WIND STORM SATURDAY

Brady Visited by Sudden Storm of Rain and Wind Which Did Several Thousand Dollars Damage.

Brady was visited Saturday by one of the hardest wind and rain storms which has been experienced in several years, and during the hour or more in which the storm prevailed several thousand dollars worth of damage was done in the city.

The biggest loss was at the plant of the Brady Cotton Oil Company, where the immense seed house, probably the largest building in the city, was totally wrecked. This house was a heavily constructed building 80x200 feet in size and tall in proportion. A section of the wall on the north gave way first, letting the wind in, and a few moments later the entire building collapsed, the wreck being complete. The hull house at the same plant was also slightly damaged, and Manager Alfred Reissner estimates roughly that the total damage will amount to \$6000. He says work of rebuilding will be begun at once. The seed house in its collapse killed a horse.

At the Compress a portion of the roof was torn off, damage something like \$100.

The Farmers Union Warehouse was damaged similarly to the compress, with about an equal loss.

The residence of W. N. Roberts in the White addition was blown from its blocks and moved about four feet. In the same locality Mr. McCleary lost a brick flue.

In the Spiller Addition a number of small houses were blown down, among them one belonging to J. W. Ufey whose loss is about \$200. A new frame house in the same locality not yet occupied was also damaged.

One of the big show windows at the Conley Mercantile store was broken.

The engine house at the plant of the Brady Water & Light Co., was somewhat damaged and the smokestack blown down.

Chas. Gray's new barn was demolished.

Both the Vendome and the Air dome were damaged more or less.

Two brick flues were demolished on the Wallace residence on the north side.

There was considerable other minor damage at various points over town, such as outhouses, trees and shrubbery.

The rain accompanying the storm was one of the hardest ever seen fall here and several inches of water must have fallen during the storm period. The rain was not general over the county, yet extended as far south as Voca. Southwest it extended about ten miles. To the northwest it extended about five miles, leaving a dry strip, but further on a good rain fell and Lohn and Waldrip both report heavy rains.

No great damage has yet been reported to crops, but it is thought that there will be some damage to oats which were just about ready to cut. Corn may also be somewhat damaged if the wind was as strong in the country as it was in town. However the rain was needed, and the benefits from the moisture, coming as it did just at the right time, will more than make up for any damage which may later be reported.

ABOUT THE CREAMERY

One of Brady's Most Meritorious Institutions Not Being Accorded a Proper Patronage.

Manager D. J. Marsden, of the Brady Creamery, informs The Standard that the creamery is not getting anything like the amount of patronage from the farmers which it should have. There are about 15 regular patrons of the creamery and every one of them are satisfied with results, finding that they can make as much money off their cows by selling the butter fat to the creamery as they could make by peddling the milk and butter, and without any of the trouble and work attached to the peddling.

Mr. Marsden is also experiencing some difficulty in placing his product after it is made into butter. Local merchants, for some reason, are not handling the Brady Creamery butter to any great extent, although Mr. Marsden declares it is as good a grade of butter as the market affords, and sells at the standard creamery price of 30c per pound to the dealer.

Both of these faults should be corrected. The farmers should patronize the creamery better, and the Brady merchants should handle every pound of butter made as long as the output is as small as it is and the quality of the butter good.

Mr. Marsden says he has no trouble in disposing of his ice cream, and all that he makes goes readily. He is making a good cream and selling it to dealers for less money than they can ship in cream from other points.

The creamery is putting out about 100 pounds of butter each week, which amount The Standard hopes to see multiplied by ten in the near future.

NEW COAL MINING CO.

Dallas Parties Organize Big Company to Develop the Rockwood Field in Coleman County.

That the Rockwood coal field will be developed seems now to be an assured fact, according to press dispatches. The Rockwood field is in Coleman county and lies just a few miles north of the Waldrip coal field in this county, the Colorado river separating the two districts. That there is an immense deposit of coal in both McCulloch and Coleman counties has never been denied, and now that the Rockwood field is to be developed it is certain that the Waldrip field will be looked into sooner or later. The Brownwood Bulletin says:

S. F. Wiles, vice president and general manager of the Lone Star Coal Mining Company, was in Brownwood yesterday enroute to Rockwood from Dallas. Mr. Wiles has just completed the organization of a large company, which will undertake to mine coal at Rockwood, and he informs the Bulletin that work will start as soon as the road builds into that place. Mr. Wiles has leases covering a period of twenty-five years and as much longer as coal is produced in paying quantities. He reports that in the way of developments there are thirty-one holes drilled with diamond drills, and showing 28 to 34 inches of coal, and he figures that the field will produce fifteen million tons of coal and that it will take forty years to mine it at a thousand tons per day.

A comparison of the coal with the other coal produced in Texas shows the Rockwood coal to be richer in carbon and to contain less ash than any of the other well known coals. He submits the report of Prof. E. T. Dumble, state geologist, who says in reference to this field as follows:

"As to the quality of the coal there can be no doubt, nor can there be any as to the possibility of working it. Generally there

is a solid roof, and beneath the coal there is an easily worked bed of fire clay which can be easily removed and in time used in brick manufacturing. The general dip is also favorable to extensive coal mining, and there is practically no danger of faults. For domestic purposes and for railroad use this coal is undoubtedly well suited."

The managers of the coal company point with pride to the fact that the Brownwood Southwestern will soon be operating to Rockwood and the coal can be shipped to the various points at a less cost than the other coal is received. The company plans to install machinery and equip the mines in first class shape.

BRADY TAKES SECOND

Buccaneers Win Handily from Comanche Indians in Friday's Game, Score 6 to 5—Great Game.

Roach hit to Perkins and was out at 1st; Myers struck out; Alexander, the only left-handed batter in the game, hit the first ball pitched for a home run over the right field fence, the first home run of the season on the local grounds; Gray fished at three wide ones, and the Indians took the field.
Roberts hit to Thodburg and was out at first; Gordon was given a life, but was forced at 2nd a moment later when Candy hit to short; Candy tried to steal 2nd, but Roach's whip worked well and he was out. Score 2 to 0 in favor of Comanche.
In the seventh Wetzel went out, Gordon to Hail; Thodburg singled to right center, but Roach fanned and Stewart flew out to Fuller.
Brady got her first score in this inning. Perkins made a valiant attempt to duplicate Alexander's home run, but was held at third, Straub having already gone out Thodburg to Myers; E.
