## CANDIDATES ASSESSED

County Democratic Executive Committee  
Met Monday and Transacted  
Necessary Business.

The Democratic Executive Committee of McCulloch county met Monday according to law at the office of Chairman J. W. Matthews and transacted the routine business set forth by the provisions of the Terrell election law. The committee consists of eighteen members, eight of whom were present. There were nine vacancies to fill which was done in due form.

The matter of arranging for the expense of the primary election was taken up and the candidates were assessed as follows:

Sheriff, \$20 each for three candidates.

District and county clerk, \$15 each for four candidates.

Treasurer, \$20 each for two candidates.

Attorney, \$20 each for two candidates.

County Judge, \$20 each for two candidates.

Assessor, \$10 each for six candidates.

Precinct candidates were assessed uniformly at \$5 each.

Places on the ticket were then drawn, the results being as follows in the list of county candidates having opponents:

County Judge—Walker, Hughes.

Sheriff—Miller, Mayo, Wall.

Clerk—Marsden, Cowan, Yantis, Campbell.

Assessor—Wadkins, Beasley, Espy, Benson, Duke, Quicksall.

Treasurer—Martin, Rainbolt.

Attorney—House, Lea.

Supt. Public Instruction—Baze, Gault.

Commissioner Precinct 1—Wood, Williams.

Commissioner Precinct 3—Finlay, Russell, Smith.

Commissioner Precinct 4—McBride, Henderson.

Justice Peace Precinct 1—Campbell, Lyie, King.

Constable, Precinct 1—Clark, Landrum.

Public Weigher Precinct 1—Allen, Jordan.

The plurality form of vote will determine the nominations in the primary. Precinct chairmen will hold their conventions at 2:00 p. m. on the day of election, July 23, and the number of delegates to which each precinct is entitled will be determined by the ratio of one delegate for each 25 votes or major fraction thereof cast for governor in the last general election. The county convention will be held on Saturday following the primary election.

## EDEN GETS SANTA FE

Contract is Finally Signed and Eden Assured of Railroad—Committee Procuring Right-Of-Way.

Messrs. Lee and Pilger, of Eden, representing the Eden railroad committee, were in Brady yesterday to begin the work of securing the rightofway for the Santa Fe into Eden. They reported that their little city had at last succeeded in getting a contract with the Santa Fe to build there, and their business in Brady yesterday was to secure the rightofway through the town-site of Melvin, which the owners readily granted.

By the terms of the contract Eden pays \$15,000 bonus and supplies about 30 miles of rightofway. These gentlemen leave this morning in company with Hill Sessions to see about securing the rightofway through the Hoskins pasture just beyond Melvin.

It will be good news to both Eden and Melvin to know that the Santa Fe has at last definitely decided to build the line as surveyed some months ago. It assures both towns of ample opportunity to grow and develop. Melvin will make a good town, and we understand that about \$5000 worth of town lots have been sold there in the past six weeks.

### The Baptist Revival.

The revival meeting at the Baptist church is in full swing and a great interest is being manifested. The pastor Rev. W. A. Knight is doing the preaching, and Mr. Herbert Reynolds, of Dallas, leads the singing which is quite a feature of the meeting. The meeting will continue all next week, with services twice daily, and children's choir practice each afternoon at 4:00 o'clock. The general public is cordially invited to attend all services, while the prayers and co-operation of all christians are earnestly sought.

## Increasing Production.

The increase in agricultural production has both an individual and community interest. The farmer is vitally interested in increasing the yield, as it costs no more to cultivate an acre of land that produces two bales of cotton than it does an acre of land that produces one bale of cotton, and the second bale is clear profit to the farmer. The farmers who have followed the advice of our agricultural departments in selecting seed, methods of culture, character of crops, combating pests, etc., have been able to double production. The farms of Texas are yielding an average of \$1,540,000 per day, and by doubling production in that portion of the land now under cultivation we can produce \$1,222,678,000 instead of \$561,339,000 per annum as shown in the figure below.



