## FRISCO HOG TRAIN

The Fort Worth & Rio Grande to Run a Special Hog Demonstration Train. In Brady on 28th.

The Frisco will start a hog demonstration train out of Brownwood tomorrow, Aug. 27, and the train will be in Brady all day Sunday, the 28th. On Sunday afternoon the car will be open to the public, and the experts accompanying it will be ready to answer any and all questions and give out all information concerning hog raising that is in their power. It is especially desired that all farmers in the Brady territory be present and see this exhibition and hear the lectures.

The train will consist of the usual car of thoroughbred hogs, a car for lecture purposes, besides a sleeping car for those accompanying it. Representatives of both the freight and passenger department of the Frisco will be present, and it is their desire to make the trip one of common interest to all concerned.

Trains of this nature have recently been run by a number of Texas roads. The gospel of more and better hogs has been spread broad east throughout the state, and the Frisco hopes to be equally successful with this train. The Brady country will produce as good hogs as any other section of Texas, and they can be placed on the market as cheaply. The Standard trusts that every farmer who can possibly do so will see this exhibit and hear the hog experts discourse on the best manner of hog raising. Remember the date—Sunday afternoon, Aug. 28th.

The train will be at Rochelle Monday afternoon, Aug. 29, and at Mercury Tuesday, Aug. 30th. The people of those communities are requested to see the exhibit.

### Weather Bureau.

The commercial club through Secretary Hardison has been at work lately on the proposition to secure a U. S. Weather Bureau Sub-Station at Brady, and the prospects for success seem good. The usual formal application has been filed through Congressman Slayden and the matter is taking its course.

This sub-station will mean a salaried man for Brady to look after the business as is now done at Abilene, Amarillo and various other places in Texas. The weather bulletins will be received and disseminated by telephone, and Manager Paxton of the local telephone system is co-operating with the club in the work. A big flag-pole will also be erected on which to fly the signals.

In the meantime the Houston headquarters will supply Brady with a government rain gauge and temperature apparatus, which will be attended to by the secretary until the pay station has been established.

This will be of advantage in many ways, and the service will be appreciated by town people and farmers alike.

### An Optimist.

H. B. Yeager is one of the optimistic sort, and shows it when he boldly states that in his opinion Brady will market 25,000 bales of cotton this season. Mr. Yeager has been buying cotton on the local market for three years and is quite well acquainted with conditions. He maintains that conditions are better than they were this time last season, and that there will be a better crop made than most people anticipate.

Of course, Mr. Yeager's opinion is not concurred in by everyone. Others who keep tab on the cotton crop make estimates ranging all the way from 8000 to 16,000 bales. Brady marketed last year between 16,000 and 17,000 bales, after one of the most discouraging prospects the country had ever faced. In view of this fact The Standard is inclined to the opinion that the crop this year will be about as good as last.

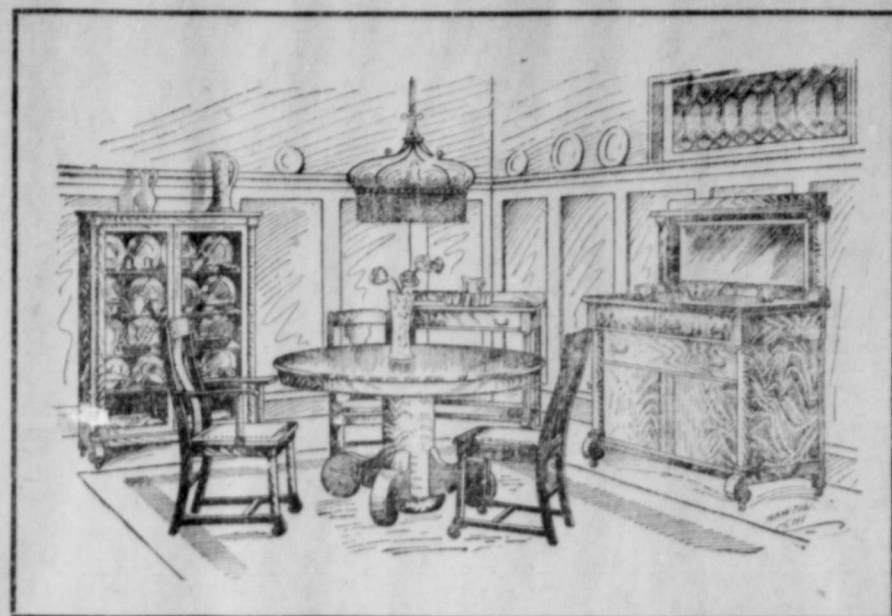

"Hot, dry and dull" is the  
way a visitor from Brady de-  
scribed things over his way; but  
possibly he was expecting too  
much of the little place. One  
must not think, you know, that  
Brady should measure up to  
Magnificent Menard.—Menard  
Messenger.

