco last week, fat and sleek, with much pampering of an epicurean appetite and announced most ponderously that the paramount issue in this campaign was not prohibition but the question of meat and bread. I thought he was going to say "oil and trust busting" was the issue but for a wonder he didn't, though I will wager that that issue will be exhibited in all its most attractive aspects before the show is over. But there is no use wasting time and space on Davidson. He is not in it, and won't be except as an "also ran" when the votes are counted. Colquitt and Poindexter are the real racers. There are no evasions, indirectness, compromising tendencies in them; they are strong, virile, positive men, with clear-cut uncompromising policies, that ring clear and true, lending no vestige of doubt as to what they stand for. Colquitt for the status quo; local option as it is now. Poindexter for constitutional amendment or failing in that, for prohibition taxation; both are very able men and aside from the prohibition question—either would fill every wrinkle in the executive chair to the satisfaction of the people. Everything connected with the race indicates a neck and neck heat and an eyelash finish. The man who knows whether there are more pros than antis in Texas can pick the winner. I don't

know. But keep this in mind: There is a 2,300 majority vote to be divided between Poindexter and Colquitt; so the man who wants state-wide prohibition would better vote for Poindexter, and the man who is satisfied with the present local option law should vote for Colquitt. A vote for either Johnson or Davidson, in my opinion, would be a vote thrown away.

### WANTS BROOM STRAW

Eden Broom Factory Now Shipping in Straw from St. Louis Which Could be Raised Here as Well.

J. D. Moody, of Eden, was here last week loading out a shipment of broom straw which he had ordered from St. Louis. Mr. Moody paid \$250 per ton for this straw and was taking it out to Eden to supply his broom factory with material for orders which he is compelled to fill and for which he cannot obtain sufficient straw locally.

Mr. Moody understands broom corn culture and manufacture and says it is one of the best business propositions he knows of. Furthermore, he says the Brady Country will produce as good a quality of brush as any country, the crop is as certain as any other crop and more so than some, and there is a better profit to the farmer than in cotton. He recommends the dwarf variety.

He is operating a small factory at Eden and supplying Brady, Angelo, Coleman and a number of other towns with brooms at a good profit. This year he is planting fifty acres himself and several of his neighbors are planting, while he has supplied seed to parties at Menard and San Angelo. He thinks The Standard is on the right track in advising the farmers to raise broom corn, and says that one-third of a ton to the acre can easily be produced, with very little work. He says he will buy all that can be raised around here at not less than \$100 per ton in the bundle, it not being necessary to bale the straw for local consumption. The price never goes below \$100, and present quotation are from \$210 to \$250.

STOCK RUSH IS OVER FOR A NEW RAILROAD

Frisco Has Handled 1375 Cars of Cattle Out of McCulloch County Since March 23rd.

The annual spring cattle shipment out of Brady to Oklahoma pastures is over. Beginning March 23rd the Frisco has handled up to Tuesday of this week when the last train went out, 1140 cars out of Brady, 160 out of Rochelle and 75 from Mercury, making a total of 1375 cars. This is just about the same number of cars handled last spring. It was thought that shipments would be heavier this year, but just as the shipping season commenced the heavy rains began falling all over the Brady Country, assuring the cattlemen of good grass in their local pastures, and for this reason a great many cattle were held back which would otherwise have gone to Oklahoma.

The cattle shipments this spring represent more money brought into the Brady Country than ever before because of the increased price. While it is hard to get an accurate estimate of the exact amount of money involved it is safe to say that the figures will run considerably over a million dollars.

Twenty-eight cars of fat stock were also shipped this month, the bulk of it going to the Fort Worth market.

Brady Faces Another Live Railroad Proposition from Proposed Seymour to San Antonio Line.

The Texas North and South Railway Company, which was some six weeks ago granted a charter with a capitalization of \$500,000 with prominent Coleman capitalists as incorporators, has made Brady a proposition to build through this city for a bonus of \$50,000, right-of-way through the county and depot grounds in the city.

The proposition was submitted yesterday through W. D. Crothers by Messrs. Dibrell, Boog-Scott and Stephens, of Coleman, who were here on their return journey from San Antonio where they had been to look over the route as surveyed a few weeks ago. These gentlemen state that they have Eastern capital behind them to the amount of \$5,000,000, and that the road will undoubtedly be constructed. It will run from Seymour to San Antonio, the entire route has been surveyed, and tentative contracts have been closed with Mason and Fredericksburg.

A mass meeting was called yesterday to hear the proposition. Mr. Crothers stated the case and a motion prevailed that the same committee which has had charge of the Santa Fe proposition also take charge of this matter, see what could be done and report back to another mass meeting to be called within a week.

The Coleman men stated that when Brady signed the contract with them for this road they would make a bond to live up to their part of the agreement, subject to damages should they fail to make good. This is an unusual agreement for a railroad company to make, and indicates how strong is their backing.

Brady must have this road. We need a north and south road, and having it our future as a city is assured. Brady will then be a distributing point with three railroads to feed from. We will then be in a position to stop giving railroad bonuses, but until we do get this north and south road we will not be in such position.

This proposition can be handled easily. The people of McCulloch county to the north of us will give the rightofway free of charge because they need the road and have got to have it. South of town the rightofway would be through pastures and would not cost a great deal.

Again we say, we can get this road and must do so.

