## SCHOOL BONDS SOLD

State School Board Takes Up the Bonds of Brady School and Work Will be Rushed--Rochelle Happy.

On Monday last the state educational board purchased for the permanent school fund \$130,250 5 per cent school bonds and among the bonds purchased were those of the Brady Independent School and the Rochelle school.

The educational board adopted the very wise system of taking but half the issue of each series purchased at this meeting, thus enabling them to assist double the number of schools at a very critical period.

Our local school board are in a position to appreciate this as it will enable them to rush to completion the handsome school building on the north side. We are informed by a member of the board that the building will be ready for occupancy before the contract limit which is October 1st. Unless delayed by unforeseen causes the contractors will have the building ready for delivery by Sept. 20th and it is probable the school board will postpone the opening of school until that date.

We congratulate the citizens of Rochelle on this successful termination of their labors in the interest of education and progress.

G. L. Miers has moved his family in from his farm near Broadmoor in order to get the benefit of our school this winter. Mr. Miers reports a splendid feed crop raised and cotton will make a fair crop if rain is had soon.

## \$31,000 LAND DEAL

Part of Henderson Ranch, Including Townsite, Sold to Party of Swedes Last Week.

One of the biggest land deals recorded in Brady for a year or more was consummated last week when the Meers Land Co. sold a portion of the F. W. Henderson ranch just over the line in Concho county to a party of Swedes from Elgin, Texas.

The buyers were Bingson Bros. and associates, and the land consists of 909 acres, all tillable, and 460 acres already in cultivation. The land lies on the Frisco between Brady and Menard, about 18 miles from this city, and includes a townsite already decided upon by the railroad officials, they having bought a strip 300x3000 feet for depot grounds and trackage. The total consideration was \$31,825.50, or about \$35 per acre.

The purchasers are thrifty Swedes who have in view the location of a colony of their countrymen and establishing a town.

Arrangements will be made for opening a store, lumber yard and several other business institutions at once. The purchasers will take possession at once and begin the contemplated improvements.

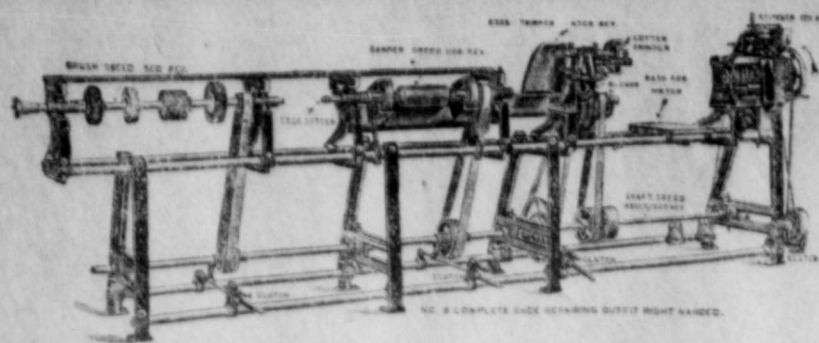

## MR. WOODALL ACCEPTS

Temple Man Accepts Proposition of Brady Commercial Club to Become Secretary Sept. 1st.

Wm. M. Woodall has accepted the position of secretary of the Brady Commercial Club. The board of directors made Mr. Woodall a proposition last week to succeed Mr. Bennett, and this proposition was taken under advisement as told in Tuesday's Standard. On Wednesday a letter was received from Mr. Woodall in which he says:

"After mature deliberation I have concluded to accept the secretaryship of the Brady Commercial Club under the proposition submitted by the board of directors, my services to begin Sept. 1st. In view of the fact that there is some sacrifice in the severance of my connection with the Temple Commercial Club I would call your attention to the importance of the united support of your people in the work I shall undertake upon assuming my duties at Brady, and if there are any who are not in hearty sympathy with your directors in the matter of my employment I shall expect you to advise me in the matter, as I would not undertake the work unless I am assured of hearty support of your people. You can readily appreciate my position in the matter. I will likely have some preliminary suggestions to make regarding the club in the course of a week or so, and if you should see proper to offer any I will be glad to have you write me."