Yes, it was (note the past tense)  
dry and hot in Brady. But Bra-  
dy very much prefers the for-

mer dryness to a wetness of the  
kind usually prevalent in Menard.  
And the wetness of it seems to  
have worked its will with Callan  
for he has become the victim of  
strange dreams. Does he not  
know that when a would-be ath-  
lete flings a challenge at the feet  
of a champion he must have first  
established a reputation for  
prowess? So! Then Menard  
must get some sort of fame be-  
sides that of "wetness" before  
she can indulge a dream of  
measuring lances with a city  
like beautiful, bustling, busy  
Brady.

As shown in our last week's  
issue the proposed bonds for  
county bridges could not possi-  
bly increase the county taxes  
more than 5 1-2 cents on the  
\$100 valuation, and when we  
take into consideration the many  
benefits to be derived from such  
taxation we do not see any argu-  
ment against the issue, even  
though we do not mention the  
convenience of having bridges  
across these streams, which, we  
contend, would alone amply re-  
pay us for the outlay. To have  
the bridges would be an adver-  
tisement of our country to every  
one who made the county a visit,  
no matter what the purpose of  
the visit might be, and it would  
soon be well known that we  
were a progressive people and  
our much desired development  
would increase in rapidity. In  
addition to all the other benefits  
mentioned we might mention the  
great benefit to be derived by  
the laboring people who will feel  
the effects of the short crops  
more forcibly than any other  
class as it is well known that a  
great portion of the money ex-  
pended for bridges would go to  
laborers, teams, etc., and would  
remain in the county and con-  
tribute to pay bills and buy nec-  
essaries for those pressed by  
the hard times, and in the mean-  
while the laborer who pays taxes  
on \$1,000 worth of property  
would only at the limit pay an  
annual bond tax of 55 cents, in  
other words the laborer could ap-  
ply one week's work, at ordinary  
wages and pay his tax for five or  
ten years and have a balance to  
his credit. We do not think  
that a bond issue could possibly  
oppress the poor but as we now  
have immense values in railroads  
we think it prudent to vote the  
tax and have them contribute  
to our upbuilding and conveni-  
ences.

J. M. McAtee was a county  
site visitor from Bowser Mon-  
day. He reports that Charlie  
King, who lives on E. E. Fagg's  
rich sandy land farm in the Bow-  
ser section, has the distinction of  
putting the first bale of 1910  
cotton into Mercury. He re-  
ceived 15 1-2 cents for it and a  
premium of \$16.50. Mr. McAtee  
says the cotton crop in the sand  
is deteriorating fast the last few  
days and will be far below last  
year's yield, though the corn  
crop in that section is good for  
the season.—San Saba News.

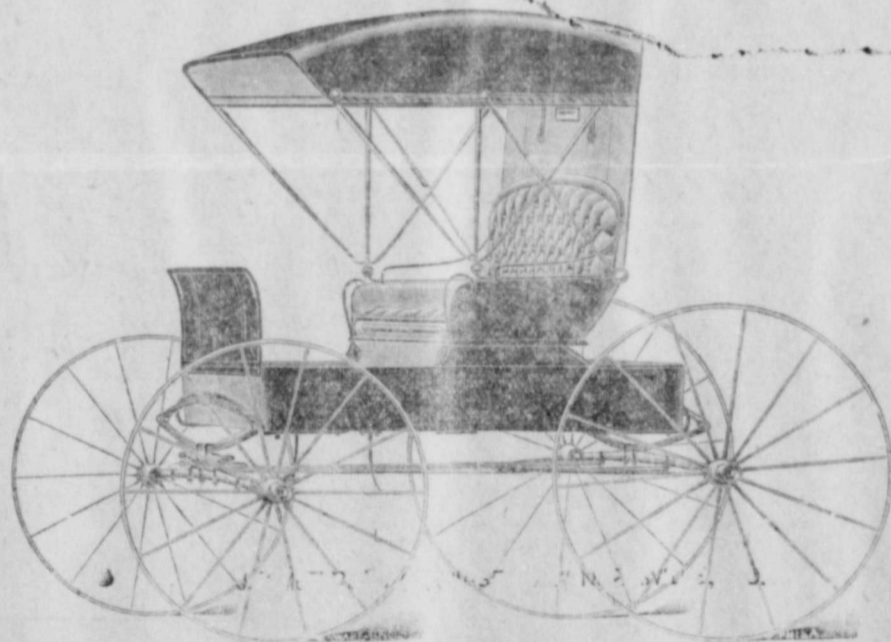

## A GOOD COTTON CROP

The Kinsel Farm Near Nine, Hailed Out in June, Now Promises Quarter Bale to Acre—Good Rain.

Rev. J. A. Kinsel, of Nine, was a pleasant caller at The Standard office Saturday, and was highly pleased with the rain of Friday which he says was good in his locality.