A concrete example would perhaps be more satisfactory than an imaginary standard, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries' Association, and we will, therefore, compare Texas with Illinois. Our lands are more fertile, our seasons more reliable and our climatic conditions more favorable to farming than in Illinois. In Illinois the average farm contains 124 acres and yields \$1,309 per farm. In Texas the average farm contains 357 acres and yields \$681 per farm. The cut shown below illustrates the growth the Texas farmer must make to reach the Illinois standard.



To build up the Texas farmer we must improve our public highways, build railroads, build factories, open mines, build cities, and otherwise increase our markets and facilities for reaching the market. We must look to our Agricultural Department, A. & M. Colleges, Experimental Stations and agricultural agents to build up the farm and instruct the farmer. These institutions ought to be liberally supported by appropriations and co-operation in their work.

T. J. Bradley this week began taking the assessments for Brady Independent School District. The school board decided to levy their own assessments this year and have employed Mr. Bradley to do the work.

## Civic Improvements.

Some time ago the Secretary of the Commercial Club appointed a committee on "Civic Improvements," said committee to be composed of three of its members, J. F. Montgomery, H. N. Cook, and the writer were appointed, and met at the Queen hotel June 11th, and discussed some of the needed improvements of our city. We wish to make the following suggestions: First, It should be the desire of every one interested in his personal welfare and the general good of the public, to make Brady an attractive place. Next we wish to call the attention of our citizens to the condition of our sidewalks, and on many streets to the entire absence of them. A four or six foot concrete walk not only would add to the convenience of the public, the looks of the property and the beauty of the lot, but would increase the valuation at least fifty per cent. No lot is dead property on your hands where there are improvements and attractions. Concrete sidewalks are live wires to the purse that will always place your home in the first column of real estate values.

Next, we wish to suggest that shade trees add much to the appearance and comfort of any sort of home. There is no cheaper method on earth to improve property than the placing of the right kind of trees about your home. Of course they require attention for a year or so, but the results are always satisfactory.

Again we call attention to the fact that Brady is not making any preparations for any public parks. There should be at least two parks convenient to the city, where the public might gather after business hours are over, for rest and recreation. These parks should have driveways, walks, swings, seats, trees, flower gardens, and plenty of water and lights.

Again, we call attention to the present unsatisfactory arrangements of lots in our cemetery. We trust that a committee shall be appointed at once to take charge of the cemetery, and that they shall place a valuation on each lot, plot off the entire grounds, make at least one street each way through it, hire a regular sexton who shall be paid from the sale of lots, the digging of graves, and a small tax upon each lot sold. Let it be the business of the sexton to keep the city of the dead looking always in good condition.

The beauty of our streets depends much on the condition of bill boards, bulletins, sagging wires, old boxes, waste paper, hitching posts, etc. Our city officers should see that these things are removed.

This article is the first of a series that we shall endeavor to write for the purpose of arousing a just pride in our citizenship for civic improvements and the general good.