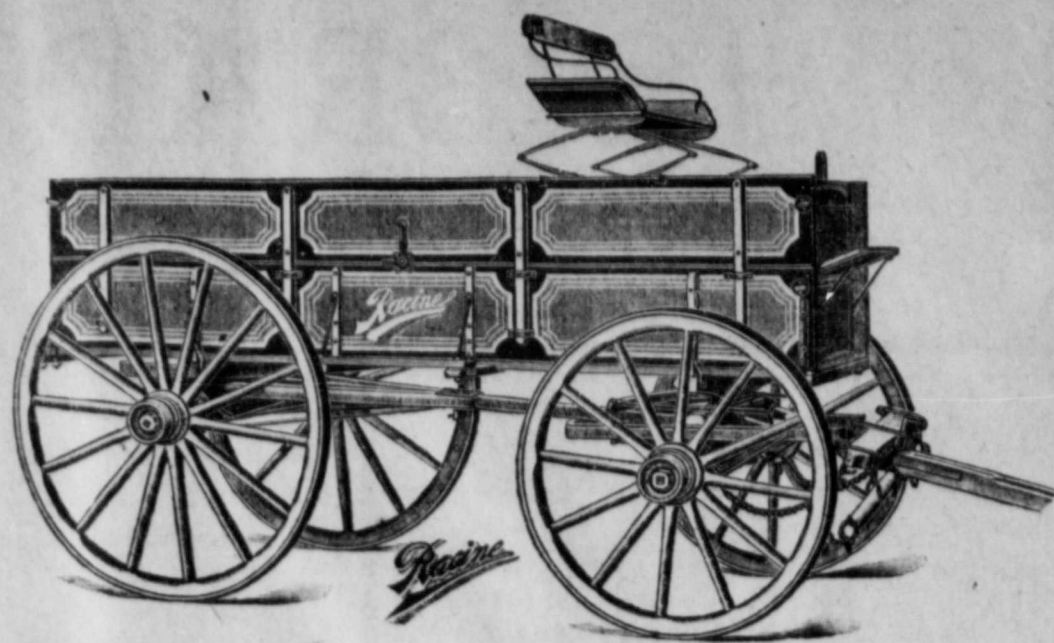

**GOOD ROADS.**

Since history began its records of human events, there has been no surer measure of a nation's advancement and progress, than the mileage of good roads within its geographical limits. Wherever intelligence and energy have been directed to the construction of good roads they have forged ahead of rivalry, in national greatness and prosperity, in exact ratio and degree, to the quantity and quality of the results obtained. Since the very dawn of civilization, when humanity was yet in the half-light and just emerging from primeval darkness, the first and most important consideration seems to have been to make intercommunication easier and more expeditious. Step by step, one generation has absorbed, and improved upon, the experience of the preceding generations until road building has been reduced to a science, though there is much yet to learn. Among the factors contributing to the happiness, prosperity, power and greatness of a people, there is not one deeper or more important than good public roads. It will make no difference how many railways or manufacturing plants a town may have, if it be inaccessible to the surrounding country it cannot prosper, but will perish of inanition. And on the other hand, just in proportion to its accessibility will it grow and flourish. What are railroads for? To distribute the products of the world, are they not? But if the people cannot get to the railroad except by long and arduous toil their visits will be few and far between, and the distribution of articles that would add much to the comfort and pleasure of life is defeated, except in a limited way. But the evil does not stop there. When the labor toll or price of traveling a road to market becomes too great, it will not be traveled at all, and neighborhoods shrink back upon themselves, become clannish and retrograde from once cherished ideals. A striking illustration of this tendency may be found in the mountainous regions of Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia and Arkansas. They are peopled with a race unlike anything to be found in the United States, illiterate, semi-barbarous with idiomatic language scarcely intelligible to the cultured people, totally disinterested in the struggle of mankind to higher levels. And yet they are of our own race and blood, descendants of the Virginia sentries of Jamestown. What has caused this strange metamorphosis of Anglo-Saxon blood? The answer is in the one word—*isolation*—the inaccessibility of their mountain homes. Of course this is an extreme case, but it applies in a degree to every country. High culture and broad, far-seeing intelligence beget civic righteousness, and civic righteousness builds good public roads. The reverse is not less true: low culture and narrow-mindedness is a sad and barren thing, that brings forth nothing of worth to the human race;