Mr. Kinsel reported the fifty acres of cotton which was seemingly ruined by the hail on June 30th, as having come out wonderfully, and now promises a yield of one-fourth bale per acre. This field was knee high when the hail struck it, and was stripped of every leaf and twig and the stumps badly bruised. It was thought to be ruined, but on the contrary new shoots put out just above the ground and the field is now more than knee high, with a good stand and full of fruit. The rain came just right for it.

Mr. Kinsel and sons are farmers who "live at home and board at the same place." They raise their feed stuffs and hay with a surplus to sell every year, and what is more to the point, they raise their own meat. Mr. Kinsel says he has hogs, and corn to feed them, and even if the cotton crop should fail he has his living made. He is a strong advocate of this style of farming, and says McCulloch county is as good a country for diversified farming as the state affords.

## NEW 25-TON ICE PLANT

Brady Will Have Adequate Ice Factory for Next Season—Organization Already Effected.

Clay Sandridge, an experienced ice factory man from Stephenville, was here last week and closed a deal with the stockholders of the Brady Ice Factory whereby a new company is organized with Mr. Sandridge as the heaviest shareholder, the members of the old company putting in their old plant and retaining their stock.

A plot of ground was purchased just across the creek from the water works station and on the new Santa Fe rightofway, and the new plant will be erected thereon. A complete new plant with a daily capacity of twenty-five tons will be installed, and the work of preparation will begin at once and the plant will be ready in ample time for next season.

One of the directors informs The Standard that the old plant will probably be moved to the new location and operated in connection with the new plant, thus giving the company a daily output of thirty-one tons per day.

Mr. Sandridge will move to Brady and take active management of the business.

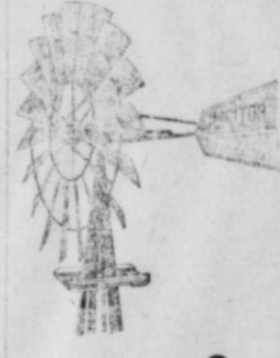

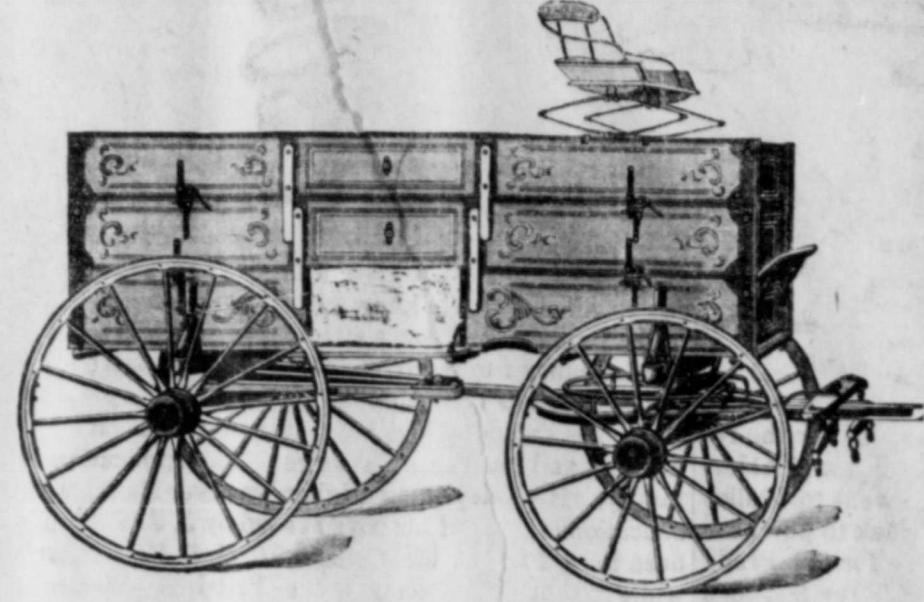

There are many movers but they are from beyond Eden, from the west, northwest and southwest, and are nearly all renters. And the fact that they are renters offers another opportunity to repeat a trite truism, that the home-makers and home-owners are the basic

factors upon which the growth and stable prosperity of every country must rest. Any other foundation is ephemeral and delusive. And there are the home-makers and home-owners, considering the large undeveloped area, as long as land is held at present figures in West Texas. I have personal knowledge of the fact that Brady territory is losing some of her very best citizens because they realize the impossibility of ever owning a home at present prices. Of course we sometimes proudly record the sale of large tracts of land at large prices, but it is to be doubted—very seriously doubted—whether such sales are not more of a calamity than a blessing to the country at large, because it encourages the big land owners to hold for the higher prices, dis-

courages prospectors of moderate means, and speeds the parting guest to every point of the compass, instead of persuading them to settle and make their home among us, in this, the fairest land in all the west. But there is nobody leaving the Eden country; they are a brave and patient people, and they are standing up to the rack, fodder or no fodder. That is to say, the large majority; there are a few, however, a very few, who seem to be down and out, whose general appearance most forebodingly reminds me of the rag I lost off my poor sore toe, when I was a boy.