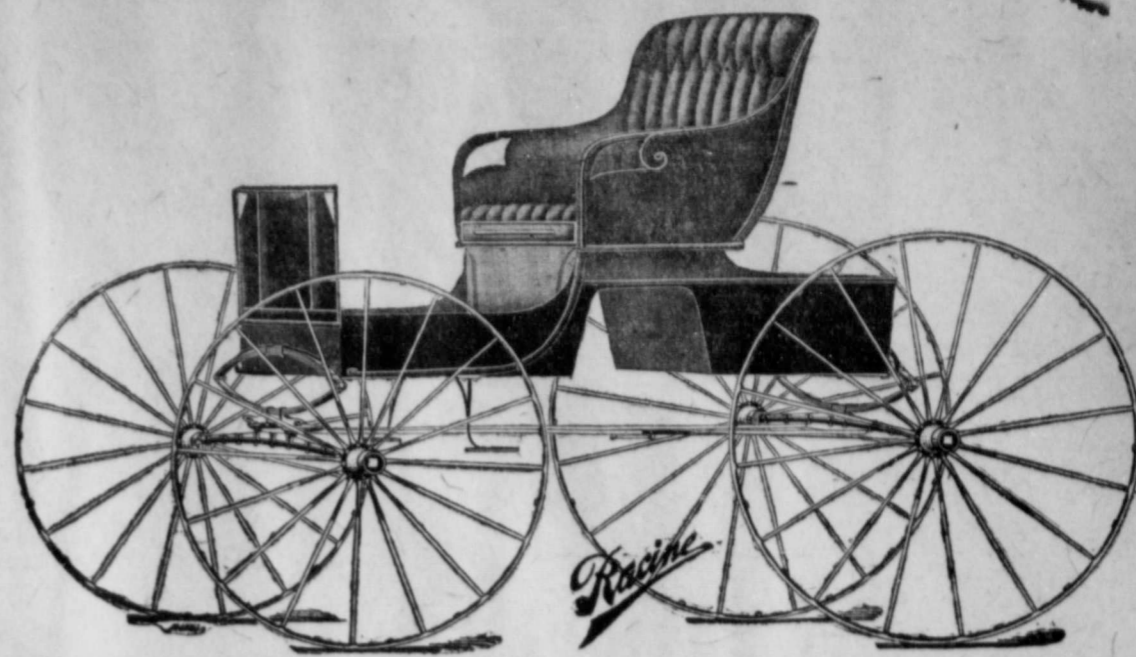

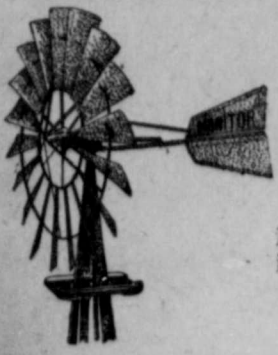

**THE MIRROR TONIC.**

When a Peak Into a Hand Glass May  
Help a Patient.

The looking glass, whether a plus or  
a minus quantity, plays a more impor-  
tant part in the sickroom than most  
nurses and physicians give it credit  
for.

"All things considered, I think it a  
good plan to give a sick person a  
chance to look at himself occasion-  
ally," said a prominent doctor recently.  
"Of course the indulgence must be  
granted with discretion. If a patient  
is really looking seedy a turn at the  
looking glass is equivalent to signing  
his death warrant, but if taken at a  
time when braced up by some stimu-  
lant or a natural ebullition of vital  
force a few minutes of communion  
with his own visage begets any tonic  
I can prescribe. It thrills the patient  
with new hope. It makes him feel  
that he isn't quite so far gone as he  
has thought and that possibly a fight  
for life is, after all, worth while. Be-  
ing thus sensitive, a persistent with-  
holding of a mirror convinces the pa-  
tient that he must be too horrible for  
contemplation, and he promptly de-  
cides that the best thing for him to  
do is to give up the ghost and get out  
of the way."

"That is one of the mistakes hospi-  
tals were apt to make up to a few  
years ago. When I was a young fel-  
low getting my first practice after  
graduation I served on the staff of  
several hospitals, and in all, especially  
in the free wards, those aids to vanity  
were strictly forbidden."—Cleveland  
Plain Dealer.

**THE TIPPING HABIT.**

It Was Worse in the Eighteenth Cen-  
tury Than It Is Now.

The tipping habit is bad enough now-  
adays, but in the eighteenth century it  
was a greater evil than it is at the  
present time. A writer in the Corn-  
hill Magazine tells some stories to il-  
lustrate the old condition of things.

In Edinburgh in 1700 tipping became  
such an evil that the Society of Clerks  
enacted that all servants should be  
forbidden to take tips and members  
be forbidden to give them. This ex-  
ample was followed by other clubs and  
societies. Today there is a rule in  
most clubs against feeling the servants.

An eccentric Irish gentleman, Lord  
Taaffe, used to attend his guests to  
the door, and if they offered any  
money to the servants who were lined  
up with the guests' luggage the host  
would say, "If you give, give it me,  
for it was I that did buy the dinner."

A well known colonel while sitting  
at dinner inquired the names of the  
host's servants. "For," said he, "I  
cannot pay them for such a good din-  
ner, but I should like to remember  
them in my will."

Another eccentric gentleman after  
patiently redeeming his hat, sword,  
cane and cloak to the very bottom of  
his purse turned to the two remain-  
ing servants who were waiting obse-  
quiously, each with a glove, and said  
affably: "Keep those. I will not  
trouble to buy them back." They are old  
and not worth a shilling.