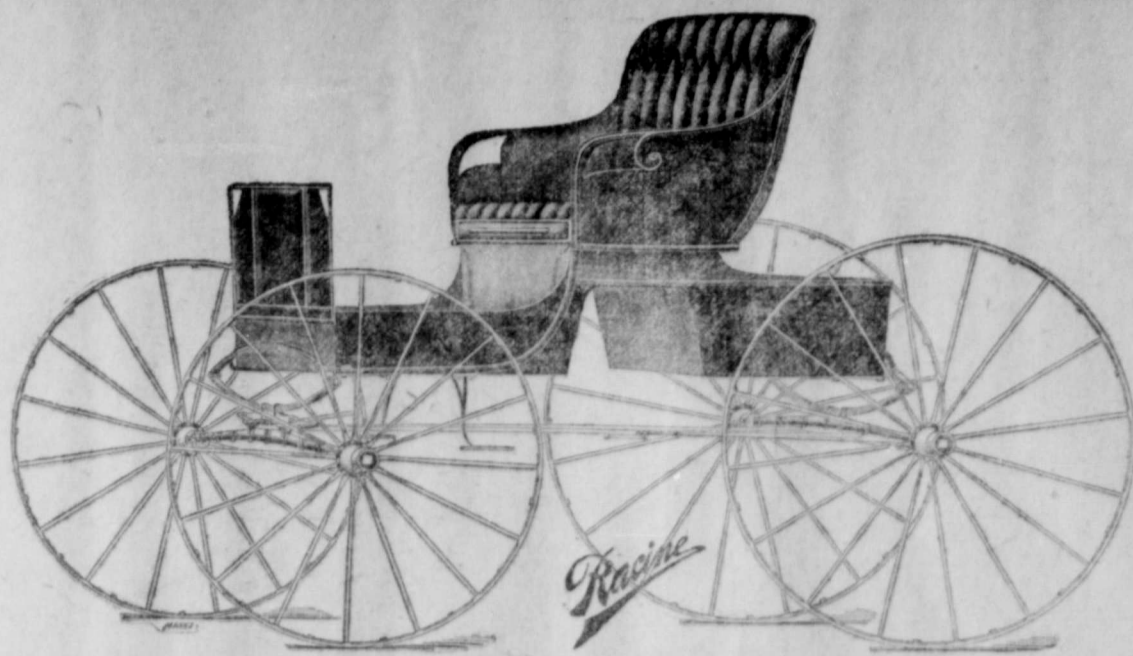

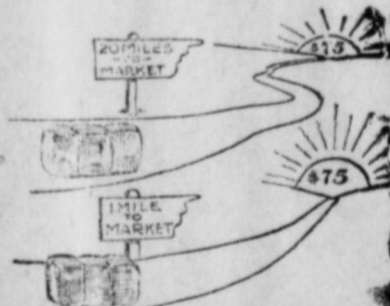
### Railroads

We have 22,000 miles of railroad in operation. The average cost of transporting freight over the railroads of Texas last year was less than 1 cent per ton per mile.



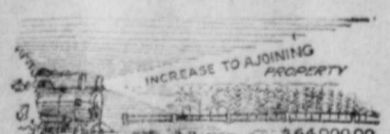
1 Cent Per Ton Per Mile.

Railroad transportation saves 42 cents per ton per mile as compared with public highways, and illustrates the economy of improved methods of transportation. As a producer the farmer who hauls a bale of cotton twenty miles to the railroad gets the same price as the farmer who hauls it one mile, and as a consumer the farmer who hauls his goods twenty miles from the railroad to the farm buys them at the same price as the farmer who hauls them one mile.



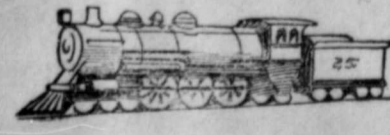
Distance levies a penalty of time and money against the long haul which the farmer must pay.

Bringing the railroad to the farm reduces the cost of transportation and adds perpetual value to future production, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association. A new railroad makes a free and equitable distribution of values to adjoining property estimated at \$54,000 per mile.



Interurbans have practically the same effect on property values as railroads.

Texas has 4.95 miles of railroad per 100 square miles of territory, and Illinois has 21.8 miles per 100 square miles of territory.



The engines shown above represent the relative transportation facilities of the two States on basis of area. To equal Illinois in railroad mileage per square mile we would have to have 52,000 miles, and this increased mileage will provide facilities, cheapen the cost of transportation and develop the resources of the State.

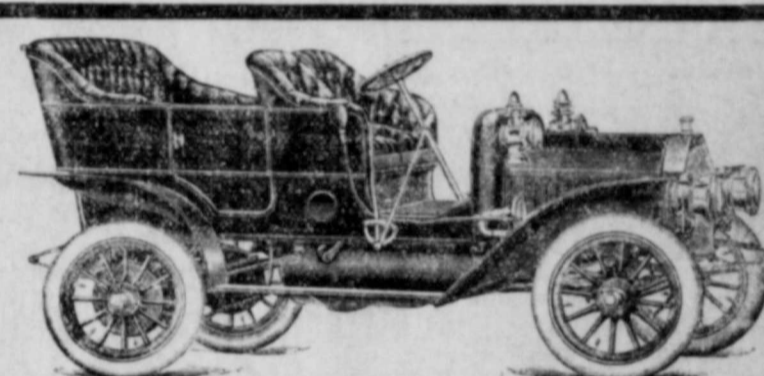