worse than that, it often annuls the efforts of broader intelligence by appeals to prejudice and miserly instincts, with arguments that should find no place in the fair discussion of any issue. 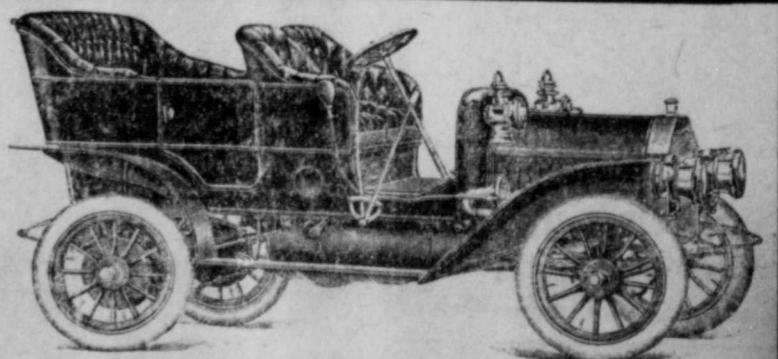

## PLANS FOR SCHOOL

Division of Students to Best  
Possible Advantage.

The school board was in session Tuesday and appointed a board of equalization as follows: A. B. Reagan, Lee McShan and C. A. Trigg. These gentlemen will get together and go over the tax renditions as prepared by Assessor Bradley, equalizing same as may be right and necessary.

The board has also recently employed a Latin teacher in the person of Miss Winnie Lowrence, late of Georgetown. She is a daughter of Prof. D. M. Lowrence, principal of the Rochelle school, and comes to Brady with the highest endorsements as to ability and industry.

The Standard is authorized by a member of the board to state that in the division of students between the main building and the ward building this fall the greatest care will be used to get the best results and give the most general satisfaction. It is stated authoritatively that there will be two sets of primary teachers up to and including the third grade, and probably including the fourth grade. This means that all children in these grades will attend school in the building nearest to them. It is the intention of the board to so arrange this matter that none of the smaller children will have to cross the creek. The Standard is authorized to state that patrons of the school living in the extreme south part of town will not be forced to send their small children to the north side building, and vice versa.

This point is one that many patrons will be glad to know is settled. This rumor, we are authorized to say, is incorrect.

Sunday School Association a  
Great Success.

The inspiring sight of four hundred children on parade marked the opening of the First Annual Picnic of the McCulloch County Sunday School Association Wednesday morning. Headed by the Sweden band, with banners of their respective Sunday schools gaily fluttering in the breeze, the children, accompanied by their teachers proudly marched around the square, and the splendid showing they made aroused interest on all sides.

After the parade, the Dutton Grove claimed the children, their parents and friends for the rest of the day. Tom Bell in his usual happy manner welcomed all to the picnic grounds, and Will H. Mayes, of Brownwood, responded to the welcome in a few well chosen words.

Then dinner claimed everyone's attention, such a dinner as only the ladies of McCulloch county know how to prepare, unsurpassed in quality and in quantity such that no one had any occasion to leave the grounds with the least pang of hunger.

In the afternoon several short addresses were given. Will Mayes in his address on "Sunday School Union Work and Co-Operation" spoke of the great work the Sunday Schools were accomplishing and praised each teacher for the part he or she took in the work. He spoke of the need of unity and co-operation among the Sunday Schools to accomplish greater good and heartily congratulated the citizens of McCulloch county upon their successful efforts along this line.

Rev. John A. Johnson, president of Trinity College at Round Rock, in "Education in Christian Sunday School Work" said it was a duty the parents owed their children to give them a thorough Christian education to prepare them to meet and overcome the

pitfalls and obstacles of this life. Dr. E. P. Oleson, of Lynchburg, Kansas, gave "A Few Remarks" on his impressions of Texas in a naive and altogether pleasing manner, and his address served to put all the picnickers in better humor than ever.

