TO VOTE ON 4 BRIDGES

Commissioners Court Will Issue Election Order on Bonds for Four Bridges in McCulloch County.

The county commissioners are busy today shaping up an election order for bridge bonds. According to the order as it will appear the people of McCulloch county will on some date in September be given an opportunity to vote bonds for bridges as follows:

Stacy, \$11,000.
Waldrip, \$9,000.
Voca, \$12,000.
Brady, \$8,000.

The election order will be so worded as to enable the voters to vote for any one or more of the propositions and against the others, but there will be only one ticket. Last year an election was held and the three bridges at Stacy, Waldrip and Voca were authorized, but on account of technicalities in the preparation of the ballot and the manner of making returns all three elections were knocked out by the attorney general. This year the court is using great care in every detail of the proposition and it is confidently expected that a transcript will be sent to Austin which will stand the closest scrutiny of the Czar of Bond Issues.

The amounts called for in the orders relating to Stacy and Waldrip are just half of the amounts necessary to construct those bridges, Coleman county being expected to take a similar action to provide money for its half. The law prevents any county from applying its funds in another county, and McCulloch county can only build half way across the Colorado river. It is said that Coleman county will toe the mark manfully when the time comes. The people over there are feeling somewhat sheepish over their former failure and will doubtless vote right next time.

Members of the McCulloch county court expressed themselves yesterday as being of the opinion that the bond election in

all four cases would carry by handsome majorities. The dangerous condition of the Brady bridge is considered in the nature of an emergency and the election will be held at the earliest possible date consistent with thorough preparation.

Postmaster David Doole, Jr., left Sunday night for Dallas to attend the Republican State Convention. If the republicans would nominate Dave for governor and the vote of McCulloch county would elect him Mr. Colquitt would probably only attend the next inaugural ball as a guest. But they won't do it; they never do anything right.

Grade Work Almost Finished.

The Bulletin learns that the grade work on the Brownwood North & South railroad will be completed within the next two weeks. Already a number of the contractors have finished their work and are moving their outfits to the Santa Fe work out of Brady. The completion of this work naturally leads to the question when will track laying begin. That is a question that will be answered by the railroad committee probably this afternoon, but it is not likely that track laying will be begun until more money has been paid into the treasury. Not near all of the first three-tenths assessed in the spring has been paid and the fourth payment is not due until in the fall. The road is assured but it will take time to build it. Be patient. Brownwood Bulletin.

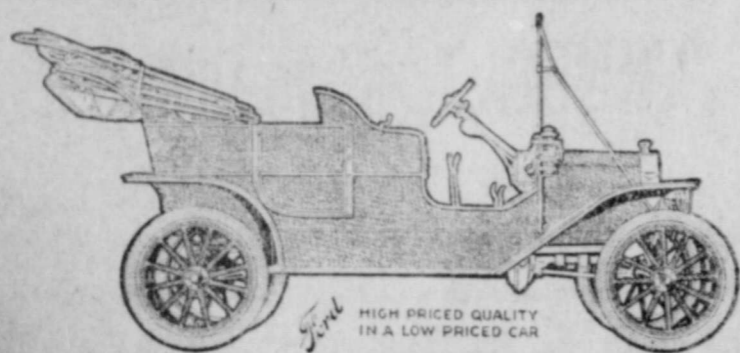

NUMBER OF ELECTION ECHO FROM S. S. PICNIC

McCulloch County Man in Interview at Fort Worth States Local Option Election Probable

Following upon a period of six year's strenuous prohibition rule, McCulloch county at the fall election may line up with the wet counties of Texas, if the opinion of Lee Shuler, a Brady cattleman, who marketed two carloads of steers Wednesday, counts for anything. Mr. Shuler says that anti-prohibition leaders of Brady are preparing a petition requesting the county commissioners to order an election in an effort to slip from underneath a dry rule.

The above item was published in last Thursday's Fort Worth Record and has attracted considerable attention in Brady. The Standard is free to admit that this is the first we had heard of a probable local option election in McCulloch county, and we have so far been unable to find anyone in Brady who would vouch for the truth of the statement. Judge Joe A. Adkins, who is looked upon as an anti, but who is in fact an anti only as applies to statewide prohibition, was seen by our reporter and said:

"If there is any move on foot by the anti-prohibitionists of McCulloch county to bring on a local option election this fall I am not aware of it, and I think I would be if such an election was in prospect. Speaking for myself I am opposed to any such election, this fall or any other time. I am strictly in favor of local option and do not want to see open saloons in McCulloch county again, and if an election is brought on by the anti I will take the stump against it and do all in my power to aid the prohibitionists of this county in keeping out the saloon and maintaining the present admirable system of local option. While I am opposed to statewide prohibition I am strictly in favor of local option and am well satisfied with present conditions here. Brady doesn't need open saloons and doesn't want them and we won't have them. I think the Shular interview a big windy."