**A King's Trick.**

King Gustavus III. of Sweden had  
been frequently invited to the little  
court of Schwerin. In 1783 he paid a  
visit to Germany, and as soon as the  
Duchess of Mecklenburg heard of his  
approach she prepared fetes in his  
honor. But Gustavus, who disdained  
the petty courts of the small rulers,  
sent two of his attendants—a page  
named Peyron and Desvouges, a valet  
who had formerly been an actor—to  
be entertained by the duchess. The  
two personated the king and his  
minister, Baron Sparre, and sustained  
the characters throughout. They accept-  
ed as their due all the homage meant  
for their master, danced with the  
Mecklenburg ladies who were present-  
ed to them, and Peyron went so far  
as to ask one of the ladies for her  
portrait. Meantime Gustavus was enjoy-  
ing himself elsewhere in secret.

**Richmond Castle.**

Richmond castle was originally one  
of the strongest of Norman keeps. It  
was probably founded by Alan Rufus,  
one of the sons of the Duke of Brit-  
tany, who took a prominent part in  
the suppression of the Saxons. At a  
later age the castle passed into the  
possession of Edmund Tudor, who  
married Margaret Beaufort and be-  
came the father of Henry VII. Henry  
was born Earl of Richmond, and he  
bestowed the title upon the magnif-  
cent palace which when king of Eng-

### THE WOOL MARKET.

The wool market is still dragging and no sales locally have yet been made, the price not being satisfactory to the producer. There is very little wool selling anywhere. One sale was reported from Talpa, Tex., Monday, about 100,000 pounds going at prices ranging from 12 to 16-1-2 cents per pound. The bids were sealed and averaged 14 to 14-1-2 cents, each clip selling separately.

The wool market is in a very unsatisfactory shape, and there seems to be no good reason for it. Local merchants say that in spite of the fact that last year wool was around 25 cents as against 12 and 16 cents now, the manufacturers of clothing have advanced the prices on woolen garments about twenty per cent. The much-talked "high cost of living" seems to effect everything and everybody but the producer. The wool grower is offered 25 to 33 1-3 per cent less, yet will be asked 20 per cent more for the manufactured product.

THE Menard Messenger man wants to know if we place Brady second to Menard. Only in her quality and quantity of editorial gall, Claude, and with the Rochelle Record coming like she is, you better look to your laurels in that line.

OUR correspondent from Voca sounds a keynote of vital importance when he suggests the establishment in Brady of a produce commission house which will handle everything the farmer raises. Such an industry in Brady would do more to promote the development and growth of the county's diversified farming interests than any other one thing which the town could have. McCulloch county will grow anything, and does grow most everything in the way of truck, fruits, vegetables, etc. Especially is this true of the southern portion of the county where the land is peculiarly adapted to such crops. Even now the farmers in that section are producing more stuff of this character than they can dis-

pose of, and it is useless for them to extend their operations unless we give them an absolutely ready market for their stuff. Brady must have a live, wide-awake produce commission firm to take care of this business. The local demand will not consume a thousandth part of the stuff that can be raised in the Voca country alone. Let us have a firm that will buy anything the farmer brings in, shipping out and bringing money into the county. This is a work which the commercial club should undertake at once.

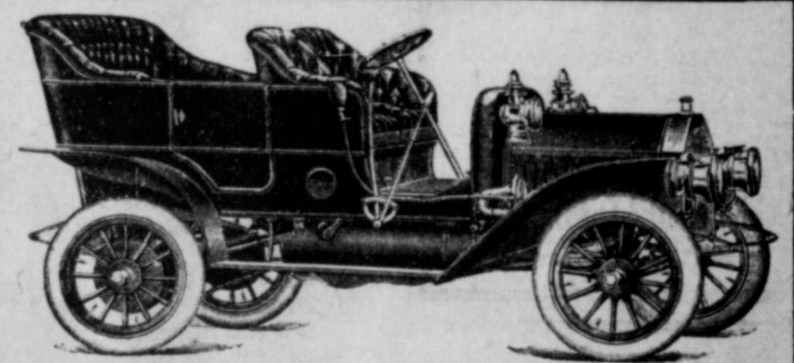

## THE NEW WARD SCHOOL

Work Begun this Week on the Foundations—Plans Call for a Splendid Building for the Money.