Summing up the occasion it may be said to have been one of the most successful picnics ever held in Brady. **Good Roads in McCulloch County.**

The greatest developers of a city or county are good roads.

Tracing the history of road-building from ancient times, we find that the greatest nations were road builders.

The best roads of ancient times were constructed by the Romans. By means of these splendid highways, the Roman Emperors were enabled to transport their troops from province to province with such rapidity, that they were able to hold in subjection the then civilized world. Remains of these roads are to be seen today after two thousand years.

Other nations from time to time patterned after these roads, until at the present day the most remote portions of Europe are traversed by roads as good as the very best in our country.

Of all the nations of Europe that are in the advanced rank of the road builders of today, none are doing more than France. While her roads have cost her \$612,775,000, yet she has gotten in return for her investment many times this amount. As a result of the improved conditions of these roads, in these countries, their farmers haul produce to market at an average cost of only ten cents per ton per mile, and in some cases as low as seven cents, while as a result of the bad conditions of American roads, our farmers are forced to pay an average expense of twenty-three cents per mile per ton on produce hauled to market or shipping point.

In this country the average haul from farm to shipping point is 9.4 miles, and the cost twenty-three cents per ton per mile, making the cost of hauling the huge tonnage over \$600,000,000 per year. At least half of this enormous amount could be saved by the construction of good roads.

In this great country of ours, which we boast of as being the greatest nation of the world, we have thousands of miles of road that is a burlesque upon the pride of advancement of the U. S. But thanks to the splendid examples of good roads in European countries, and common sense of the American people, we are awaking to the importance of having public highways which are in condition for all kinds of traffic. But some of the Northern and Eastern states, in recent years, have built roads at comparatively little cost considering the results obtained, which have demonstrated the more backward portions of the country the necessity of having highways over which our farmers can haul their products.

Georgia is attracting favorable notice by her great activity in road building. This spirit of progress has made itself felt in a number of counties in Texas. It is a pleasure to ride over the recently constructed roads in Dallas, Harris and Brown Counties.

The time has come in Texas when all counties that wish to be in the front ranks, will pay more serious attention to this important matter.

Coming down to this county, we find the leading farmers and business men, are awake to the necessity of making the McCulloch county roads more serviceable.

I have just been informed by a prominent citizen of the London community, that, if the road leading from that section to Brady is not put in better condition, those people will go to Menard or Kerrville instead of coming to Brady as a great many of them are doing.

Towns around us are fixing up their roads. As a result they will enlarge their trade territory at the expense of our own. Mason is putting her roads, leading this way, in good shape. Farmers from 10 to 30 miles distant from Brady will transfer their trade to the new building towns around us if our roads leading out of Brady are not put in better condition. We owe it to our

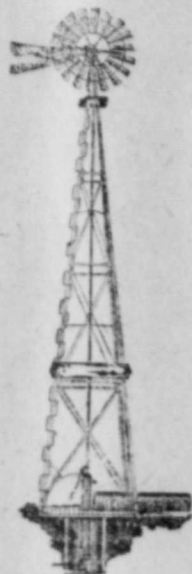

**An Exclusive Consumer.**

The tramp consumes as little as he can and gets it as cheaply as he can. Low price products make tramp life easy and farm life difficult, and vice versa. All the people are consumers, and most all people consume more or less the products of another. Most all the people are producers directly or indirectly, and net profits accrue only by production exceeding consumption. High prices for products of the farm, mine, factory, etc., and all lines of productive and industrial endeavor encourage development and promote prosperity. Low prices cheapen labor, stagnate development, discourage production and destroy prosperity.

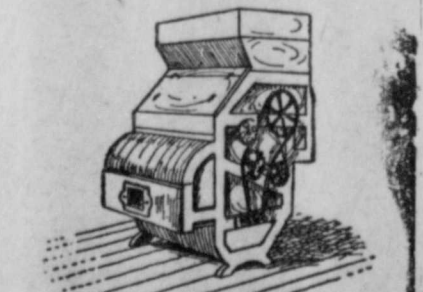


**Plowing and Planning.**