Judge Adkins' opinion is shared by the public generally so far as The Standard can ascertain, and we feel sure that if an election was held the majority for local option would be bigger than before. Local option is a success here, and McCulloch county will continue in the dry column.

They marched over several blocks and the men, women and children, carrying numerous banners indicating the school from which they came, was a most impressive sight, one long to be remembered. A number stated that the march alone did enough good to repay all cost and effort that had been made for the convention.

At the grounds there was music by a brass band, and it was good music too. This was followed by an address of welcome by Tom Bell and a response and then came dinner. And such a dinner! There was everything imaginable to eat and in greatest plenty, and the crowd did ample justice to it. The way they ate was a compliment to the culinary skill of everyone who took part in the preparation of the meal.

After dinner there was more good music and speechmaking and this was followed by reports from all the Sunday schools represented, votes of thanks, etc. After this the people lingered in the lovely grove meeting and greeting friends and discussing privately many Sunday school problems. 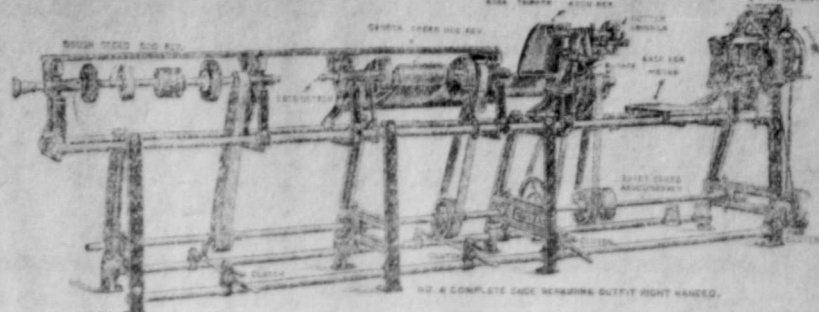

Death of Henry Kothman.

Henry Kothman, a well known and highly respected citizen of the Field Creek community, died at his home on Friday morning, the 20th of July, at the age of fifty-four years, six months and seventeen days. His death was due to asphyxiation and a rupture of several blood vessels.

On the evening of the 28th, a blast of dynamite was set off in the well of the deceased. The following morning Leon Chew, who had contracted to clean the well, came in to clean it. Mr. Chew climbed down into the well, but after being down there a few minutes complained of too much gas having collected to continue the work. While ascending from the well on a ladder, Mr. Chew was overcome by the gases. Mr. Kothman immediately descended and tied a rope around Chew's waist. Chew was then drawn up. As Mr. Kothman was ascending the ladder, he was overcome by the gases and fell back. Before help could be summoned to rescue Mr. Kothman he had passed into an unconscious state. As soon as aid arrived Mr. Kothman was taken out of the well and all possible in the power of those present was done for him. Artificial respiration was applied but to no avail, a doctor who had been hastily summoned arrived within an hour after the accident happened, but before he arrived Mr. Kothman had breathed his last.

The deceased is survived by his three brothers, Fritz of Field Creek, John of San Antonio, and William of Pontotoc, who besides a great number of other relatives and many friends mourn his untimely death.—Mason News.

COUNTY TAX RATE 45c

Commissioners Court in Regular Session Cuts County Rate 20c on \$100 From Last Year.

The county commissioners court convened Monday morning and immediately got very busy. A big stack of accounts were allowed and much other business attended to during the first two days of the session.

One of the most important actions taken was the setting of the county tax rate for the ensuing year. A cut of 20 cents on the \$100 valuation was made, making the rate 45c this year against 65c last year. The tax is divided as follows:

- Advalorum, 25c.
- Road and Bridge Bonds, 2 1-2c.
- General Road purposes, 12 1-2c.
- Jury Fund, 2 1-2c.
- Court House Bond Fund, 2 1-2c.
- Total, 45c.

The state tax this year is 4c advalorum and 16 2-3c school, a reduction of 1 cent from last year, making the total state and county tax this year 65 2-3c against 86 2-3c last year.

Tax Assessor Quicksall's rolls show an increase of about a half million dollars in taxable values over last year, and this was the basis on which the reduction was figured.

Wm. Hoerster Dead.