Wright & Horn, the contractors, this week began the work of digging the foundation ditches for the new ward school building on the north side. The bonds were received from the printer Monday, and while they have not yet been sold, the School Board has bids for same and expects to place them soon.

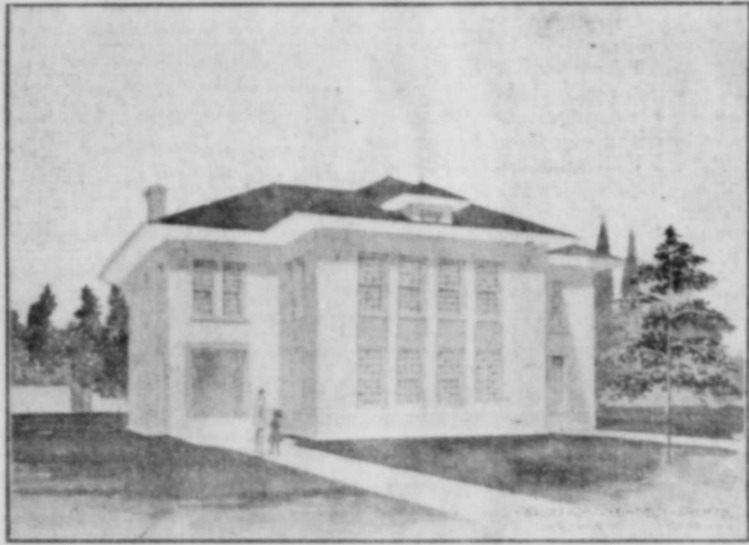
The Standard presents here with a cut of the building as it will appear after completion. The lower floor will consist of four class rooms, a large assembly hall and two nice entrance porches. One class room is 19x24 feet, another 21x30 and the other two 23x21. The assembly hall will be 14x29, while the porches each take up a space 11x19. The upper story will be left in one large room, unfinished, to be cut up into class rooms and finished later as occasion may require and funds permit. There will be a basement 19x25 for steam heat, fuel supply, etc. The building will be of stone

with brick veneer, concrete foundations.

The contract price on the building finished as above stated is \$7126. The bond issue was for \$8000. The difference between these two amounts will go towards paying for the grounds, employing a superintendent, paying for the plans, etc., and there will be nothing left for furniture and equipment.

It occurs to The Standard that the district should supplement this bond issue with another for about \$4000 in order that our school interests should prosper. That amount of money additional would finish the upper story of the new building, buy all the school furniture necessary, and install complete steam heating plants at both schools, doing away with the stove proposition and greatly lessening the danger from fire. The district will probably show an assessed valuation of \$2,000,000 this year, and on that basis a tax of a cent and a half on the \$100 would do the work.

Brady is growing too rapidly to take any chances of neglecting her school interests. We can get along, perhaps, for the present, but our school stands in absolute need of the additional funds in order that the best results may obtain.

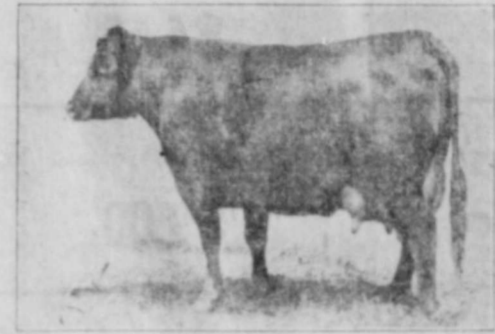

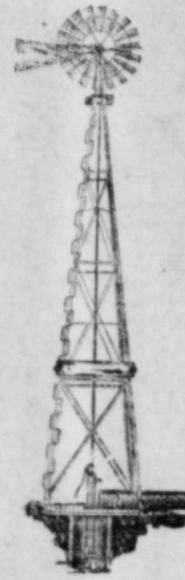
